Now this passion for unity is not to merge all congregations into a few huge churches. Rather, the passion is for a unity of spirit among all groups. A spirit which reaches out in Christian love to all who are in Christ and with one great voice says 'we have the answer', "God in Christ, reconciling the world unto Himself." Whosoever will may come. In so doing we would be convinced of the Prayer of Jesus as he prays, "That they all may be one . . that the world might



Giving Habits of Church Described By Committee

Three weeks ago the budget planning committee studied the giving habits of our 415 resident members and 286 Sunday school pupils who are not church members. These represent 701 potential weekly contributors.

The study showed that 308 of the 701 made a pledge last year. But these 308 represented only 44 per cent of the total, actually gave 90 per cent of the church's income. The non-pledgers representing 56 per cent of the enrollment gave only 10 per cent of the income. It is true that a few of our finest people do not pledge, but give systematically. However, this study shows that generally the ones who says "I don't believe in pledging" really means "I do not believe in giving."







> The first boys' "corn club" was organized in 1908 in Jack county by the late T. M. Marks, then holding a position corresponding with the county agricultural agent of today. Mr. Marks enrolled 25 boys and demonstrated to them the best practices in corn produc tion then known. Judging was done on the basis of 30 points for yield, 30 for profit, 20 for the story on the demonstration and 20 for the exhibit.

The first "beef calf club" was organized in Coleman county in 1910, largely through the support of the late J. E. Boog-Scott, then a prominent cattleman at Coleman. Sam L. Mathews, then of Coleman, showed the first club beef at the 1910 Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show in Fort Worth.

The first statewide rally for "corn club boys" was held at the 1910 State Fair of Texas in Dallas. A feature of the rally was a parade of 1,500 boys through the downtown section of Dallas, each carrying a stalk of corn.

The first "tomato club" for girls was organized in 1912 in Milam county by Mrs. Ena W.
