Jynxing Lynxettes Dump Big Little Cypress In Finals!

Spearman's fabulous Lynxettes, playing with two of their greatest seniors on crutches blasted their way to the state championship Saturday night by defeating big Little Cypress 50-46. Most everyone was glad that Coach Dean Weese didn't go ahead and win the game by 15 or 20 points but allowed his loyal Lynxette team to give the home folks a thrill, and make the game more interesting. In fact, it looked like in the fourth quarter, at the beginning, the Lynxette team might win by 20 points, but the final 4 point win was as good as 100 to the Championship hungry Spearman fans. Not until Karen Gibson sank two free throws with 14 seconds left to wind up the scoring could Spearman breathe really easily, although the Lynxettes had been sailing joyfully along on their 10 point lead through most of the first three quarters.

Then something happened and big Little Cypress started a comeback rally that reached within two points of Spearman with 22 seconds left when the Bears Phyllis Parish hit a couple of free throws.

Better accuracy led to the Spearman victory. They weren't the "Missing Lynxettes" by any means connecting on 56.3 per cent of their field shots as against big Little Cypress' 45.7. And it was going that made the difference as each connected on 14 free throws.

For Spearman it closed a glorious 33-3 season and brought the Lynxettes the state championship that their 1961 predecessors missed.

The entire town welcomed the State Champions home at 3:00 p.m. Sunday night. The whistle sounded, the Sheriff met the state champs, and escorted their bus to town, the Spearman high school band played a welcoming number, and Mayor Vaughn introduced the girls and their coaches to the largest group of fans ever to appear in Spearman!

Stratford Man Dies of Wound

Henry B. Francis, 61, who was shot accidentally in the head with a .22-caliber rifle Thursday March 10, died Saturday afternoon in St. Anthony's hospital in Amarillo.

Mr. Francis, a farmer of Stratford, was getting into his pickup truck when the rifle, standing on end by the seat, slipped out of the vehicle, struck the running board and discharged. The bullet entered Francis' head just above his right eye and passed through the top of his head. He underwent surgery at St. Anthony hospital late Thursday.

A native of Oklahoma, Francis was a member of the First Christian church in Stratford. He married Julia Galloway on Jan. 6, 1925 in Erick, Oklahoma.

Funeral services were conducted in Boise City, Okla.

Survivors include his wife; a daughter, Mrs. Olen Mencher of Escalante, California; sons: Charles of Colorado, Curtis of Spearman, Edgar of Lasco, Calif.; Frank of Felt, Okla.; three brothers, one sister and 21 grandchildren.

Post Office Has Medicare Blanks

Acting Postmaster Elmon "Jake" Jacobs announced today that application blanks for supplemental Medicare benefits are available at the window of the Spearman Post Office.

The application blanks are being made available as the Social Security Administration seeks to contact 3.1 million senior citizens before a March 31 deadline imposed by the Medicare law.

Through direct mailings and other means, the Social Security Administration has had contact with 16 of the 19.1 million citizens who will be 65 or over on July 1. Of the 16 million who replied, less than one million said they did not want to sign up for the supplemental program.

A copy of the application blank is displayed on the lobby bulletin board of the local post office.

Senior citizens who reached 65 before 1956 face a two year delay if they do not sign up by March 31. The application forms are preaddressed to the Social Security Administration in Baltimore, Maryland.

Homemaking Notes

Weight-conscious Americans hear much these days about the role of fats in the diet. Today, I want to help solve some of the questions you may have about fats in our diet, and the fat's role in weight reduction.

Because of its high caloric density, fat has been considered objectionable in reducing diets. Of all foodstuffs, fatty foods are richest in calories. This makes it logical material to consider when it is necessary to decrease the number of calories consumed per day. This decrease, however, has frequently been carried to extreme of attempting to exclude fat entirely from the diet.

Rigid exclusion of fat is detrimental to the health and welfare of the dieter, and recommended diets ordinarily include moderate amounts of fats.

Some of the most successful diets supply equal weight of fat, protein and carbohydrate. Using then balanced meals, dieters are able to reduce without the usual experiences of hunger, excessive fatigue and irritability which are often associated with low fat diets.

To understand the importance of fat in a reducing diet, it is important to understand some of the background of obesity and dieting.

Reasons for weight reduction vary, of course, with the individual; but in general they can be classified under four headings: (1) for better appearance; (2) for improved health; (3) for longer life; (4) for to prevent rapid tiring and listlessness.

Figures published by life insurance companies continue to show increases in mortality rates for over-weight policyholders. We must face facts - excess weight decreases health and vigor. And there are many factors to hunger, including habit, the amount of food in the stomach, nervousness, blood sugar level, psychological attitudes, etc.

By properly controlling the carbohydrate, protein, and fat content of our meals, it is possible to take advantage of varying rates of utilization to delay hunger and make reducing easier.

Let's take a quick look at them. Carbohydrates are quickly digested and absorbed. If they constitute the principle source of food, the meal is quickly used, hunger symptoms are felt, and you are hungry again.

Protein is more slowly utilized and will lengthen by several hours the period of satisfaction following a meal.

Fat is even more slowly utilized and further delays the recurrence of hunger; these slower utilizations don't imply poor digestion or absorption. It is simply the nature of the metabolic processes to utilize the substances at different rates.

The most adequate explanations of physiological hunger are based upon observations that effective blood sugar levels below certain value results in symptoms of hunger. Since proteins and fats are more slowly absorbed in meals, blood sugar is maintained at satisfactory levels for longer periods of time than when with carbohydrates alone.

Fortunately, dieting problems usually center about the fact that people simply enjoy food too much and eat too much of it. Developing new eating habits to alter amounts, and to a certain extent, types of foods consumed is all that is necessary to reduce and maintain desirable weights.

Naturally, fats are in the restricted classification, although they should be included as an integral part of the diet for the following reasons: (1) Fats supply essential fatty acids; (2) fats serve as carriers for essential vitamins; (3) fats facilitate the absorption of certain minerals, particularly calcium; (4), fats slow up the digestion of food; and (5), fats improve flavors. It is frequently possible to substitute fat for a

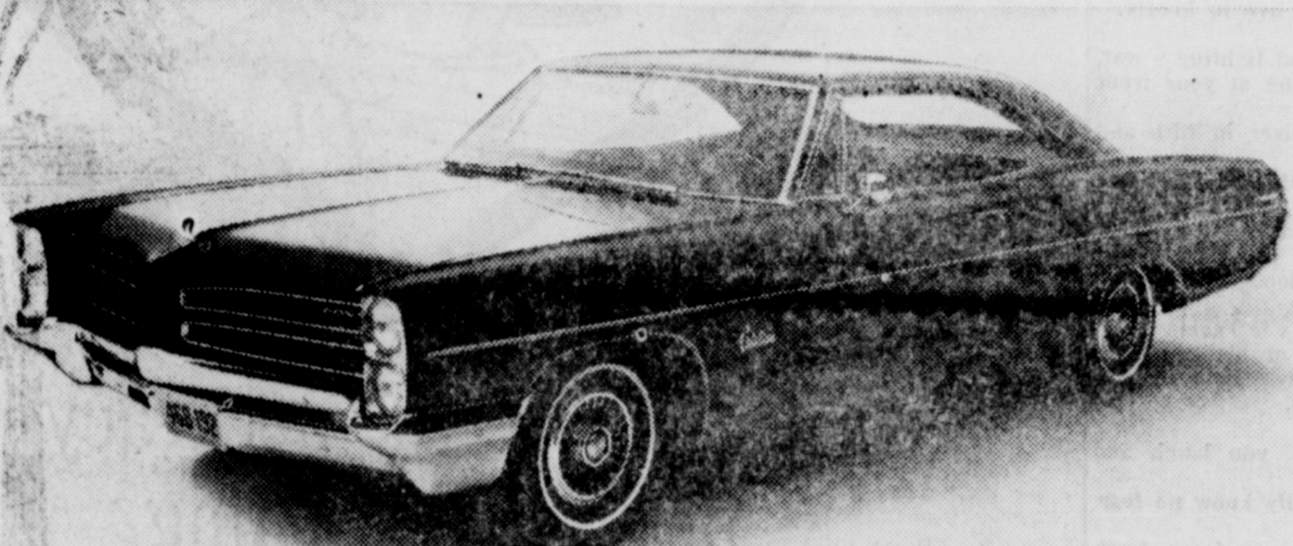

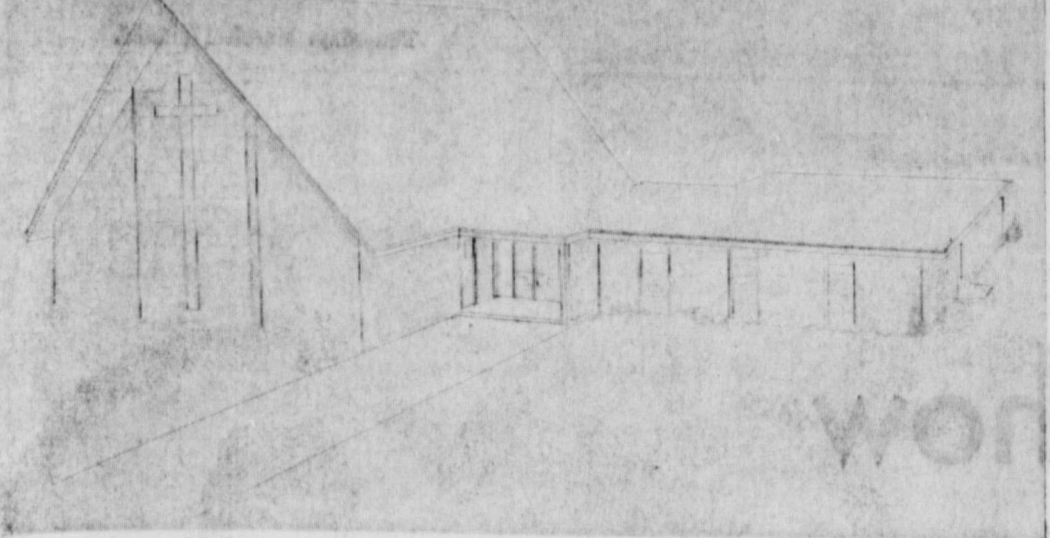

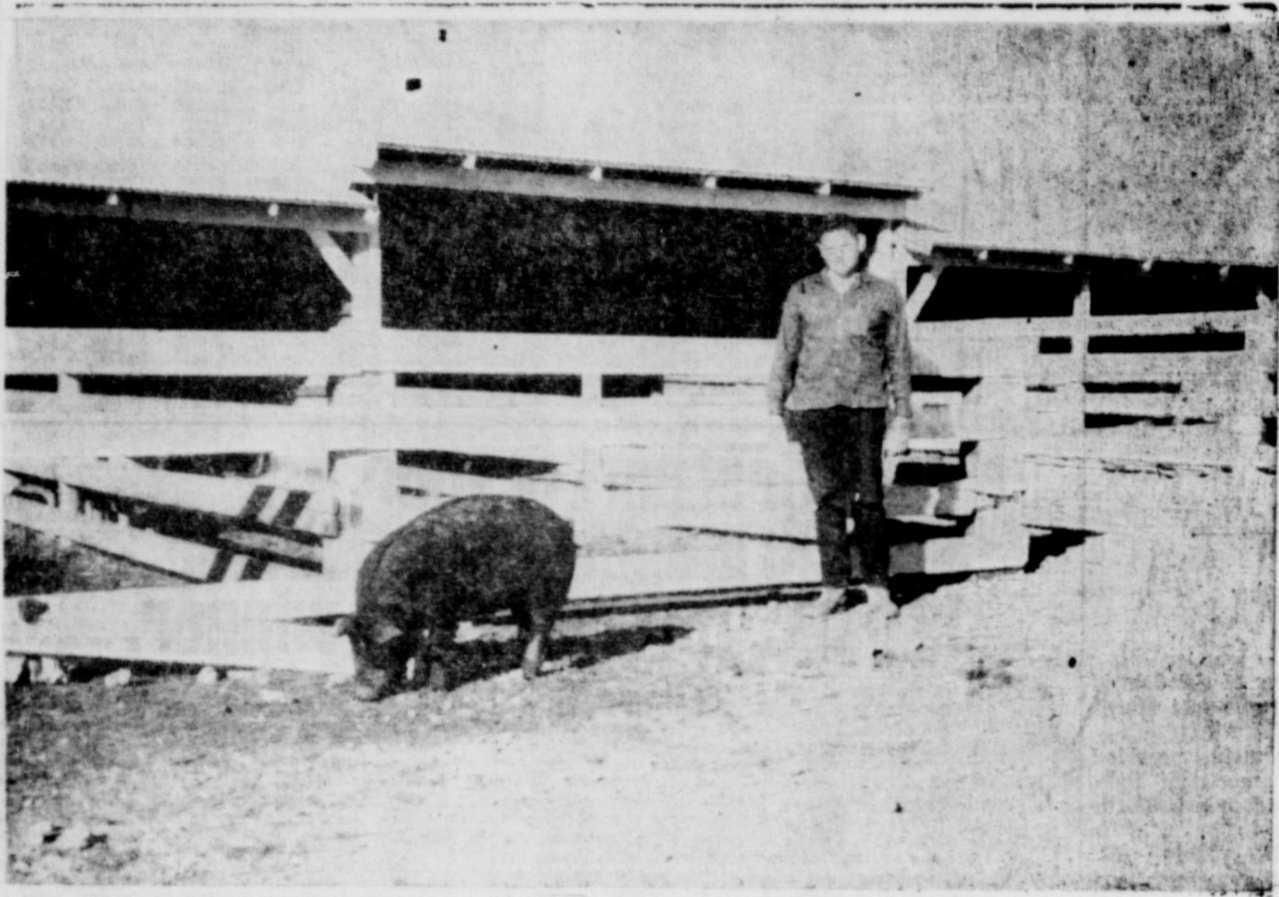
