GRUB CONTROL BOOSTS CALF WEIGHTS

A livestock specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service here says grub control in cow herds can increase calf weaning weights as much as 40 pounds.

The Specialist Dr. Dixon Hubbard, says grub control costs as little as 12 cents per cow & few management practices will pay such good dividends.

According to Hubbard, Heavy infestations of grubs can reduce a beef cow's milk production as much as 2.5 pounds per day. Multiply this times a 205 day suckling period and it means a loss of more than 500 pounds of milk.

Experiment Station research indicates 500 pounds of milk can make a difference of 40 pounds in the 205-day weaning weight of a calf, the livestock specialist said.

Hubbard's co-worker, Entomologist Don Rummel says cost of control varies with the method of systemic treatment.

Using recommended dosages and procedures, the grub control costs per head are about 22-cents for spray, 50-cents for pour-on and 12 cents for dipping, he said.

Grubs can also be controlled through feed that contains a systemic. Stockmen should consult their feed dealer for information on this method.

Treatment should be made after the end of the heel fly season. In the High plains area that is about June 15.

The specialist say all methods are effective in controlling grubs and stockmen should use the one that gives the best combination of costs and convenience.

They do warn that stockmen should not treat for grubs and drench on the same day.

Information on controlling grubs with systematics is available in the Extension Service publication, Texas Guide for Controlling External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry (MP-691), available in my office.

Applications Being Taken For Clerks And Carriers At Local Post Office

The Spearman Post Office is seeking applications from local residents who are interested in becoming postal clerks or city carriers. Acting Postmaster Elmon J. Jacobs announces.

Persons who apply and who pass a written test given by the Civil Service Commission will be placed on a list of eligibles and will be considered for future job openings.

Clerks and carriers are now paid a starting rate of 2.48 per hour, with annual increases for six yrs. to 2.97 an hour and additional increases every three years to 3.38 an hour. 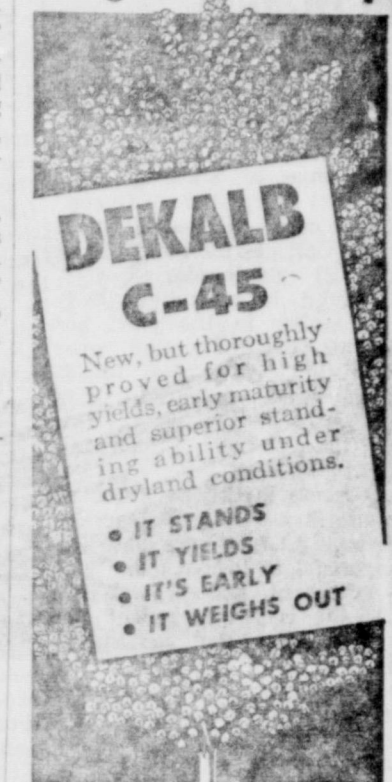

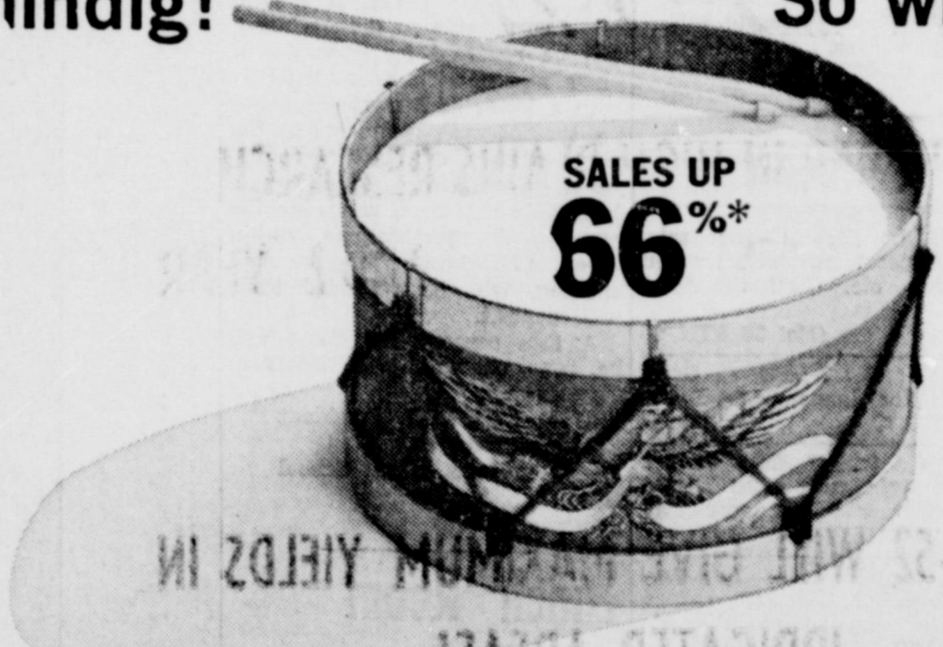

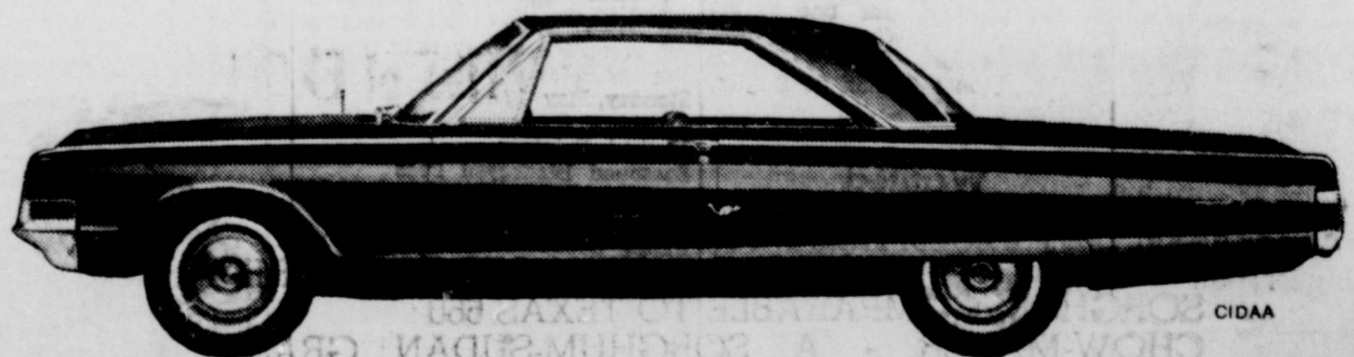
