Post-Mortem Shows Alcohol Cause Of Death

Travis C. Castleman was hospit. alized for two days in Hansford Hospital. He was released to the custody of city Police Monday of this week.

Post-mortem report on the dec eased showed the cause of deat! as a "tear in the esophagus due to excessive strain while vomit ing from use of too much alcohol resulting in pneumonia when lungs filled.' Blood tests showed .93 percent alcohol content in the blood stream, which is in itself enough to cause death.

The body was shipped to Welceka, Oklahoma for burial.

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

Interest Rate Up On Savings Bonds

President Johnson recently announced a new and higher interest rate to be paid holders of all U. S. Savings Bonds. The new rate is 4.15 per cent.

In announing the interest hike President Johnson emphasized that it will benefit holders of all

The interest rate is effective as of December 1 1965, and it

applies to all Series E and H Savings Bonds outstanding for their remaining period to maturity, as well as those to be purch-

The new rate will reduce the maturity period for Series E Bonds (those most frequently purchased) to seven years. Under the old 3 three quarter per cent rate a bond purchased for \$75, for example, could be redeemed at \$100 at maturity -seven years and nine months. For Series H Bonds, which are bought at face value, the interest is paid semi-annually, and those payments will simply be increased to the 4.15 percent rate.

Mr. Johnson noted that bet ween 30 and 40 million Americans who hold more than \$49 billion in Savings Bonds will automati-

cally enjoy the rise in interest. The President pointed out that this year marks the 25th Anniv ersary of the Savings Bonds program. It was May 1, 1941, when President Franklin D. Roosevelt bought the first Series E Bond from Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau.


