Memorial Rites Today At 3 For Marvin Shapley

The body of Marvin Shapley, 63 year old Gruber rancher who was discovered early Wednesday morning, A park Ranger who has been making six o'clock checks along the shore lines, discovered the body about 7:30 a.m.

Shapley, a prominent Gruber man, lost his life in a boating accident. He was attempting to start the motor of his stalled boat when a huge wave knocked him from the boat. He struck his head against the boat as he went overboard and eye witnesses believe he was unconscious as he hit the water. Attempts to throw him life lines were hampered by high winds and water.

Searchers have conducted a round-the-clock vigil most of the week. However, attempts to drag the lake bottom proved futile due to the thick entanglement of brush and soap trees. Skin divers also abandoned their efforts because of the turbulence and coldness of the water on the bottom of the 35-foot lake.

Marvin Louis Shapley was born May 26, 1922 in Hansford County. He was reared in Gruber and attended school there.

Marvin served with the US Navy during WW II.

The farmer-stockman was very active in civic work in Gruber, and served on the Gruber city Council. He was a Past Comm-

ander of the American Legion; a member of Gruber Masonic Lodge No. 1326; member of Scottish Right, El Paso Consistory; was a member of the Khiva Temple and of the First Methodist church of Gruber.

He is survived by his wife, Helen Ruth of the home at 203 E. Broadway; one daughter Mrs. Arnold Beck of Gruber; two sons Tony and Rex who both attend Texas Tech college in Lubbock. His mother, Mrs. Albert Bakehouse, Gruber, and 2 sisters: Mrs. Elvin Wright, Gruber and Mrs. Richard Barchman of Ropesville, Texas. One grandson, Tab Lee Beck, and a host of other friends and relatives also survive.

Funeral services will be conducted today, (Thursday May 19) in the First Methodist church of Gruber at 3 p.m. The Rev. Norman Grigsby, pastor, will officiate and will be assisted by Rev. R. L. Kirk, Jr., pastor of the Seminole Methodist church.

Burial, directed by Boxwell Brothers Funeral Home, will be in the Gruber cemetery.

Car Wreck Here

Oscar Dahl, of Gruber was injured in a car-wreck at the city limits of the Spearman-Gruber highway, at 1:45 p.m. Wednesday.

Chief of Police Wayne Pierce collided with Mr. Dahl, while escorting an ambulance through town. Chief Pierce was only slightly bruised; he did have his seat belt fastened.

Mr. Dahl received painful chest injuries, apparently; Dr. Kleeberger rushed to the scene of the wreck. The ambulance that Chief Pierce was escorting thru town, was from Perryton, it was believed.

Hansford County Ranks Ninth In State Grain Sorghum Production

Hansford County's grain sorghum production for 1965 was 8,389,000 bushels according to final figures released by Grain Sorghum Producers Association. This was a gain of 2,570,000 bushels, or a 29 per cent increase over the 1964 crop which was 6,120,000 bushels. This ranked it 9 in grain sorghum production among all counties in Texas according to Rudie Tate, North Plains Rep, GSPA.

The trend for the past several years has been increased grain sorghum production in this county and in Texas. Texas, the number one grain sorghum producing state,

had a production of 285,740,00 bushels in 1965 which was 43 per cent of the total grain sorghum produced in the nation. All Panhandle Counties had increased grain sorghum production in 1965.

The 1965 grain sorghum crop was the largest ever in Texas and the Nation. The biggest production shift came in the 13-county North Plains of Texas area which produced 81,169,000 bushels of grain sorghum in 1965 which was 12 per cent of the national production and 21 percent of the Texas production.

It is expected that the increasing grain sorghum production trend will continue this year, particularly in the North Plains.

Along with these production increases, utilization of grain sorghum has steadily increased at home and abroad through intensive promotion program by Grain Sorghum Producers Association. When such programs were started in 1965, livestock use of sorghum was 179 million bushels, now it is 479 million. Exports in the same period have moved from 22 million bushels to over 200 million in 1965. The other major uses of grain sorghum, commercial and industrial, now promises to double with the opening of the new wet milling plant to be built at Dimmitt.

Mrs. Wilbanks and Mrs. Kenney served refreshments to 19 members.



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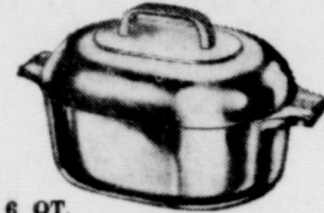

Linda Hall To Be Worthy Advisor

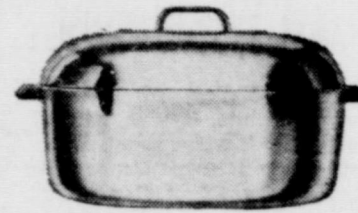
The Rainbow Girls met May 12 for their regular meeting in the Masonic Lodge.

Congressman Walter Rogers Speaks On Raging Controversy "Is God Dead?"

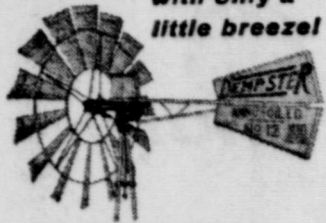

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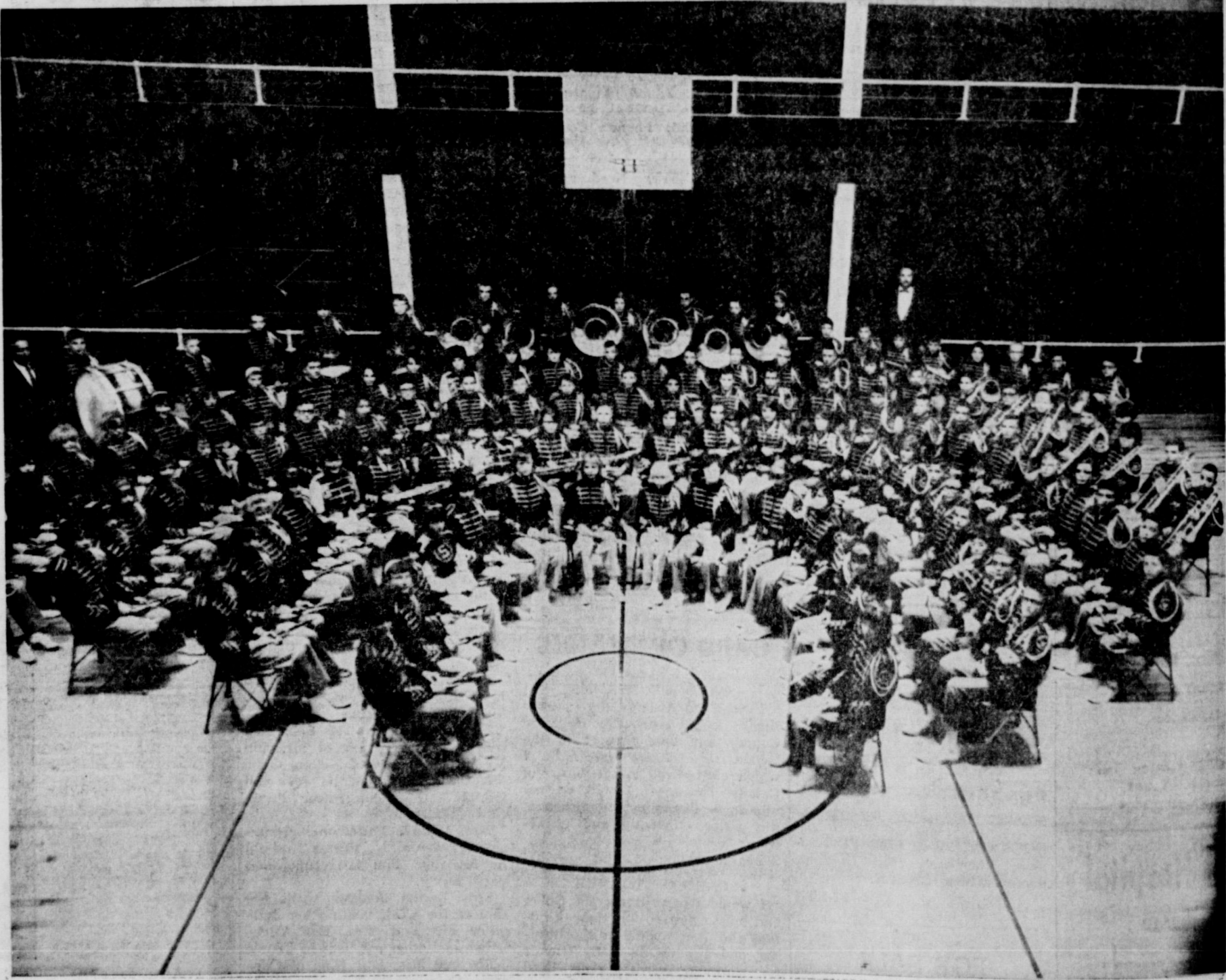
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
