Washington News Letter From Your Congressman Walter Rogers

November 28th, 1958
TO THE PEOPLE OF THE 18TH DISTRICT

"WHAT IS PAST IS PROLOGUE"

Nearly four centuries ago the above lines were written by Shakespeare, and they are today engraved on the National Archives Building in Washington. Shakespeare knew, as have many other learned men that there is no way to understand the present or to look ahead into the future than to take a backward glance at the past.

The time of year surrounding Thanksgiving, Christmas, and the New Year referred to by some as the Holiday Season has always seemed to me to be a time for reflection and of preparation for the future. It is interesting to do this on an annual basis, and even more interesting to compare the present with various circumstances in the past. The destiny of America, always full of promise, has never been more so than at the present time. This statement is justified when we compare circumstances today with those of ten years ago.

You remember that 1948 was the year of the Berlin Airlift, the year when Mao Tse-tung and other Communists were taking over China, the year of the upset victory of Harry Truman, the year in which Ghandis was murdered, Babe Ruth died, and Prince Charles was born. 1948 marked the introduction of bebop as a successor to swing, and the establishment of laundrettes in thousands of our communities. Economically it was a highly prosperous year. Agricultural production, national income, personal income, and wages were at an all-time high. In fact, the production of crops that year has not been exceeded since, unless it occurs this year. In 1948 we had a total of 146,000,000 people in this country. Only recently the Census Bureau announced we have passed the 175 million mark. By 1968 we will almost certainly have well over 20 million people in the United States. This 20 per cent population increase is due both to a generally high birth rate and a significant decline in death rates. The average life expectancy at birth is now about 70 years—three years more than it was a decade ago. The decade's medical advances included the breakthrough in the fight against polio. The effectiveness of antibiotic medicines plus advances in surgery have contributed measurably toward reducing the average period of hospitalization required per patient.

The period 1947-1957 saw the

increase from 4,821 million to 11,873 million kilowatt hours of electrical power distributed weekly. Total cars and trucks assembled in 1947 averaged 92,000 per week and in 1957 138,500 per week. The huge interstate highway system has been started. The St. Lawrence Seaway is nearing completion. A new era of air transportation is dawning with the conversion of many of our commercial air fleets to turbo-jets.

We should not forget that our rapid progress has been accompanied by ever-increasing demands on the natural resources of the nation. One vital raw material where shortages are threatening is water. Not only are we using more water directly as consumers, but industry's demand for water are staggering. It requires 300,000 gallons of water to manufacture one ton of rayon, and the rayon industry in the United States manufactures 600,000 a year. Conservation is necessary on many fronts, and in our forests, on our farms, and in our mines.

In the picture of our economic expansion, there is one blotch which we cannot be proud of. I speak of our farmers, whose average annual net income per farm dropped from \$3,483 in 1948 to \$2,780. As you know, it has long been my contention this situation will produce sociological factors as well as economic problems.

Scientific advances have been almost unfathomable. The developments in nuclear energy, electronics, chemistry—not to mention the advent of the space age, are truly astounding. It is entirely within the realms of possibility that the moon may be manned flight to the moon may be an accomplished fact.

Although it cannot be measured statistically, has actually grown more rapidly than our population and currently over 104 million persons are affiliated with some organized religion, which approximates an increase of over 25 million in the past ten years. We are a great nation—a growing nation with a heritage of which we can be proud and a future rich in the rewards of a boundless faith.

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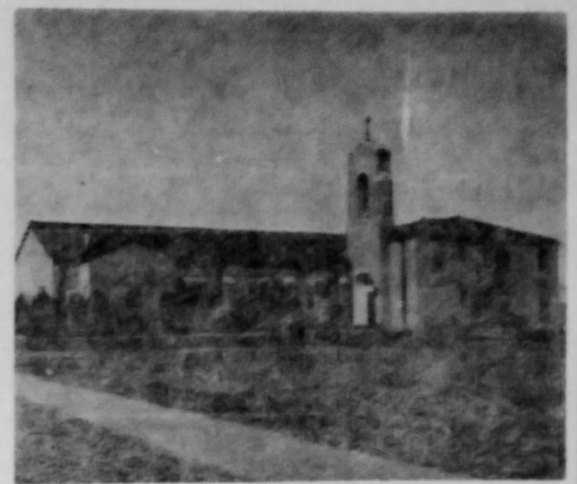

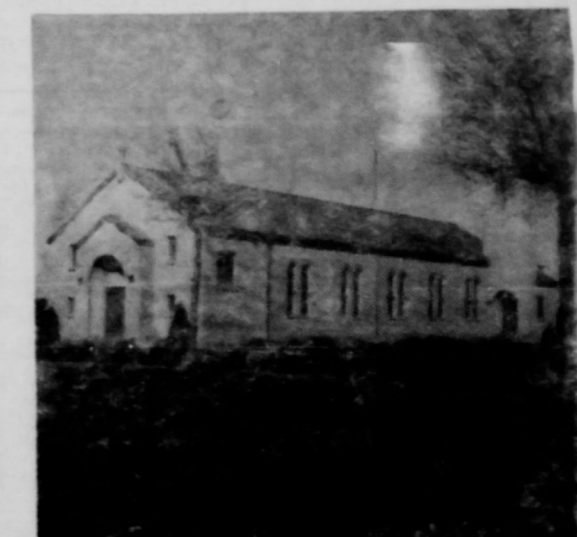

Leptospirosis Is Discussed at Dairy Short Course

Leptospirosis a disease on increasing concern to dairymen will receive special attention at the 24th annual Dairymen's Short Course, Dec. 4-5, at Texas A&M. Already this disease is the third most cattle disease in the U. S., causing tremendous losses annually. The two most costly cattle diseases will also be discussed at the short course, which focuses a disease control.

The short course is designed to serve the needs of all dairymen, milk plants, commercial feed company fieldmen and others directly or indirectly interested in the future of the dairy industry in Texas. Some of the topics to be discussed are contract farming possibilities in dairying, minor management details that make a difference and practical feeding practices.

Speakers included several A&M staff members and one out-of-state speaker Dr. Leland West, practicing veterinarian in Wesaca, Minn. Dr. West will discuss what the dairy farmer can do to control mastitis.

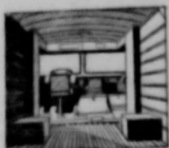

Bulletin On Peach Variety Released

College Station, Nov.—Economic conditions and improved transportation facilities have encouraged consumption of peaches as fresh fruit. Changing economic conditions, labor supply and consumer preference made it necessary to continue and expand the work of selecting peach varieties that might meet present requirements. Plant breeders in recent years have developed peach varieties with fruits of high quality, early ripening and yellow flesh. Varietal plantings have been made in East Texas to determine which peach varieties are best adapted to the area. Performance and behavior of a large number of already recognized varieties as well as recently developed ones were tested. The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has released a bulletin summarizing results of these tests. It is entitled "Performance of Peach Varieties in East Texas." The publication describes the experimental procedure used, makes general comment on peach varieties and gives recommendations for East Texas. The bulletin is available from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas. Ask for B-913.

Know Egg Values Title of Bulletin

College Station, Nov.—Egg values concern millions of people, especially homemakers who buy food for the family and try to serve well-balanced, nutritious meals. Egg values are also of interest to producers and persons in commercial food service and merchandising channels. Those who buy eggs should know economic values, how to determine value of the different grades and thoroughly understand grade terminology. Homemakers should know egg value from the viewpoint of nutrition, calories, protein-fat ratio and the versatility of eggs in cooking. The Texas Agricultural Extension Service has released a bulletin entitled "Know Egg Values." It discusses such topics as egg qualities and size classes, carton identification, consumer responsibility and cooking tips. The bulletin is available from county agricultural agents or the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas. Ask for B-909.
