## Mrs. Sallie Butler Buried October 13

Funeral services for Mrs. Sallie Butler were conducted from the Union Church at 2 p.m. Wednesday, October 13 with the pastor Rev. George Bollinger officiating. Burial was in Hansford Cemetery.

Mrs. Sallie Caroline Butler was born March 3, 1872 in Phelps County, Missouri, and departed this life October 12, 1965 in Hansford Hospital at the age of 93. Her husband and five children preceded her in death. Those left to mourn her passing are: one son, Sherman Giddens of Houston, Ark. two daughters Mrs. Alberta Estes and Mrs. Dortha Taylor, both of Spearman, 22 grandchildren, 44 great grandchildren and 15 great, great grandchildren.

Mrs. Butler was one of the great Pioneer stock of which we are so proud. Her life spanned a long period of many changes, from the covered wagon she learned to drive to the old Model T and before her passing the airplane and exploration in space.

She moved to Paris, Texas in a covered wagon at the age of 17. The oldest child in a family of 10, she knew how to work hard at an early age. She dipped her with an old gourd dipper from a spring to use for washing on the wash board. She spun thread at the spinning wheel and wove it into cloth for clothing for the family. Wild game was meat for the table. She was a true marksman with the muzzle loaded gun.

In 1905 the family moved to Hemphill County where her family was reared. She was always ready to serve in time of sickness or when a new baby was born. She was converted at the age of 25 and remained true to Holiness teachings all her life.

She moved to Spearman in 1948 and spent the remaining years here.

The past year she spent at Spearman's Pioneer Manor Home.

Dr. B. E. Reeves, Superintendent of the Spearman Public Schools is the 1966 Spelling Bee Director for Hansford County.

Some time before April 9, the Hansford County Bee will be held, and the Champion will go to Amarillo on April 23 for the annual regional elimination for the National Spelling Bee.

Last year, Darrell Tope, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Tope, of Spearman was the Hansford County Champion. He was a 7th grader in the Spearman School and is eligible to enter the 1966 Bee.

The Amarillo Globe-News, which has sponsored the High Plains area bee since 1949, also has a unique secondary contest—the Junior Spelling Bee, open only to contestants from the 6th and lower grades. The National Bee is open to all students, 16 years of age and under, through the 8th grade.

The Hansford County Junior Champion for 1965 was Pat Schnell of Spearman the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Schnell.

First place winner in the regional bee will go to Washington during the first week in June 1966, to participate in the National Spelling Bee. The winner will also receive several other attractive prizes, and his (or her) school will have a full year of use of the Britannica film service.

A traveling plaque, carrying the names of all Regional winners since 1949 will hang at the school of the winner.

## District Court Judges Against Gas Gatherer

The U. S. District Court in Amarillo, Texas, has entered a judgement which has now become final to Phillips Petroleum Company, for damages and court costs in the amount of \$2,432.29. Damages are for injury to the company's gas gathering system in Sherman County, Texas and for gas taken from the system.

In addition, exemplary damages in the amount of \$500.00 was awarded to the company.

The Federal Court also issued a permanent injunction against the defendant, O. E. Carson, prohibiting him of taking gas in the future from Phillips Gas Gathering System in Sherman County, Texas.

**Xmas Packages To Soldiers Overseas Are Deadlined**

The period from October 21 to November 10 has been designated for the mailing of Christmas parcels by surface transportation to members of our Armed Forces overseas. Greeting cards for overseas should be mailed during this period if they are to have a reasonable expectation of delivery prior to Christmas.

All articles should be packed in boxes of wood, metal, solid fiberboard or strong double faced corrugated fiberboard and have sufficient cushioning to prevent any rattling or loosening of articles within the package. All fiberboard boxes should be securely wrapped in heavy paper and each box should be well tied with strong cord. Addresses must be legible and complete and should be prepared by typewriter or pen and ink.

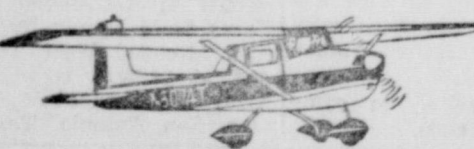

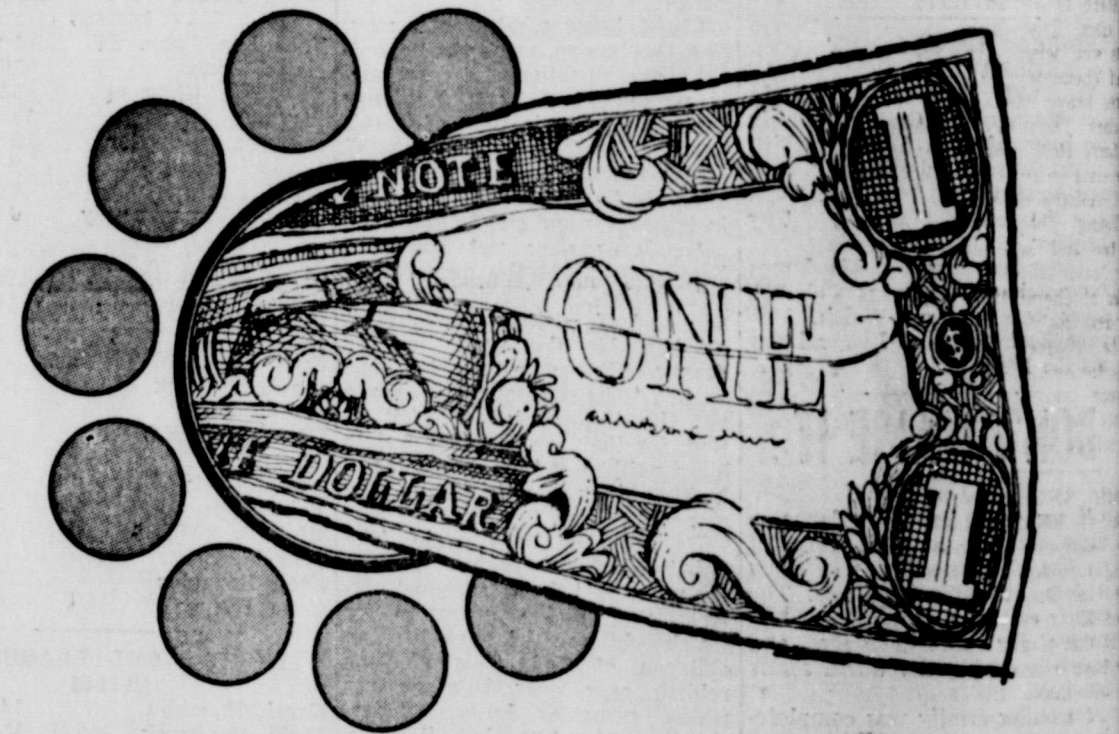

### DRAFT BOARDS WILL BE MORE STRICT

Draft age men who burn their draft cards can get their inductions speeded up. The President signed new legislation in August which makes it a criminal act to mutilate or destroy a draft card, and carries an imprisonment to 5 years, or \$10,000 fine as punishment.

Forced to meet doubled quotas, local draft boards will not be as liberal in granting deferments to college students now as they have in the past few years.

The state draft director will furnish boards with standards, principles and opinions in the area of student deferments. Deferments for undergraduates taking a full time course of 12 semester hours will still be considered. If the student deferred on the basis of a 9 hour load doesn't go to summer school, his deferment will be terminated.

The local board may question a student's progress, and request a transcript of his credits. Those who drop out or carry less than the recommended academic load get themselves on a scholastic probation can expect a termination of their deferments.

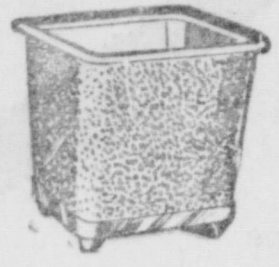
