## Lutheran Church To Be Dedicated Sunday

On Sunday March 13th at 3 PM Faith Lutheran Church will hold dedication service and a worship service of Thanksgiving at 11th and Bernice St. You are invited to this Dedication service to be followed by an open house & refreshments. Dr. Vernon Mohr, president of the Southern Dist. of The American Lutheran Church will do the dedicating. Pastor Robert Cordes will conduct the worship service and Pastor Orvis Soustad of Beautiful Savior Lutheran in Amarillo will deliver the Dedication message.

Faith Lutheran congregation began as a preaching place in February 1964 when Pastor Robert Cordes began meeting with a small group of Lutherans in the Farm Bureau Building. This group has expanded until they now number nearly 100. The group organized into an official congregation of the American Lutheran Church on June 13, 1965 and began almost immediately to plan for construction of a worship and educational unit. Their new \$60,000 brick structure was begun in August and seats 200 with a large area, to be used for education, offices and group meetings.

The congregation will stress education in the Bible and living a life of love in daily activities in response to Jesus Christ. The Lutheran Church, largest Protestant denomination in the world has always been known for its solid Biblical teachings and Christ

centered Biblical preaching. Its members are always well trained so they know what they believe and hopefully practice it.

A course of instruction for church membership will begin March 15th at Faith Lutheran, conducted by Pastor Robert Cordes. Anyone who is interested in the teachings of the Bible can attend. You are welcome.

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**GUEST EDITORIAL**

**The Democratic Discourse Constitutional Characters**

Each week the Spearman Reporter will submit a "guest editorial" in this column. If you wish to contribute to this column, or to air your views on some subject, you are welcome to do so, but must sign your name.

The Constitution was a result, not of prearranged plans and doctrines, but of give and take mutual concession. The document is a conglomeration of those compromises which the delegates to the Convention of 1787 deemed necessary to form a more perfect Union.

The United States is based on this document, behind which lies the unlimited power of the People. To give the Constitution uncritical acceptance, one must ignore that our Government derives its powers from the consent of the governed.

A number of the Constitutional compromises had to do with the legislative department. The greatest of these was the Connecticut Compromise providing for equal representation in an upper house and for representation proportioned in a lower house.

Some of those legislative compromises have proved to be illogical and imperfect. Illogical was the decision, affecting representation in the House, that a slave was equal to 3/5 person. Imperfect was the decision, affecting election of the members of the Senate, that the Senators from each of the states were to be chosen by the state legislatures.

The two-year term of the Representatives was arrived at after considerable debate. It is apparent that the compromise reached was imperfect.

No doubt, the makers of the Constitution assumed that the House would be more powerful than the Senate. This has not proved to be true. The short life of the House as a major factor causing its lesser power. Doubling the House term is the first step that we should take toward strengthening the effectiveness of that most important legislative body.

After we have succeeded in increasing the term of Representatives to four years with half standing for election every two years, there are other reforms (i.e. repeal of the seniority rule, setting a mandatory age for retirement, forming agencies of information responsible to and controlled by Congress only) to be made if the equal power given to the executive, legislative, and judicial branches is to be other than empty of meaning.

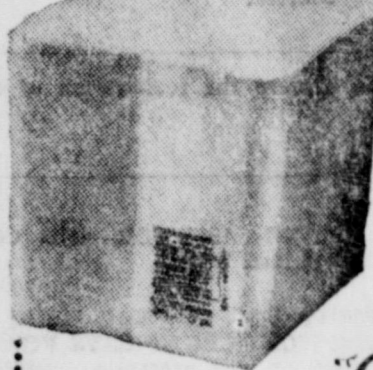

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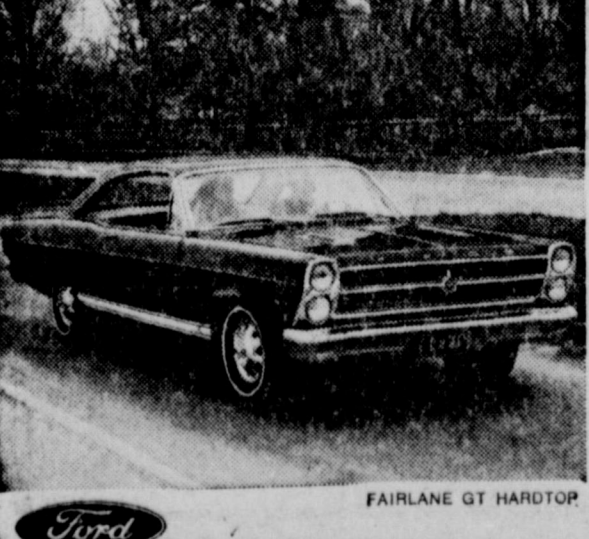

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# Voter Registration To Be Through March 17, 1966

The State of Texas found it necessary to oppose, Saturday, February 26, the office of the Attorney General of the United States before the Federal Court in Houston in order to protect the honesty of the Texas elections until the new Texas registration law could be put into effect.

In a letter to Honorable Nicholas DeB. Katzenbach, Attorney General of the United States, the Attorney General of Texas, Waggoner Carr wrote "Without a 30 day stay of the court order abolishing the poll tax in Texas we had no satisfactory way to prevent fraudulent multiple voting by persons presenting themselves to vote under real or fictitious

names. I concede, of course, that you had the right to oppose our efforts. However, I found it difficult to understand why Texas had to fight your office for the right to protect the purity of her elections for the next 30 days. As you know, after arguments the Federal Court promptly granted the 30 day stay we needed to allow our citizens to register.

Since your efforts were rebuffed by the Federal Court, however your assistant, Mr. Stephen Pollak, has on two occasions made long distance calls to my office in which he stated that he had discussed the matter with his superiors (he did not say whether you were one of those with whom he checked) and it had been decided that the lawyers in the Department of Justice felt it their duty to keep a close watch on voter registration in Texas to be sure our citizens have an adequate chance to register. He requested that my office report to yours on such things as the Communications I have with the Texas Tax assessor-collectors and to account to you our actions in carrying out the registration law of Texas. It was requested that we report to you whether the tax collectors make their employees work overtime on weekends, as well as other details.

On Tuesday morning, March 1, Pollak called this office again and said you were asking the F. B. I. to check on Texas to see whether our registration is carried out as you think it should be.

I simply want to state to you that I know of no court order which requires me, as Attorney General of Texas, to report to you for anything Texas does. Quite frankly, we feel our State is capable of handling our internal affairs. Our reports will be made to the Federal Court having jurisdiction over this matter and to no one else unless the Court directs us to do it. You have the same right as any other citizen to see what we file with the Court if the Court desires you to see it. Our State appreciates the confidence the Court has in Texas' ability to see that its citizens are fully protected in their constitutional rights once those rights are judicially determined.

Your assignment of the F. B. I. to maintain surveillance over the Texas government is an insult to every public official and every citizen of Texas. No citizen of

Texas, any more than any citizen of any other proud state will cover under such misuse of authority. If you have any complaint against Texas, state it in court - don't threaten with the F. B. I. I would remind you that once before you sent them out over our state to search out any possible instances where Texas had used the poll tax to prevent anyone from voting. You failed, and the Federal Court specifically found that no such discrimination existed in Texas.

Texas will cooperate with you in every reasonable way on this or any other matter, but we will not subject this State to any humiliation resulting from an "overlord" attitude.

In the meantime, this state will continue to see that each of its citizens has the opportunity to become qualified to vote in our State and local election. This we are dedicated to accomplish. This we will accomplish.

Now that the federal court has ruled the poll tax unconstitutional all a citizen is required to do to be able to vote in local, county, state and federal elections is to register.

Persons who have already been issued a poll tax receipt or an exemption certificate for this year should not apply for a registration certificate. Persons having paid receipts, nonpaid receipts for voting in federal elections, or exempt certificates do not need to register under the provisions of the Emergency Registration Law.

Persons exempt and citizens who paid the poll tax in Hansford County this year total over 2400. Registration is running slow in the office of Tax Assessor-Collector J. B. Cooke. To date only three persons have taken advantage of the new law and registered.

The 15-day period for registration began March 3, and will continue until midnight March 17, 1966. Application may be made by mail to J. B. Cooke Tax Assessor-Collector, Spearman Texas. If you plan to register in person you may do so, Monday through Saturday at the tax office in the Hansford County Court House from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., or the same days in the Sheriff's Office in the Court House from 5 p.m. to 1 a.m. No one can register after midnight, March 17th.

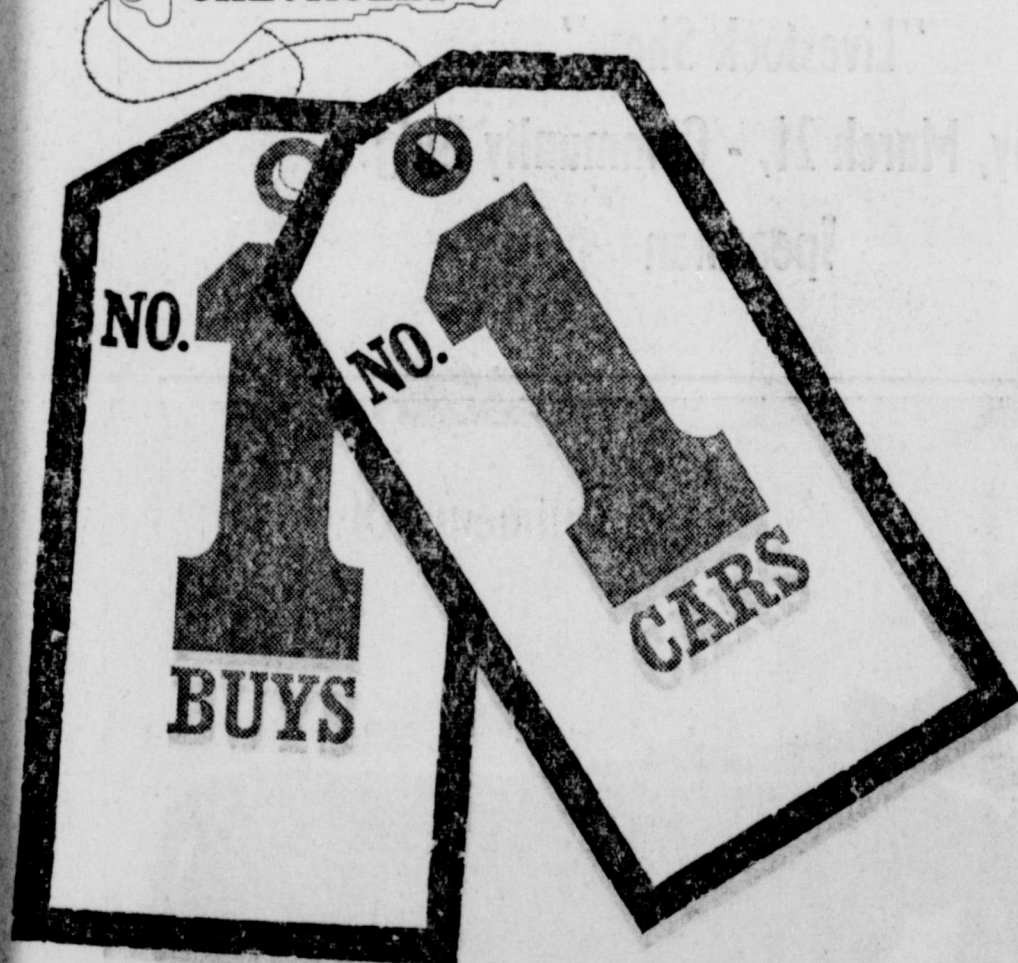

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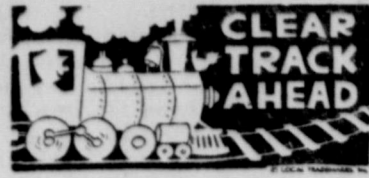
