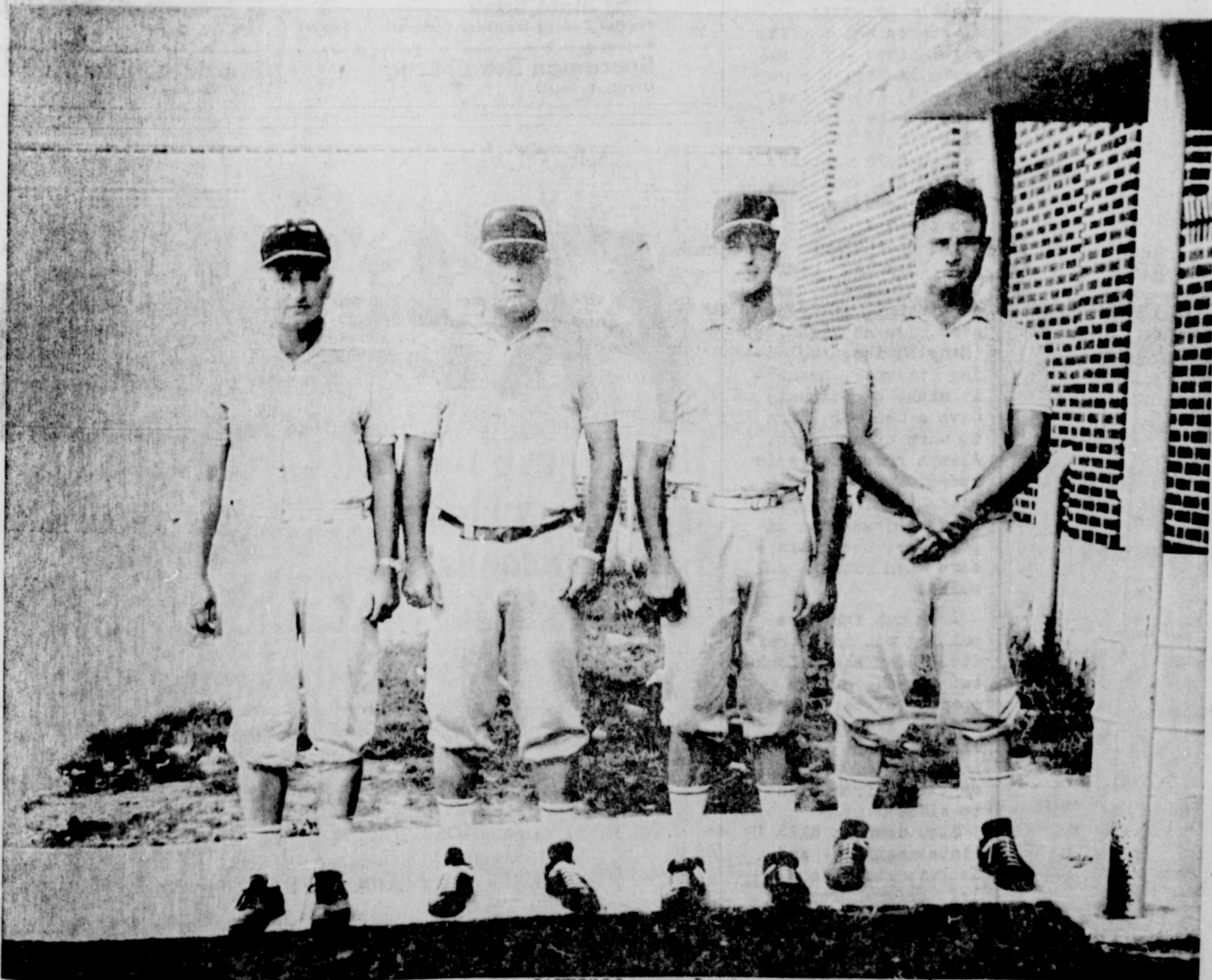

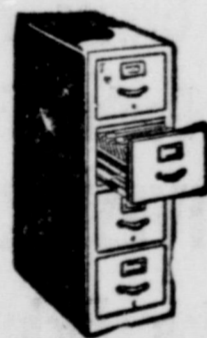

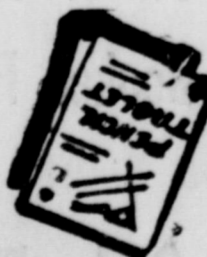

Child Safety Is Everybodys Business!

National Child Safety Week — and then apply the lessons for all the weeks that are to come.

With the opening of another school year, it's time to recall once again the danger of bicycle riding.

In recent years, from 500 to 700 deaths and 30,000 to 40,000 injuries a year have occurred in collisions between bicycles and motor vehicles. By far the greater number of these deaths and injuries were suffered by children from five to fourteen years of age.

As we said before, parents must assume the major responsibility for the safety of their children. Parents must see that their young riders are taught when and where bicycling is safe; they must help create safe conditions; they must promote a friendly and cooperative spirit toward the law enforcement officers; they must help the child develop an understanding of the purpose of traffic regulations.

Here are some important rules to help your child work out for safe bike routes to and from school, or any other place he might customarily ride. Bike Riders using the roadways are subject to the same regulation responsibility, and privileges as motor vehicle drivers:

- Observe all traffic regulations — red and green lights, one way streets, stop signs.
- Keep to the right & ride single file.
- Keep a safe distance behind all vehicles.
- Have a headlight on front and a danger light on the rear of your bicycle. Wear white or light-colored clothing, if you ever ride at night. (Many cities, including Spearman, prohibit night bicycling.)
- Have a bell or horn to warn of approach. Always ride at a safe speed. Give pedestrians right of way.
- Avoid sidewalks, if possible; use extra care when riding on walks.

Look out for cars pulling out into traffic. Keep sharp lookout for the sudden opening of car doors. Ride in a straight line. Do not weave in or out of traffic or swerve from side to side.

Slow down at all intersections and look to right and left before crossing. Be sure your brakes work properly, and keep your bicycle in perfect running condition. Never carry other riders — carry no packages that obstruct vision or prevent proper control of your bicycle.

Never hitch on another vehicle, stunt or race in traffic. Never ride two on a bike. If your child plans to ride to and

cycle this fall, take the advice of Junior High Principal, James Fendergraft, get a short length of chain and a padlock for your youngster so it will help prevent someone else stealing your child's bike.



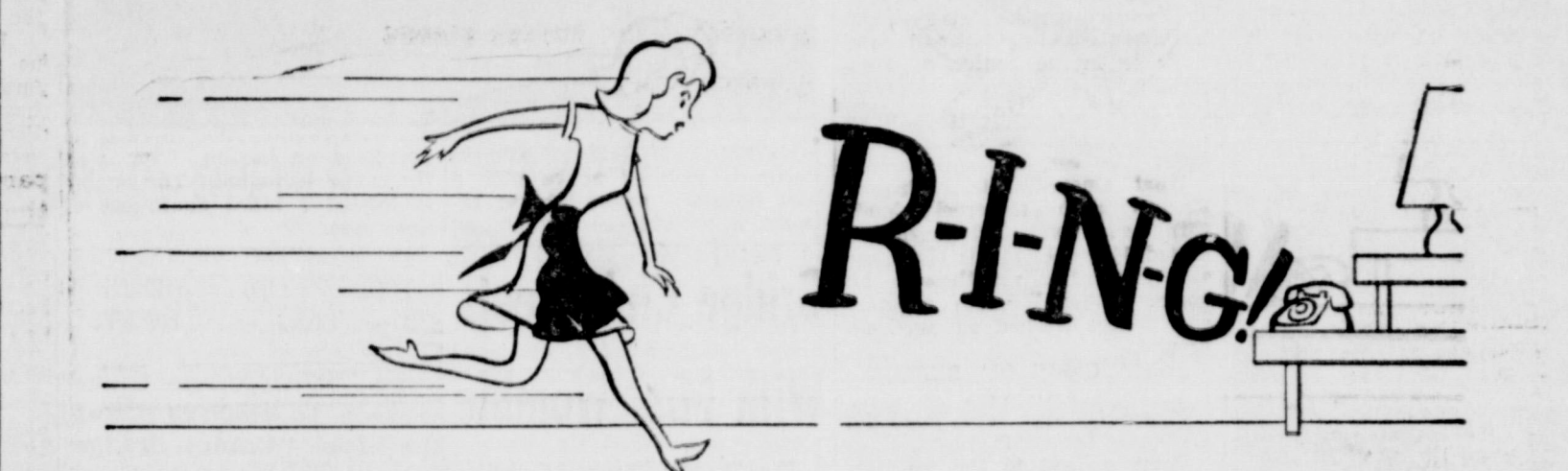

The date for the annual luncheon was changed to October 25.

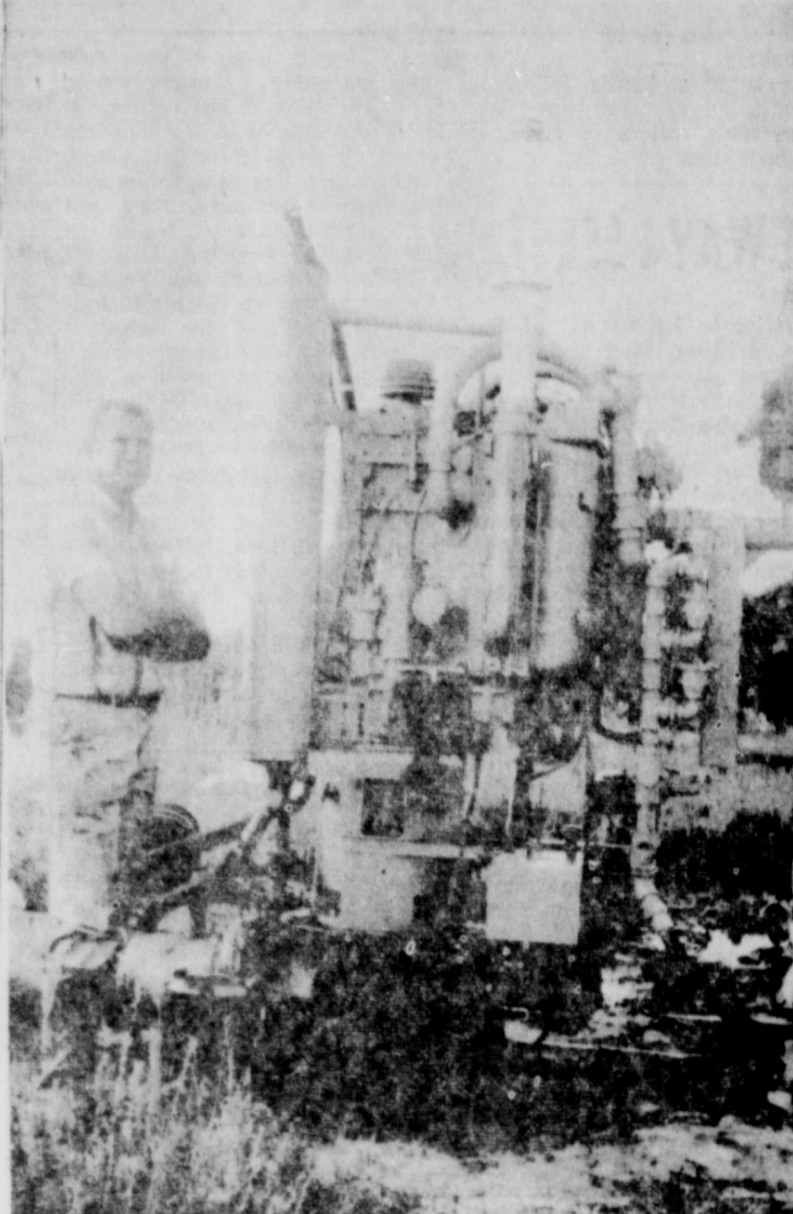

County Approves Amendment, But Loses In State

Hansford County voters approved the Constitutional amendment to enlarge the Texas State from 31 to 39 members on Tuesday at the polls. There were 343 votes cast, 295 for and 48 against.

Here is how the voting went throughout the county: Courthouse, 46 for, 14 against; Kimball 12 for, 2 against; Gruber Elev 22 for, 1 against; Gruber school 63 for, 3 against; Hitchland 6 for, 3 against; New Hope 6 for, none against; Oslo 19 for, none against; Phillips plant, 7 for, 5 against; Morse school, 18 for, 5 against; Spearman school 96 for, 14 against.

Even though Hansford County voters approved the change as did the other 15 counties in the 31st Senatorial district, the change was defeated. About 19 percent of the two million enfranchised voters in Texas voted Tuesday.

The amendment approved by the 59th Texas Legislature which adjourned in May, was amended Senators admitted, at preserving some representative strength of rural areas and small cities in the State Senate.

In the future when there are no paved roads and vehicles are fording the river for lack of funds for a bridge over the Farm-to-Market roads the rural voters over the state will wish they had gone to the polls.

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
