## Memorial Rites For Joe Novak

Funeral services were conducted at 10 a.m. Wednesday March 23 for Joe L. Novak who passed away Monday night in St. Anthony Hospital in Amarillo. He had been a patient there since the last week in February and had undergone heart surgery on March 1st.

Memorial services, held in the First Baptist Church, were conducted by the pastor Rev. Luther Berry, who was assisted by the Methodist pastor, Rev. Weslie Daniel.

Mr. Novak, a Spearman resident 36 years, was 68 years old. Born in Yukon, Oklahoma October 11, 1897, he moved with his family to Spearman in 1930, purchased land east of town and became one of the superior and most progressive farmers in Hansford County.

Survivors include the wife Addie at home; a son Robert of Spearman; a daughter Mrs. Lou Turner of Quanah, Texas; two step-daughters, Mrs. Dickie and Mrs. Marcus Larson of Spearman; 12 grandchildren and 2 great grandchildren.

Funeral was in Hansford Cemetery directed by Boxwell Brothers.

Mr. Novak was a member of the First Baptist Church and the Masonic Order.

## One Year Old Hollis Child Died Here Monday From Spinal Meningitis

Ronald Hollis, one year old son of Mr. and Mrs. J. S. Hollis of 803 S. Bernice street, died about 4 p.m. Monday afternoon in Hansford Hospital.

Dr. Stephenson and Dr. Gober, physicians with the child, announced Tuesday that the cause of death was Spinal Meningitis (meningo-coccus).

The Hollis child had been ill about two days with ordinary cold symptoms, and fever. Monday afternoon the condition worsened about one o'clock and death came at 4:00 p.m.

Dr. Stephenson stated Tuesday that people should avoid all panic and rumors, and said "it is definitely NOT LIKELY that this disease will spread." Although it is a highly infectious disease and high-percent fatal, the germ is easily killed with all common household antiseptics, and in fact dies in 24 hours in the open.

Dr. Stephenson said only persons who had direct contact with the child (in his house, or he in theirs) are taking preventive medicines. It will not be necessary for school classmates of the brother and sisters to take medicine. The Doctor stated that usually only one child in a family will ever contract the disease.

Mr. and Mrs. Hollis and their five children have lived in Spearman about two years. He is an employee of Bob's Sales and Service.

Funeral arrangements for the child were scheduled by Dunkle Funeral Home in Pampa, Texas. Survivors include the parents, one brother and 3 sisters.

**HOMEMAKING NOTES**

For the girls who are interested in what's new in the fashion world for this spring . . .

Soft simplicity in fashion puts focus on fabrics and colors. Textured fabrics are still news as are contrasts - dark on pale or textured areas alternated with smooth. Sheers achieve an important transparent look with coolness and femininity. Together are sheer fabrics with matching heavier fabrics in the same pattern.

The young set has put its approval on the scrambled patterns of dots and stripes, florals and plaids. The "in" prints are calicos, baby florals, geometrics and petite paisleys.

It's the year of the dress, as it replaces the suit in importance, in a variety of looks, sometimes under matching fitted coats. Suits, then, are taking to the costume look. Dresses with perky jackets or skirt-blouse-coat ensembles are taking prominence.

Sportswear takes on many moods to fit tempo and needs of any age group. In pants lengths are decisive, but not shapes. They skim the knee or skirt the ankle, but ignore anything in between. The ankle-touching designs include a wide range of pants . . . straight cuffed or belted; on the side are bermuda length patio pants, and above the knee culottes.

Here are a few tips on prolonging the life of washable garments through proper handling: Sort garments as to color, type of fabrics, and the way in which they are made. Don't overload your washing machine. Don't damage or weaken fabric by twisting or wringing. Use the type of washing product suitable to the garment being washed, and use the amount recommended on the package.

Avoid adding bleach directly on the garment. Always dilute the bleach water according to directions. Place small, lightweight items

In a mesh bag to keep them from being twisted or damaged during washings. Close zippers and fasten hooks or supporters so they will not catch on other articles during washing. Use correct water temperature for the type of fabric you are washing, and select the washing cycle. — Allow the clothes to be thoroughly rinsed. — Don't overload the dryer. — Select correct drying time and temperature for the fabrics you are drying.

Cleanliness at home (or away) helps prevent illness. Germs live from hand to mouth; so it's safety first to wash off the germs with soap and water, especially now that several diseases are sweeping our community. Extra care in cleanliness could help your family escape these illnesses.

February 25: The day was spent relaxing and getting acquainted. Each traveling day began with a devotional and singing. The first night was spent in the Holiday Inn in Texarkana, Texas.

February 26: The group was ready to leave at 7:30. The days travel took us through Arkansas, Mississippi and Tuscaloosa, Ala. It has a University and one of the largest paper mills in the south. It was Alabama's Capital for 21 years and later moved to Montgomery. Part of the group went to the show, "Sounds of Music" which was very interesting. The night was spent in Town House Jolly Inn in Tuscaloosa, Ala.

FEB. 27: It was a short drive from Tuscaloosa to Montgomery, Ala. where we toured the First White House of the Confederacy that President and Mrs. Jefferson Davis occupied, and the state capital building. There is a red star embedded in the marble on the outside in the floor of the front entrance. When the Governor takes his oath of office he stands on the star. Our overnight accommodations were waiting for us in the Sheraton Valdosta Motor Inn in Valdosta, Georgia. It is the largest inland Navel station in the world.

FEB. 28: Our morning departure takes us to White Springs, Florida to tour Stephen Foster Memorial park where we visited the museum. He composed many songs such as "Old Black Joe", "My Old Kentucky Home", etc. We visited the eleven Stephen Foster Dioramas which takes a great amount of planning, research and imagination. Every thing has to be hand made, especially for each diorama. We

crossed the St. Johns River which is the Nations longest river flowing North. From there, drove to St. Augustine Florida and spent the night in Howard Johnsons Motor Lodge.

MARCH 1: St Augustine is the oldest city in the USA, founded in 1565, it is located on St. Johns River. Toured the Wax Museum and the Fountain of Youth Park. Traveling along, saw many pine, orange and palm trees. We saw Cape Kennedy at a distance. Four nights were spent in Di Lido Hotel in Miami Beach, near the Atlantic ocean.

MARCH 2: A free day of relaxing, shopping and looking around. MARCH 3 A morning tour of the Parrot Jungle. It is a natural, colorful tropical wonderland located 10 miles south of the center of Miami Beach. The parrots, macaws and cockatoos fly about free and perform for the visitors in an open theatre. These birds are well trained such as ride a bicycle on a wire, roller skate, talk over a telephone and many other things.

MARCH 4: The bus tour left at 10 for the Seaquarium. For many miles nothing but hotels along the beach. The Warner Bros. Hotel has 1600 rooms and cost 40 million dollars. Saw the coconut play house where plays are put on in the winter. Then the group got on the commodore II Boat for the Seaquarium. We traveled down Virginia Keys, Indian Creek and Biscayne Bay for 12 miles. We ate lunch on the boat. The captain of the boat called our attention to a residence that was for sale on the water front for \$85,000.00. The Seaquarium is located on a 55 acre tract. Two viewing tanks each holding a half million gallons of sea water takes care of the sharks, porpoises and many other kinds of fish. The porpoise especially "Corky" is well trained and can jump through a hoop, take a cigarette out of the trainers mouth while standing in a boat, can bowl and perform many acts before the visitors in the open theatre.

MARCH 5: We bid farewell to Miami Beach Florida where we traveled northward through forests heavy laden with Spanish moss and orange orchards to Cypress Gardens. It is one of the most outstanding attractions in Florida. It is a fairy land of flowers on the shores of Lake

MARCH 6: Leaving Natchez at 7:30. Traveling along, saw many pine and pecan trees and strawberry fields. We ate lunch in Shreveport, La. Got to Dallas at 4 p.m. Pictures were made of the group and soon were moving into the Baker Hotel to get ready for the farewell dinner

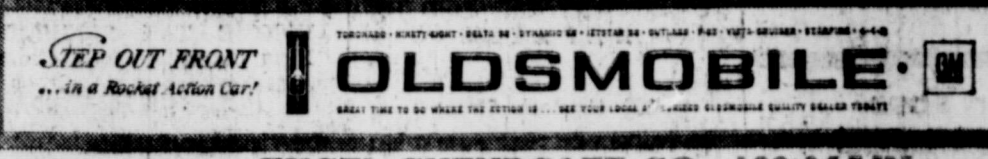
