Texas rodeo will get underway next week with the miniature rodeo scheduled for Tuesday, August 10, where more than 300 young cowboys and cowgirls will vie for honors. Registrations for the kids show are now being taken at rodeo headquarters in the Pampa Chamber of Commerce office.

The big RCA rodeo will get underway Wednesday, August 11, with a giant parade through the downtown Pampa at 3:00 o'clock, led by the Amarillo Air Force Band and featuring the Rolling Plains Wagon Train from Spearman, Texas. Riding clubs from throughout the tri-state area will appear in the parade and be featured in the grand entry of the opening performance Wednesday night.

Dancing will be held nightly Wednesday through Saturday at the National Guard Armory with music furnished by Lou Waifer and his Western Playboys.

Special attractions include C. D. Ferguson and his sheep dogs and cowboy monkeys, the Clark Brothers, world famous rodeo clowns, and the 4H and FFA boys beef calf scramble Thursday, and Saturday nights.

Beat The Champ Handicap Tourney

The American Machine & Foundry Company's "Beat The Champ" bowling tournament kicks off on August 16, at Bowl-Mor Lanes, in Spearman. This no-entry-fee tournament offers bowlers qualifying in local roll-offs a chance to test their skill in finals against AMF Staff of Champion members Dick Weber and Donna Zimmerman, two of the top professional bowlers in competition today.

Neither Weber or Miss Zimmerman need any introduction. Weber is three-time winner of the

BPA All Star, four time National Doubles Champion, a member of the ABC Classic Division Championship team, a member of the team which six times won the BPAA Team Championship, and winner of the Hickok Belt Award, as professional athlete of the month in January, 1963. He was named Bowler of the year three times and listed on the Bowling Magazine All American Team seven times. He holds an all-time record in winning 14 PBA tournaments, and has an even dozen sanctioned perfect games.

Miss Zimmerman holds an equally impressive record in the women's division. She was WIBC all events champion in 1963 and won the PWBA Oxnard Open in 1964. She was runner up in the All Star and World's Invitational, and a finalist in four All Stars, six World's Invitational, and 3 WIBC "Queens" tournaments. She was the Ohio State singles Match Game Champion in 1962, and won the Akron City All Events title four times. Miss Zimmerman has one sanctioned 300 game to her credit and holds a high sanctioned

series of 742.
Under the "Beat The Champ" tournament rules, anyone who has a 1964-65 ABC or WIBC League average, based on a minimum of 21 games, is welcome to enter the roll-offs and try for the "Beat The Champ" finals to be held at Amarillo.

A series of four weekly roll-offs will get underway on Monday, August 16th, and will run through Sunday, September 12. The starting dates of the second, third and fourth weekly roll-offs will be Monday, August 23, Monday, August 30, and Monday, September 6th. There will be a total of six winners each week, the three top-scoring men and the three top-scoring women. The winners of the four weeks of roll-offs will then compete in a final house elimination on September 26 at Amarillo to determine the three top men and three top women bowlers who will roll against Dick Weber and Donna Zimmerman in the finals. Each of the winning finalists in the eliminations will receive AMF silver plated serving bowls.

There will be no entry fee in the tournament; however, each participant will contribute 50c to an expense fund to help offset the cost of taking the top men and women bowlers to the finals and bowling at the finals. The only other expense to the bowler will be the regular charge per game at Bowl-Mor Lanes. Men use a 75 per cent handicap of 200 scratch, a 135 pin maximum three game handicap. Women use 75 per cent handicap of 190 scratch, also a 135 pin maximum three game handicap.

When the finals are held at Amarillo Dick Weber and Donna Zimmerman will roll on the same lanes as the finalists. The men and women will both be bowling with the regular tournament handicap against the AMF Champions. The first prize for both the top man and woman bowler rolling with the champions in the finals will be \$50.00 in cash. Second place winners will receive \$25.00 and third-place winners will receive \$15.00. Fourth and fifth place winners get \$10.00 and sixth through tenth place finishers each receive \$7.50.

Mesdames Cotter Clark And Yeary At Conference

Mrs. Helen Yeary, Mrs. Omar Cotter and Mrs. Wilma Clark, Spearman, are working with the Texas Association for the Improvement of Reading in the Thirtieth Annual Reading Conference for this area. Mesdames Cotter, Clark and Yeary are serving with the publicity committee of the three day conference held in Canyon August 10-12.

They are among the administrators and teachers from your system who are interested in the conference and has material related to programs.

The conference, sponsored by West Texas State University in conjunction with TAIR serves a thirteen county area in the Panhandle and is designed for the presentation of improved methods and inspiration in connection with reading and the use of reading content fields in public schools. Other participants in the annual session will represent New Mexico, Oklahoma and Kansas.

Michigan. Henderson & Parks Enroll in Program

Henderson & Parks, registered Angus cattle breeders from near Morse, have enrolled in the American Angus Association's beef improvement program. The herd is scheduled to be classified August 30 to September 15, by an official representative of the American Angus Association.

The program, called Angus Herd Improvement Records (AHIR), is designed to help cattlemen do a more professional job of breeding by measuring and recording the type, production and carcass producing qualities of their herd. All AHIR records are kept by the American Angus Association on a Honeywell 400 computer. These records are sent regularly on special forms to each Angus breeder enrolled in the AHIR program.

The official classifier will compare every animal in the herd against the ideal type Angus. Each integral part will be analyzed and a total score ranging down from an ideal of 100 points will be assigned to each heifer, cow and bull over one year of age.

When the classification is complete the American Angus Association's breed improvement department will compile a graph showing how the herd averaged on each part, such as feet and legs, head and neck, rump, loin, etc. A graph of each bull will also be made up on a transparent sheet of acetate. By placing the bull graph on top of the herd graph a breeder can quickly determine if their herd bulls can be expected to sire calves that are better on all points than the average of the herd.

In line with the production measure portion of AHIR, Mr. Henderson, had made provisions to weigh and grade the calves produced in his herd each year. This will allow him to measure and work improvement in the "mothering ability" of his cows and the production of his bulls.

Water Rogers Column

TO COMBAT THE WATER CRISIS

The Mayor of New York City for a blimp ride recently over the depleted reservoirs serving his metropolis of more than 8 million residents. Upon return he declared there was no need for "panic". He urged caution and "touched off a campaign to encourage New Yorkers to curtail their water consumption. The city's reservoirs, on July 21, were at 47.8 percent of capacity. On his inspection flight, Mayor Wagner could see stone walls and foundations first by rising vectors of the reservoir more than 100 year ago.

The crises confronting New York City and much of the drought-hit Northeastern United States is serious indeed. As I have said repeatedly, the real and threatening water shortages in our country constitute our No. 1 domestic problem. For many Americans, the crises in water are going to get worse before they get better.

It would be of interest to Panhandle residents to know that the capacity of all New York City reservoirs is less than the usable capacity of the reservoir being backed by the Canadian River dam near Sanford. Because the Northeast normally receives substantial amounts of rainfall, it is difficult for many residents of that area to realize the seriousness of the shortage they now face.

On July 22, I was honored to be among several Members of Congress invited to the White House to attend the ceremony as President Johnson signed the "Water Resources Planning Act." This legislation, which was shaped in the Subcommittee on Irrigation and Reclamation, of which I am chairman, declares the policy of the Congress to be "to encourage the conservation, development, and utilization of water and related land resources" on a coordinated basis. This means that all levels of Government, as well as affected corporations, business enterprises, and individuals, will participate in planning the development of water resources. The Act sets up a cabinet-level Water Resources Council to keep the President and the Congress informed on the Nation's water needs and to guide the planning effort; authorizes the President to establish river basin planning commissions when needed; and provides for financial assistance to the States of water resources planning. By the way, at the bill-signing ceremony the President appeared hale, hearty, fit and tanned, despite the recent pressures brought on by the close attention he must pay to events in Viet Nam.

Report on Pesticides

The report of a study conducted by the National Academy of Sciences-National Research Council on the question of pesticide residues in foods has been submitted to Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman and Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare Anthony J. Celebrezze and was done under contract with the two Departments. The two Secretaries currently are reviewing recommendations of the report.

Even recommendations were made in the report. They are:

1. The concepts of 'no residue' and 'zero tolerance' as employed in the registration and regulation of pesticides are scientifically and administratively untenable and should be abandoned.
2. A pesticide should be registered on the basis of either 'negligible residue' or permissible residue, depending on whether its use results in the intake of a negligible or permissible fraction of the maximum acceptable daily intake as determined by appropriate safety studies.
3. Where the use of a pesticide may reasonably be expected to result in a residue in or on food, registration by the U. S. Department of Agriculture should not be granted unless (a) it is established that the residue is a negligible residue or (b) such residue is not more than a permissible residue established by the Food and Drug Administration.
4. When a pesticide is registered on a negligible-residue basis, the negligible-residue Figure should be published, as well as an analytical method for determining whether or not a food contains a residue in excess of the negligible residue. Both the amount and the analytical method should have the concurrence of the Food and Drug Administration and be controlling for its enforcement purposes.
5. The Food and Drug Administration's regulations on permissible residues should include a published description of the analytical methods used for enforcement purposes and should not be changed without notice and opportunity for comment by interested parties.
6. If a pesticide is known to be too hazardous for a particular use, registration for such use should be refused.
7. Because of the importance that pesticides play in the production of our food supply and the many non-food uses necessary for protecting the health and economy of the nation, it would seem appropriate that the registration of pesticides should continue to be the responsibility of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.
8. The publication of a reasonable schedule for an orderly transition from the present procedure is necessary, and its duration should be decided by mutual agreement between the Department of Agriculture and the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.
9. Programs should be developed for continuing centralized leadership, free and prompt exchange of information, training activities, and interlaboratory for residue methods should be produced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare and continuously revised and mixtures.
10. A formal program for education in residue analysis is urgently needed and the Department of Agriculture and Health, Education and Welfare, and any other agencies concerned should cooperatively sponsor this program with suitable training centers.
11. There should be an expanded research program on the persistence of pesticides in the total environment and on the toxicology, pharmacology, and biochemistry of pesticides that would improve the reliability and precision of animal studies and their relevance to man.

Homemaking Notes

It is definitely ice cream weather! And what is better than ice cream made in an old fashioned ice cream freezer. Just more of it, I'd say. Of course, I am one of those home-made ice cream's biggest fans.

There are many ice cream recipes around, but I'd like to pass on to you some of my favorite they may be yours, too.

VANILLA ICE CREAM

6 eggs
2 cups sugar
2 tsp vanilla
whipped cream or
can of Carnation evaporated milk

Beat eggs and add sugar, small amount of milk, and cream. Pour some milk into freezer can first to make mixing in can easier. Pour in mixture; add milk to fill to two inches of top of can.

FRESH PEACH ICE CREAM

Use vanilla ice cream recipe & start freezing same as above but be sure to leave room in freezer for peaches.

Add juice of half lemon to sliced peaches. Use either pint or quart

of peaches mix through the ice cream and give a more uniform taste. Frozen peaches are just about as good as fresh ones.) As soon as ice cream is mushy enough that peaches can be stirred in without settling to bottom, add peaches and complete the freezing. REFRIGERATOR ICE CREAM

2 eggs
3 cups milk
1 cup thick cream
1 1/2 cups sugar with tiny touch of flour
1 tsp. vanilla
Beat eggs, add sugar and milk. Whip cream and add. Add vanilla. Put in freezer tray and let freeze until slushy. Strain out into mixer bowl and beat with electric mixer.

Let it freeze a little harder and mix again. Through beating with electric mixer is secret of making it taste just like freezer ice cream.

COOKED VANILLA ICE CREAM

3 cups milk
2 1/2 cups sugar
2 heaping tbs. flour
6 eggs
1 1/2 cups whipping cream
2 tsp. vanilla

Scald milk in double boiler. Mix sugar and flour; add eggs and beat until creamy. Pour into freezer; add whipping cream and then enough milk to fill to about two inches from top.

THE LAST NOTE: The world really isn't any worse. It's just that the news coverage is so much better.

If you are planning to freeze or can peaches this summer, freeze or some information to aid you. This year's crop is 12 percent larger than in 1964. Offerings provide excellent quality at moderate prices.

Peaches must look good to be good. Select peaches that are firm plump, free from blemishes, well developed in size and yellowish in color. At this stage, they will continue to ripen.

Handle peaches with care, for they bruise easily. A bushel of peaches yields about 20 quarts when frozen.

An easy method to peel peaches is to cover them with boiling water. Let stand for a minute, then with a paring knife strip off the skins.

Many of the peaches now on the market are brushed and washed before packing. Generally, these do not really need peeling before they go into a pie or are eaten out of hand.

Peanut butter must now contain at least 90 percent peanuts according to a revised food standard just announced by the Food and Drug Administration.

There was no standard regulating the peanut content of products marketed as peanut butter until this revised ruling. In the past, it has ranged as low as 78 percent. FDA officials have announced.

The new standard allows 10 percent for optional ingredients which, with proper label declarations, may be used to create products with eating qualities acceptable to a wide variety of consumers. Such ingredients include seasonings and hydrogenated peanut and cotton oils to reduce oil separation and counteract the tendency of peanut butter to stick to the roof of the mouth.

All optional ingredients used, however, must be declared on the label.

The new standard will become effective 60 days after the announcement was made July 8, unless there's a request for a public hearing based on legally valid objections.

In the event that the peanut butter is made from unbleached peanuts, the label must bear a conspicuous statement such as "Prepared from unbleached peanuts (skins left on)."

The standard also provides that the common names of suitable optional ingredients shall be set out on the principal display panel so that they will likely be read and easily understood. The label information about the hydrogenated vegetable oils when used shall include the word "hydrogenated" or "hardened."

"HOLY BAPTISM SAVE"

Baptism is the door into discipleship with Jesus. Matt. 28:19-20 states "Go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the Name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you." According to Titus 3:5 it is a "washing of regeneration." I Peter 3:21 says it has saved Noah's ark which saved Noah.

Sleeping Sickness In Horses

A wide spread disease of the central nervous system of the horse was recognized in the U.S. as early as 1912 and was known to be the cause of serious losses during the 1920's and the 1930's. During the summer of 1930 a virus was isolated from a horse and the disease was named equine encephalomyelitis, commonly called sleeping sickness. This important discovery was the forerunner of many significant advances in the understanding and control of encephalitis in other animals as well as man.

Two different strains of the virus is known to occur in the United States - known as "Eastern" and "Western." Disease caused by "Eastern" strain is much more serious than that caused by "Western" strain.

It seems likely that wild birds and insects are the principal reservoirs for the infection and that mosquitoes serve as carriers from birds to susceptible horses. Even through equine encephalomyelitis is an important disease in horses and man, infection of these is rather incidental to the pre-occupation of the virus.

Affected animals lose awareness of their surroundings and walk continuously in circles, are unresponsive to commands and

may collide with objects or crash through fences. The symptoms usually appear rapidly one to three weeks after exposure.

The nervous signs seen with sleeping sickness are similar to those produced by a number of poisoning and other encephalitis. Vaccination of horses gives adequate protection from the disease for up to 1 year. Vaccination should be carried out annually before the expected danger period since 15 days are required for development of immunity.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 27 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section 48a to be designated Section 48b, so as to create as an agency of the State of Texas the Teacher Retirement System of Texas, vesting the general administration and responsibility of said system in a state board of trustees to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas, and authorizing said Board to invest assets of said system in various obligations and subjects of investment, subject to certain restrictions stated therein and such other restrictions as may hereafter be provided by law; providing that such Amendment shall be self-enacting and shall not alter, amend or repeal Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of Texas or any legislation passed pursuant thereto except insofar as such legislation may limit or restrict the provisions of this Amendment; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding Section 48b thereto which shall read as follows: "Section 48b. There is hereby created as an agency of the State of Texas the Teacher Retirement System of Texas, the rights of membership in which, the retirement privileges and benefits thereon, and the management and operations of which shall be governed by the provisions herein contained and by present or hereafter enacted Acts of the Legislature not inconsistent herewith. The general

administration and responsibility of said system are hereby vested in a State Board of Trustees, to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas, which Board shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, intelligence and industry in the management of their own affairs, not in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income therefrom as well as probable safety of their capital; and further provided, that a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as may now or hereafter be provided by law. Unless investments authorized herein are hereafter further restricted by an Act of the Legislature, no more than one per cent (1%) of the book value of the total assets of the Teacher Retirement System shall be invested in the stock of any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; and provided further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid cash dividends for ten (10) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors; and provided further, that so long as less than \$500,000,000 of said Fund is invested in the government and municipal securities enumerated above, not more than thirty-three and one-third per cent (33 1/3%) of the Fund shall be invested at any given time in common stocks. This Amendment shall be self-enacting and shall become effective immediately upon its adoption without any

If, after hearing, or after considering the report and report of a Master, the Commission finds good cause therefore, it shall recommend to the Supreme Court the removal or retirement, as the case may be, of the Justice or Judge in question and shall thereupon file with the Clerk of the Supreme Court the entire record before the Commission. (8) The Commission may, after such investigation as it may determine to be necessary, order a hearing to be held before it concerning the removal or retirement of a Justice or Judge, or it may in its discretion appoint an active or retired District Judge or Justice of a Court of Civil Appeals as a Master to hear and take evidence in any such matter; and to report thereon to the Commission. If, after hearing, or after considering the report and report of a Master, the Commission finds good cause therefore, it shall recommend to the Supreme Court the removal or retirement, as the case may be, of the Justice or Judge in question and shall thereupon file with the Clerk of the Supreme Court the entire record before the Commission. (9) The Supreme Court shall review the record of the proceedings on the law and facts and in its discretion may, for good cause shown, permit the introduction of additional evidence and shall order removal or retirement, as it finds just and proper, or wholly reject the recommendation. Upon an order for involuntary retirement for disability or an order for removal, the office in question shall become vacant. The rights of an incumbent so retired to retirement benefits shall be the same as if his retirement had been voluntary. PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 57 proposing an Amendment to Section 1-a of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding to said Section as presently written, the following provisions: requiring automatic retirement of certain District and Appellate Judges at age seventy-five (75) or such earlier age, not under seventy (70), as may be provided by law; creating a State Judicial Qualifications Commission and providing for its composition and the qualifications, methods of selection and terms of office of its members; defining the functions and procedures of said Commission; and the duty to investigate, and hold hearings in respect of, disability and misconduct of District and Appellate Judges and to make recommendations to the Supreme Court of Texas for involuntary retirement or removal of such Judges; empowering the Supreme Court of Texas, in its discretion, to retire such Judges for disability and to remove them for misconduct upon recommendation of the aforesaid Commission and consideration of the record made before it; defining misconduct for which said Judges may be removed; providing that the proceedings of said Commission shall be confidential until filed in the Supreme Court with recommendation for retirement or removal; and providing that the removal provisions hereby established shall be alternative to and cumulative of those provided elsewhere in the Constitution. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 1-a of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so that said Section shall hereafter read as follows: "Section 1-a. (1) Subject to the further provisions of this Section, the Legislature shall provide for the retirement and compensation of Justices and Judges of the Appellate Courts and District and Criminal District Courts on account of length of service, age and disability, and for their reassignment to active duty where and when needed. The office of every such Justice and Judge shall become vacant when the incumbent reaches the age of seventy-five (75) years or such earlier age, not less than seventy (70) years, as the Legislature may prescribe; but, in the case of an incumbent whose term of office includes the effective date of this Amendment, this provision shall not prevent

ing shall be by majority vote of those present, except that recommendations for retirement or removal of Justices or Judges shall be by affirmative vote of at least five (5) members. (6) Any Justice or Judge within the scope of this Section 1-a may, subject to the other provisions hereof, be removed from office for willful or persistent conduct, which is clearly inconsistent with the proper performance of his said duties or casts public discredit upon the judiciary or administration of justice; or any such Justice or Judge may be involuntarily retired for disability seriously interfering with the performance of his duties, which is, or is likely to become, permanent in nature. 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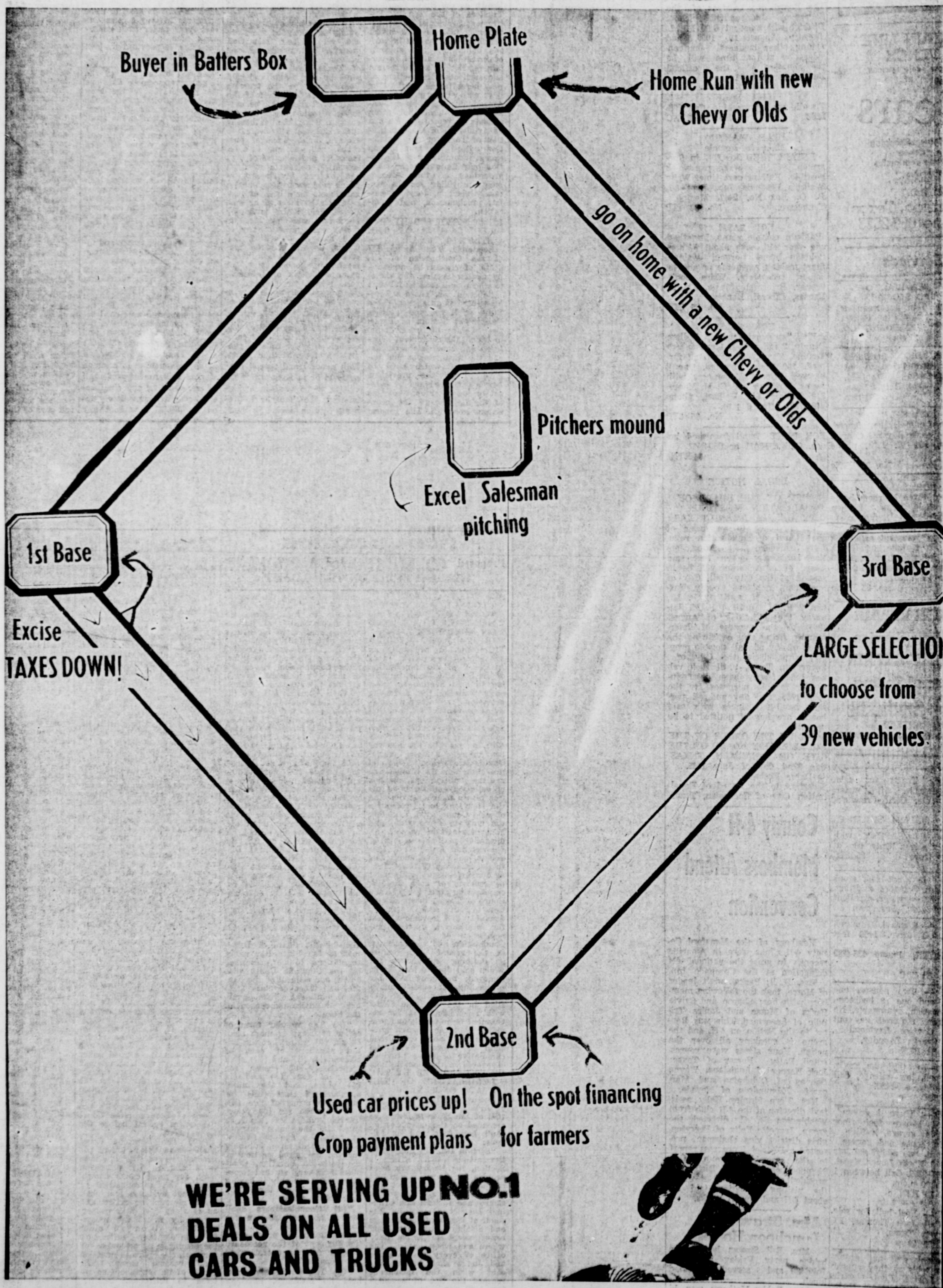

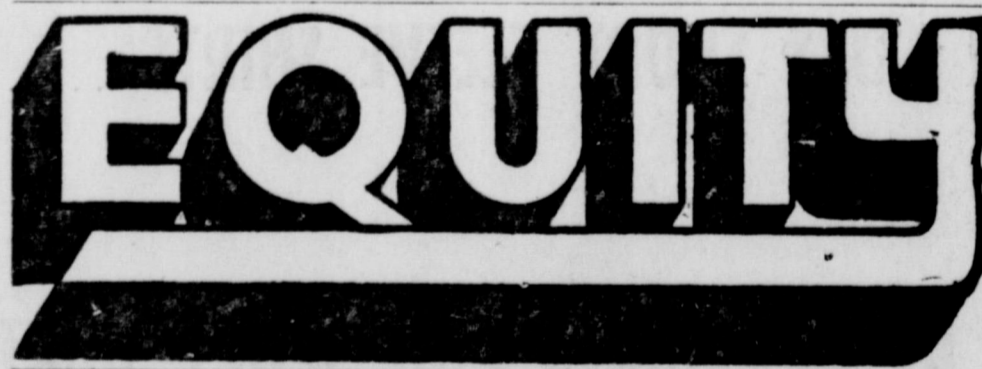
