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PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON SEPTEMBER 7, 1965.
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 44 proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for an increase in the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, to fix the membership in the House of Representatives at 150 members; to require apportionment of the Senate according to population; and to delete the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the 7th day of September, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read respectively as follows:

"Section 2. The Senate shall consist of 39 members. The House of Representatives shall consist of 150 members."

"Section 25. The state shall be divided into Senatorial Districts of contiguous territory according to population, as nearly as possible."

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling legislation in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature."

"This Amendment shall be effective upon its adoption."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."
Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

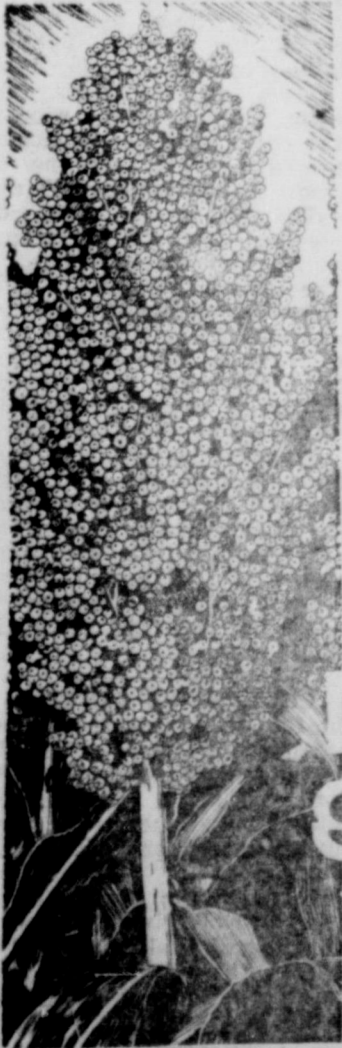

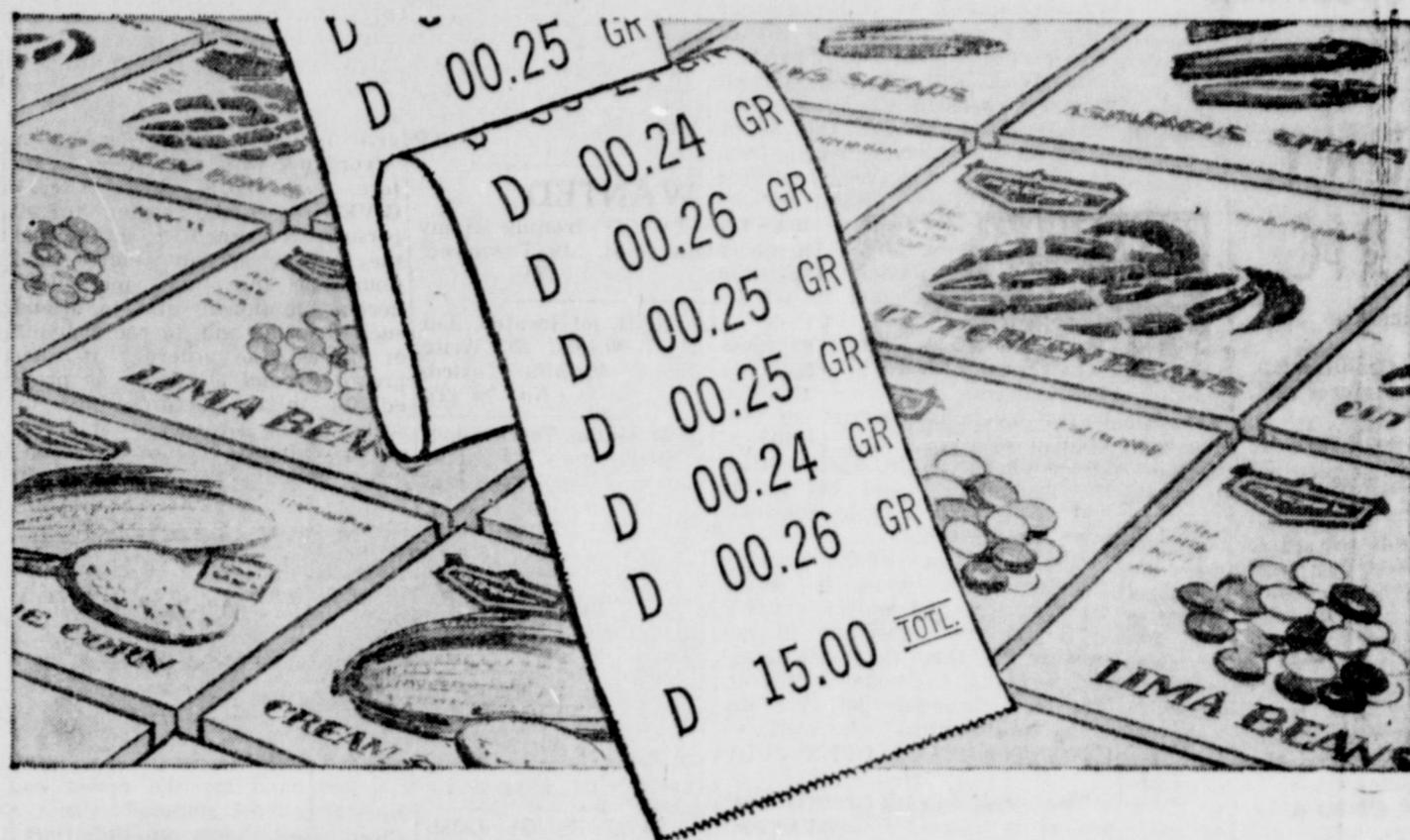

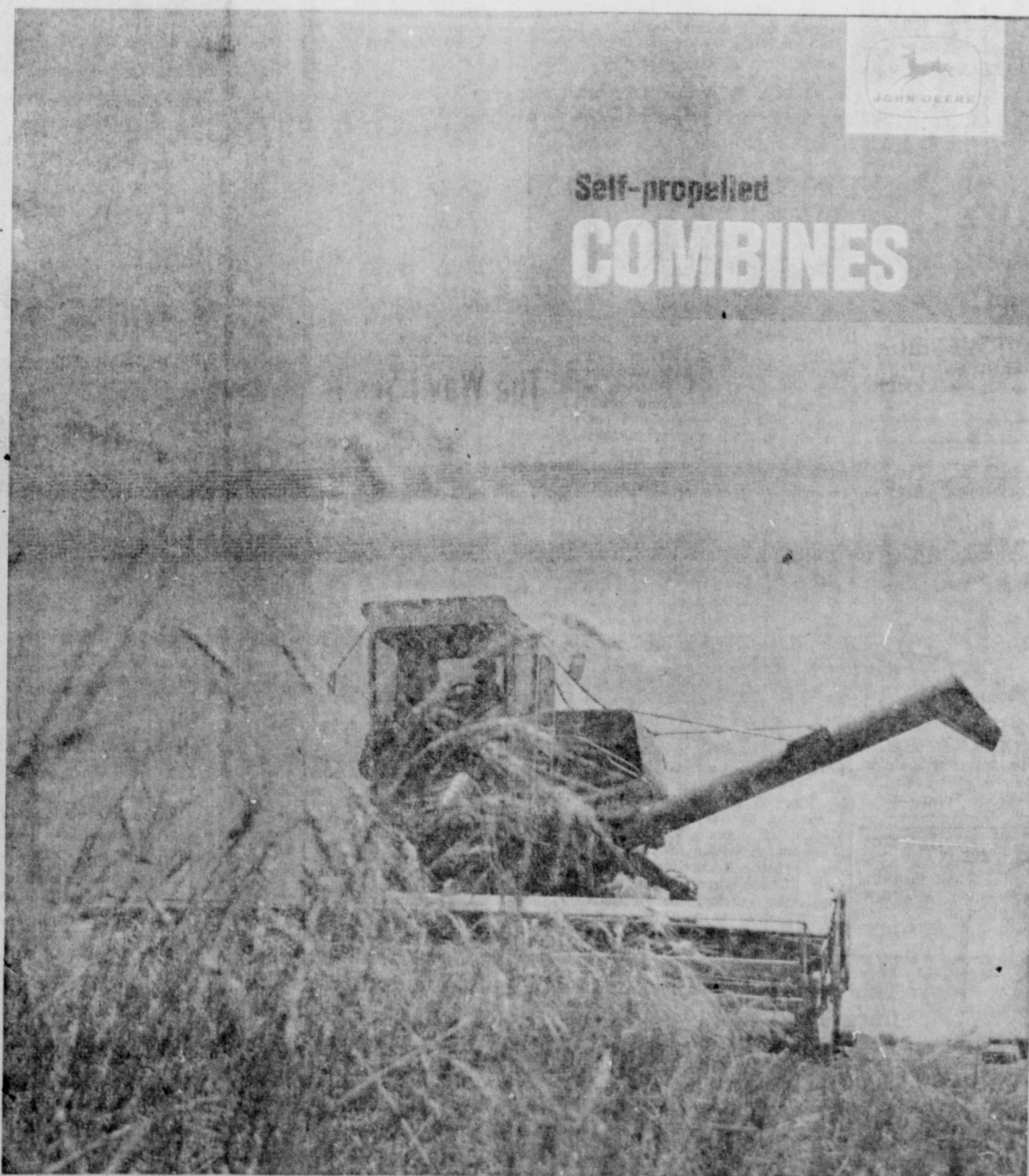

Don't Name It greets you with the 8th annual harvest edition of the Spearman Reporter. Again we wish to thank the local business men in Spearman for their excellent advertising support in this special issue of the paper.

For about the first time of the eight harvests this writer has lived in Spearman, crop conditions in and around Spearman are better than in other sections of the country. This is probably due to the nice six-inch rain received in August of 1939.

This writer is glad to locate just a little bit of interest in politics in this section of the state. With all the war activities overshadowing any possible political program, it has indeed been a difficult task to jar people into the realization that they must select a candidate to vote for in the coming primary election.

The writer attended a political rally in Silvertown, last Saturday and estimates that 1,500 people gave their attention to the 10 or 12 speakers, who outlined their candidacy for respective offices. 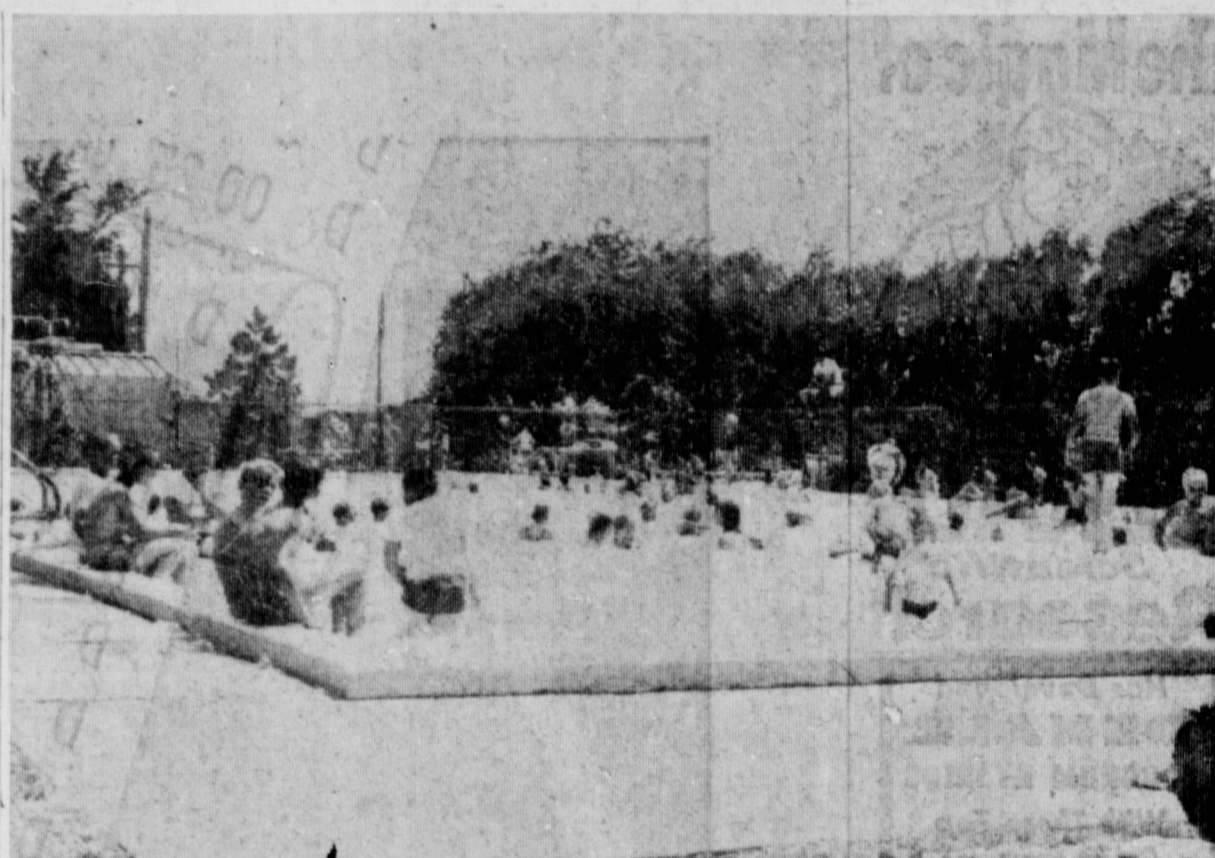
HOMEMAKING NOTES

Wall-to-Wall cleaning is almost a necessity in our part of the country, where dirt settles on them so easily. If washing the walls is on your spring housecleaning agenda, here's how you can do a better job of cleaning them.

Select a mild soap or commercial cleaner. Use one bucket for the cleaning solution, another for clean water for rinsing, and large sponges for both.

Wash walls from the bottom up. This is the secret of success. If you start at the top you may drip scrub water down over the soiled area. This will cause str-

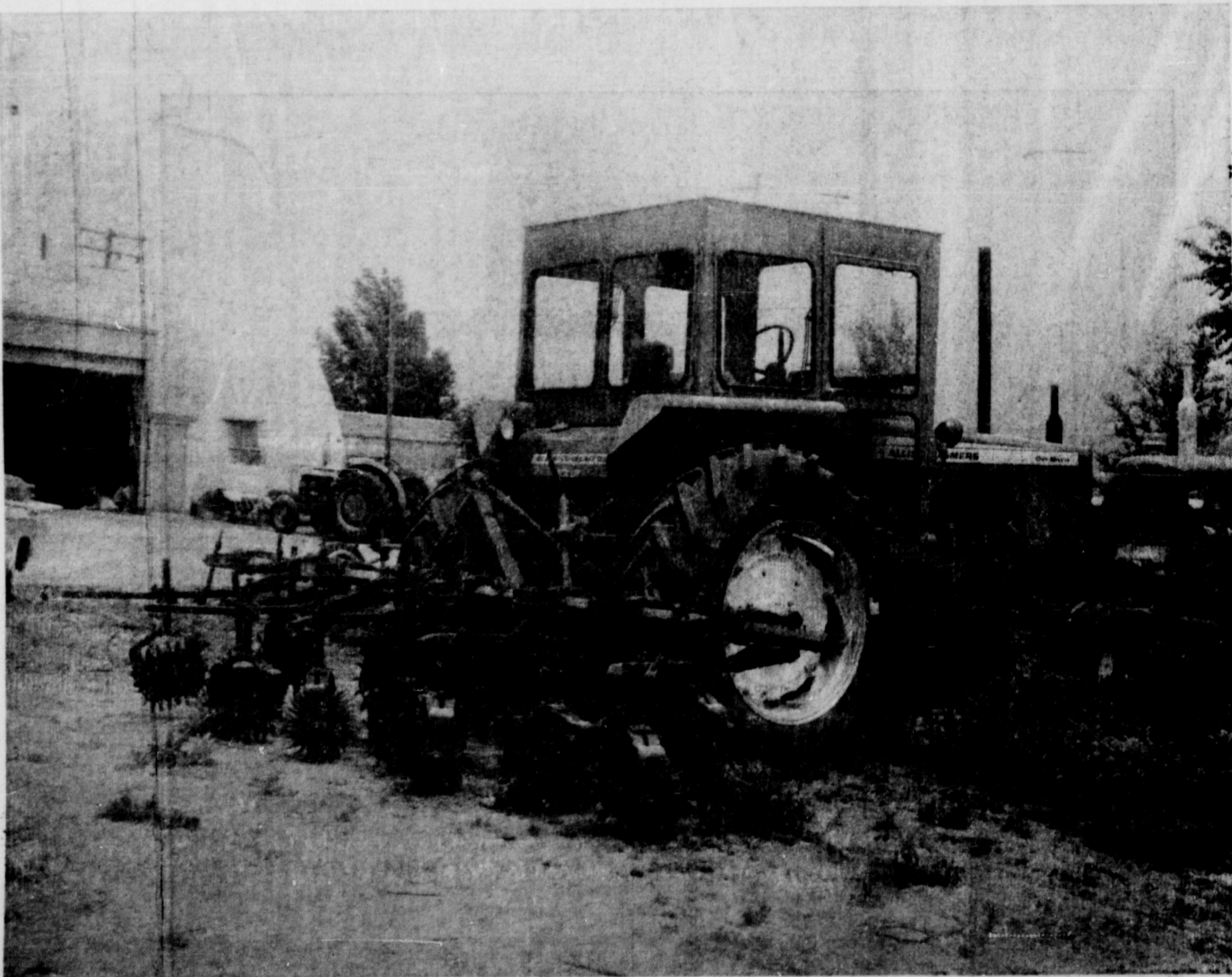

HEALTH AND SAFETY TIPS

There recently was a verified case of smallpox in the United States, the first in many years. The scourge that once killed thousands of Americans every year is long gone from this land.

But smallpox is by no means gone from the world. In many areas smallpox still is a significant health problem, despite the fact that an effective vaccine has been available for many years. In the lesser developed areas the vaccine simply has not yet been used on enough people to stamp out the disease.

In the era of air travel, it is possible for someone infected with smallpox to come to this country & infect many others, even before doctors are aware that the disease is back again. This isn't likely because health authorities require vaccination certificates of all persons entering this country,

returning citizens and foreigners alike. But there's always the possibility of a slip-up. In recent years there have been several smallpox scares precipitated by travelers. The one case this summer was brought in by a traveler from Africa.

Physicians caring for infants routinely vaccinate against smallpox at an early age. Many public school districts require smallpox vaccinations of first graders and this means a booster vaccination at age 5 or 6. Most summer camps require vaccination certificates for young campers.

Boosters are required each three to five years to maintain protection against smallpox. Studies have shown that only a relatively small percentage of the American public keep up this schedule. Most adults have not been vaccinated since they left military service, or made their last trip

abroad.

The American Medical Association has noted that the level of immunity against smallpox in the United States has been sinking steadily for years, as more and more people neglect to get boosters. Health authorities estimate that at least three-fourths of the population is inadequately protected against smallpox.

The World Health Organization is spurring a concerted drive all over the globe in 1965 on behalf of smallpox vaccinations. The disease is increasing in some areas of Asia and in other lands.

The risk of contracting smallpox in the United States today is, admittedly, very slight. But it is a needless risk. Vaccination will eliminate this risk entirely.

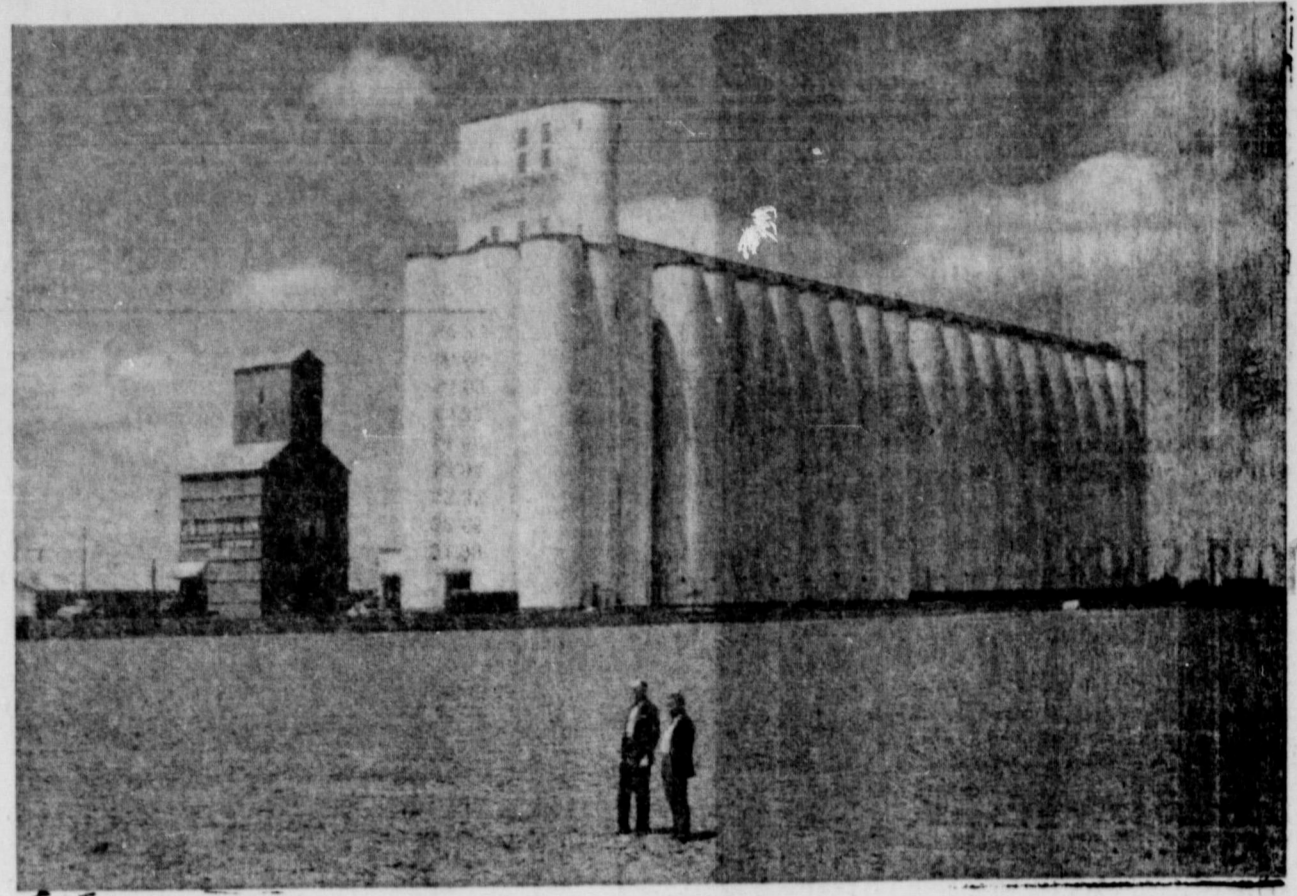

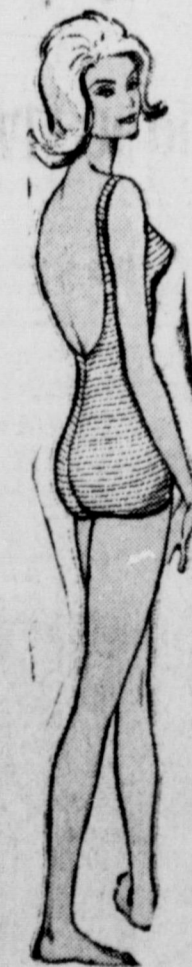
