## Billie Sol To Be In Spearman?

The District Court Judge Max Boyer has rendered an order, resting that the federal government will take Billie Sol Estes and Ruel Alexander McSpadden, as witnesses in April 12 trial of Earl Clements Spearman.

McSpadden faces trial on the charge of a transaction in Potter County with Southwestern Investment Company. He was accused of phony chatted mortgage Superior Manufacturing Company to McSpadden, Alexander Harold Orr, who is now in prison.

State charges that Clements gave the money to the men and they in turn gave it back to Clements as the price for the tank firm. The price of Superior was \$482,000 which \$328,000 was raised by phony mortgages. The state contends that Clements was convicted in Amarillo on a charge of theft in 1953. The conviction was by the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals because of an indictment. A new trial was ordered and the trial was moved from Amarillo to Spearman. Ruel Sol Estes is now serving a ten year sentence in the Texas State Penitentiary at Jester in the Coleman McSpadden also serving a ten year sentence in prison. Ruel is serving a ten year term at Seagoville. Twenty prospective jurors reported for jury duty Monday noon.

McClellan. Also present were: James E. Branlett, Superintendent; Frank Cockrell, High School Principal; James Pendergraft, Junior High Principal; Allen Alford, Elementary Principal; Orville Latham, Business Manager and Marvin L. Jones, newly elected Board Member.

The Board examined the returns of the Trustee Election held April 3, 1965 and a motion was made by Ray Moore and seconded by Roy L. McClellan that the results be declared as follows: Lloyd Buzzard, 422 votes; James B. Lair, 137 votes; Bill Massie, 154 votes; Carl M. ### Skinner, Callaway Hicks Keep Seats On City Council

Three incumbent councilmen were re-elected to the Spearman City Council Tuesday, when 149 votes were cast in the City Election.

Four men were seeking the 3 places on the five man council. The three winning incumbents were Robert Skinner with 131 votes, E. J. Callaway, Jr., with 128 votes and J. K. Hicks with 116 votes. The fourth candidate, Clarence Pettitt received 50 votes. J. K. Hicks, Mayor pro-tem, has served on the council since 1959, when the city changed from commission to council form of government. He is a grain elevator operator and a farmer.

Winning his second two-year term, Robert Skinner is a farmer and business property owner. E. J. Callaway has served on the council since 1960 and is a building contractor.

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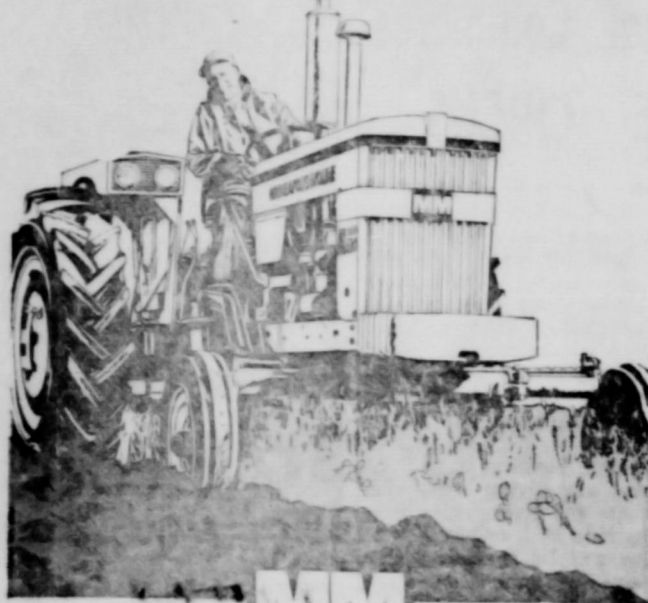
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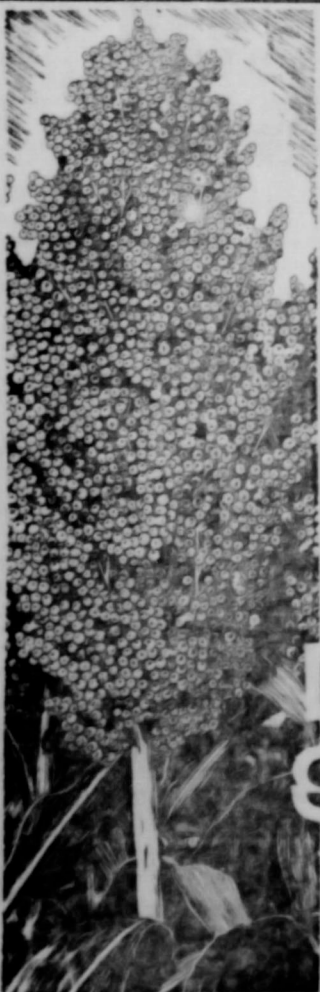
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**HOMEMAKING  
NOTES**

members, press your dress and polish your shoes. It's time for the District THDA (Texas Home Demonstration Association) meeting. The meeting will be held on Thursday, April 8, in Canyon.

Because the THDA program is constantly changing to meet the homemaker's needs in this fast-changing world, homemakers find it well to keep informed. In addition to regular programs of study in health, 4-H, safety, family life, citizenship and recreation, special attention this year will focus on studies of the school drop-out problems; pesticide facts, and fears; an anti-litter educational program; and improved motor vehicle safe-driving practices.

You see, the Home Demonstration Club members are not only

interested in "cooking and sewing" but all other phases of life as well.

With Easter only little more than a week away, the thoughts of Mothers who have young children, are turning to the job of Easter Eggs and egg dye.

Little thought may be given to egg cooking, though, and I have some notes to help any homemaker who hard-cooks eggs.

There is quite a difference between hard-cooked and hard-boiled eggs. Hard-boiled means tough; and that's exactly how eggs will turn out if you hard-boil them.

Eggs should be hard-cooked instead. Place eggs in a pan and cover with cold water to at least one inch above the eggs. Bring water to simmering (just below the boiling point). Simmer 20 to 25 minutes.

For use as Easter eggs, cool eggs quickly and thoroughly in cold water. Put them in the refrigerator until you are ready to decorate.

Then if you keep the eggs refrigerated (except during the egg hunt, of course) you can eat them when the fun and frolic of

the hunt is over. They'll still be tender and tasty. Of course, if the eggs become cracked during the hunt, discard them, for dirt and bacteria can get in through the cracks.

Because several requests have come in, I will devote part of my column the next few weeks to hints on sewing with the new fabrics on the market—stretch, knits, and others. So, home sewers, keep watching for these timely tips.

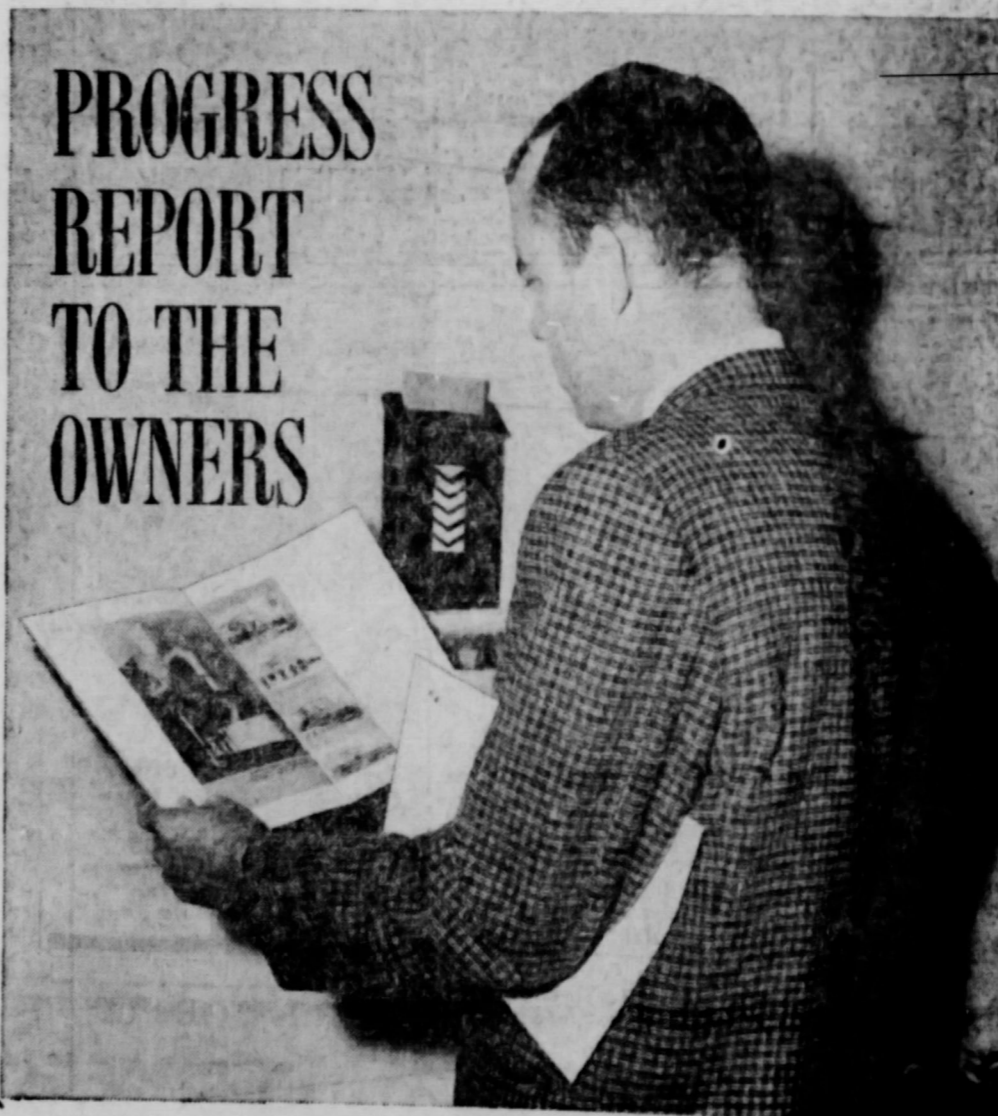

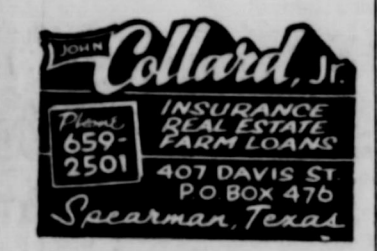

**No Extension on Inspection Sticker**

"Only two weeks remains for some 1,500,000 vehicles registered in Texas to secure the 1965 safety inspection sticker," Col. Homer Garrison, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today.

"The period set by law for securing the 1965 sticker ends at midnight, April 15, and there can be no extension of that deadline," Garrison pointed out. "Any Texas motorist whose vehicle does not display the new sticker after April 15 is subject to arrest by any sheriff or his deputy, an city policeman, or by officers of

the Department of Public Safety." Garrison said that in the remaining month of the inspection period there is sufficient time for the 300 official inspection stations to inspect the remaining vehicles without undue inconvenience to the motorist, provided the vehicle owners act promptly.

"From now until the deadline, every minute of the inspection station's time will be at a premium," Garrison warned, "and waiting lines will become general throughout the state."

Garrison suggested that congestion at inspection stations would be lessened if known defects in a vehicle were repaired prior to presenting the vehicle to the station for inspection.

**One Rural Accident During February**

There was one rural traffic accident in Hansford county during the month of February according to Sergeant W. J. McLean, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in two persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$1,200.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county for the first two months of 1965 shows a total of two accidents resulting in no persons killed, four persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$2,300.

Yes, the old adage is true "the best defense is a good offense." However, there is one exception where a good defense comes before a good offense. The exception is driving a motor vehicle. Defensive driving is the technique of driving to avoid accidents by anticipating all hazardous situations created by unsafe acts of other drivers, adverse weather, or road conditions.

The defensive driver is always ready for the other driver or the pedestrian to do the wrong thing. He never takes anything for granted.

Another good defense is to see that you have a safe operating vehicle by having it safely inspected. The Sergeant reminds all motorists that April 15 is the deadline for obtaining the 1965 inspection sticker. Anyone operating a motor vehicle requiring a 1965 Texas inspection sticker without same after this date will be in violation of the law.

FARM LABOR OFFICE GIVING Farmers of Hansford and Childress Counties the making good

use of the Farm Labor Office which has been open in the Courthouse in Spearman since the first of this year, according to a statement made today by Richard L. Curtis, interviewer in charge.

Mr. Curtis states that many of our farmers have been in his office giving him orders for Farm Workers and that he has been able to locate workers for the majority of these farmers. He urged that all farmers needing workers let him know as far in advance as possible, as a shortage of good farm workers during the year is anticipated, and at times he must call on other officers of the Texas Employment Commission, of which this office is a part, to have workers sent into the area.

Mr. Curtis also urged all workers of the area seeking farm work, either on a part time or full time basis to call on him at his office and leave their applications so that he may get in touch with them as they are needed.

The Spearman office of Texas Employment Commission is located on the second floor of the Hansford County Courthouse and is open each Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Mr. Curtis concluded by saying that they hope to soon have sufficient business to justify another person in this office, so that they may be open throughout the week to serve our community.

**Bollinger's Return From Mission Trip**

Mr. and Mrs. George R. Bollinger, pastor of the Spearman Mission Church have just returned from a mission survey trip which took them to southeastern Utah, the Navajos, Utes, and Towaocs among the principle tribes of the Southern Ute tribal agency in Ignacio, Colorado & to how well the area was being covered by the various religious groups and what particular needs were there. This particular part of Indians are fairly well framed and are being reached with the gospel. The Towaoc mission headquarters is just below Colorado and inquiry was made there. In Kaventa, Arizona there is an agency for the Navajo people.

The Navajo is the group that is of particular interest to the Bollingers, being the most primitive and the largest, having over 200,000. They still live mostly in earth covered hogans, still use sheep largely for a livelihood and weave rugs. Their children, if educated, are taken at the age of six into the larger cities where they are kept in boarding schools. The Navajo reservation is the largest in the United States of while it touches the four corners of New Mexico, the bulk of it in northeastern Arizona. And there are vast areas here that are untouched by any church.

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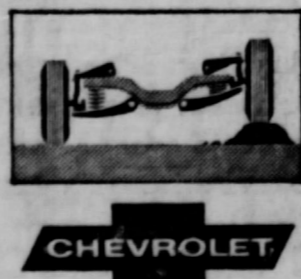
