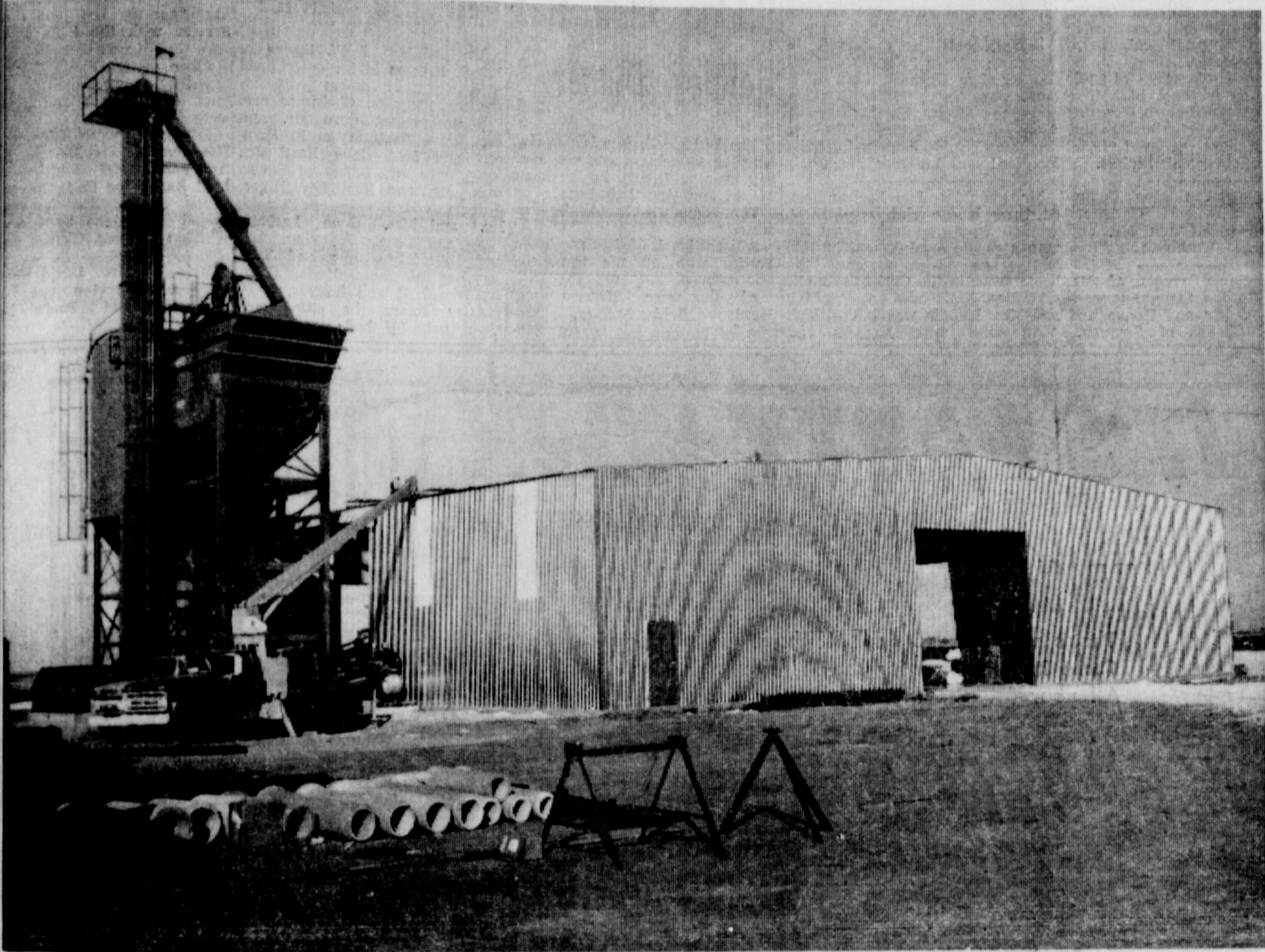

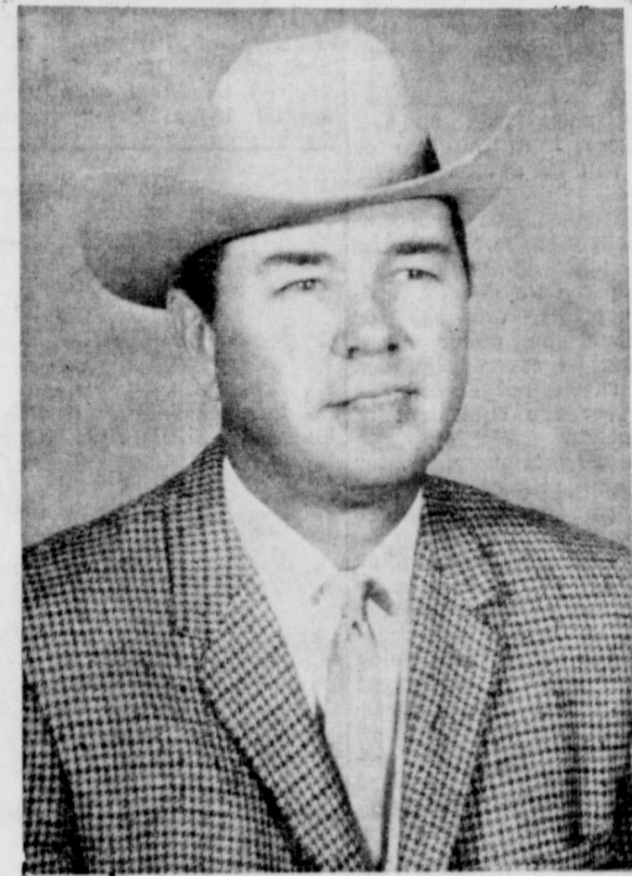

## Production To Begin At New Plant Soon

Mack Mauldin, Sales Engineer for the Gifford-Hill Western Co., moved to Spearman in late Sept. He and his wife and daughters live in a beautiful new home at 1015 Wilmet Drive.

A 1948 graduate of Texas Tech, with a degree in Agricultural Engineering, he worked for several years with the Soil Conservation Service in various places. Mr. Mauldin is the Sales Engineer for this territory.

Within the next few weeks the concrete irrigation pipe you have heard so much about, will be rolling off the assembly line at the new Gifford-Hill Western plant in Spearman.

The 30-some employees of the new industry, will bring a monthly payroll into the Spearman territory totaling \$20,000.00.

Announcement was made in late September of the company's plans to construct the half-million dollar plant in Spearman. The ground breaking ceremonies were held September 29 at the fifteen acre site just outside the Spearman city limits, on the Gruver highway. Much progress has been made since that time.

Three buildings have been erected including a welding shop, the large plant, and an office building.

The division office, which has been in Dumas for the past seven years, is being moved this week into the new office at the Spearman plant. This building will house offices for: Jim Burks, the Division Manager; Accountant, Carroll Meeker; Dispatcher, Jon Cranford; and Sales Engineer, Mack Mauldin.

Mr. and Mrs. Jim Burks and 3 children have purchased the beautiful rock home at 304 S. Endicott, from Mrs. Maude Mathews. They are in the process of moving from Dumas this week.

Mr. and Mrs. Carroll Meeker will be moving here soon, as will Mr. and Mrs. Cranford and one child. Mr. Mauldin and family have lived here since September. Mr. and Mrs. Ray Salzman and family, who live at 719 Steel Dr., have been here since September. He is one of the crew foremen.

The plant will have two crew foremen, with each supervising 10 men. These crews lay enough pipe during the winter months to keep the plant busy all summer long. However, the plant will manufacture underground pipe the year-round, for these crews lay more pipe during the non-watering season than the plant can keep up with. The industry services the territory between Amarillo & Garden City, Kansas. Gifford-Hill maintains plants in these two cities. Spearman's plant is the in-between supply.

A minimum of 18 new families for Spearman is assured as a result of this new industry. There is a possibility of 30 new families after the plant goes into full operation. However many local men have already been employed by the company.

This newspaper, along with the citizens of Spearman welcome this new industry, the employees and their families, to our fair city. We hope you will feel at home in Spearman, and be as happy to be here, as we are to have you!

## Paul B. Higgs Well Known Area Banker Succumbs

Paul B. Higgs, 70, of 2100 Julian, Amarillo, Texas, a Banker, rancher and farmer with interests at Gruver, Spearman and Bushland, died Saturday night at St. Anthony's Hospital after a year's illness.

Funeral services were conducted at 10 a. m. Monday, December 27, in Amarillo at Scholer-Gordon Colonial Chapel. Dr. Jordan Grooms, pastor of Folk Street Methodist Church officiated.

Graveside services were held at 2 p.m. in the Gruver Cemetery. Mr. Higgs founded the First State Bank of Gruver in 1929. In the early 1930's with Hayden Hart of Gruver and the late John Colvard of Spearman, he consolidated the bank with the First State Bank of Spearman. He remained a director of that bank until 1959. Mr. Higgs owned farm property near Gruver and a ranch north of Bushland.

Born at High, near Paris, Texas, he came to Hansford County in a covered wagon with his parents in 1905. Starting in 1914, he attended West Texas State University for two years. He was married to Miss Elizabeth McClellan in 1915 at Old Hansford. He farmed and ranched in the County for many years.

Mr. Higgs founded the Amarillo Stockyards in 1948 with J. D. Amerd. The enterprise on the Fritch highway was sold a few months later to Charlie and Hugh Ford, and was recently torn down. He moved to Amarillo in 1939. He was a member of the Southwestern Cattlemen's Association.

He is survived by his wife; a son, Browning Higgs of 2620 Sunlite, Amarillo; two daughters: Mrs. Rose Rogers of Roswell, N. M. and Mrs. Mary Lou Shines of New Orleans; and six grandchildren.

The US Weather Bureau issued a severe weather forecast for much of the local area, calling for possible tornadoes with a few severe thunderstorms with large hail and locally damaging windstorms.

The golden-spread residents were still enjoying the "Springtime in December".

The rain, which fell in Spearman during the day, Dec. 23rd, was accompanied by thunder, lightning, small hail and some high winds. The steady drizzle turned to rain which ended in the middle of the afternoon with the sun shining brightly, giving ample promise of a dry Christmas. The sunshine was quickly dispelled later in the afternoon and by 5 p.m. large black clouds had loomed up in the North and west. Snow then began to fall after midnight and by the time the town fully awoke from the night's slumber Spearman had a 4 inch snow cover.

Although there had been some prediction of snow the fall came as a surprise to most residents when they arose Friday morning.

Pushing 24 hours ahead of Santa Claus the weatherman brought the first White Christmas to Spearman residents in so many years no one can seem to recall exactly when the last white one was.

However only the extreme northern Texas and Oklahoma Panhandles appeared to have snow cover. Darroutett received the heaviest snowfall with five inches on the ground Friday morning. Spearman was next with four inches with drifts up to 3 1/2 feet blocking east-west county roads. Clear skies and melting snows prevailed Friday afternoon with a high of 50 recorded on the official weather gauge at the H. P. Cates' residence.

Early evening however with temperatures falling rapidly, turns the melted slush to pure ice, making city streets and sidewalks dangerous. Monday of this week still finds lots of snow and ice on protected sides of buildings and streets.

**Amateur Artists Competition open For Cash Awards**

The Third Annual District Citation Art Exhibition Art Exhibition and Scholarship Competition will be held in Canyon, Texas in January. The fine Arts Building of West Texas State University will hang the Exhibit representing 16 counties of the 31st Senatorial District. The state competition will be held in Austin in February. Governor John Connally will present the state awards.

Two major divisions of competition will be open again this year for entries by high school and Amateur artists. High school students in the 9th, 10th, 11th, and 12 grades will compete for prizes of \$75, 50, and 25. In the Merit Award Division (open to any amateur of any age who does

not derive more than one-half of his income from the sale of art) there will be awards of \$75, 50, 25.

All entries must have been completed within the past year, be original, suitably and simply framed or prepared for display. Water colors prints, drawings, or pastels should be under glass. Name should be covered by tape. The entry should not exceed 36x42 in size, or the equivalent of 1512 sq. inches.

Oils, pastels, tempera, water colors, casein, plastics (polymer, etc.) and pen and ink drawings will be accepted.

A whiteentry blank and \$1.00 registration fee (fee goes to make up awards given) must accompany each entry. Deadline will be January 9. Deliver paintings to Nelda Sheets at the Hansford Implement Co. or 702 Gibner Drive, Spearman. Entry blanks will be available from Nelda Sheets, the county Art Chairman of Hansford County. Mrs. Frank Kimbrough, Canyon, Texas, Box 788, W1 Station, is the District Chairman for the 16 Counties of the 31st Senatorial District.

State Scholarships to be given are \$500, 300 and 200. The Merit Award winner will receive \$100. District judges are now being selected for the competition in January.

Three Spearman men were involved in the chain-wreck accident which occurred about 8:30 Saturday night on US highway 83 just north of Perryton.

James Frank Sutherland, driver, his brother Mickey Sutherland and Teddy Pool all of Spearman, crashed their 1964 Valiant into the rear of a semi-trailer truck which was stopped on the highway. The truck had no lights on.

The truck driver, who was not injured, had stopped to investigate an accident which had just occurred between two other cars. Occupants in the two cars were Mr. and Mrs. James Wright and their daughter, and three Latin-Americans. Mr. Wright is the Principle of Perryton Elementary schools. 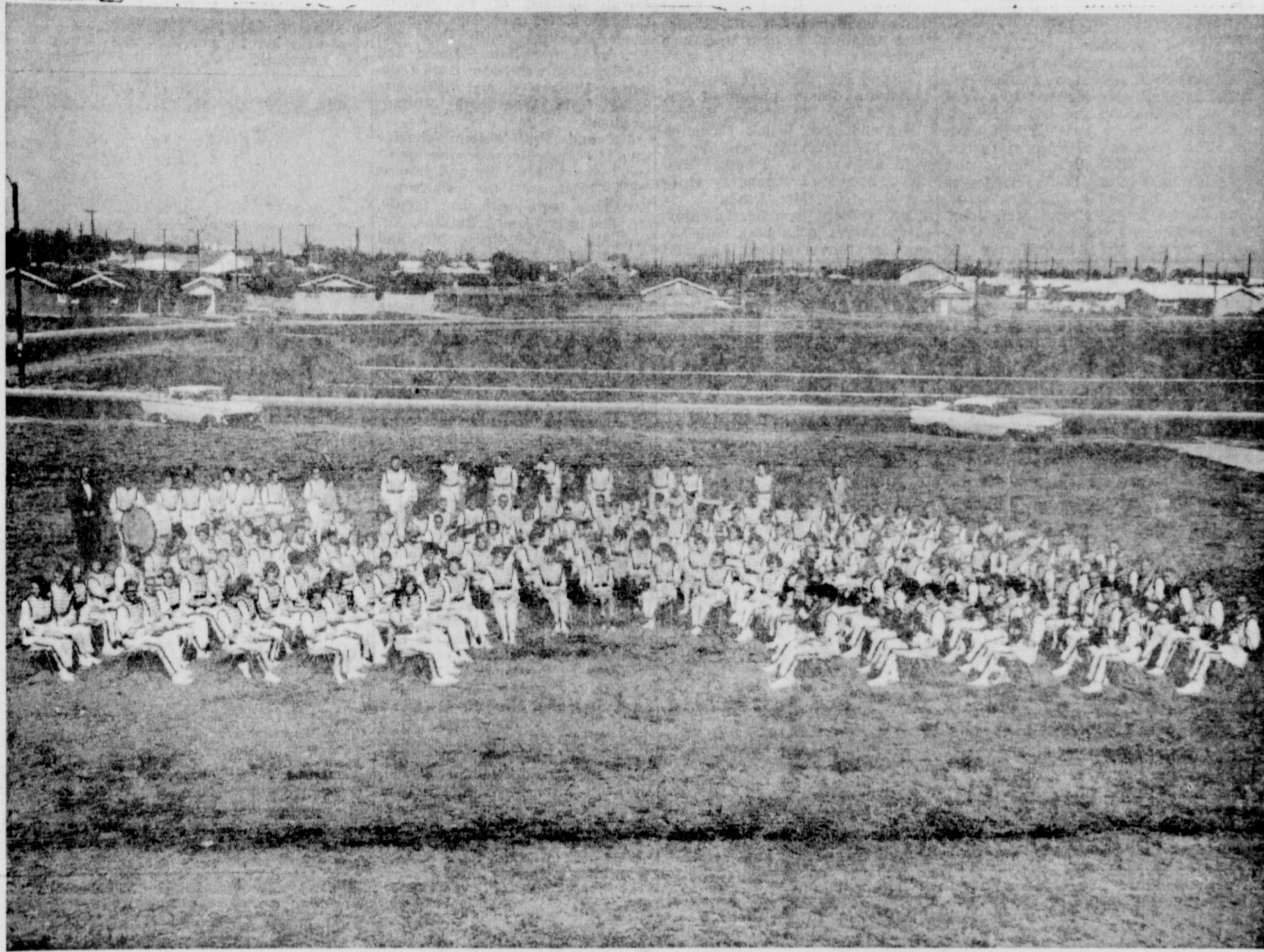

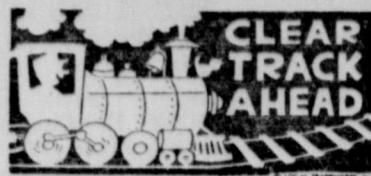

IV. Blank spaces shall be left in order that the names of other persons may be written in. Each person(voter) residing in Directors Precincts Nos. 1, 2 and 3, as set forth above, shall vote for only one Director, namely the Director for the District in which the voter resides. All voters may vote for the candidate of their choice by placing an "X" in the square beside the name or by scratching or marking out all other names in that race and leaving the name of such Director on the ballot. All voters desiring to cast a vote for a candidate whose name is not on the ballot may do so by writing the name of the person in the blank space provided on the ballot and by placing an "X" in the square beside the name, or by scratching or marking out all other candidates appearing on the ballot for Precinct Director. Each person residing in the counties composing the District, as set forth above, shall vote for two (2) County Committeemen for the county in which the voter resides. All persons desiring to cast a vote for a candidate whose name is not on the ballot, may do so by writing the name of that person in the blank space provided on the ballot and by placing an "X" in the square beside the name, or by scratching or marking out all but two candidates appearing or written in on the ballot.
