City Has No Ordinance Prohibiting Solicitors

EDITORIAL
City residents need to be warned against door-to-door salesmen and solicitors, who solicit without a permit, and who increase in numbers in this city this time of year.

In fact, if they have a permit, this doesn't always mean they have been "checked out and found legal."

Once a few years ago the Chamber office issued a permit to one solicitor and found later people who bought his wares had been duped! There is simply no way of checking on solicitors, other than taking down license tag numbers, credentials, Company's name, etc. Then later, if time proves the salesman failed to deliver his magazines (etc.) this record will be on hand. That is, if he called at the Chamber office or the City Hall or Sheriff's office for a permit, or if you doubted his credentials and turned him in YOURSELF.

The City of Spearman has no ordinance prohibiting soliciting without a permit. Most cities do, however.

This city has had an influx of Deaf Mutes lately, passing you a card asking for a donation. And some of these people are getting real familiar! They come often. Most of them hold down good jobs

in other cities, and do not, if you care to investigate, have to beg.

In one of the cities in this area last week two solicitors were denied permits on advice of the Better Business Bureau, and one local family was nearly taken for \$1700 on a metal siding deal. Charges being filed in City Court in that city against people soliciting without a permit average from two to five per day. They are selling everything from magazines up. They must pay a \$25.00 fine for NOT having a permit. This money can be put to good use at the City Hall too!

You should ask to see the permit of any person selling door to door, or soliciting for funds, before you let him in the house. If they have a permit, it will be signed either by the Chamber of Commerce, or the City Manager. If they do not have a permit, this is your best excuse to get rid of him in a hurry.

A local Attorney stated to this newspaper that it is definitely a "crime" to obtain money under false pretense. This same attorney also stated that this City should have some system of "approval".

If you have one of these callers who do not show a permit, have him wait just a minute for you to call the Sheriff's Department or the City Police Department to ask about their credentials.

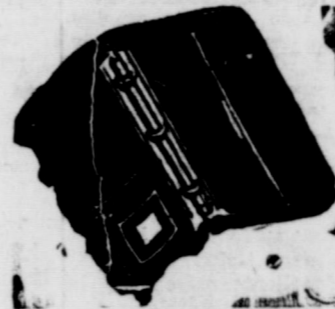

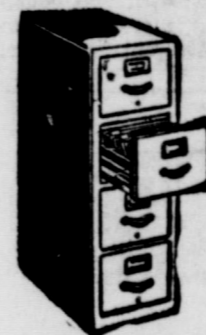

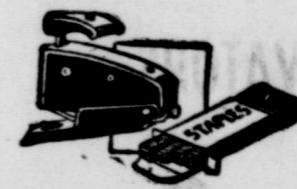

HOMEMAKING NOTES

FLASH! New Horizons for Sunday Painters -

Every so often a hit-or-miss experiment produces a brand new medium. That happened when one inspired artist, reaching for a new effect with water colors, mixed detergent into poster paint. The result was spectacular. Here, on ordinary paper, were textures and "hot" effects previously possible only with oils on canvas.

The word spread, and soon people who had never before had a brush in hand were out "Sunday painting" and enjoying it to the hilt. More important, they were learning a great deal about technique because they felt no inhibitions in handling this stuff.

So, would-be artists, get started. Here is a convenient way to practice a new craft without the expense of professional materials and paraphernalia. Just add one part detergent to two parts tempera sometimes called poster paint.

This gives the paint more flexibility and body because the detergent acts as a thickening agent. Painting with this mixture makes a highly skilled art technique suddenly easy to master.

This new medium also eliminates the usual clean-up problems of oil painting. There are no messy paint rags, turpentine, solvent, or chemical thinners to cope with. There is nothing dangerous to spill nothing can be permanently stained. Since the detergent is part of the paint formula, brushes and containers can be washed in a jiffy.

The kitchen is a convenient "studio." Spoons and kitchen utensils can double as art supplies. You can use muffin tins to mix the paint and detergent. A cookie sheet or wax paper can serve as a palette. A spatula, the back of a spoon, a serrated knife will create interesting modern effects, and cotton swabs will produce delicate touches.

The painting surface can be any kind of paper. Shirt cardboard makes an excellent surface and is easy to frame. Paper towels, paper bags, or construction paper are also satisfactory. To approximate the texture of canvas, use the wrong side of oilcloth or a piece of rough cloth stretched and pinned over cardboard.

As your first still life, arrange garden flowers or vegetables. As soon as you feel sufficiently deft at applying the paint, you can pre-mix it and move out-doors. Adding a few drops of glycerine to the mixture will keep it moist longer. Should the paints dry out on your palette, just add some more water.

At first, it may help to sketch your design in with pencil. Eventually, you will be able to block out your ideas with diluted colors made by adding more water to the tempera-detergent mixture.

When you are satisfied with the basic composition, start painting your picture with short, heavy strokes. The heavy daubs will build up on your initial sketch just as oils do. In fact, all the techniques of this medium are similar to oil painting.

For fine line work, highlights, or to delineate the objects you are depicting, dilute the paint slightly with water to get a flowing consistency. This permits, loading the brush with paint to produce smooth-flowing, continuous lines while retaining an oil-like quality.

To change the texture of certain areas, or heavily painted elements of the design, just scrape the paint off with a knife before it dries.

Once the painting satisfies you, here's how to preserve it. Allow it to dry about 24 hours, longer if the climate is humid. Then cover the entire picture with a clear shellac, using a soft-haired brush.

Shellac, thinned with denatured alcohol is best, giving your painting two thin coats rather than one heavy one. Let the first coat dry for about four hours before applying the second. This will give the picture an oil-painting finish and protect the colors - Tempted to try it? It's fun, easy, and rewarding. And it's an activity which the entire family can enjoy, in or out of doors, without mess, expense or bother. There may be an undiscovered Rembrandt in your home Mix tempera with detergent and find out!
