

Fanned Flames Help Contractor Clear Brush, Trees From Land

Blowing into the coals of his barbecue pit to get the fire started gave a Texas man a great idea, an idea that has meant thousands of dollars of revenue to his business.

E. N. Sonnier, a Houston earthmoving and road-building contractor, has applied the simple trick of fanning a fire in his work of clearing land for oil companies, industrial districts and highways.

He mounted a 5-foot electric fan on a truck and ingeniously installed a 50-gallon drum of diesel oil behind it, along with a pump which squirts the oil 30 to 40 feet into trees, trunks and brush which have been piled up. Waiting a day or so for the sap to drain out of the wood, he touches a match to the pile, sometimes as high as a 2-story building, starts his fan and

THE ANGELUS

One of the world's best-known paintings is "The Angelus" by the french artist, Jean Millet. The painting shows two French peasants pausing at their work in a field to pray. They have heard the sound of the Angelus bell in a distant tower and in humility and deep reverence they bow their heads in prayer and thanksgiving.

The Angelus is a devotion in honor of the Incarnation of Our Lord, recited at morning, noon and evening at the ringing of the Angelus bell. It takes its name from the opening word of the Latin form. "Angelus Domini nuntiavit Mariae" ("The Angel of the Lord declared unto Mary"). The devotion consists of the Hail Mary said three times together with certain versicles, responses and concluding prayer:

responses and concluding prayer:

V. The Angel (Angelus) of the Lord declared unto Mary.

R. And she conceived of the Holy Spirit. Hail Mary, etc.

V. Behold the handmaid of the Lord. R. Be it done unto me according to thy word.

Hail Mary, etc.
V. And the Word was made flesh.
R. And dwelt among us.
Hail Mary, etc.

Let us pray; pour forth, we beseech Thee, O Lord, Thy grace into our hearts; that we, to whom the Incarnation of Christ, thy Son, was made known by the message of an angel, may by His Passion and Cross be brought to the glory of His resurrection. Through the same Christ Our Lord. Amen.

This devotion developed gradually, probably from the ancient monastic custom of reciting certain prayers which include the salutation of the Archangel Gabriel to Mary. These words began to be used by the people as a daily prayer. By the four-teenth and fifteenth centuries it was in common usage throughout all of Europe and in the form which is used today.

We mention these few facts about the Angelus for this reason: Here at the Catholic Church at 9th and Roland, we are presently installing a Schulmerich "Carillonic Bells" instrument which will not only ring the time of Sunday and daily Masses, but also ring the Angelus three times each day. We felt sure that many of you would be curious as to the meaning of bells ringing everday at 7 o'clock in the morning, at 12 noon, and at 6 in the evening. We felt, too, that there would be questions asked. And for that reason we took the liberty of giving an explanation of the Angelus is this

We sincerely hope, too, that when you hear the sound of the Angelus bells it will remind you to pause for a few moments in your busy day and give thanks to God for the many gifts and blessings He has given us, particularly the gift of the Incarnation and the Redemption.




