Pallbearers were: Ira Harbour, Robert Harbour, Rodney Harmond, Lewis Harbour, Monty Harbour and Joe Harmond, all grandsons. Lena Sevier Harmond was born February 28, 1865 in Hill County Texas. She was married to Robert L. Harmond September 30, 1886; Mr Harmond and a son Earl preceded her in death.
She is survived by one son Ernest, of Spearman; one daughter Ollie Harbour of Stinnett; and three brothers: Ed Sevier of Hereford, Guy Sevier of Corpus Christi and George Sevier of Hillsboro. There are fourteen grandchildren, thirty four great grandchildren.
Mr. and Mrs. Harmond came to this part of the country in a covered wagon in 1910.
She was converted and baptized in the Thornberry Church in Clay County Texas.

Net Wire Diversions

Each year millions of gallons of water speed down hills and slopes to end up in the Gulf of Mexico. This water which could have been used to grow more grass for the rancher is now lost forever. There are two ways to reduce this waste. One of the best methods is to manage your rangeland so that you will always have enough grass on the land to slow down the water and increase the amount soaked up by the soil. The other method is to use some mechanical practice to help hold rainfall until the soil can absorb it. These mechanical practices include such items as chiseling, pitting, and earth or net wire diversions.
A few people in Hansford SCD have been showing interest in net wire diversions as a means of growing more grass. A net wire diversion is a low fence built with hog wire which is used to slow down run-off water. They are best adapted to wide level draws.
The SCS personnel assisting the Hansford SCD will be glad to assist you in selecting areas that are suited for net wire diversions. Is your ranch land growing all the grass that it could grow?

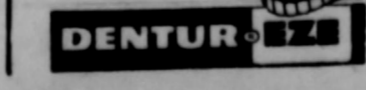

GET READY TO STORE SUMMER CLOTHES

Right storage will increase the life of summer clothing, and make all garments more wearable for the next season.

Here are some suggestions for keeping out-of-season clothing in good condition until next summer:

1. Mend any ripped seam, tears, loose buttons or other damages. A few stitches can save the life of a garment.

2. Wash or dry clean all garments before storing.

PANHANDLE OUTDOOR LIFE

Last week I observed six pecan trees growing on the northern slopes of the Canadian River in Moore County. These six trees were from five to seven feet in height and had been transplanted for two years, this proving the fact that this tree specie will thrive in the Texas Panhandle. The trees were growing on the C. B. Marsh Ranch some 20 miles southwest of Stinnett. The trees were purchased from Wolf's Nursery at Stephenville, Texas.

Growing pecans in the Panhandle isn't as simple as just setting them out since Mr. Marsh did some experimenting before he could successfully grow this fruit-bearing tree. One of the ideas that was necessary was to wrap the trunk of the small tree with ordinary kitchen tinfoil to keep the insects and rabbits from destroying the body of the sapling. The point to this experiment, to me, is that anyone can grow tall, pecan-bearing trees in the Panhandle if he will try.

If the Canadian River banks were one huge pecan grove extending from New Mexico to Oklahoma, it could easily be a fox-squirrel paradise and would furnish scores of tons of pecans for turkey as well as other game

during the winter months when feed is so greatly needed. There are some wild fox-squirrel in the Panhandle. The squirrel season is from May 1 to July 1 and October 1 to December 1 with a daily bag of five.

A few hundred pecan trees on any ranch wouldn't make the ranch produce thousands of this choice game animal but probably there could be a hundred or more squirrel harvested each year.

Panhandle Dove Population Dropping

The amount of mourning doves in these parts is still falling off but in some places there are still quite a few around. The season will last until October 20 at sunset. The shooting hours are from 12 noon until sunset, much to the surprise of some hunters. The afternoon shooting hours aren't anything new. This has been the rule for more than ten years.

Since occasionally someone calls up and asks if it is against the law to train a dog before the quail season opens, the answer is herewith submitted. There is no law or statute which forbids anyone from training bird dogs at any time of the year on wild quail,

provided that such trainer has the permission of the rancher or landowner where he wishes to train.

From the way some handlers attempt to train dogs it might be wise to consult the advice of some recognized national authorities on this subject. Last evening I saw a dog handler teaching his pointer and from what I saw the dog would never have a chance to develop as long as he was being taught in the manner that he was at the time. The dog must have made ten points, stands, in almost that many minutes with none of them being productive. Evidently, the handler was encouraging the dog to overly cautious so as not to flush the birds. The dog was so cautious that, from the way he was going, he would never find a quail.

Jim Bell, president of the Panhandle Bird Dog Association, once remarked that he preferred a dog that flushed a few birds, due to the dog's fast ground covering pace, than to handle perfectly and find practically no birds. A hard hunting dog will sometimes "bump" birds but he will find ten times more than some of the slow, plodding kind.

To the average bird hunter nothing is more spectacular than to have a pointer or setter going at full speed and slide into a rigid point and continue to "freeze" on

the birds until the handler walks up and flushes the game. When a dog hits his game hard he will hold better and there will be more wintese to the sport from the "dog trained to perfection" angle.

A few years back I was wondering how to go about the training procedure of my first bird dog and finally ordered a book by one of the foremost authorities in the nation on the subject. The book is, "How to Train Hunting Dogs," by William Brown, editor of The American Field. Since that time I have lost or misplaced the copy but have another one on order at this time. The address is, The American Field, 222 West Adams Street, Chicago, Illinois.

About Face

For many years I have told hunters that blue quail and bobs will not cross. Last year this statement was nullified with the definite proof of a cross between these two species. Evidently the cross is rare but just the other day Jack Knight, oil well pumper of Stinnett, gave an account of two coveys of birds that he had seen in 1942, the year that quail were so plentiful, to the effect that the birds had the white markings on the head similar to a bob white while at the same time they had top-knots like the blues. They also ran like a blue," so Mr. Knight said.

Today I received information from a rancher who had released several hundred Corturnix quail he had seen several coveys of birds that were not true blue quail, were not bobwhites, and the rancher surmised that they were a cross between the blue and the Corturnix. If this is the case I will notify the proper wildlife biologists and it will be established that the first cross between these two species will be another first for the Texas Panhandle. As soon as I find out any conclusive proof of this hybrid it will be called to your attention via this column.

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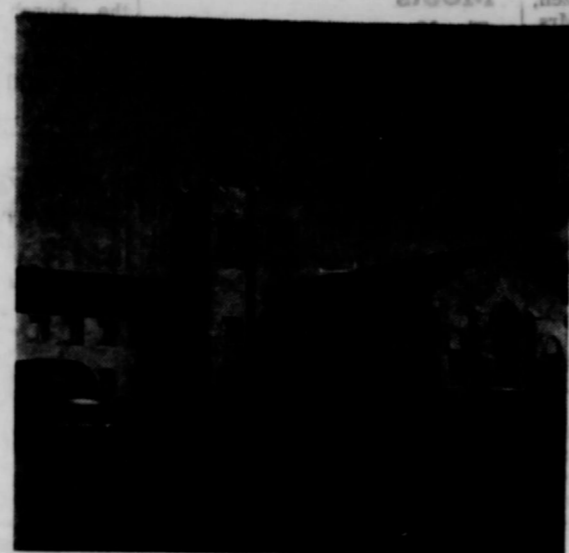
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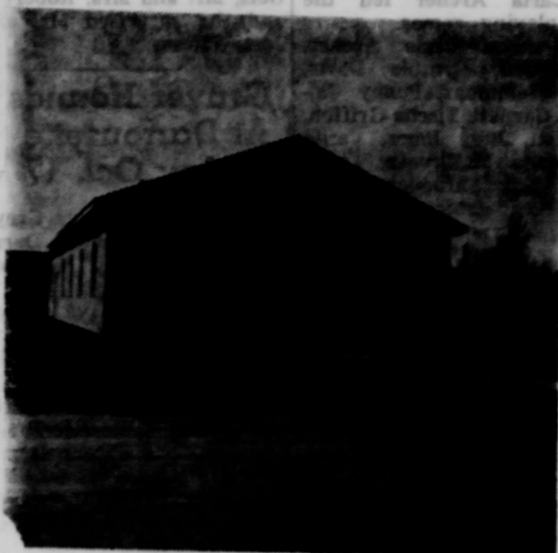

I do not think the young people of today are so very difficult to understand. The average high school student has simply reached the age where he takes absolutely nothing for granted — for its face value. When that high school student was a child of four or five, he asked the same "why" he asks now but then he really did not care what you answered. Now he does and he rebels when he does not get his full answer. We should be relieved because in each questioning lies our future.

Of course their social patterns are different but I say—let them have their fun. It is up to us as parents, citizens, and youth workers to see that these social patterns do not get out of control. So how do we do it? Here goes one adults ideas on the subject.

Guidance: That one word has made or broken more high school students than perhaps any other. They can ask intelligent questions and conduct themselves in a grown up manner but they cannot yet be left completely on their own—in a group or singly. That one word has probably worn out more parents than any other—because one has to keep after them constantly without nagging. Rules with reason helps this situation. If we leave them alone then they get into trouble with money or morals for example, then the blame should be more shared. High school students need guidance when planning any kind of group activity. Plans should never be made for them but an adult should be there to see that the plans are in the right direction.

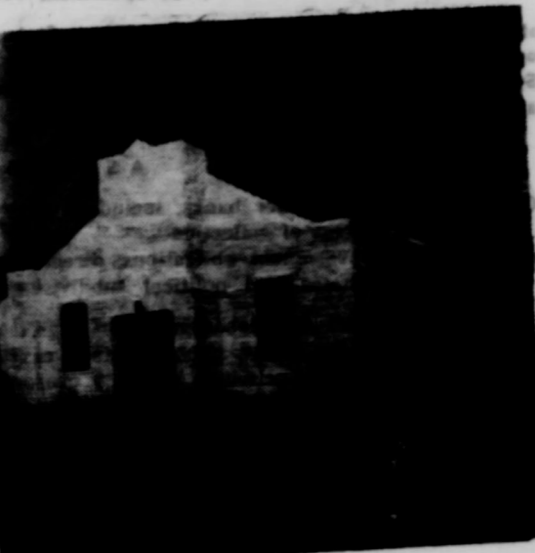
Activity: They need a lot of activities that are wholesome and bring out their best qualities. The school sponsors a variety of activities that are worthwhile, but each young person needs a church sponsored activity. Here they get some of their most important questions answered. I am sure that every church in this area has a program for its youth. As parents you can help to see that your young people are attending—not with force, but with interest on your part.

The ideas and attitudes the young people gain through their church sponsored activities will carry them through many of the hard knocks life will give them later on. Christianity needs a strong background just as much as education does.

What makes a young person tick? That question can best be answered through lots of understanding on the part of both youth and adults. All this takes good common sense, and good spiritual guidance.

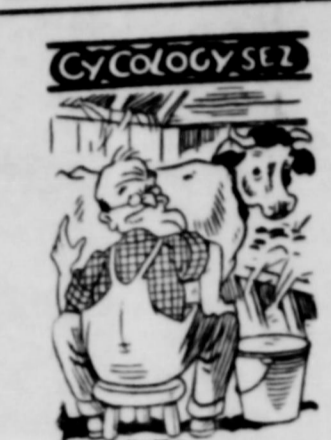

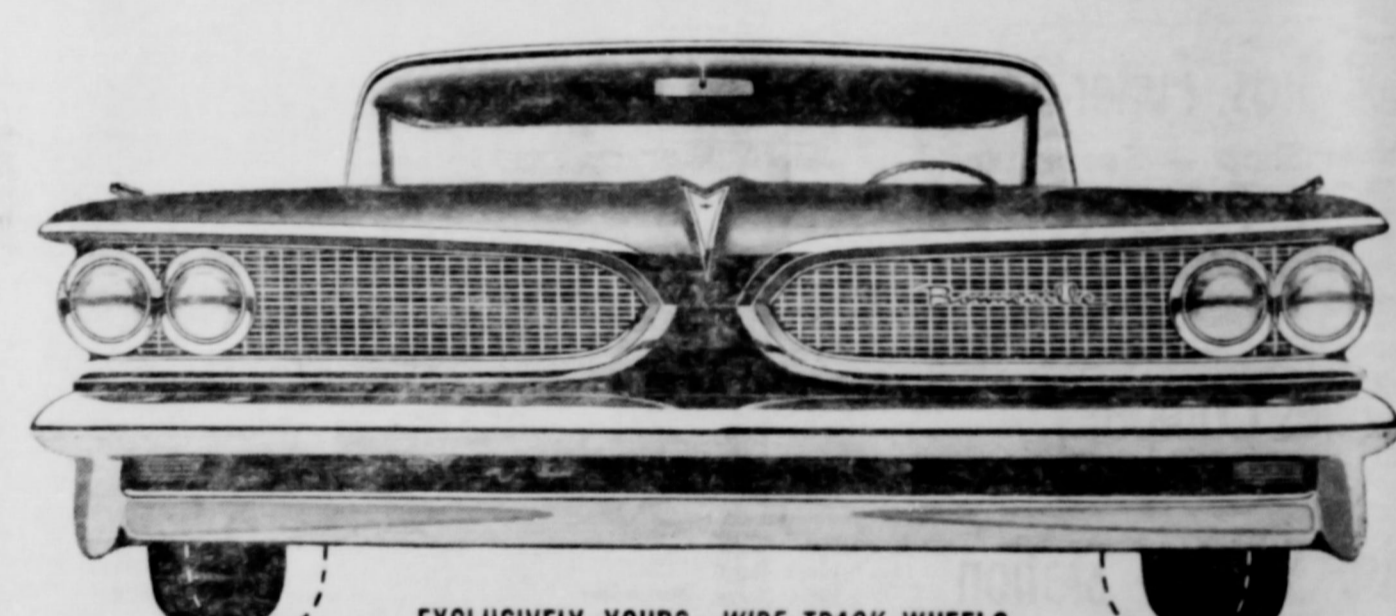

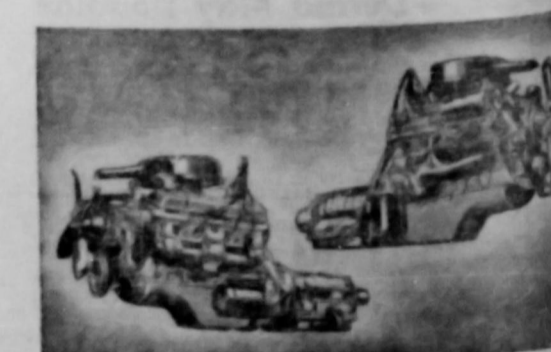
