





The wide Canadian goes dry at different times throughout the summers with scarcely a pot-hole here and there, but the indestructible minnow seems to thrive through these ordeals.

Church bodies formed for a variety of reasons. Nationalistic backgrounds formed separate Lutheran synods, although each taught basically the same Catechism. Some protestant bodies formed over dispute of doctrine, church government, policies, or failure of agreement that let tempers rise and two bodies emerging

Let us unite in one church is the modern cry. This would be fine. But on what basis shall we unite? We need common ground. We just cannot get together for joint services and overlook basicai'v difterent doctrines. propose the only way we can get unity among the Christian churches is on the interpretation of scripture and teaching. Until we do, we cannot become one visable body. Man will have to agree on how to interpret the Bible literally or figuratively, using reason to interpret or accept on faith, agree on original sin or baptism, or Lord's Supper, or just what is faith. It would surprise you to know how interpretation of the word faith sets up whole theological systems. Unity without the agreement of Scriptural interpretation will not make us strong. Large numbers without the Word means nothing.

I propose if unity is desired that we learn to understand one another's teachings and compare with scripture. Now this can be done by laymen—or pastorial groups—or public discussions. True, we will find open controversies—seemingly unsurmountable but if we desire unity in the Christian church outwardly it must begin inwardly where only unity can begi —with a study care fully of God's word.

Meanwhile we are united in the one True church—the church of true believers in Jesus Christ. And members of this true church are found in any church body that teaches Jesus Christ as the sole Savior of man's sins. And no one church dare claim they are the only church. Some are closer to scripture though than others.




