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Soybeans May Be Answer To Another Crop For This Area

Halfway, Texas
Many area farmers are watching with interest the development of soybeans as an additional crop that can be grown on the Plains of Texas. At this time, Texas stands twenty-third in the nation in acres devoted to soybean production. However, at the same time the state of Texas leads the nation in average bushels yield with 28 bushels of beans per acre in 1964. About 2.3 of the total world production of soybeans is in the U.S.A.
During the crop year of 1964, Texas had only 62,000 acres of land planted to soybeans. Most of the available land is planted with either cotton or grain sorghum, but each year soybeans gain some in popularity.
Due to the unusually dry year in 1964, the yields on all varieties of soybeans were down. In most years there is some supplemental rainfall to help in crop production.
1965 will see an increase for the nation of over 2 million acres of soybeans that have been planted in some other crop in years past. This demand for soybeans is brought about by the large percentage of the U. S. beans being exported to other countries, 82 percent of Japan's total soybean import came from the U.S.A. This ever increasing market is demanding not only more soybeans, but also a product of better quality. At this time, soybeans are the leading agricultural export, bringing into the U. S. more export money than any other agricultural commodity.
The High Plains Research Foundation at Halfway, Texas, has been carrying on an accelerated breeding program on soybeans. This first new variety released by the Foundation and given the name of HINN has proven to be a good producing and high yielding soybean.
Some of the characteristics for which HINN was developed are: higher yielding ability than the other varieties being grown in the area; shatter resistance; fruiting higher from the ground for better harvesting and reduction of loss at harvest; will not lodge or fall down. One important characteristic of the HINN soybean is its ability to produce heavy branches which help compensate for skins and will also help in shad-

ing for weed control.
Report from some of the growers who planted part of the 6,000 bushels of the HINN soybean seed during 1964 indicated that an average yield of 33.66 bushels per acre was obtained. This is a composite of all yields that were reported to the Foundation.
Don Robinson, farming at Spearman, made these comments concerning the HINN soybean, "I would say that the very best aspect of the HINN soybean for the North Plains area is its shatter resistance. It also has a good yielding ability, is easy to harvest, doesn't lodge, and holds its seed late into the season. My HINN beans were grown at Spearman, and due to wet weather, harvest was not completed until January 4, 1965. Even at this late date, I had an average of 31.06 bushels per acre on 136 acres. I don't believe that I lost more than 3 bushels per acre due to shattering even after the first of the growing season caused by rain and wet weather during June, and was not able to plant the HINN beans until July 2. They had only about 116 days of growing weather until the first frost on October 20."
One other grower of the HINN soybean from the High Plains reported that he felt there was a potential of 50 bushels per acre from this bean.
Orrville Nash, of Guyton, Oklahoma, states, "I think the HINN has a potential of 30 bushels per acre, considering the 32 bushels we received on a poor stand. I like the way it performed and the way the pods hold the seeds."
Some of the growers reported high yields of over 50 bushels per acre and the yields ranged down to 16 bushels grown on dryland. In general the HINN out produced all the standard varieties by from 3 to 8 bushels per acre. During harvest time, most receiving points were paying around \$2.50 per bushel. At an increase of 3 bushels, hits would mean \$7.50 per acre extra income to the farmer.
At this time, the High Plains Research Foundation has a good supply of Foundation quality HINN soybean on hand for any of the farmers wishing to plant some for the coming crop year. For more information on how to obtain planting seed of the HINN soybean contact Jack Werner.

PANHANDLE OUTDOOR LIFE

Some of the best gun dogs in the southwest were on display in the bird field last weekend near Canadian at the spring field trials. It was a test for the humans as well as for the dogs, considering the sub-freezing temperatures and the high, dusty winds. It was a good trial, however, since native wild quail were found on all the courses. There were also some ring-necked pheasants found and pointed by the dogs. It was a severe test of pointers and setters. The judges, Ed Edwards of Big Spring, and Earl Jackson of Lawton, Oklahoma, had little difficulty in determining the best in the field.
W. B. Mason, professional trainer, formerly of Amarillo and now of Snug Harbor Shooting Resort near Dallas, won first in the open gun dog stake with a pointer male named Maberdasher's Bull. Second place went to another pointer male, Salty Mike, owned and handled by W. L. Fuller of Wichita Falls, Texas, while third place went to a pointer male, Talamonium Mike, owned and

handled by Chuck Taylor of Woodward, Oklahoma.
TOP OF TEXAS WINNERS
A couple of gentlemen from Pampa almost made it a clean sweep for the winners in the amateur class. First place went to a pointer male called Spunky Ivone, owned by R. E. Frieron of Pampa and capably handled by Frank Roach, also of Pampa. Second place went to Rick-A-Shay pointer male owned by Dr. L. J. Zachry, Pampa, and handled by Toach, while third place went to Salty Mike, owned and handled by W. L. Fuller of Wichita Falls. It's only twice a year that these trials are conducted by the Panhandle Bird Dog Club. The next trial will be in mid-November probably at the same Parks and Wildlife grounds on the Genevieve Wildlife Area a few miles northeast of Canadian. The competition appears to get rougher each year. All dogs placed were seasoned, high-class gun dogs which could complete with the best in the nation.
Frank Roach displayed his skill and knowledge of bird-dogdom, placing two this spring in the top two bracket, and last fall winning first in the gun dog stake, also. Many handlers have been competing for more than a decade without winning top honors. I have won only one first place in fifteen years of trying. It's an interesting outdoor sport. It wouldn't be if there were no competition.
Considering the large amounts of birds on the refuge at this time, we could very well have one whale of a big bird crop this fall. If so, the largest trial in Texas, the Texas Open, might be conducted there this fall.
I did run Sam Medallion this last weekend but would rather not talk about his efforts at this time.

IT'S FISHING TIME
Bass and sunfish should begin to take lures at a much faster clip as the waters begin to warm. In fact, these two species can be caught all year round but it is just once in a while they will hit during the winter. From now on until top water plug time, the deeper lures will be more attractive to game fish.
A month ago when the water was really cold, I was advised by an expert fisherman that it would take a show-moving lure for successful angling. The friend suggested a Johnson spoon with a three-inch pork ring attached, & to work the lure as slowly as possible. I tried and caught four. Two were about a pound each, one a two-pounder and the other almost four pounds. A Mepps or an H&H spinner should work well, as should several other spinning types.
In clear water plastic worms are used by the experts who know how and when to use them. Report is that it "takes lots of patience" with these worms, however, it is usually the larger bass that are caught with them.
Report from Dude Mosely at Canadian is that there are more than a score of 20-pound plus flathead catfish in Lake Marvin. These whoppers, some larger than 35 pounds, were placed in the waters a few years ago by technicians of the Parks and Wildlife Department. Mr. Mosely said that anglers haven't caught one yet but some had a chance

with light tackle. Lonnie Peters, aquatic biologist, reports good catches some of them at regular intervals in gill nets, checks their weights, tabulates his findings and then releases them back into the lake. P. S. - Dude Mosely said that most catches in the nets are usually made a few hundred feet northeast of the fishing pier that runs out from the dam.
I have been told that trotlines are not permitted at Lake Marvin. I would suggest large bait, a large hook and a strong line. There should be some of these whoppers caught this summer.

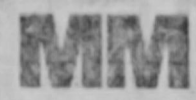

Clements Trial Here April 12

84th District Court Judge Max Boyer has issued an order, at the request of Amarillo District Attorney Dee Miller, requesting that the federal government make Billie Sol Estes, Coleman McSpadden and Ruel Alexander available on the trial date as witnesses in the April 12 trial of Robert Earl Clements in Spearman. Clements faces trial on the basis of a transaction in Potter County with Southwestern Investment Company. He was accused of using a phony chattel mortgage to sell Superior Manufacturing Company to McSpadden, Alexander and Harold Orr, who is now deceased. The state charges that Clements secured money on bogus tank mortgages, gave the money to the three men and they in turn gave the cash back to Clements as the purchase price for the tank firm. Sale price of Superior was \$482,000 of which \$228,000 was raised by mortgaging phony anhydrous ammonia tanks, the state contends. The case was moved to Spearman on a change of venue from 47th District Court in Amarillo. Clements was convicted in Amarillo earlier on a charge of theft over \$50. The conviction was reversed by the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals because of a faulty indictment. A new trial was set and the trial was moved from Amarillo to Spearman. Billie Sol Estes is now serving 15 year sentence in Leavenworth, Kansas. Coleman McSpadden is serving a 10 year sentence in federal prison. Ruel is serving a six year term at Seagoville.

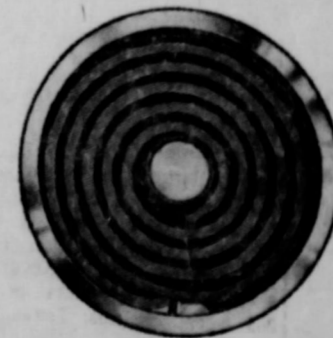

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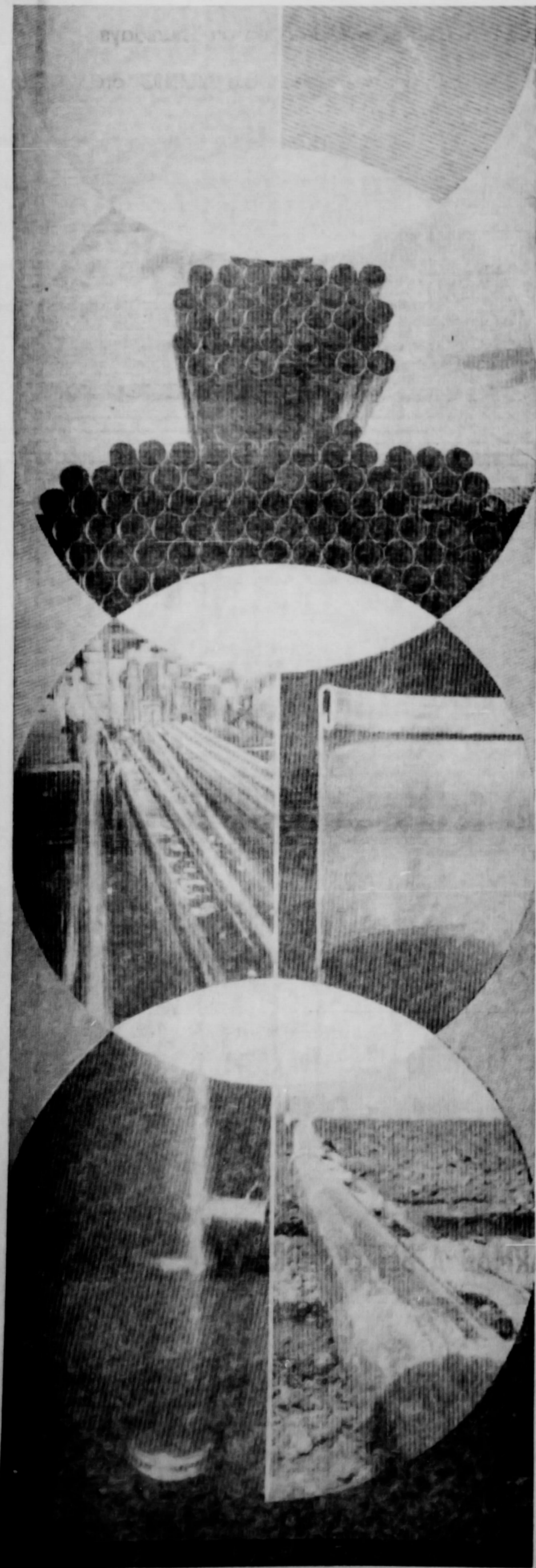

ing workshop in Pampa for the Home Demonstrations Agents in this area. I received information on working with new fabrics in construction and care of these fabrics.
Man-made fabrics have many different trade names given for one generic name, so it makes things much more simple to learn the generic names; for example, polyester fabrics go under trade names of Dacron, Kodol, Fortrel, and Vyeron.
Labeling on fabrics is important to us because it gives us the information (and guarantees) we need before working and caring for it.

The information we agents received will soon be available to the public in bulletin form, giving the characteristics of each fiber, its uses, care information and trade-mark names to help you better care for your clothing. As soon as the publication is available, I will let you know.

Small children should know & trust the telephone operator as much as they do the corner policeman, and should turn to the operator in the event of an emergency.

Although pre-school youngsters can't be expected to memorize long telephone numbers, they can be taught one rule: If an accident happens, dial zero, tell the operator what is wrong, and she will help you. A child should be taught, however, that he is to dial zero only in emergencies.

One five-year-old's plaintive message to the operator was "My mommie's asleep and won't wake up-and there is a fire in our house." After a little prodding, the operator learned the boy's name and address and called the fire department. Firemen rushed to the address, found the house on fire, and the mother knocked out by sleeping pills. Both survived, thanks to the child's action and the operator's help. Another youngster whose mother fell through a floor and was trapped, went directly to the telephone and dialed zero. He couldn't remember his daddy's name or where he lived, but he rattled off the name and address of his grandparents. The operator called them, got the child's address and had a doctor on the way in minutes.

Although operators are ingenious in tracing calls from small fry, such procedure is a waste of precious time. Encourage your child to memorize his name, his father's name and address. An emergency could happen any time to anyone, so take precautions before hand. . . .

SURVIVING SPOUSE TAX INFORMATION

You may file a joint return with your deceased husband or wife if he or she died during the 1964 tax year, Internal Revenue's Administrative Officer Hubert B. Hamill of the Amarillo office said, provided you have not remarried by December 31, 1964.

You may compute your tax at the rates applicable to joint returns for the next two years following the death of your spouse if you have not remarried, maintain your home as the principal abode of your dependent child, and were entitled to file a joint return in the year of death, whether you filed jointly or not.

Document 5107 which furnishes more detailed information on this subject is available upon request from the Internal Revenue Service.
