## Rabies Outbreak

Mr. and Mrs. John Sell received reports Monday of this week that two horses which died at their farm 2 weeks ago had rabies. The horses were both gentle riding pets belonging to the Sell children. Earlier in the week one was seen running, kicking, rolling in the pasture. Next children noticed it chasing and biting one of the pigs. When the child tried to stop the horse animal turned on him and bit arm. Mr. Sell penned the animal which was by this time so ill it fell and broke both legs. He shot the horse through the

head. Tests from this animal were inaccurate because of the gun shot wound into the brain. In a few days the pet pony of Susie Sell became quite ill and died. Results from tests on this animal showed positive rabies. Both children are taking the rabies shots. Mrs. Sell said they noted a dead skunk in the pasture. The family is keeping a close watch on all their other pets and have been advised to pen them immediately if any penitence is noted. The family lives 1 and a half miles North of Spearman.

## David McClellan Granted Award For Leukemia Research At Texas Univ.



DAVID MCCLELLAN, Junior in Spearman High School, has received a special award to do summer research work at the National Science Foundation at the University of Texas, David will do research work in Leukemia. Out

of 5051 students throughout Texas, David ranked 74th on his tests in competition. The 12-week program which begins in June will give David an opportunity to work under top ranking Professors in the Nation. The program is designed to identify high-ability science students and to present to these students a special program in experimental Biology. They will have access to lectures (from top scientists from England, Germany, etc) Laboratories, Libraries, greenhouses, animal rooms. The last six weeks of the course will be strictly research where David will develop confidence in evaluating experiments. David, who plans to major in Bio-Chemistry, has been doing project work in the Spearman Science labs on Leukemia in mice. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. L. McClellan of Spearman. Mr. Barker, David's teacher, said "It is difficult for the people to realize what this special award means for David. It is the highest honor, and literally means that this boy is 'TOPS in Science.'"

## Board Members To Houston Meeting

Mr. Lynn Davis and Mr. W.P. Hutton have recently returned from Houston where they attended the Annual Stockholders' Meeting of the Federal Land Bank. They represented the Federal Land Bank Association of Spearman at the two-day meeting at which plans were discussed for observing the 50th Anniversary of the Land Bank System in 1967. The Anniversary will be dedicated to American farmers and ranchers, in a program to achieve public recognition and appreciation of the contributions of agriculture to the National economy.

Hal Weatherford, President of the bank, in his annual report, stated that the \$94,000,000, loaned in 1965 was the largest in any one year in the bank's history and that the volume of loans outstanding are now at an all time high.

Mr. Hutton and Mr. Davis are members of the local Board of Directors. Mr. Hutton is also a member of the Stockholders Committee for the Federal Land Bank of Houston. Mr. J. E. Gunn, manager of the local association, also attended the meeting in Houston.

## Tag Sales Are Above 1965

A record number of license tags were issued this year by Hansford county tax collector's office. The total so far issued 5248 tags. Dollar volume of these receipts totals \$152,096.24. In 1965 the office issued 4903 tags for a total of \$130,279.93. For 1966, the office issued 2628 Passenger tags, 781 Commercial tags and 1148 Farm, 691 were issued for miscellaneous vehicles (trailers, motorcycles, etc.)

lem in this city. Money for the remodeling was provided by Home Demonstration clubs in the county and through donations given by many very

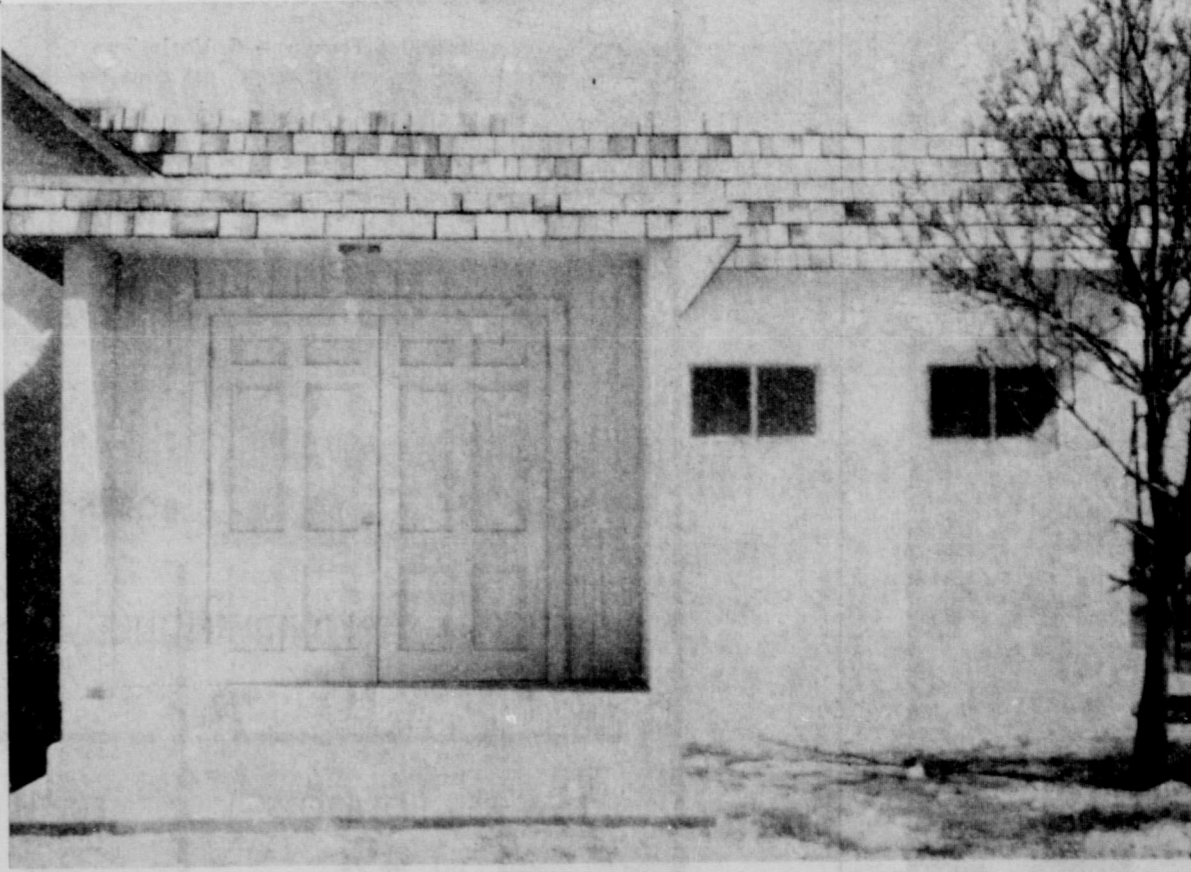
generous people. The clubs have been at work for two years on various projects to raise money for their "dream".

**90 Percent Of Nation's Elders Have Signed Up**

Older people in the Pampa area who did not sign up for the voluntary doctor bill insurance under medicare before the close of the first enrollment period on March 31 have been given a little more time, Virgil Holloway, social security officer in charge, announced today.

In legislation signed by President Johnson last week, Congress has extended until May 31 the deadline for enrollment by persons 65 or over.

Nearly 90 percent of the Nations elderly were enrolled for the doctor bill insurance when SS officers closed at midnight on March 31. Another 5 percent had not made up their minds either way, or else were not aware of the deadline and the need to sign up for the supplementary protection.

## HOMEMAKING NOTES

### "MEAT MAKES THE MEAL"

While that long-lived adage may not be entirely accurate, it's true that festive occasions call for a meat entree that enhances the meal, and gives it that gala touch.

Family traditions and preferences usually prevail when the shopper selects her meat for Easter as for other holidays. The Easter ham, or a pork roast, is tradition in many homes. Roast turkey or chicken ranks

high, too. A good beef roast always scores. Or, how about a savory meat loaf, trimmed to Easter perfection?

Fortunately, in America, available supply does not limit our meat selection. There's enough of any kind of meat you choose.

Cost will be a deciding factor for many families, even, though Easter is a good time to have something special.

Price per pound, alone, is far from telling the full story of cost of any food, especially meats. Bone and fat waste, plus cooking shrinkage, are important. And, it's the meat on your plate that determines real value.

Ground beef, always popular, shrinks 25 to 30 percent or more, especially if it contains a lot of fat. Ground pork shrinks even more. Bacon loses two-thirds of its weight in cooking. Cooked poultry holds its own. Almost half the weight of a whole fryer sets to your table as cooked edible meat. At 29 cents a pound, the cost per pound of cooked fryer meat is 56 cents.

At least half the weight of a large turkey reaches your table as cooked meat. And it usually follows that the larger the turkey, the more cooked meat for each pound of dressed bird.

Meats already cooked when you buy them are often a better buy than their cost per pound indicates. Frankfurters, for example, have only around 2 percent loss when heated. And sandwich meats, not even heated, reach your table at the price you pay at the market.

The same principle applies to the ever-popular Easter ham. A tenderized ham yields about half of its weight in cooked edible meat when you count out cooking, boning and trimming losses. So you can afford to pay almost twice as much per pound for a carefully trimmed, fully cooked boneless ham. Of course, if you heat a cooked ham 10 minutes to the pound, there's some additional shrinkage.

No matter what kind of meat you choose for Easter, it's a good rule to cook it at a low or moderate temperature. This will allow it to cook more evenly, be more tender and have less shrinkage.

3. Which of the following is the best preparation for your regular food shopping spree? (1) — make a list and buy only what is on it (2) Check the ads to see what and where the best buys are (3) walk around the store and buy whatever appeals to you (4) don't keep a regular pattern of shopping.

4. Your market is having a sale on ground round at 89 cents a pound. The store also sells ground chuck at 59 cents a pound and plain ground beef at 39 cents a pound. You'd like to stock up on chopped beef and use it for meat loaf, spaghetti sauce, chili and casseroles. The best buy, in terms of nutrition and economy, is the (1) —ground round; (2) —ground chuck (3) —plain ground beef.

5. The best way to store chicken in your refrigerator is (1) — leave it in the original wrapping (2) — remove the original wrapping, then cover loosely with waxed paper (3) — remove the giblets and store uncovered.

ANSWERS: (Score 20 points for each correct answer.)

(1) Chuck — knowing your cuts of meat can save a lot of trouble, time and money. Since meat takes up a good part of your food bill, you would do well to study information on meats.

(2) The Grade A Medium eggs are the better buy. A rough rule of thumb to judge egg prices on the spot is this: take either one-eighth or 7 cents (whichever is easier) from the price of Large eggs. Medium eggs of the same price category below this price are a better buy. (Remember, size has nothing to do with quality.) In this example, Grade A Large are selling for 56 cents. Therefore, Grade A Medium eggs would have to sell for 49 cents to be equal in cost.

(3) The best answer is (2) check the ads to see what and where the best buys are. Supermarkets often buy up large quantities of meat or other products and sell them as "specials". This is to attract customers to the store, but specials usually work to your advantage. Food ads also tell you what products are the best buys and are most plentiful that week.

Follow the other practices too. They are all good. You should definitely make out a list before you shop, but make it flexible. Do take advantage of the unadvert-

specials in the store, but don't rely on impulse buying. It can be expensive.

It is also a good habit to read the columns of food editors in newspapers and magazines. (4) Number 3, ordinary ground beef is fine for these uses. Ground chuck is recommended when you want hamburgers for the small fry. Ground round is used on special occasions. (5) Remove the original wrappings, cover loosely with waxed paper. Poultry, like other raw meats, is very perishable and should be stored in the coldest part of the refrigerator.

The store wrappings should always be removed or punctured, poultry should be stored loosely covered. Do remove the giblets and store separately since they will spoil more rapidly than the rest of the bird. Poultry should be used within two days.

If you score 80 to 100 excellent! You don't need too much extra help. Chances are you've had a lot of experience in shopping for food.

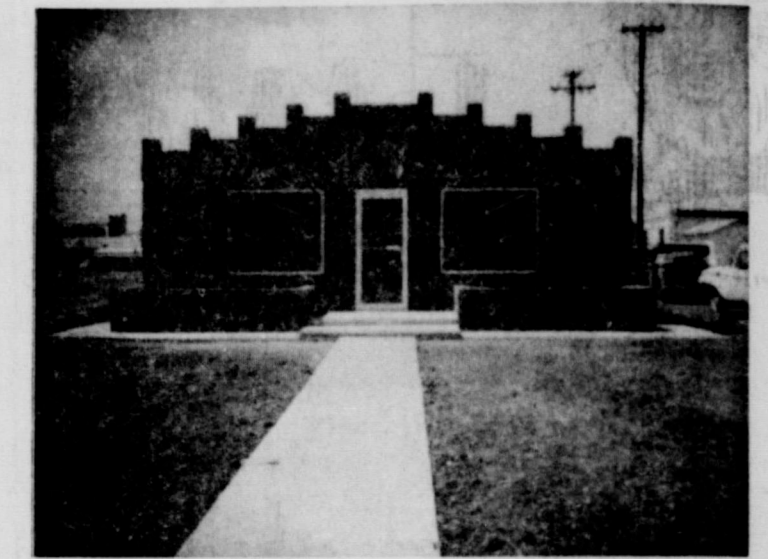

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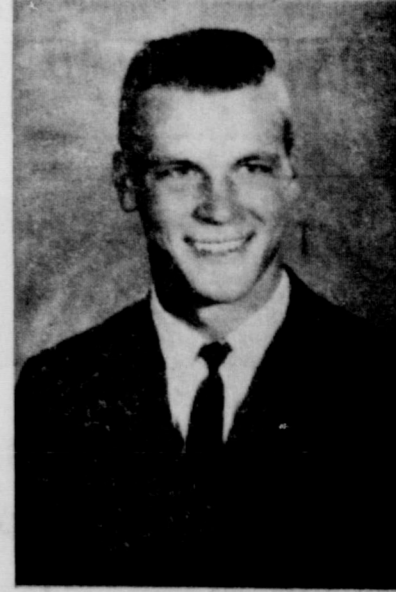

**County Agent's Report**

**BROWN MITES ATTACK WHEAT**  
Brown wheat mites are attacking wheat in parts of Mansford County, but control of the pests with insecticides will not necessarily increase yields.

Texas A&M University researchers at the Bushland Research Center believe chemical control on dryland wheat will pay only when mite infestations are severe and the attacked wheat has enough soil moisture for good crop potential.

The researchers have seldom gotten significant yield increases when control chemicals were used on dryland wheat.

A good rain or heavy irrigation would greatly reduce the brown wheat mite population.

The mature mites are metallic brown or black. Young mites are bright red after hatching and are sometimes mistaken for red spider mites.

Wheat infested with the pests suffers from a loss of plant juices withdrawn by the mites for food. Heavily infested wheat appears dried out although sufficient moisture may be available in the root zone.

**NEW DRUG FOR PREVENTING LEGUME BLOAT IN LIVESTOCK**  
The discovery of a new drug, poloxalene, represents a major breakthrough in the search for a

preventive of legume bloat in livestock.

Dr. C. M. Patterson, Extension veterinarian at Texas A&M University, says tests made in Kansas and other states indicate the new drug is very effective in preventing legume bloat which annually causes losses approximating \$100 million for U. S. farmers and ranchers.

Patterson said Dr. Erle Bartley, a dairy nutritionist, developed the bloat preventive use of poloxalene. The drug was developed by Kansas State University scientists in cooperation with other university and industry scientists with help from Smith Kline & French Laboratories, Philadelphia, Pa., which will market it in the U. S. in the near future under the trademark, "Bloat Guard."

Although specific causes of bloat elude researchers, they agree it is brought on by excessive foaming of rumen contents of dairy and beef cattle and sheep. To meet the needs of stockmen, an anti-bloat product had to do several things.

It had to prevent bloat for at least 12 hours in animals fed green legumes, had to act fast and be palatable and economical enough for general use. It could not leave any residue in milk or body tissues or cause any bad effects on health, reproduction, rumen function, feed intake or milk quality or quantity.

Tests conducted in Kansas, Montana, Iowa, Illinois, Mississippi and Louisiana show the new drug has satisfied all of these requirements.

"Bloat Guard" is a dry product which may be spread over grain as a top dressing. If this is fed to cattle a few minutes before they are pastured or fed freshly cut legumes, bloat will be prevented. Animals weighing 1000 lbs. or more need 20 grams per day and smaller animals 10 grams.

With the bloat preventive, Patterson says stockmen can safely feed legumes and make much wider use of good legumes for pasture.

**PUREBRED BULLS RAISE WEANING WEIGHTS**  
Purebred bulls are worth more in a crossbreeding program according to research at Texas A&M University's Livestock and Forage Center.

Walter Kruse, animal husbandman at the Center, says crossbreeding offers for the first time a truly sophisticated method to prove the value of a purebred bull.

In one test at McGregor, crossbred cows, half Hereford and half Brahman, were mated with a purebred Hereford bull. At the same time, Hereford cows were mated to a crossbred, half Hereford and half Brahman, bull. The calves from both matings had the same genetic make-up three fourths Hereford and one-fourth Brahman.

What happened? Calves from the purebred bull and crossbred cows weighed a good 40 pounds more at 180 day weaning time.

Kruse says this illustrates a vital point to cattlemen--how the cross is made is the key to higher weaning weights. He says A&M research at McGregor has shown time & again that purebred bulls and crossbred cows are the money making combination.

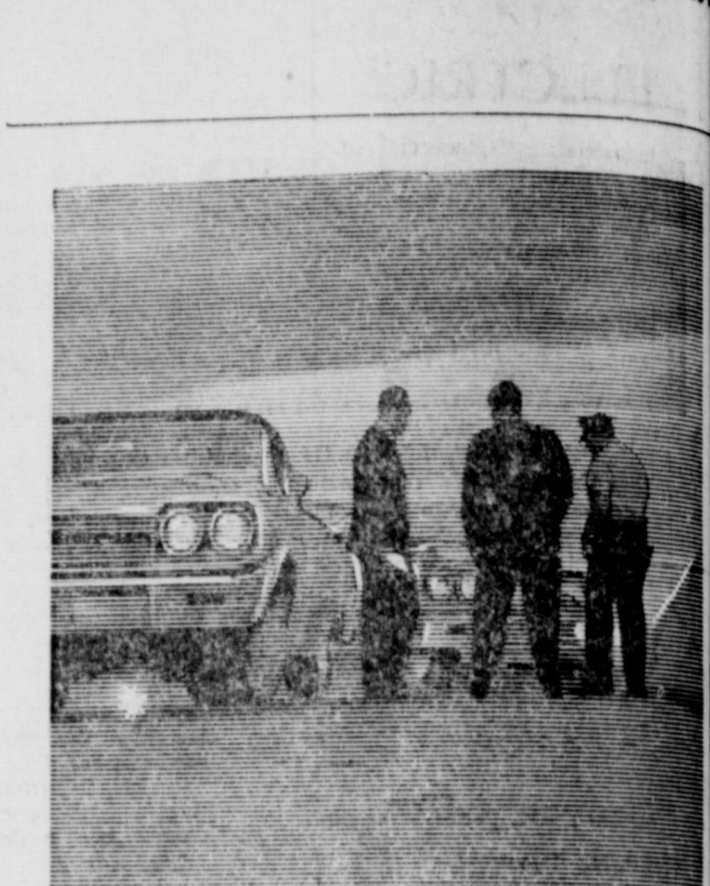
**JUDGE SANSING GUEST SPEAKER**

ciples... baptizing... and teaching... and lo I am with you always, to the close of the age. A Great commission given. But a promise also to be with us always. So I live knowing God is near. I am not frightened for being afraid is a sin. I am then no longer trusting my God. So in my daily life, I think of the presence of God and His promises. It causes me to live with hope & joy & peace of mind.

I not only heard God in this verse, but I respond with action. I think about how I will live this verse, or sermon, or God's revelation. It helps!
