**Farmer & Rancher To Be Chosen**

Texas prestige awards for total accomplishment in the field of commercial agriculture — the 1966 Hoblitzelle Awards for the Advancement of Texas Rural Life — are announced today by Texas Search Foundation.

The two farmers or ranchers chosen for the awards will receive the state's highest recognition given to individual land operators during Texas Research Foundation's Awards Dinner at Remier on Wednesday, May 18, 1966.

"Search for the two men is underway through a team of statewide committees," said Dr. C. L. Landell, Director of the Foundation. "The recipient will be a

junior farmer and ranchman who is 35 years of age or younger. The other will be a senior who has passed his thirty-sixth birthday."

Next May each will be presented an award of \$5,000 in cash, a gold medal and a scroll in recognition for his outstanding contribution to the improvement of rural life in the state. The four year period of service covered by the awards is July 1, 1961 through July 1, 1965.

"Any farmer or rancher operating in Texas is eligible for the 1966 Hoblitzelle Awards," Dr. Landell continued. Any organization, business, institution or person may make nominations to the proper committee. The candidate's actual plan of land improvement will receive utmost consideration in the selection. The Director added.

The Statewide Search is carried out by five state regional committees — one in each of the five areas of the State Association of Soil Conservation District. Nominations may be made to any member of the state regional committee in the area in which the candidate lives.

All nominations for the honor must be submitted to the proper committee by December 1, 1965. Members of each regional committee are the vice president of The State Association of the Soil Conservation Districts, the Area vice president of the State Association of Young Farmers of Texas, an area supervisor of Vocational Agriculture Education, a district agent of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, an area conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service, and an outstanding banker.

The biennial awards — the most lucrative and all encompassing given in Texas agriculture — are donated by the Hoblitzelle Foundation of Dallas and presented by the Karl Hoblitzelle Agricultural Laboratory of Texas Research Foundation, administrator of the awards.

The Hoblitzelle Foundation was established in 1944 by Karl St. John Hoblitzelle, Dallas philanthropist, who has been active for half century in civic, educational, cultural, patriotic and charitable movements.

Winners of the 1964 awards were Albert Roach, Lamar County farmer-stockman of Depue and Bill Sherman of Leakey, Garza County farmer and ranchman and junior respectively.

**Walter Rogers Column**

Congressman Walter Rogers said today "the year's most heated floor fight" is in prospect this week as the House of Representatives conducts its debate on proposed repeal of Section 14(b) of the Taft-Hartley Act.

Congressman Rogers said no one could predict with certainty the outcome of the issue. "Both sides are claiming to have the necessary votes," Congressman Rogers said. "It appears that the outcome will be extremely close."

The Congressman said he believed most House members from Texas would oppose repeal of the section. Congressman Rogers said "It has been my position that the basic issues involved in this controversy are matters within the jurisdiction of the States and should not be preempted by the Federal Government. Section 14(b) reserves this right in the States."

Section 14 (b) of the Taft-Hartley Act, on the Federal lawbooks since 1947, permits States to enact laws prohibiting membership in a labor union from being required as a condition of employment.

The decision by the house on this matter will clear the way for consideration - probably in the week of August 1-7 - of the Omnibus Farm Bill," Congressman Rogers said.

Meanwhile, Congressman Rogers will preside Wednesday, Thursday and Friday as the Subcommittee on Irrigation and Reclamation conducts hearings on three reclamation projects proposed in Western areas. They are the Tualatin Project, Oregon; the Manson and Chief Joseph Dam Project, State of Washington; and the Southern Nevada Water Project.

Congressman Rogers is chairman of the subcommittee which has initial House jurisdiction over Federal reclamation projects providing municipal, industrial and irrigation water supplies and conservation and reclamation benefits.

The House Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce, of which Congressman Rogers is a ranking member, will continue hearing this week into legislation proposing a massive Federal program to battle heart disease, cancer, stroke, and other major diseases.

Congressman Rogers will also take part during the week in a House-Senate Conference committee meeting to resolve differences in water desalination program legislation passed by the two houses of Congress.

**Sen. Tower Says**

Thousands of Texans have written to me urging retention of our state's Right-to-work law. I certainly agree with them that Texans should keep the right to make free choice about union

membership. It is illegal to deny employment to any person because of race, color, creed, or national origin. It would seem strange, therefore, to deny employment to a citizen who prefers not to join a union.

Right-to-Work means a man is free to become an active, dues-paying union member if this is in his best interest. Right-to-work means he also is free not to join a union if he feels that is best. This is the way of free men. It should continue to be the way of Texans.

Unions are strong and well led. They are that way because they pay better attention to their knitting than do unions in states where compulsory membership is required. Right-to-Work does not interfere in any way with legitimate union activity. It merely guarantees all workers against compulsion.

We should not any more make a man join a union to hold his job than we would force him to work for a specific firm, if he wants a job.

In addition, our state's continued favorable economic progress is at stake. Over the past decade all Texans have benefited because freedom of choice has been preserved for our workers.

For instance, in the number of new jobs created over the decade, Texans enjoy nearly a 10 percent advantage over non-Right-to-Work states.

In number of new manufacturing jobs created, the Texas advantage is 29 percent. And, all these new jobs are available for all Texans whether they prefer union membership or not.

Because of our Right-to-Work law, we have a better state, better unions, more jobs, and better labor management relations.

The U. S. House of Representatives may vote this week on the question of repealing our state law. If the House does vote for repeal, the fight will shift to the Senate, where I will do all I can to see that our state law is retained and that the right of changing such state laws remains with the states and their people.

**Meredith Walleye Growing Rapidly**

Tiny walleye fry released in Lake Meredith two months ago are already three inches long, reports Aquatic Biologist Lomae Peters of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

On May 10, a half million walleye about one-fourth inch long were flown from Spirit Lake, Iowa, to Borger, Texas and released in Lake Meredith.

Meredith, one of the three Texas lakes recently stocked with walleye, now impounds 6,000 surface acres. When full, the lake will cover 20,000 surface acres.

The three-inch walleye recently captured were in excellent condition indicating the 500,000 wall-

**The Way I See It**

I believe God's Holy Spirit works thru certain means. Just as a farmer uses a tractor or a plow, so the Holy Spirit uses means which are commonly defined as the Word of God and the Holy Sacraments.

The emphasis is that both the Word and Sacrament should be emphasized. The Sacraments are not magical things, nor is the emphasis only on the word. He who belittles the sacraments belittles both Christ and the word.

The sacraments are dependent upon the Word for the Word if God fixes the value of the sacrament. Some say baptism or Lord's Supper don't save. I Peter 3:21 states "Baptism does now save us." or Matt. 26:28 says concerning the Lord's Supper "Unto the remission of sins."

Thus in the sacraments there is an inter-communication an interaction between God and man. It is God who reaches into our lives and creates faith and maintains it. Without the Word baptism is simply water and not baptism. Or the bread and wine are simply that without the word. But God's word makes them means, ways that the Holy Spirit teaches into our lives to strengthen, guide, forgive us. They in no way limit Jesus, in fact it is still Jesus and his Word that bring power to the Word and Sacraments.

Thus it is the work of the Spirit to make us partake of salvation. This is alone God's work and He uses means to bring this to us. If the sacraments are underestimated in value, as some do, the grace of God is also frequently underestimated. Salvation becomes something I help achieve by a particular kind of conversation. It can easily become a form of legalism where there is only one way to approach God. How we need to guard against extremes of magical sacramental formulas or underestimating their value.

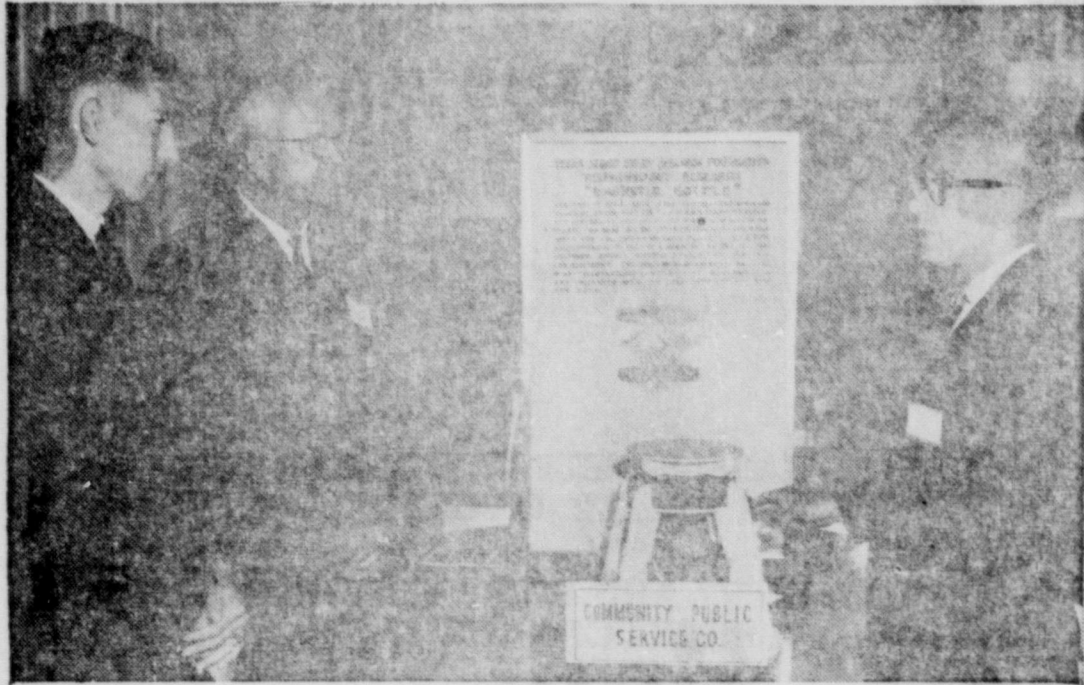
