

be thoroughly cleaned before use to prevent the meat from stickgrill may be greased lightly if there is a tedency for the meat to stick. (of course immediate cleaning of the grill after cooking is important.)

Meat will be more tender if cooked slowly. Basting with fat or a sause will tend to keep meat more moist and juicy. It is best to have a grill that can be raised and lowered so that the distance of the meat from the coals can be regulated.

Don't season meat before grilling, as salt tends to draw moisture from lean tissue. To avoid loss of juice, turn meat with tongs. Piercing with a fork will let out the meisture. 




