# LYNX BAND Heads For ENID

### Another Award Added To S. H. S. Band Trophy Case

Spearman High School band won a first division rating in both concert and sight-reading competition at the regional UIL contests Thursday in Hereford. This win gave them their ninth consecutive Sweepstakes trophy. Director Sam Watson said he believed this was a state record for sweepstakes awards.

Spearman was the only AA band to earn two First division ratings and a Sweepstakes this year. Phillips got a first in concert for the only other first given in AA competition.

Wednesday of this week the band left for the Tri-State Musical Festival in Enid where it will try to retire its 2nd marching trophy. The band has won the outstanding marching trophy for the past 2 years and if it can repeat again this year, the band will bring the trophy home for keeps.

**Drouth Continues**  
While most of Texas is wet enough to merit "disaster" relief, the Panhandle might apply for the same help under extreme arid conditions.

A cold front which invaded the area over the week end with cloudy, misty, cold temperatures, left just as suddenly as it arrived—without a trace of moisture.

Dry, southerly winds prevail once again leaving dryland wheat struggling even harder to survive. Most farmers have already marked this crop off as April ended as one of the driest on record.

Cold temperatures, (April 30 was down to 32 degrees again) have damaged irrigated wheat to some extent. County Agent Robert Adamson remarked that every field varied in the amount of damage from freezes. Some fields suffer 50 per cent damage.

On a statewide basis, John Connolly has two opponents for governor and Preston Smith has one for lieutenant governor, but none but the incumbents are considered to have much chance.

The same situation exists for many state office holders including Jerry Sadler, commissioner of agriculture; Byron Tunnell, railroad commissioner.

Wagoner Carr, present attorney general, is well in the forefront in the race for the Democratic nomination for US Senator.

The best race seems to be the attorney general battle, with Crawford Martin and Franklin Spears generally considered ahead, and Galloway Calhoun a fairly strong candidate.

Another close race will be for State Representative 23rd District between A. C. (Shorty) Hallmark incumbent, and Bill W. Barton of Borger. The winner of this will come up against Republican Jack Hart of Gruver in the General election.

Some of the district races will become hotter in the general election, with Walter Rogers, Democrat, and Bob Price, Republican, due to battle for U. S. Congressman, 18th district.

### 3 Candidates Face Contests

With most of the action in the Democratic ballot, primary elections from the Democratic and Republican parties are set in Hansford county and throughout the State Saturday May 7.

The Republicans, who will be holding a county primary, have only limited statewide filings and few races which are attracting much attention. There are no Republican candidates locally.

Three Hansford County offices will be contested in the Democratic primary May 7.

County and District Clerk Kee-see Richardson, seeking her second four-year term, will be opposed by Donald Heath of Gruver. Heath is associated with his father in the Heath Food Market in Gruver.

County Treasurer, Merle Washington will be opposed in her bid for a third term by Selma Dahl Reneau and Juanita Kemper.

Mrs. Reneau, a former ASCS office employee, is now working as a distributor of the Amarillo Globe Newspaper.

Mrs. Kemper, a county resident for 12 years, is now employed at the Baker-Taylor Drilling Company office in Spearman.

Guy Remy, a retired Skelly Oil Company man of Spearman, is opposing Justice of the Peace Johnny P. Vernon who is seeking his third term in office.

A. C. Hallmark of Dalhart, State Representative for the 83rd District, is opposed by Bill Barton of Borger, Democrat, and Jack H. Hart, a Gruver Rancher, on the Republican ticket.

Those who will make unopposed bids for return to office on the Democratic ticket include George P. Lowe, County Commissioner, Prec. 2 & Johnnie C. Lee for County Judge, Grady Hazelwood State Senator, 31st Senate District, and Walter Rogers, US Representative, 18th Congressional District.

Precinct Chairman listed on the Ballot will be: Precinct 1, Emmett R. Sanders; Precinct 2, C. T. Collier; Prec. 3, Don McLain; Prec. 10, J. L. Brock.

J. D. Helms is asking for another term as Hansford County Democratic Chairman.

Polling places throughout the County will be located in Spearman at the Court House and the Junior High School. All residents who live north of 5th Avenue vote at the Court House. All others who live south of this street, and this includes all people who live on the West side of Roland street, will vote at the Junior High school.

In Morse the polling place will be in the School house.

In Gruver: at the Gruver Elevator and Gruver School.

Oslo School house and the N.F. Renner farm will accommodate voters in the Northern part of the County.

Voters are asked to bring their Poll Tax receipt or voting exemption with them when they vote in the May 7 primary.

### Pastor Lands Plane After Accident

**SPEARMAN** — A Spearman pastor who escaped serious injury Sunday afternoon when his Cessna 170 airplane crashed on landing, said today:

"The good Lord must have been with me. I suppose it sounds strange, but I wasn't afraid. I still think flying is the best way to travel."

The Rev. George Bollinger, 47, received his pilot's license one year ago on the day of his crash. He said the motor cowling flew up as he was coming in for a landing.

"I had to make a blind landing as best I could, but I landed on a short runway."

The Rev. Bollinger, pastor of the Union Church here, said one wing hit a building and the plane was "just about completely demolished."

The pastor said he bought the plane a month ago and it had been flown only 800 hours. He had 164 flying hours.

The pilot was treated at Hansford Hospital. He was home this morning.

### Doctor Retired, Hospital Closes

With the announcement of the retirement from active practice of Dr. G. L. Kengle, general practitioner who has served patients in the Perryton community for 40 years, the Perryton Hospital and Clinic closed its doors last week.

Dr. Kengle is at present a patient in the Oklahoma General Hospital in Clinton, Okla. and is expected to return to his home in Perryton for convalescence but will be unable to resume his practice.

The decision to close the hospital was made last week after Mrs. Kengle had visited with her husband in the Clinton hospital.

There were 10 patients in the Perryton hospital at the time the closing announcement was made and those who were not able to be discharged by Monday were transferred to other hospitals.

Dr. Kengle bought the Perryton Hospital in 1942 and opened it as a hospital after considerable repair and remodeling. In 1946 the modern brick clinic was built next door and has served the community since that time.

The closing of the Perryton Hospital leaves Perryton with the 30 beds of the privately owned Senior Hospital until the new 65 bed Ochiltree General Hospital can be opened sometime early next year.

**HOMEMAKING NOTES**

Spring sewing for homemakers is well underway. Many new fabrics are available and some of the more familiar ones are back with new finishes and characteristics.

Bonded fabrics are plentiful in the form of laces, knits, or woven fabrics with a tricot or taffeta backing. This backing is attached with a heat locking process and makes underlining a garment unnecessary.

Since the backing makes the straightening of the fabric difficult, check the fabric before buying

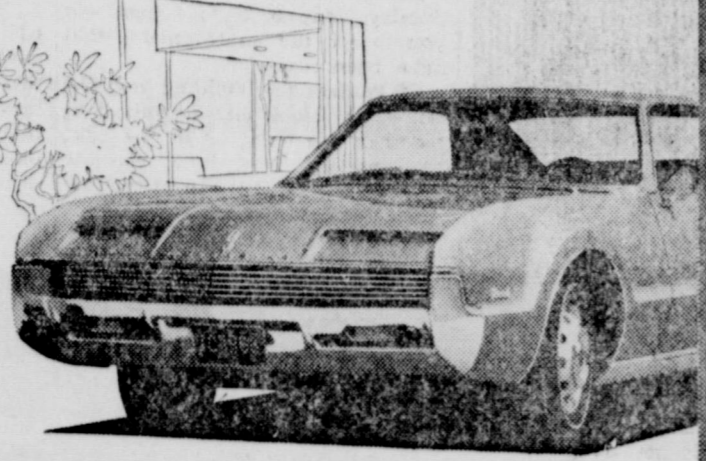
it to see that it is not off-grain. It has usually been preshrunk, so shrinking is not necessary.

Choose a pattern with few seams and without intricate details. Lay the pattern on the right side of the fabric, following a lengthwise rib. It is easier to handle if only one layer is cut at a time. To eliminate bulkiness on bodice fronts, bodice backs or jackets fronts, cut facings as part of the main garment, rather than a separate piece.

For ease in sewing, use a thread suitable for the outer fabric, a medium machine needles. Since ripped machine stitching may show hand baste and fit the garment before permanently stitching the seams. If the fabric is extremely

Low volatile esters release vapors at about 90 degrees F. Vapors from ester formulations can kill susceptible plants growing near the area where they are applied.
3. Avoid spraying on windy days and do not spray when the wind velocity is more than 10 miles per hour. Wind carried droplets of 2, 4-D may kill susceptible crops near the area that is being treated.
4. Spray when the wind is blowing away from susceptible crops and toward the area being sprayed. Even with the amine form of 2, 4-D it is recommended that a susceptible crop be no closer than 4 miles downwind when wind velocity is 7-10 miles per hour.
5. Use nozzles that apply a coarse spray to help reduce wind carried droplets or spray drift.
6. Use low pressures — no more than 35 pounds per square inch for boom sprayers, 100 pounds for spray guns.

## County Agent's Report

**4-H TO SELL SMV EMBLEMS**  
Hansford County 4-H mem-  
bers will be selling slow moving  
vehicle emblems soon as a 4-H  
Safety project. These emblems  
are for use on slow moving ve-  
hicles on the highway. They will  
take your order and deliver the  
emblems when they arrive.  
**A and M CHEMIST URGES SAFE USE OF PESTICIDES**  
It's almost summertime again.  
That means insect time too!  
With the demise of the fly-  
swatter, everyone from the house  
wife and home gardener to the  
farmer, uses pesticide chemicals  
to control insects.  
Jack Price, Extension leader,  
agricultural chemical section,  
Texas A and M U., says pesticide  
has provided a great boost to  
agriculture, but can be harmful  
if not properly used!  
Misuse of pesticides not only  
results in poor insect control - -  
it can also create an unnecessary  
hazard to humans and to crops,  
he cautions.  
Buy the right chemical for the  
job.  
Transport the chemical in the

bed of the truck or the trunk of  
car, not in the drivers compart-  
ment.  
Read the label understand and  
follow the directions.  
Use clean equipment, properly  
designed for the job!  
Mix pesticide solutions in a well  
ventilated area preferably out-  
side and avoid inhaling pesticide  
sprays or dust.  
Apply when there is little or no  
wind to minimize drifting of the  
spray or dust.  
Don't use pesticides near wells,  
cisterns or other water sources.  
Store pesticides in close, well-  
labeled containers, where child-  
ren and pets cannot reach them.  
Do not store near food, feed or  
seed.  
Dispose of unused chemicals and  
empty container properly.  
Keep a record of the chemical  
used, the time required to do  
the job, weather conditions, rate  
of application and when and  
where used!  
Pesticide safety is an individ-  
ual responsibility. But if you  
misuse chemicals you may harm  
others as well as yourself.

**IRRIGATION WATER QUALITY**  
It's not good business to fuss  
at the quality of irrigation water.  
Rather than be in doubt as to  
harmful effects of the water on  
future soil productivity, I sug-  
gest having the water evaluated by  
a chemical analysis. The ideal  
time to collect samples is during  
the highest period of water use.  
The need for a chemical analy-  
sis is particularly important in  
areas where new wells are being  
drilled or old ones are being  
drilled or old ones are deeper  
than average for the area. If the  
wells extend into the red bed  
formation, there is a greater  
possibility of dangerous salt lev-  
els in the water.  
Soils vary widely in their  
ability to tolerate salt without  
being harmed and some crops  
are more tolerant than others.  
Clays, where the water intake  
rate is already slow, can be made  
even less porous by a water high  
in sodium. Obtaining stands can  
become a problem on the light-  
er soils due to sodium accumula-  
tion that "seals" or crusts the  
surface.  
Water samples may be sub-  
mitted to the Soil Testing Lab at  
Texas A and M University Col-  
lege Station. Samples must be ac-  
companied by the complete in-  
formation sheet which is avail-  
able from the offices of local  
county agents. The present test-  
ing fee per sample is \$5.00.

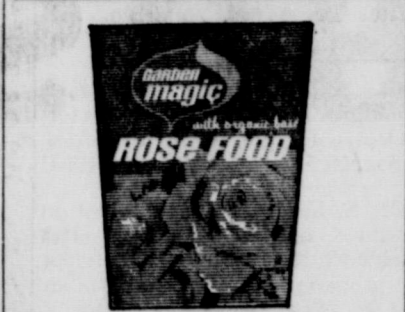
