The Texas quota of 1585 men for induction in September, is the state's share of a national call for 31,300 men all for the army.

Mrs. John Brown of Spearman received word last week of the death of her brother, Sgt. James Robert Croley, 33, who was killed in Viet Nam July 19.

Funeral services for Platoon Sgt. Croley, a former Amarillo resident, will be held at 10:30 a.m. on July 29 in Grand Junction, Colo. directed by Callihan Funeral Home.

Sgt. Croley's mother, Mrs. Annie Laura Evans of 1600 Martin Road, Amarillo, was notified that her son had been killed by "a metal fragment while in combat."

The family was making the Army his career. He enlisted in the Marine Corps for 17 years and served in the Korean war. After 17 years with the Marines, he joined the Army paratroopers and finally served with the infantry.

He attended Horace Mann Junior High school in Amarillo, and completed his education after enlisting. He was married to Miss Faye Darnell of Amarillo in 1954. She and their daughters, Denise, 10, and Anita 3, and sons Robert 7, and David 6 months, live in Grand Junction.

Sgt. Croley was a member of the San Jacinto Baptist Church.

Employers Urged To Cooperate In New ICT School Training Program

Perhaps one of the most important educational programs ever to be introduced in Spearman schools will be the new on-the-job training program for the 1966-67 school term. The new vocational education program is known as the ICT (Industrial Cooperative Training) and will be offered to students at least 16 years of age who are Juniors and Seniors. W. W. Smith, Spearman school teacher for many years, has been assigned to initiate and coordinate this program. He has a very appropriate background for the job. Students earn three credits for 175 hours of related instruction combined with 525 hours of supervised work experience. Mr. Smith said students, who enter this program, will attend school until noon, then be released to go to their employer for at least three hours of on-the-job training. Employers who are interested in cooperating in this program are invited to contact Mr. W. W. Smith at the counselor's office at the High School. Smith gave the following occupations approved for industrial cooperative training: Air conditioning mechanic, automobile body repairman, automobile mechanic, auto parts man, carpenter, cement finisher, chef, dentist's assistant, electrical appliance serviceman, electrician, floral designer, jewelry repairman, medic laboratory technician, linotype operator, machinist, meat cutter, motion picture projectionist, nurse aide, off-set pressman, painter, paperhanger, Radio and Elec. repairman, refrigeration mechanic, shoe repairman, upholsterer, welder, wheel alignment mechanic, X-ray technician dry cleaner. Training of students must necessarily be limited to establishments which meet certain specific requirements. Training stations are approved upon the recommendation of the Area Supervisor of Vocational Industrial Education.

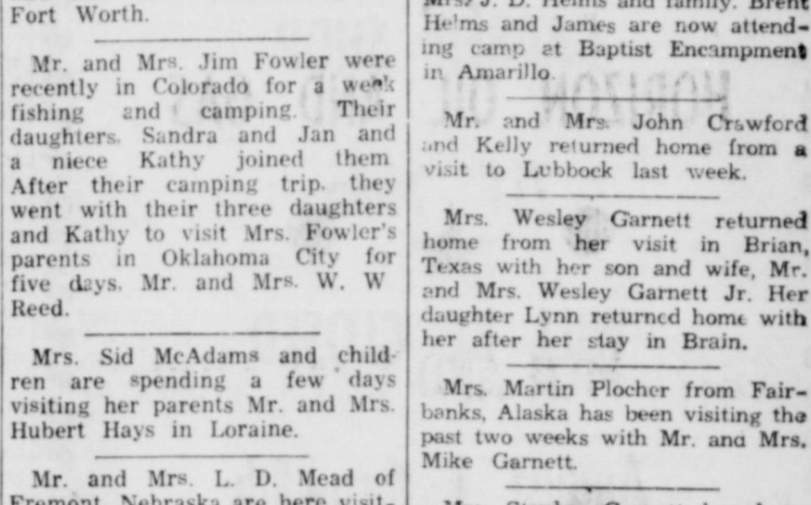
Kenneth McKay Hired As New SHS Principal

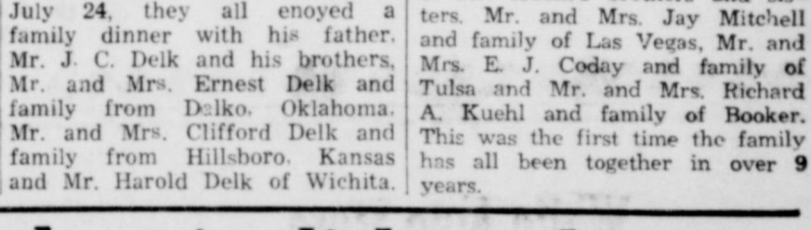
Santa Fe Bell Presentation To Mark Third Spearman Gift

Mule Train Shares Highlights Of Recent Dodge City Journey

The Rolling Plains Mule Train was well accepted along the route to Dodge City, Kansas where they had large crowds daily along the road, and during their noon and nightly stops.

At Liberal, Kansas, where the wagon train assembled, Boulder, Colorado and Liberal, were playing baseball under the lights and the Rolling Plains Mule Train was asked to put on a half time performance. During the performance, their Frontier City gunfighters hung the crooked umpire with the approval of about 200 children. Then a gunfight ensued among the outlaws and in the thick of battle, an unexpected event happened when one of the mule teams ran away, going across home plate, pitcher's box, third base and in right field. The team came back about the same way before slowing down. The crowd went wild and when the team was under control, they were given a big applause. Also

during the half time, Mr. and Mrs. C. T. LaValley from Burbank, California were presented with a plaque for having hauled their mules the longest distance. Miss Patty Shepherd, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Shepherd, was appointed the Mule Train Queen for 1966. Patty rides a white mule and is also one of the scouts. She received this honor on the trip.

Leaving Liberal, Kansas at 8:30 a.m. July 10, they were led through downtown Liberal & on to Hiway 54 by the colorful uniformed Liberal Trail Riders carrying flags.

Their first night stop was at Kismet, Kansas, 18 miles away where water and a campsite had been prepared for them. A large crowd was awaiting their arrival and furnished entertainment that evening.

When they left Kismet, Kansas at 8:30 a.m. on July 11, they travelled to Plains, Kansas for



their noon stop. At this stop, they were invited to stay at the Plains City Park by the Mayor and City Manager and were served refreshments. The young folks of the wagon train were invited to go swimming as the pool was opened especially for them.

Leaving Plains at 1:00 p.m. & through pre-arrangement with law enforcement officers, the 5 gunfighters from Frontier City put on a show. Three acted as outlaws and two were marshals. They kidnapped the Mayor and held up the bank. When the outlaws came from the bank with a sack of (presumably) money, they were jumped by the marshals and a gunfight followed. One of the marshals was killed and the three outlaws, the Mayor was saved along with the money.

The train travelled on to Meade where they camped in their beautiful, well shaded City Park. There they shod mules and made necessary repairs to wagons. Mr. and Mrs. Melvin Miller from Woodward, Oklahoma had prepared the evening meal and served it from the John Shepherd wagon of Fargo, Oklahoma to all members of the mule train. Needless to say, it was very much appreciated by one and all.

The train left Meade, Kansas at 8:30 a.m. July 12 and travelled to Fowler, Kansas for their noon stop at a roadside cafe where they ate their lunch. A feed store delivered feed and hay to their pick-ups and trailers. They left Fowler at 1:30 p.m. and travelled on to Minneola, Kansas where they were also provided with corral, water and a campsite. The entertainment was held in the City Park where the "Ole Professor" Otto Mangold from Pampa was Master of Ceremonies. The mule train was entertained by Minneola's Singing Moms and

other singers, jokes, instrumental numbers, speech by the Mayor and an imitation of Festus of Gunsmoke by Peggy Turner of Fowler, Kansas.

The Dodge City marshals and gunfighters came over to watch the mule train and gunfighters put on their show. The gunfighter shows were all good; a different show each night. The mule train didn't know what to expect next.

Mr. and Mrs. Jim Rollins from Frontier City were spending their honeymoon on the trip and Jim was one of the gunfighters. Mrs. Christine Rollins also celebrated her 21st birthday and the boys provided a birthday cake with candles and the audience joined in on the birthday song.

At 3:00 a.m. while some of the muleskinners were sleeping outside by the water tower, they were awakened by a sudden down pour of water. They couldn't understand where the rain was coming from without a cloud in the sky. After it had soaked their bedding, feed, pickups and mules, they discovered that the water tower was overflowing.

Leaving Minneola at 8:30 a.m. July 13, the mule train headed north on Hiway 283 to Dodge City some 24 miles. By this time the mule train had picked up many Kansas people in their wagons and also riders they arrived in Dodge City about 4:30 p.m. at the well shaded Wright Park on the Arkansas River. They rested and did as they wished, some went to the rodeo, Miss Dodge City Kitty stage show and other places of entertainment.

On Thursday, July 14 at 5:00 p.m. the mule train was in the Dodge City Days Parade, along with 3500 other people. Saturday night, the 16th, the mule train gunfighters had a performance

at the rodeo and the sound truck furnished the music and audio. While there, they were invited to go to South Dakota & Nebraska.

In the mule train caravan, there were 17 wagons, about 50 head of mules, the sound truck, from 75 to 100 members with many, many visitors. They represented 18 cities and one foreign country. Mrs. Johnny Lee and Mrs. Earl Riley appeared on television in person on Channels 6 and 4. T.V. stations covered the mule train trip and it appeared in papers as far away as Las Vegas, Nevada.

John Trindle Named To Texas Pavilion Drive

John Trindle of Route 2, Spearman has been named county chairman in the Texas campaign to build a Texas Pavilion at the Agricultural Hall of Fame at Bonner Springs, Kansas.

Mr. Trindle said, "The Agricultural Hall of Fame and National Center is the only institution in the county which is devoted to memorializing the greatness of American agriculture since pioneer days." He explained the National Center is administered by a board of volunteer agricultural and business leaders drawn from every state in the Union and that the center is a private, non-profit, tax-exempt corporation having no government support.

Comprising 275 acres of rolling farm land at one of the highest points in Eastern Kansas, the Agricultural Hall of Fame today has assets of more than \$700,000.

An exhibit hall of 9,500 square feet with an administrative wing of 3,000 square feet were opened to the public last June. A second building will soon be more than 18,000 square feet of exhibit area and will be the largest of its kind in the world given over exclusively to the exhibit of antique farm power machines.

One of the more popular attractions at the Agricultural Center according to Fred Leighton, administrator, is "OLD TEX," a 2000-lb. Longhorn given by the Light Ranch of Cotulla, Texas.

The Texas goal is \$400,000. The Texas Pavilion will represent a gift from the citizens of Texas to all the American people Plans for the pavilion and its location on the grounds will be supervised by the Texas Council of the Agricultural Hall of Fame. The Council is composed of 29 farmers, ranchers and agri-business leaders from facilities for conferences of agriculturally related organizations from throughout the country. Also included will be an auditorium.

Funds to launch the Agricultural Hall of Fame have been received from more than 20 states. Kansas and Missouri contributed the largest share to initial purchases of land and construction of buildings.


