## Area Burglaries Solved By Arrest Of Two Felons

Several offences were cleared from law-enforcement books last week when Hansford County Sheriff, J. B. Cooke, arrested two Dumas men. He was aided by the arrest by law officers in Dumas and Sherman county. Roy Gene Wright, 36, and Edward Doak, 20, were charged with theft over \$50 in Moore county and arraigned before Justice of the Peace Sims of Dumas. Bond was set at \$2,000 each. The two men were transferred to Spearman last week where they were arraigned before Hansford County Judge Johnnie Lee on charges of destruction of private property at the John Arms north of Gruver. An additional bond of \$2,000 each was set. They are being held in Hansford County jail awaiting trial and jury appearance. An alert farmer took the license number of the suspicious car, and notified Sheriff Cooke. The two men stuck their car in the mud, near the Arms home, walked to the house, and taking no one at home, proceeded to spend the night. They allegedly broke a window and entered the home, did extensive damage to some irrigation motors, batteries and a pickup tractor. The farmer, a neighbor of the Arms, knew no one was home at the residence, and notified the Sheriff in Spearman about the suspicious intruders. The two felons are also charged with burglary in Sherman county.

Social Security Will Go Up To \$188,398. For Local Employees

The new Social Security tax bite that will hit the pocketbooks of Spearman workers, beginning January 1, will be a shocker to many people. They know all about the added benefits voted by Congress during the last session, such as medicare and bigger pensions for the aged. But they have not figured out how much it will cost them as individuals.

Half of this extra cost will be borne by the workers, through payroll deductions, and other half by their employers. Under last year's tax rate, local employees paid \$142,505.00. This year, with the change amounting to a 40 per cent tax increase, local employees will pay \$188,398.00. Employers will match this sum.

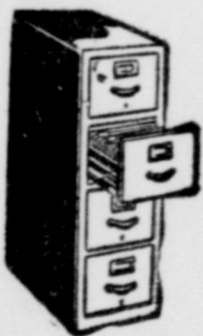

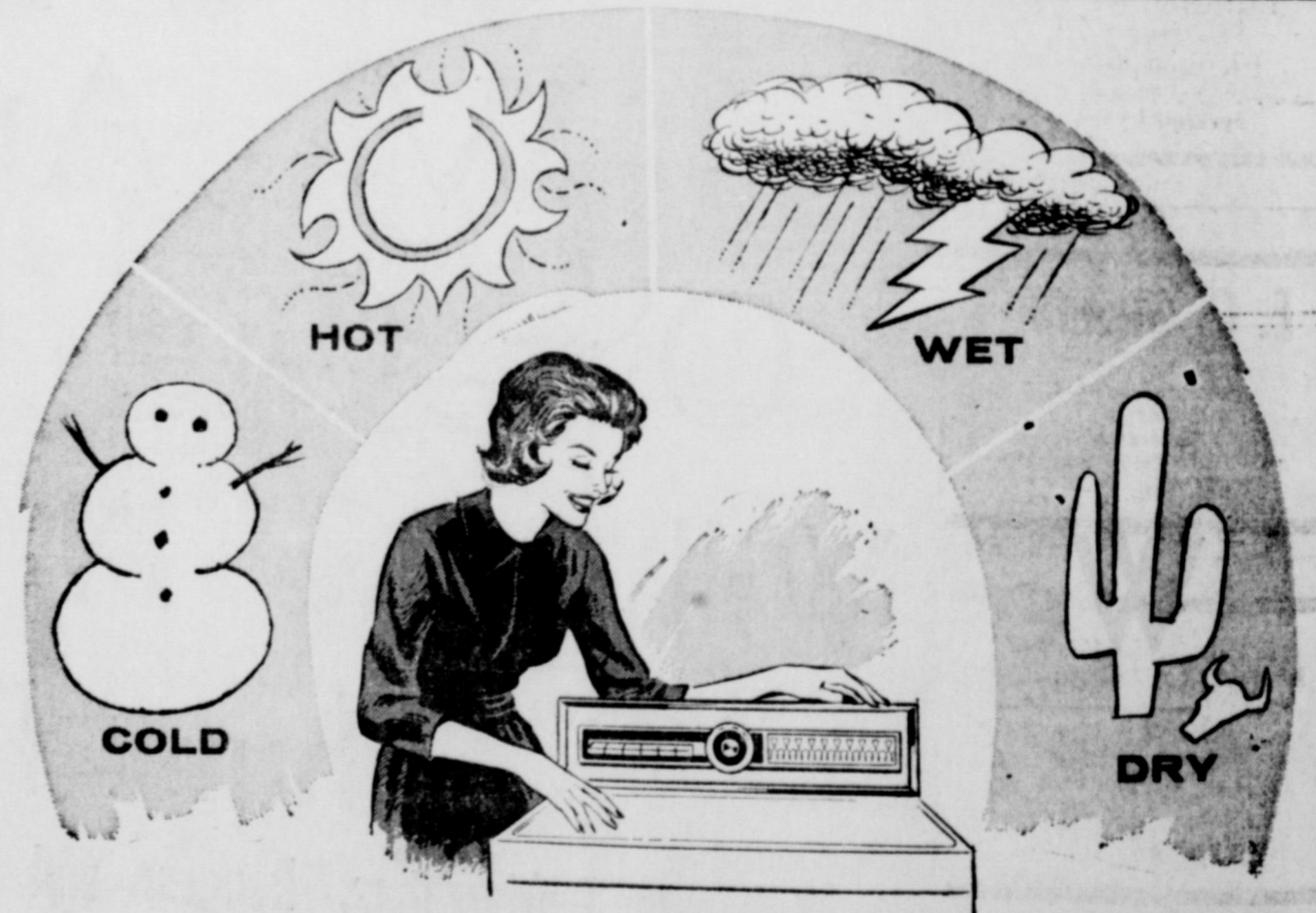

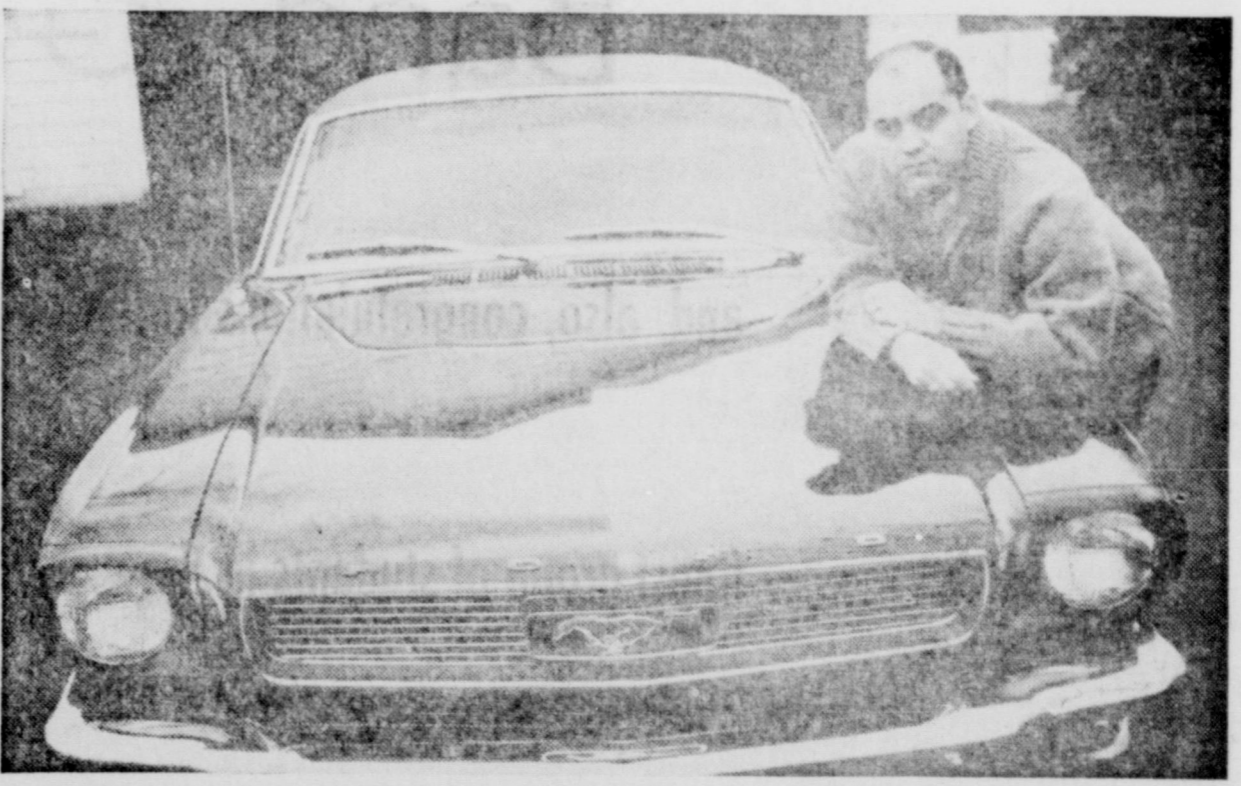
