## Gov. White; Hightower Discuss Farm Problems

It was a grey, somber day in Lubbock Wednesday, and the mood could not be attributed entirely to the cool, wet weather. Both Gov. Mark White, and Texas agriculture commissioner, Jim Hightower headlined a farmer meeting in Lubbock on Ag Day, which was also the first day of spring.

According to Gov. White, who spoke to more than 800 farmers and agribusinessmen at the meeting, inadequate and depressed prices farmers receive for their produce.

"Farmers need higher prices for their products," echoed Gov. White, Agriculture Commissioner Hightower and Agriculture Commissioner Jim Nichols of Minnesota.

"We want to help your child," said Richard Hawkins, chairman for CASA (Citizens Against Substance Abuse). "If you think you have a problem with your child, or yourself, please meet with us on Thursday, March 28, at 7:30 p.m. in the basement of the Bailey County Law Enforcement Center."

"No! Not My Child!" is a normal reaction, added Hawkins, who cites the continuing problem of drug abuse in this area. "Do you know what to look for in your child?"

Some of the things parents should be aware of include:

Upon coming home a parent should talk with their child and develop good relations. Your child could have problems you are not aware of.

If your child keeps late hours and there is not a lot of contact, become very aware.

When the child has no desire to be around the family and home, be aware.

Be aware of the use of breath mints and sprays, also room fresheners and colognes. This hides the odor on your child's person and their clothing.

Strange clothing, missing articles (jewels, tapes,) new tape decks etc. should be a symptom of a growing problem. Youth who don't have alot of cash will sometimes trade and sell to get what they want. Be aware of where your child's funds are going!

Loss of appetite or sporadic binges could be a clue.

Focusing on the effect the depresses agricultural picture is having on the predominantly agricultural communities, the governor commented, "When a sector of the economy is suffering, it's all of our problem for not doing something about it," he said. "Now is a good time to start. Agriculture is the foundation of this economy. When a tractor sits in the field and rusts, there is a business in town having to start boarding up the windows."

Regardless of the fact that farmers in America are the most efficient producers of food in the world--"they have gone broke," says the agriculture commissioner.

"The farmers are the first to be affected, then the supplier and the bankers, the main street business," said Hightower, "then finally the urban factory workers and consumers."

According to Commissioner Nichols, "I figure no Texan is going to back away from a good fight."

The Texas governor came down 'hard' on U.S. Agriculture Secretary John Block, commenting, "I know the difference in a John Deere and a John Block. One you drive at work and the other takes you for a ride. One plows the ground and the other plows you under. The three speakers all blasted the proposed 1985 farm bill.

As he spoke about the upcoming planting season,

### Expansion Set

Andrew Durco, Jr., president of Great Plains Foods, Inc., announced Thursday that Great Plains Foods recently acquired the food corn processing and storage facilities of Deaf Smith County Grain Processors, Inc., in Hereford and Muleshoe.

Great Plains Foods is a Dallas-based corporation that is actively engaged in acquiring and operating agricultural businesses. Great Plains Foods will continue to use the name Deaf Smith County Grain Processors in its operation of the acquired facilities, added Durco.

Deaf Smith County Grain Processors, Inc. was controlled by Cliff Skiles, D.V.M. Dr. Skiles will remain as a consultant to the management of Great Plains Foods and will continue to operate his other farming and business interests.

Jeff Smith has been hired by Great Plains Foods to manage the acquired facilities. For the past seven years, Smith has been the manager of the operations of Valley Grain Products, Inc. in Muleshoe.

Durco indicated that Great Plains Foods intends to expand the operations of Deaf Smith County Grain Processors, Inc. and is considering the installation of facilities for corn masa production and wheat flour milling.

### Wheat Rust

### Now Found

### In This Area

The threat of a devastating outbreak of leaf rust in Texas High Plains wheat fields is the greatest it has been in more than two decades, a plant pathologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service warned.

"In 22 years in this area, I've never seen such active rust infections at this time of year," said Dr. Robert Berry, the pathologist.

Berry issued the warning to producers following a survey recently of fields in Hale County with Danny Nusser, assistant Hale County Extension agent. They found extremely active rust spore production in southern and western parts of the county.

The disease requires moisture on the plant leaf and suitable temperatures, such as have occurred across the Plains in recent weeks, Berry said. "At 70 degrees, infection can occur in four hours and the complete cycle, producing spores which then repeat the infection of other leaves, takes 10 to 12 days," the Extension specialist explained. At 60 degrees, the cycle takes twice as long, he said.

A fungus, the rust appears as small, round orange spots or pustules. They appear right at the groundline on the oldest leaves of the plant.

If the infection is heavy enough, it will defoliate the plant. "Even light rust will interfere with development of

## ASCS Extends Program Signup

Danny Noble, County Executive Director for the ASCS office, has released the following information for Bailey County farmers and ranchers: **SIGNUP EXTENDED**

The 1985 farm program sign-up has been extended through April 1, 1985. Producers who

wish to signup or withdraw from the program without liquidated damages being assessed, must do so by this date, says Noble.

### COTTON PRODUCTION

April 1, 1985 is the FINAL date to return your 1984 production cards (S03's) to this office, added Noble. If these cards are not returned by this date, a permanent zero will be applied.

### ACREAGE CONSERVATION RESERVE (ACR)

A cover crop must be planted on ACR by June 30, 1985, and maintained through the end of the calendar year, reminded Noble, except: ACR may be seeded in the fall to crops that predominantly mature in the next year.

Cover crops include: annual, biennial, or perennial grasses and legumes, wheat, rye, barley, oats, haygrazer, peas, etc.

Producers cannot graze ACR from May 15 through October 14, and the crop shall not be mechanically harvested. Wheat, rye, barley, and oats designated for ACR crops must be destroyed before the disposal deadline which is May 15.

Noble says if you want the crop to remain standing after this date, you must pay a \$10 fee to leave standing or re-seeding till October 31, 1985.

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## 'Sudan, You've Got Spirit' Sudan CofC Banquet Theme

Top awards given included the following: Two Sudan High School seniors, Jamie Ingle and Tammie Gore were spotlighted for the Youth Leadership Awards.

Special awards were given to Gery Donnell, the People's Choice Award; and to Son

Qualls, the Spirit of Sudan Award. Mr. and Mrs. Bobby Carson and Angie were named as Farm Family of the Year.

Man of the Year is Tom Rigsoy, Chamber of Commerce president and master of ceremonies for the banquet. Jonelle Bandy, Sudan business woman and secretary of the Sudan C-CA, was selected as Woman of the Year. A longtime Sudan resident, Mary Olds was named Citizen Through the Years.

Tom Rigsoy introduced the speaker, Tommy Stewart, who has been speaking, writing music and performing for

almost 20 years. He presented a musical program of humor mixed with numbers he has written himself, as well as others sung by other artists.

He began speaking about MLM-Multi Level Marketing. "Now this is not sales I'm talking about, where you can get rich. You know, like when you have a product and show it to two friends, then they get two of their friends, and finally you have the whole world deluged with your product."

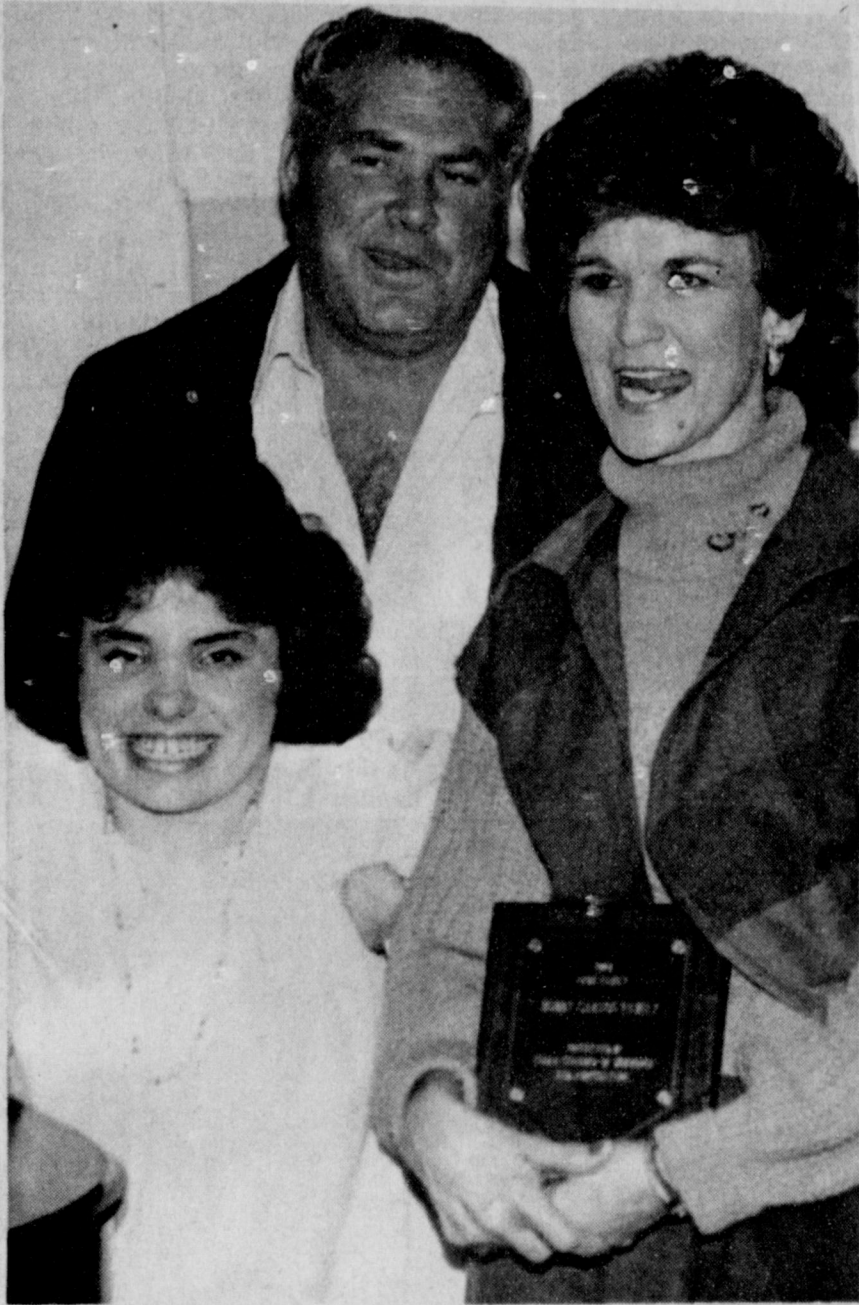

### PUBLIC NOTICE

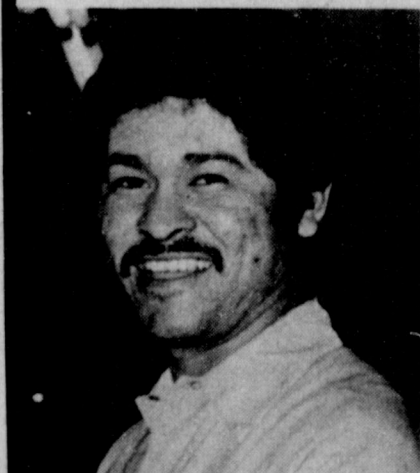
Article 4477-9a of the Texas Statutes provides in part:

Notice is hereby given that, effective immediately, Bailey County will vigorously enforce the foregoing statute.

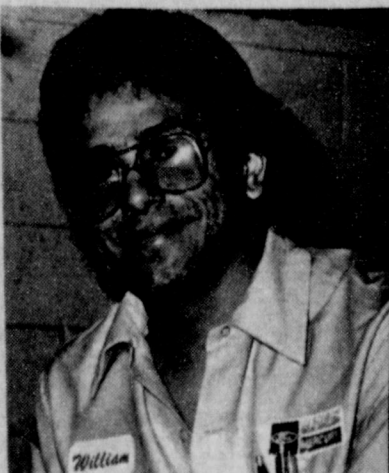

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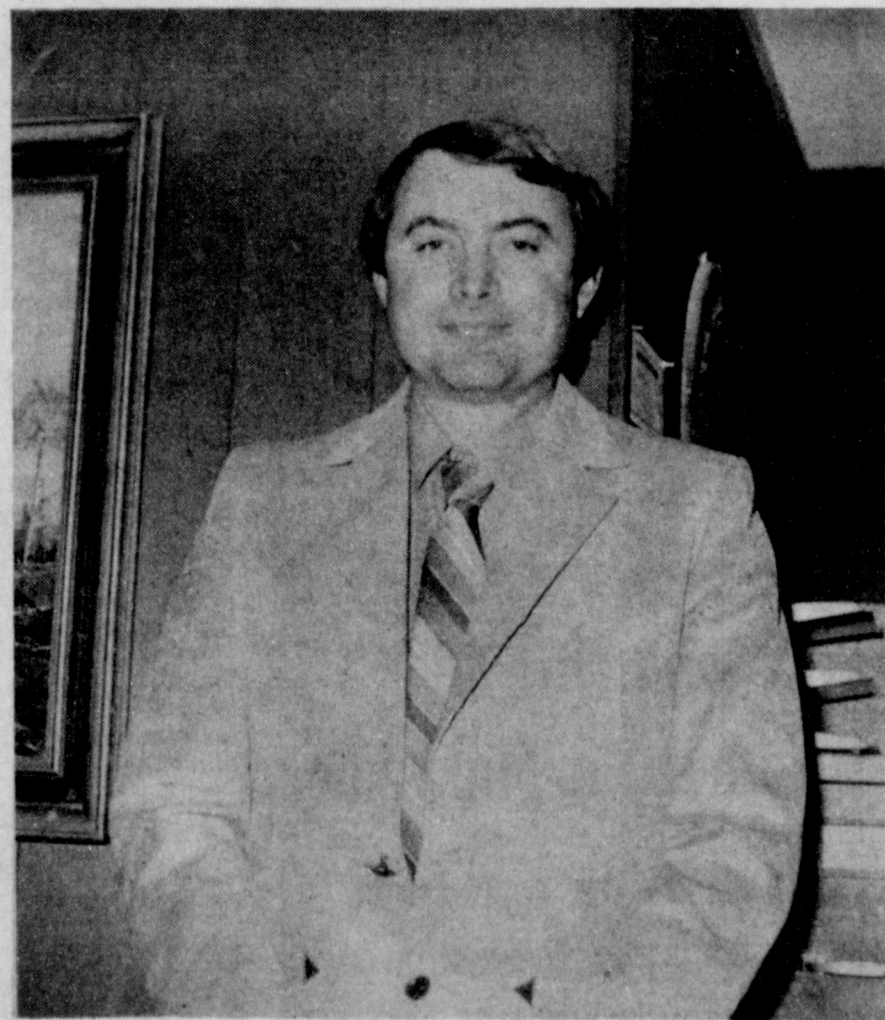

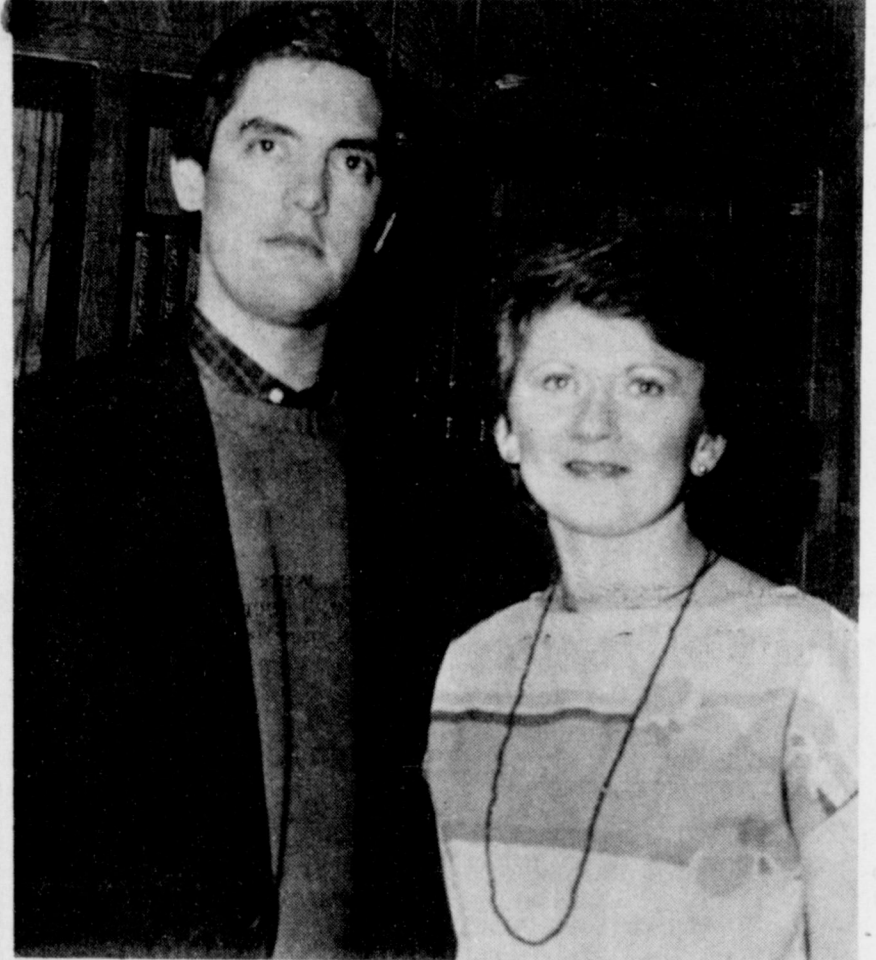

It can be adapted for stir frying; baking pizza, cake or muffins; popping corn and slow cooking.

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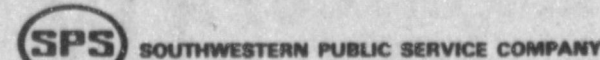
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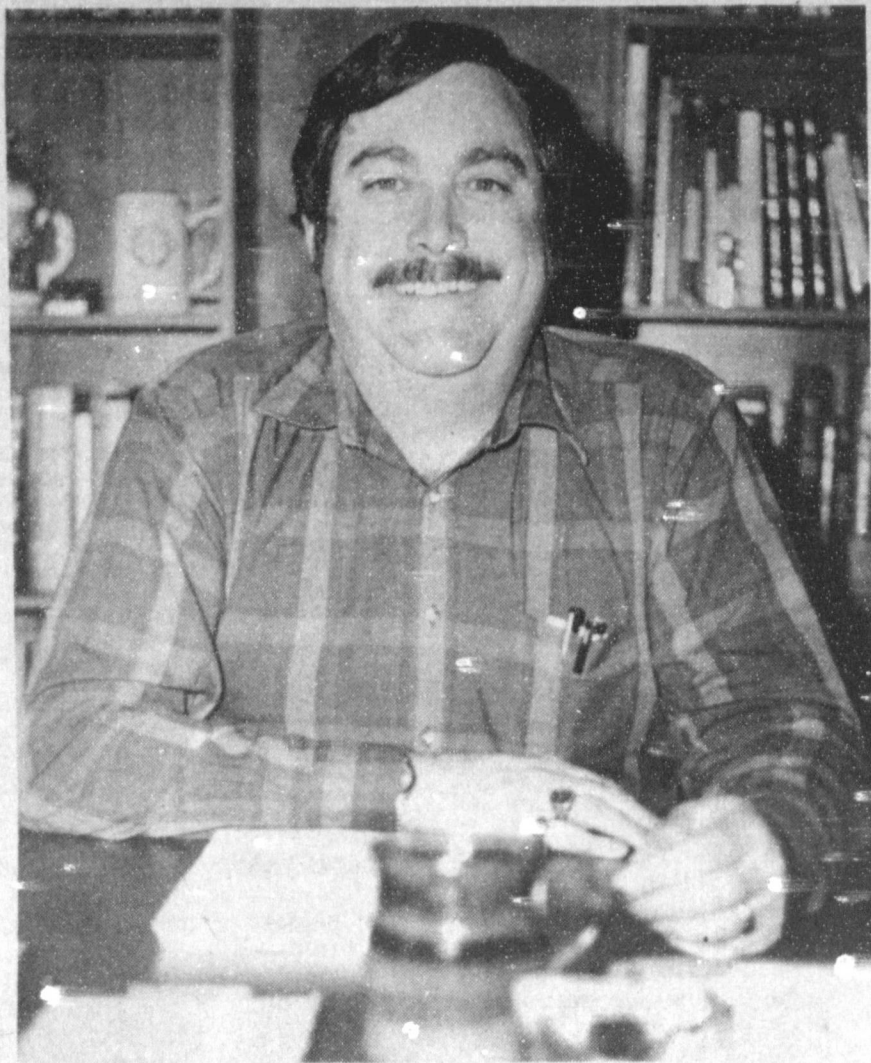

## Know Your Doctor--

"I like kids," Dr. McCarty answered when asked Tuesday afternoon why he devotes much of his time and talents to the care and treatment of the many athletes, boys and girls, in this area.

A native of Lubbock, Dr. McCarty said that after he finished his internship in 1979, he moved to Woodland Park, Colo. near Colorado Springs, to open his practice.

He said he practiced the same type of medicine in Woodland Park that he practices here, leaning a lot toward athletic medicine.

"Although we treat 90-95 percent of all athletic injuries here," said the doctor, "ironically, most of the injuries are not received in organized sports. Most are received in the halls, in roughhousing in the gymnasiums, in wrestling, or sandlot ball.

"With more complicated injuries where surgical intervention is required, we usually refer the patient to the specialists," he added.

While trying to make a decision as to whether or not to move to Muleshoe, Dr. McCarty said the size of the town was a major contributing factor in the decision to come here.

He consulted with his family, and wanted his family in a smaller town, adding that Woodland Park is comparable in size to Muleshoe. His wife, Cindy, is a sister of Dr. Jerry Gregory, who recently moved his practice to Lubbock, and the family ties were another factor in the decision.

Muleshoe had an opening for a family practitioner, and although Dr. McCarty had looked at Lubbock, made the decisions to come to West Plains Center, and opened his practice here in June, 1983.

"Greg, who was to be a senior at the time, preferred Muleshoe for his final year," said Dr. McCarty, who also has Jeff, presently a senior at MHS, and Susan, who is an eighth grader at Watson Junior High. All three of the McCarty children are very active in school sport activities.

#### Expands Farmer

#### Home Credit

The Cooperative Extension Service has agreed to expand its assistance to the Farmers Home Administration efforts to provide necessary credit to farmers in Texas. J. Lynn Futch, state director for Farmers Home, said.

Futch added he had been notified by Frank W. Naylor, Jr., Under Secretary of Agriculture for Small Community and Rural Development, that a formal aid agreement has been completed by the two agencies.

Depending on workloads in local offices, Extension Service may be able to provide professional or clerical assistance, on a case-by-case basis, Futch continued.

"In addition, we are continuing our efforts with Extension to locate farm credit and management specialists so that we can provide counseling services at the county office level to farmers who want it," he concluded.

## Take Precautions Against Egg Food Poisoning

The "Easter Bunny" will soon be making his annual spring visit, and the joys of hiding, finding and eating the colorful goodies are already uppermost in young children's thoughts. However, parents may want to take special precautions to help prevent food poisoning from contaminated or spoiled eggs.

Hard-boiled eggs that are cooled in water and not refrigerated can be a source of food poisoning, according to Dr. C. David Morehead, Director of Infectious Disease in the Department of Pediatrics, at Scott and White in Temple.

"Although unbroken and uncooked eggs are remarkably resistant to bacterial invasion," says Dr. Morehead, "the heating process breaks down the egg's natural defense mechanisms and creates and ideal growth medium for bacteria."

Dr. Morehead adds that reports of contamination of whole shell eggs are rare, but cases of staphylococcal food poisoning commonly occur with improper handling and refrigeration of a variety of egg products, such as salads, custards and deviled eggs.

"The bacteria can be transmitted to the cooling water or

unwashed hands or by storing eggs at room temperature for more than 24 hours," notes Dr. Morehead. the egg by a cook with

Symptoms of staphylococcal food poisoning may include vomiting, abdominal pain and diarrhea within 12 hours after eating the eggs.

"We recommend that cooked eggs be handled as aseptically as possible," stresses Dr. Morehead, "and that they be properly refrigerated until they are consumed."

the grain," Berry warned. "Many fields which we saw in our survey have high weed populations. Many also have thin stands. These conditions don't promise a high yield potential," Berry noted.

He suggested that dryland producers who have thin stands and poor yield outlook may want to consider grazing out their fields hit by rust.

"If an irrigated crop with good potential develops rust, the producer might want to consider a fungicide application at the jointing stage," he said.

"It is generally thought that, economically, fungicide should only be applied to wheat that has a potential for a yield in the 80-100 bushel range," he said. He also said that new fungicides are very effective, but are expensive.

Hightower told the farmers, "Reagan, Budget Director David Stockman and Block are making plans to plant, too. They are going to plant you about six feet under."

He also predicted that United States is in danger of losing the family farmer, the farmer we can least afford to lose.

"There is nothing scarier than ignorance in action," he added. "I don't mind John Block being dumb, but I don't like him to think we are."

The agriculture commissioner also spoke about his department proposed farm bill and suggested farmers study the proposal, then take it to Washington.
