J. L. Brock Named To Select County Delegates To Tex. Youth Conference

The Texas Law Enforcement and Development Foundation, sponsors of the Texas Youth Conference, have announced that J. L. Brock of Spearman will serve as county representative for delegate selection from this county at the 1966 Texas Youth Conference.

The Texas Youth Conference will hold its fourth annual meeting on the campus of the University of Texas August 18-21. As county representative for delegate selection Mr. J. L. Brock will work with local civic, churches and other organizations and individuals interested in Youth to send the allotment from Hansford county to this fourth annual meeting.

Last year Ike Richeson of Spearman attended the conference. He was sponsored by Spearman Lions Club.

The Texas Youth conference in 1966 became a project of the Texas Law Enforcement and Youth Development Foundation in cooperation with the Hogg Foundation for Mental Health and the Sears-Roebuck Foundation as well as a number of other foundations and individuals in Texas. The program had originally begun as a pilot project of the Attorney General's office, but is no longer associated with that office.

DRILLING RIG ACCIDENT WED.

All four crew men on Baker Taylor's Drilling Rig 9 were injured, one seriously, when the rig caved in Wednesday morning around 9 o'clock.

None of the men were from Spearman. Authorities from the drilling Company's local office stated that the accident occurred when the very sandy soil washed out from under the rig. The undermining caused the huge derrick to fall in. The rig was demolished.

At press time Wednesday afternoon at 3 p.m., Bill Moxsey and Roy Bulls of the Spearman office, had not returned from Moreland, Oklahoma, where the accident happened. No further information was available.

Elaine Kelly Of Morse Conducting Missionary Duties In British Isles

Work Begins On New F-M Road

A Pre-Construction Safety Conference was held July 1, 1966 in Gruver covering an up-coming highway construction project in the Gruver area. The project involves the construction of a new Farm to Market highway which will be an extension of Farm Road 2018. The new road will begin at the present east end of Farm Road 2018 at State Highway 136 and extend approximately seven miles east to State Highway 282.

This road has some caliche base that was placed by Hansford County. Additional caliche base will be added and a double asphalt surface will be applied. The estimated cost of the project is \$74,400 and will be financed by one-half state funds and one-half federal funds. Lewis R. Loyd, resident engineer for the Texas Highway Department in Perryton, will be in charge of construction.

The low bidder for this work is Ivan Dement, Inc., of Amarillo. Mr. Murray Gray, representative of the contracting agency, stated that the new caliche base had already been crushed and stockpiled on the C. H. Winder land. He stated that culvert work would begin in about a week and caliche work would begin in three or four weeks. All work should be completed by the end of August.

Traffic will be allowed to use the road at all times during construction but may be asked to drive along the shoulders or in the ditches for short distances. Motorists are asked to observe all signs, lights, barricades, and flagmen used to direct traffic during construction.

Famous Mule Train On Dodge City Trek

Members of the Rolling Plains Mule Train will leave Spearman July 9th for Liberal Kansas where they will assemble the wagon train for their three day trek to the Dodge City celebration.

The famous mule train has been invited as special guests to participate in Dodge's celebration which will carry out the theme "Historical Events of the Old West." The Spearman bunch plans to be in full dress. Women folk will be dressed in 1870 traditional garb, and with the men-folk and mules just acting "natural" nothing more authentic than the covered-wagon-mule-drawn group is expected to be present!

"Miss Kitty" will soon be greeting members of the Rolling Plains Mule Train when they arrive in Dodge City July 13 for the Celebration. Some of the mule skinner will be honorary bartenders in the "Long Branch" saloon serving sarsaparilla, but there will be two marshals on hand to keep things

under control. Some of the girls from the wagon train will be honorary con-can girls.

Kosie Mock, today's "Miss Kitty" runs the Long Branch Saloon and during the tourist season she stages shows seven nights a week. Her husband, Dr. Lewi E. Mock an optometrist in Dodge City, is known as the "Old Professor" He plays honky-tonk music for the shows while their daughter Mandy Mock sings old fashioned camp trail ballads.

Dodge City's Replica, better known as Front Street is made up of one square block. Authentic western lore is used and part of the "Beeson Museum Collection" is on display in three of the stores. Other stores are Rath & Wrights General Store, Long Branch Saloon and a Tonsorial Palace. The "hanging tree" still stands by Best Hill and Dodge City's first jail is nearby.

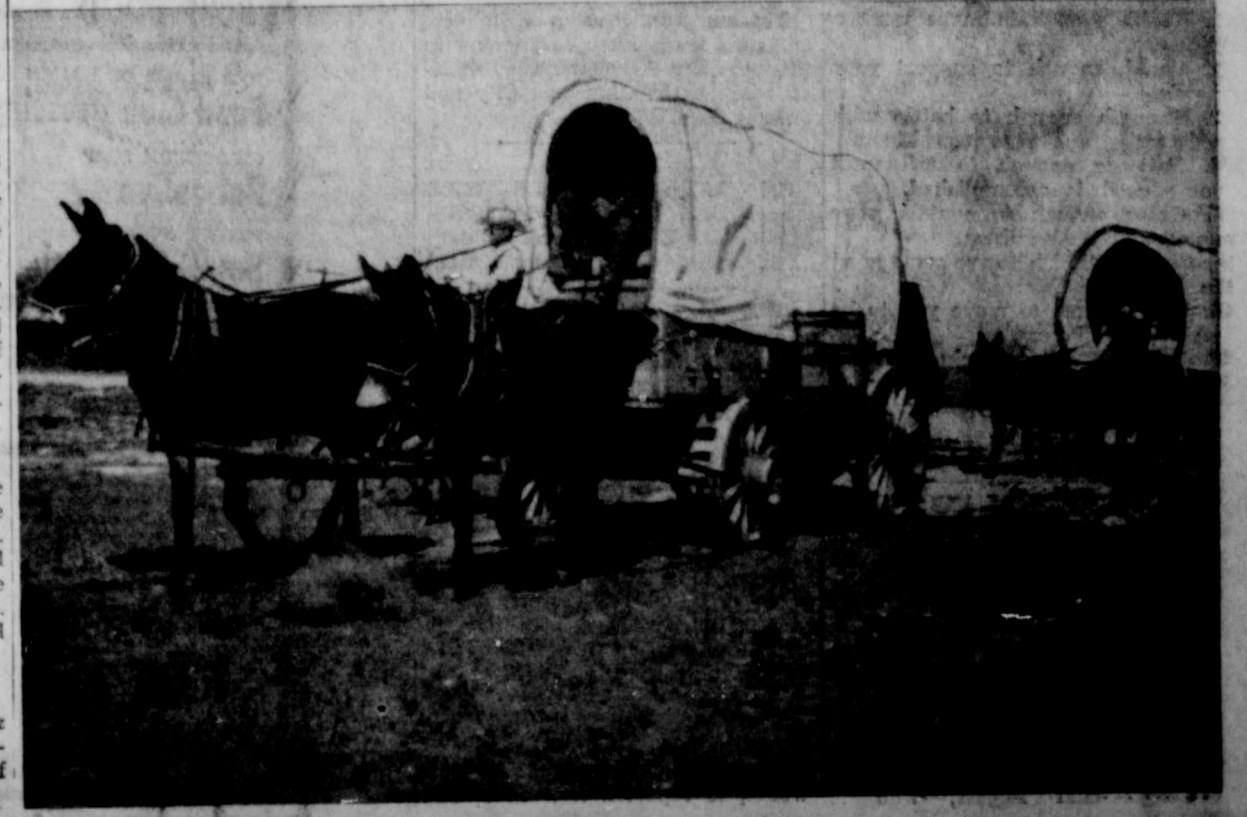
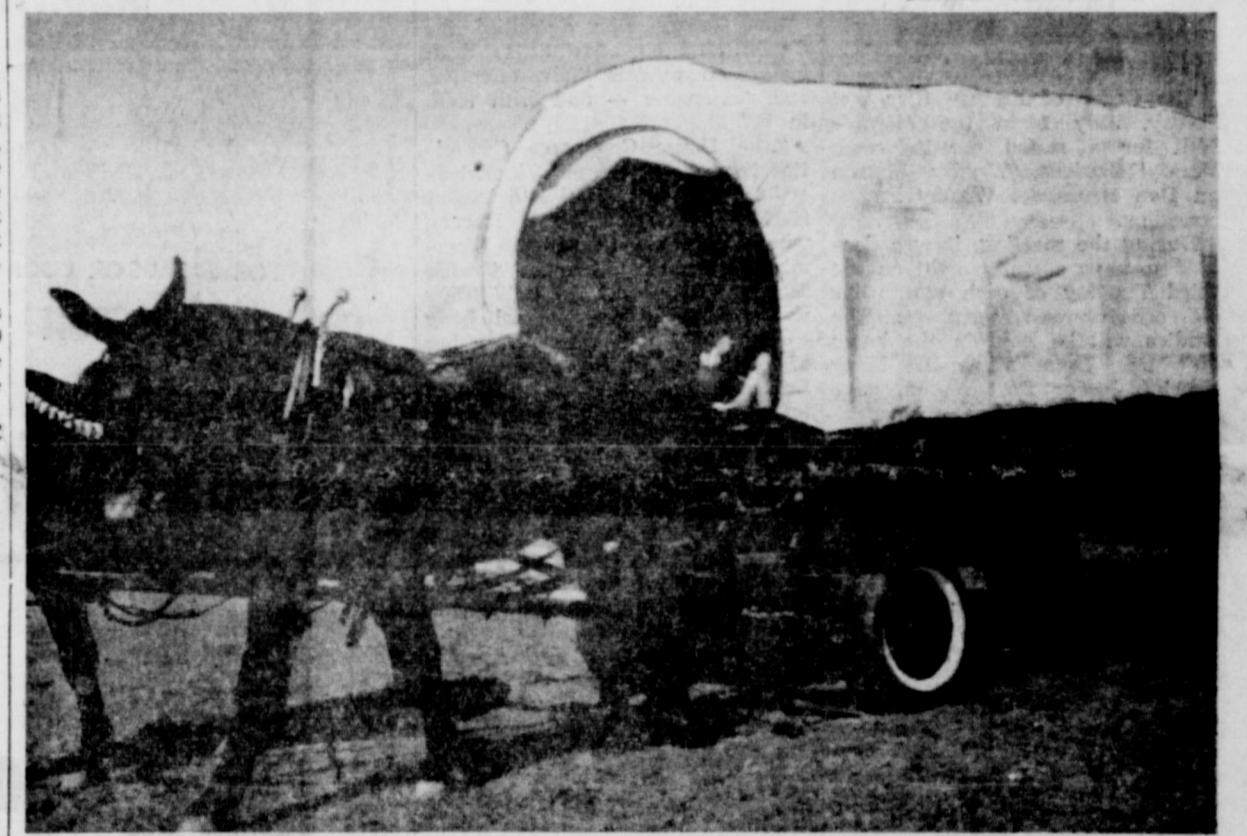
Rolling Plains Mule Train will be travelling to Dodge City just

Buffalo hunters came through this area on their way to sell hides and cattle drives from South Texas came this way going to Dodge.

Frontier City, U. S. A. which is near Oklahoma City is sending five gunfighters to travel with the wagon train and will be furnishing entertainment. When they reach Dodge, the wagon train gunfighters will challenge Dodge City gunfighters in a fight to the finish.

In Liberal, the wagon train will parade and put on a show during the half time of a ball game between Liberal and Denver at the Seward County Ball Park.

When the train reaches Dodge City July 13 they will be camped on the Arkansas River and invite everyone to come join the fun.

**CONGRESSMAN ROGERS
EXPECTS HOUSE COMMERCE
COMMITTEE TO REPORT AUTO
SAFETY BILL NOT LATER
THAN JULY 20**

WASHINGTON, D. C. (Special) Congressman Walter Rogers predicted Saturday the House Commerce will approve "a meaningful, effective, workable" auto safety bill "not later than July 20," Congressman Rogers, who is

ranking majority member of the Committee, said members of the 33-Congressman panel will concentrate this week on researching legal questions and other implications of proposed sections of the bill.

"Although the Senate has passed a bill and sent it to the House, there is a great deal of controversy among House members as to the effectiveness and practical application of a number of its provisions," Congressman Rogers said.

"Having held lengthy hearings during which witnesses were heard on all sides of the issue, the House Commerce Committee is preparing to resume exhaustive executive sessions in an effort to present the best possible bill for consideration by the full House," Congressman Rogers said.

The congressman described the Committee's objective as to draft legislation that is "fair, effective, and reasonable -- and with teeth in it."

"The House Commerce Committee is probably the most knowledgeable group on Capitol Hill in this field," said Congressman Rogers, who was a member of the Committee's Subcommittee on Traffic Safety which, in the mid-1950's was the first Congressional body to study the problem. "A number of helpful suggestions made by the Subcommittee later were adopted by the automobile industry, including safety belts," Congressman Rogers said.

"The research and study to be undertaken in the coming week by Committee members would prove to be of great value when the Committee reconvenes its deliberations," Congressman Rogers said.
 "With legislation of such importance to every citizen, whether he drives or not, and of such potential impact on an industry employing the most judicious bill it is possible to devise," Congressman Rogers said.

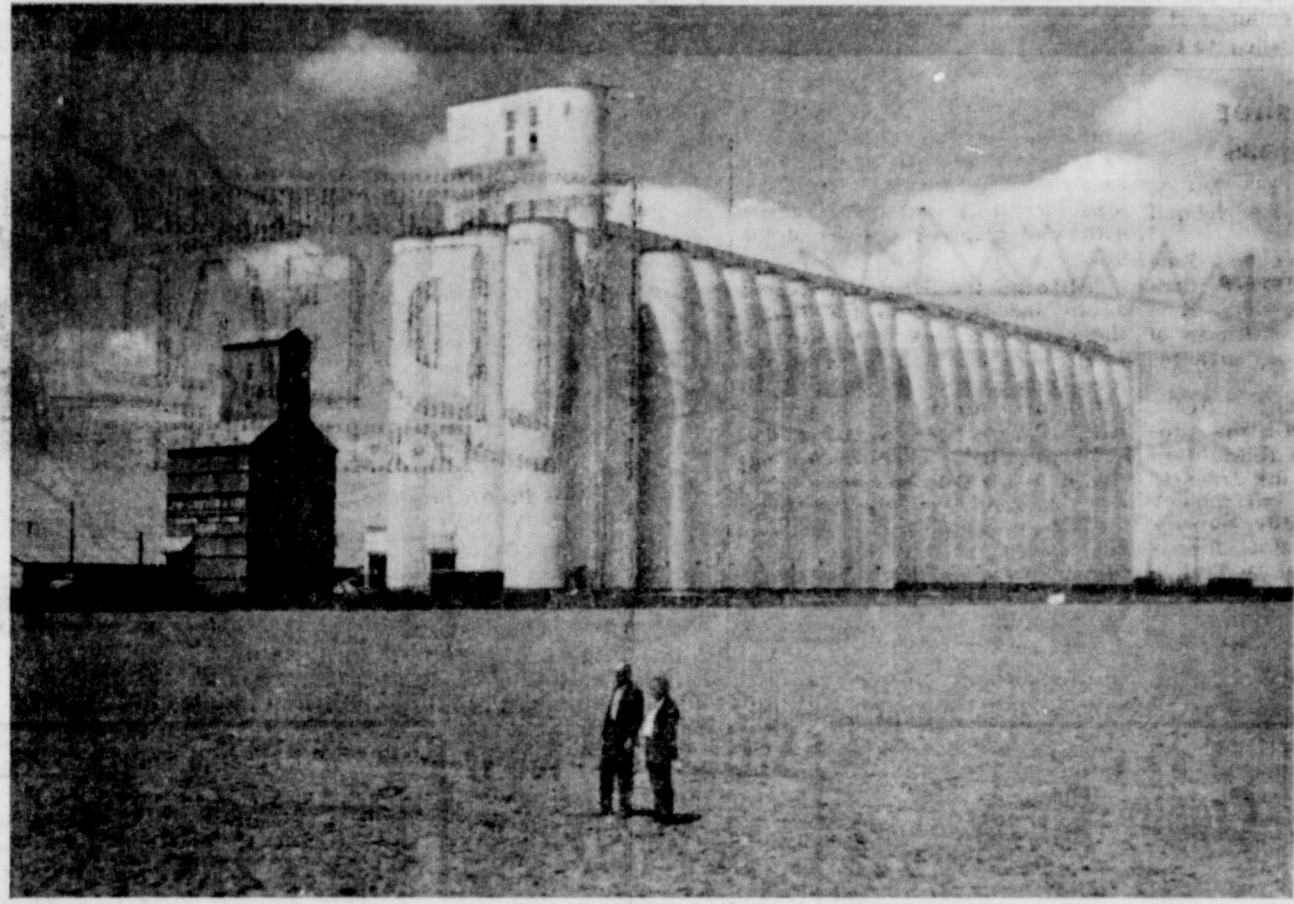

HOMEMAKING NOTES

By Linda Webb

During the summertime, luncheon meat is a regular at many meals for sandwiches. Most luncheon meat today is sold in small packages containing 6 to 12 slices although considerable bologna and other sausage meats are sold in "sticks" (whole rolls) or in chunks. I thought that you might be interested as I was, to see how some of the more common types of luncheon meats are made to add variety to your sandwiches or cold cuts plate. Cheese and meat loaf --made from extra lean, finely chopped pork trimmings. The seasoned meat mixture is poured into a molded pan to fill it part way; a layer of cheese is added, and the remaining space is filled with more meat mixture. Corn beef, jellied --pre-cooked, lean, corned beef is shredded and mixed with pure gelatin and formed into a loaf and cooked. Ham, cooked --sometimes called coiled ham, it is a boneless cooked product that is cured but not smoked. It is usually sold thinly sliced. Head Cheese --a cured mixture of hog head meat and meat by-products which is cured and stuffed into casings about 4 inches in diameter. Honey Loaf --a meat mixture similar to franks and bologna which contains about equal amounts of pork and beef. Flavorings include honey, spices and sometimes pickles and/or pimientos. Liver sausage --finely ground and mildly seasoned with onions and spices, this is a combination of liver and pork. It is cooked; maybe smoked, in which case it is called Branschweger, and is sometimes cured to achieve a pink color. Also, it may be shaped in loaf form and covered with white pork fat to keep it moist. Luncheon meat --pieces of cured pork pressed together, some large or chopped or ground. It is all meat, and often times more highly seasoned and labeled as "spiced" luncheon meat. Macaroni and cheese loaf -- finely ground pork and beef with generous quantities of cheddar cheese and macaroni. Olive Loaf --a blend of lean pork and beef, it is finely chopped, seasoned, and mixed whole stuffed olives. Pastrami --made from flat pieces of lean beef which have been spiced, dry cured, and smoked. Peppercorn loaf --made from extra lean, coarse beef chunks which have been cured, and the loaf covered with cracked, black peppercorns. Pickle and pimiento loaf -- finely chopped lean pork and beef to which has been added sweet pickles and pimientos. Salami, cooked --made from highly seasoned ground meat, it is softer than the "hard salamis", because it is first cooked and then air-dried for only a short time or not at all. Souse --similar to head cheese (the names are often used interchangeably) except for the addition of a vinegar pickle which gives it a sweet-sour flavor. With such a wide variety of luncheon meats available today, you need not serve the same one time after time. All are delicious and nourishing. THE LAST NOTE: (from personal experience) No one who can read is ever successful in cleaning out the attic.

J. E. Gunn Says Farmers No Longer Regarded As Poor Business Risks

For several hundred people who make their living from agriculture in Hansford and Hutchinson Counties, July will be a month-long testimony to the fact that they, and most other farmers, have turned out to be good businessmen.

It will be "LAND BANK MONTH" the 56th Anniversary of the Farm Loan Act which helped put farming on a business basis in the US for the first time in history. Farmers at last were able to borrow money on reasonable terms and put it to work as a production tool.

J. E. Gunn, manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Spearman, said that farmers at the turn of the century were regarded as poor business risks. "No one would lend them money to operate the way a businessman must if he is going to grow and contribute to this community," he said. "Interest rates for farmers were twice as high as for city businessmen, and the loans were for very short terms."

"Three Presidents -- Theodore Roosevelt, Taft and Wilson, studied the problem and finally the Farm Loan Act was signed by Woodrow Wilson on July 17, 1916. This act created the Federal Land Bank System, through which farmers could make long-term, low-cost real estate loans from their own organizations."

The Federal Land Bank Association of Spearman was created in 1917 with Mr. R. L. McClellan as its Secretary Treasurer. It is one of seventy-three associations in the Federal Land Bank district of Houston, which in turn is one of 12 Federal Land Banks that serve the 50 states.

"Altogether," Mr. Gunn said, the Federal Land Bank System nationally has loaned its farmer members more than \$12 billion. The Land Bank of Houston, has loaned Texas farmers more than 1.1 billion dollars. Our own association has loaned the farmers and ranchers of this area many millions over the 49 years it has been in business."

Not only have farmers proved to be outstandingly good loan risks. Land Bank foreclosures are almost unheard of today--but, given money to work with, they have proved to be production geniuses of a quality rarely found anywhere in American business, Mr. Gunn said.

"There are half as many farmers today as there were 50 years ago, and they are feeding a pop-

ulation that has doubled in this century," he said. "They rank among the greatest users of technology the world has ever known. Anyone who doubts it should visit a modern farm today."

"What goes on there--in new breeding, feeding, and other production techniques makes many of the rest of us look as if we and not the farmers are living in the horse-and-buggy days."

"I don't know of another industry in the country that is producing today with 1957 methods and selling for the most part at 1953 prices."
