In serious condition in Amarillo's Northwest hospital is Miss Willoughby who is suffering brain damage and lacerations. In Hansford Hospital in fair condition, is Barbara Reed suffering from shock and lacerations.

The stationwagon was traveling south on highway 136 when it left the road, went down a 15 foot embankment and was completely demolished.

The bodies were found early Tuesday morning, about 7:30, by Jack Hart, a Gruver resident.

Investigating authorities believe the wreck occured about 12:30 midnight. They base their statement on the fact that one of the girls watches had stopped at this time.






