



SURVIVING SPOUSE

TAX INFORMATION

You may file a joint return with your deceased husband or wife if he or she died during the 1964 tax year, Internal Revenue's Administrative Officer Hubert B. Hamill of the Amarillo office said. provided you have not remarried by December 31, 1964.

You may compute your tax at the rates applicable to joint returns for the next two years following the death of your spouse if you have not remarried, maintain your home as the principal abode of your dependent child, and were entitled to file joint return in the year of death, whether you filed jointly not.

Document 5107 furnishes more detailed information on this subject is available up on request from the Internal Revenue Service.
