200 Pint Quota

The Red Cross Blood-Mobile will be in Spearman next Thursday July 28, to secure blood for Hansford Hospital and for the soldiers in Viet Nam.

The quota for Hansford County area is 200 pints of blood.

Heading the drive is E. J. Copeland, president of Hansford County chapter of the Red Cross.

A kick-off breakfast was held Tuesday morning at 6:30 a.m. with those present viewing films on the processing and securing blood.

Richard Strayer, Amarillo National Representative of the American Red Cross, presented the program.

This Hansford County blood drive will be one of the most important projects held this year. An entire staff of Doctors and Nurses will be on hand at the Home Demonstration building to conduct the activity. The program will start at 9:00 a.m. and last until 2:00 p.m.

All persons between the ages of 18 through 59 years of age can (and indeed are urged) to give blood, if their health permits.

If you have ever had infectious hepatitis or polythemia, you cannot give blood.

If you will give a pint of blood next Thursday morning, it has been suggested you eat fruit or fruit juices with generous amounts of sugar for breakfast and cream of wheat or oatmeal with sugar and skim milk, toast with jam, jelly or honey (no butter). For lunch eat clear soups without fats, sandwiches, roast beef, chicken, lettuce & tomato, etc.

A special plea is being sent to Graver where 100 donors are needed, and to Morse where 50 donors are wanted. Due to the fact that so many who plan to give might not be able to, at least 300 donors are needed for the Thursday drive.

Anyone wishing to give blood is urged to contact any of the below listed persons who were present at the kick-off breakfast. They will take your name and set up a time schedule for Thursday.

HOMEMAKING NOTES

News in foods!

It may not be too long before homemakers can buy frozen liquid eggs. In New York State they are already available to the food service industry in 5 and 10 lb. packages (A 5-pound package contains 50 eggs).

The eggs, packed in polyethylene defrost quickly in the refrigerator. The bags with a corner cut diagonally provide a perfect pouring spout.

WHAT's in a Name? A lot if the product has meat in it and has been shipped across a state line. Then it's inspected by the U.S.D.A. and you know the name accurately describes the product, "Curry Sauce with Vegetables and Beef", for example, indicates more sauce than anything else, a few vegetables and even less beef. Had the product been labeled "beef curry" it would have been the other way around.

Space-Saving Celery. First it was carrots that lost their tops, now it's celery. A recent U.S.D.A. marketing study shows that Florida producers could trim \$750,000 annually off their transportation bill by trimming 2 inches off the top of each stalk of celery. So, look for shorter celery at your supermarket. Because it's cheaper to ship, it might well be cheaper to buy.

One way to keep your food dollar from shrinking is to use all the food you buy. Throwing food away because it's spoiled, dried, or wilted does about the

same thing to the food budget as tearing up dollar bills.

The extent of food spoilage and quality loss depends directly upon the quality of the food purchased and the way it's stored.

You can get a dollar's worth of food value for each dollar spent by following these pointers:

Temperature, light and air are the three important factors to consider when storing any foods. In general, low storage temperatures mean better flavor, texture, and nutritional value -- even for canned foods.

Between the temperatures of 50 and 120 degrees F, bacteria will grow very rapidly in meat, milk products poultry and egg dishes. If these foods stand at such temperatures for only four hours, they may develop dangerous toxins or bacteria that cause common food poisoning.

Don't let cooked foods stand on the kitchen table after a meal -- refrigerate immediately. Use leftover meat within a week after refrigeration. Use foods cooked in gravy even sooner.

Store milk and milk products in covered containers in a clean, cold place. Milk should be the first thing back in the refrigerator after a meal because bacteria grow rapidly in milk at room temperatures.

Sort, wash and drain most fruits and vegetables and refrigerate as soon as drained. Berries are the exception. Store in the refrigerator without washing.

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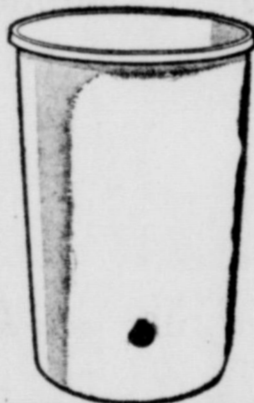

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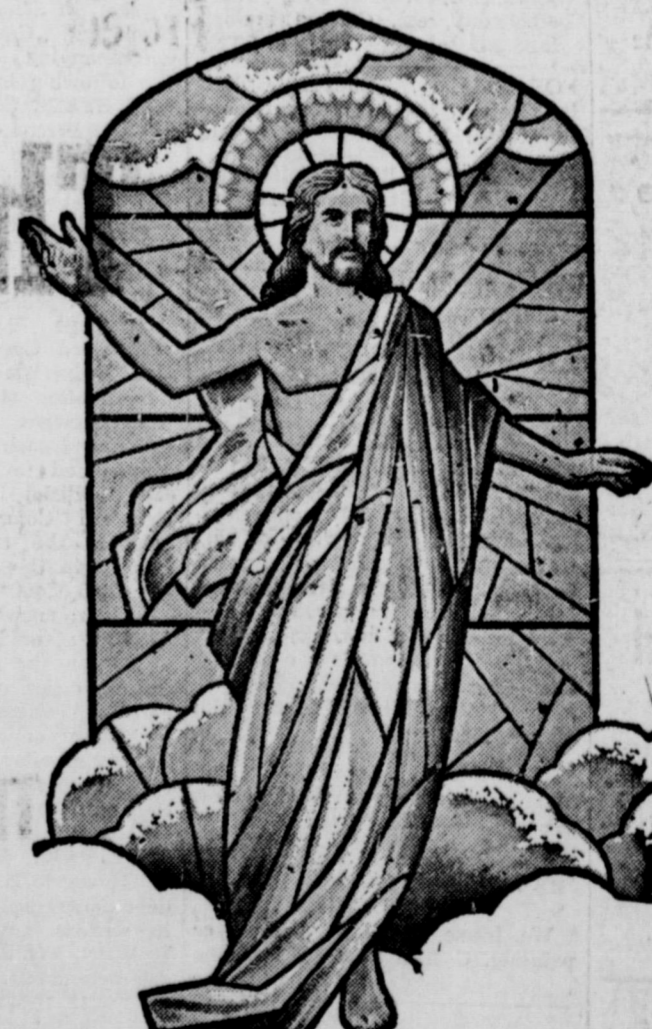

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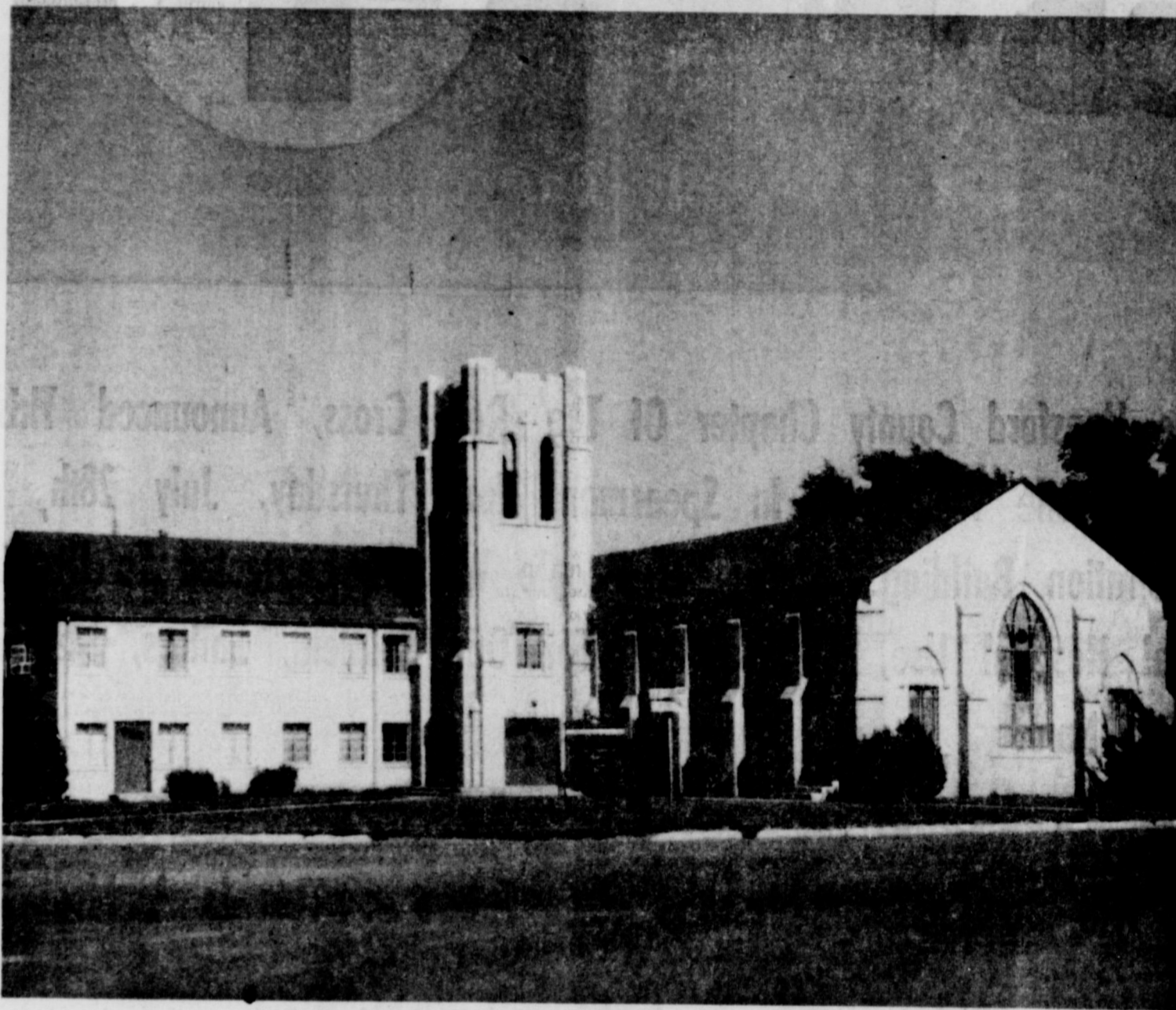
