Health Officer Closes Schools

Schools Close Down Here As Epidemic Hits 16 per cent of Students

County Health Officer Dr. Gordon Gregg, ordered all Spearman Schools closed, Wednesday, an approximately 200 students absent because of a flu virus. Local Doctors have been working frantically to head-off the epidemic, but with 14% of the students sick Monday, and 16% sick by Wednesday, officials wisely decided to close down the large Spearman schools, to help stop the spread of the virus.

A record number of church revivals which began Monday night in Spearman, also have shut down, in order to prevent any large gathering of people.

All Spearman school activities have also been suspended, and it is assumed that the schools will resume Monday, unless the epidemic continues to worsen.

PS LOWERS Electric Rate

Community Public Service Company offered the Spearman City Council on March 24, 1966 a voluntary reduction in electric rates ranging 7.4 percent for residential customers and 9.5 percent commercial users of electricity in the Panhandle area served by the company.

The proposal was approved by Council.

Charles Gilliam, manager for Community Public Service, presented the proposal and stated that a reduction in purchased power costs from the company's plan has allowed Community to make the reduction to Spearman customers.

Residents of Spearman will realize the savings on their electric bills under the new rate statements prepared on and after April 1.

The rate reduction not only benefit individual citizens Spearman, but also the City Spearman. The electric utility company will make adjustments street lighting and water pumps in the city to effect reduction of approximately \$60 annually to the city government.

The Spearman City Council has authorized a survey to determine the possibilities of additional low-cost government housing units.

There are 20 units in operation east of the city with a local board governing administrative matters.

"We authorized a survey to determine the justification of 20 to 40 more units," Mayor R. E. Vaughn stated. A government team from Fort Worth will make the survey.

Vaughn said the additional units would not necessarily be built in the same area where the present units are.

The Mayor said he believed there is a need for additional housing because of the increase in population.

Four Civil War veterans grave markers are ready for erection and a fifth one is on order.

These Civil War veterans who served with the Confederate States Army are:

- Wm. A. Burran from Georgia 1839-1930
- Wm. T. Bowling Tennessee 1849-1913
- C. C. Hancock, 1st Lt. with Tennessee Cavalry 1840-1915
- Henry Clay Gibner, Alabama Cavalry 1847-1915
- B. P. Ward, Born in Virginia September 4, Died 1912.

Pipe Installed At Gulf Wildcat

Four and one-half inch production pipe has been cemented to 7112 feet at the Gulf Oil No. 1 McClellan, a wildcat drilled to a total depth of 7590 feet.

While drilling, operator tested the Upper Morrow at an interval 6845-7020 feet. With tool open, one hour test produced 270 feet of slightly gas cut mud and 180 feet of heavy gas cut mud.

Flow pressure increased from 209 to 290 pounds while shut in. Pressures of 1475 and 1759 pounds were recorded.

Location of the prospect is 1220 feet from the north and east lines, section 13, block P, H&GN survey, approximately 3/8 and one half miles north of Gruver in west central Hansford county.

Nearest production is some two and one-half miles east in the Hansford "Gas" field.

An avid recipe collector myself, I am naturally interested in prize winning dishes of any type. This week for your pleasure I am sending out the recipes of the winners of the County 4-H Favorite Food Show.

High point winner from Gruver was Randy Messer. His favorite food was Swiss Steak.

2 lbs round steak
1 cup flour
6 tablespoons shortening
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon pepper
1/2 cup chopped onion
1/2 cup chopped celery
1/4 cup chopped green pepper
1 (no. 2 can) tomatoes
1 cup water

Salt and pepper steak (which has been cut in serving pieces); roll in flour. Brown in hot fat. Brown remaining flour in fat. Add chopped onion, celery, pepper, tomatoes and water. Cover closely. Cook in oven 350 degrees one hour.

Baked Lemon Pudding

5 Tablespoons flour
1 cup sugar
one-eighth teaspoon salt
2 1/2 Tablespoons soft butter
4 eggs, separated
1 Tablespoon grated lemon rind
4 1/2 Tablespoons lemon juice
1 cup milk

TOPPING

1 cup whipping cream
3 Tablespoons sugar
1/2 cup vanilla wafer crumbs

Mix sifted flour, sugar, and salt. Cream butter; Add dry ingredients, mixing well. Beat egg yolks and add to mixture. Add lemon rind, juice and milk; mix. Beat egg whites until stiff and fold in. Pour into buttered 8 x 12 inch baking dish. Set into pan of warm water to bake. Bake uncovered 40 minutes at 350 degrees.

Chill and spread with sweetened whipped cream. Sprinkle crumbs over top. Chill. Cut into squares and serve. Makes 8 servings.

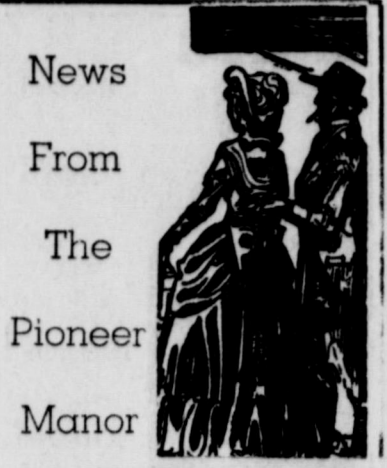

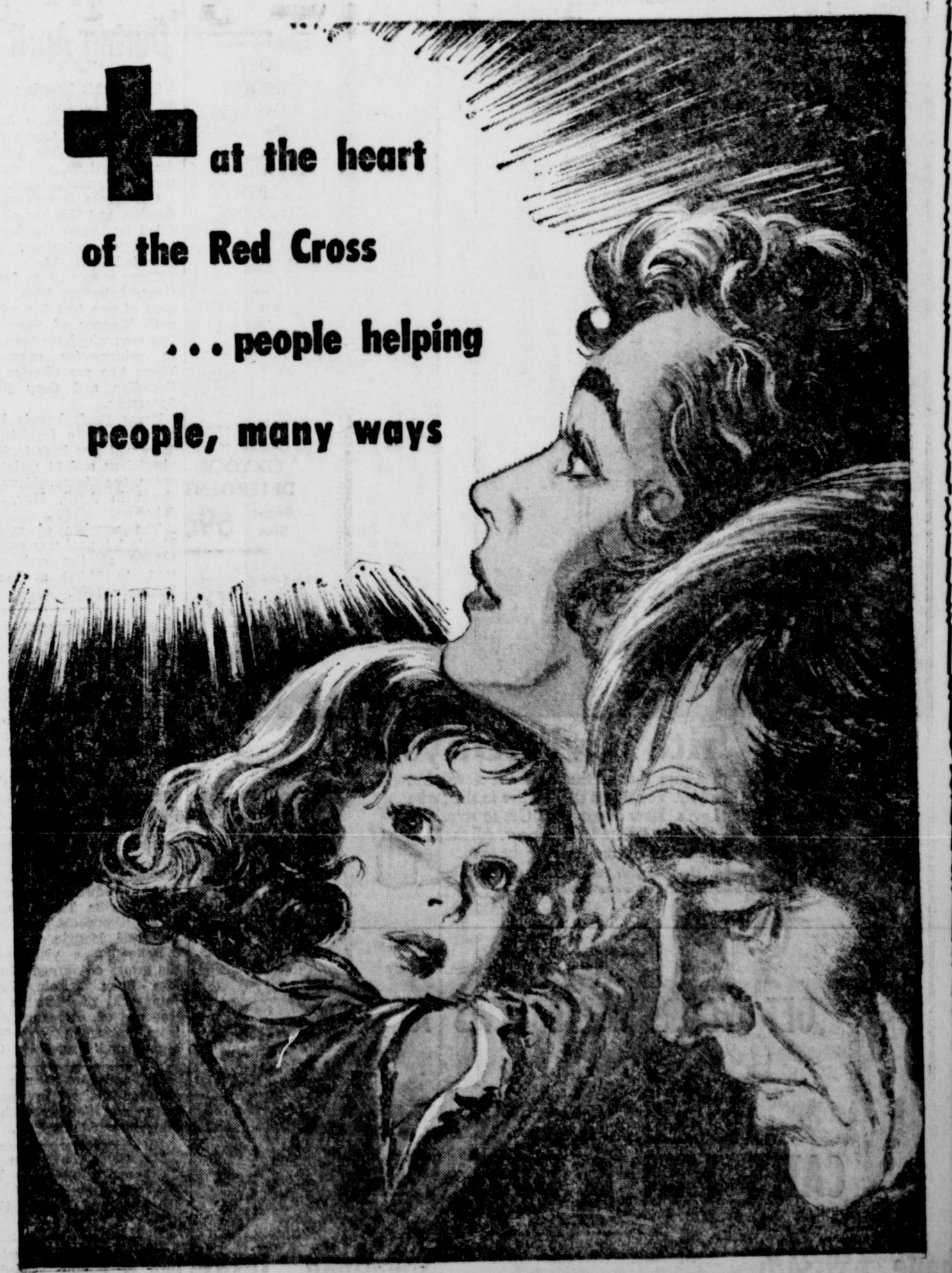

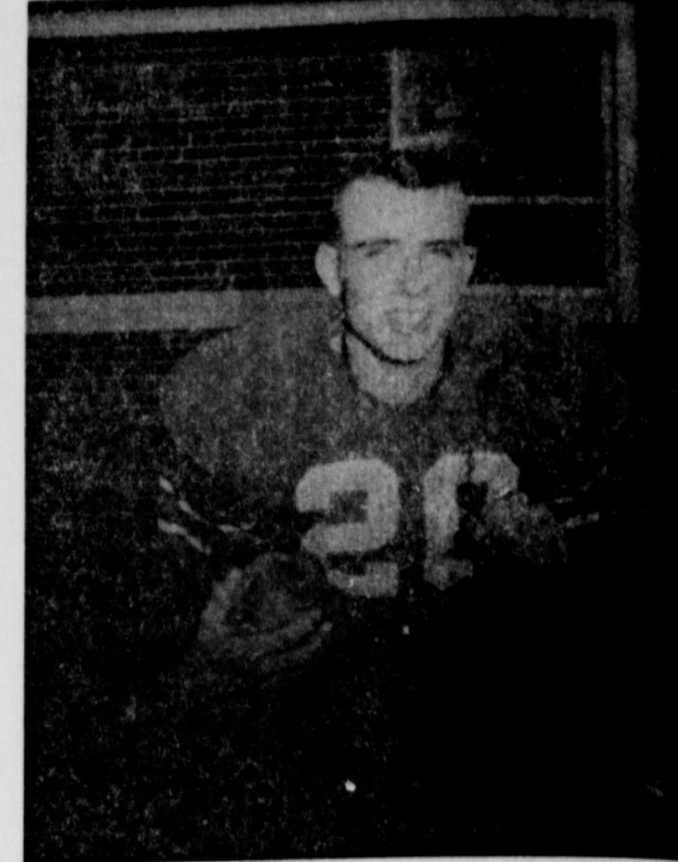

Three men will go for examinations, however. This group consists of one transfer, who is Kenneth Wagner of Spearman; and two men who have been requested to return for re-examinations. These two are Charles Chartz of Canadian and Gary Pracher of Spearman.

Texas Draft boards have been called upon to furnish 979 men. They will also have to furnish 106 physicians and 21 male nurses to enter the Army, Navy and Air Force in April, May, June and July.

The number of men in the State's 1-A pool was reduced from 100,000 at the end of August 1965, to 51,000 at the end of February 1966.

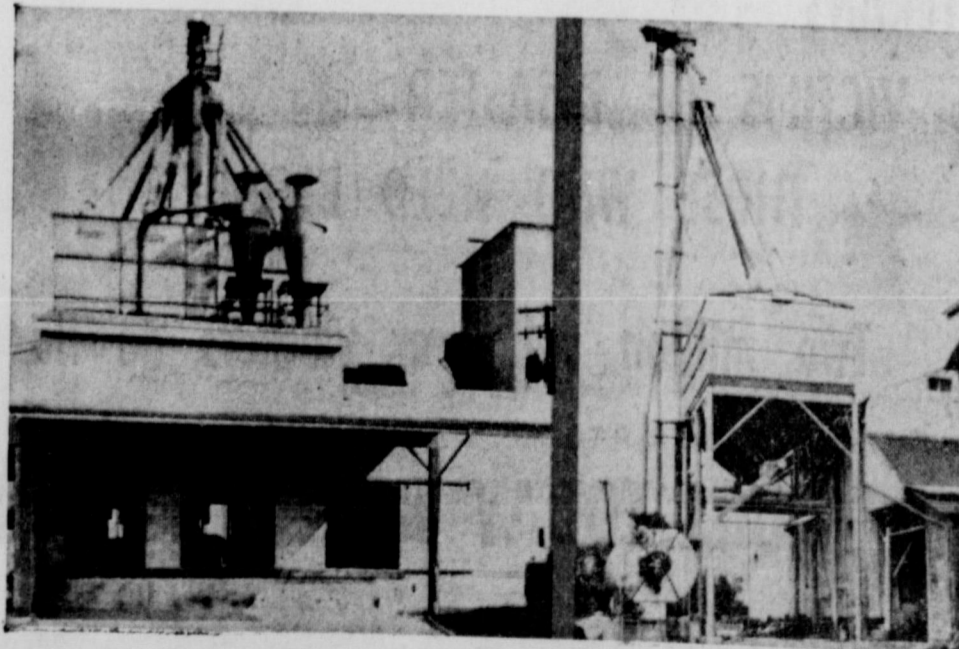

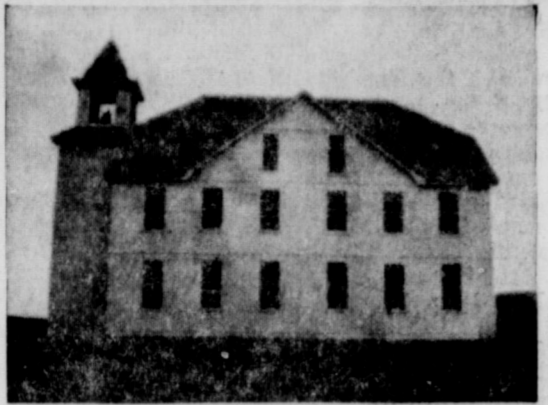

This Review of the first Spearman school is presented to Spearman Reporter readers with a genuine love for the people, the school, and the land of Hansford County.

It has to do with the opening of the school, its first pupils, its triumphs and defeats. Data is taken from the old School Annual, The Wild Rose.

Once a banner hung in the study hall of the old Wooden high school building. It represented a victory (second place) in basketball for the Spearman High School Girls' team. They won it at Dalhart in a Tri-State Tournament.

Today, the area is more proud of the Present Spearman school system, it's scholastic progress, it's athletic prowess just as they were in the beginning.

Congratulations and May the town, the school and the land continue in its growth and development.

southwest in Moore County. Still farther, and across the Canadian River and then some, Amarillo, nursing of the prairie, was the future metropolis of the plains.

A young Chicago "promoter" ventured to the plains, and tried to promote a railroad called the E. O. & W. from Dalhart, via Dumas, Leib (Jarvis), Hansford, Ochiltree and on to Enid, Okla.

After much speculation, money raising and planning, the project failed. Many people lost their money and possibly trust in a future railroad. A few "I told you so" folk, felt lucky that they had kept their money in their jeans.

Hack loads of boosters from Hansford and Ochiltree drove to neighboring towns advertising the proposed venture. One Panhandle real estate dealer made a famous quote that if railroad came through, "land would eventually sell for as much as seventy-five dollars per acre."

A decade later the Santa Fe Railway Company ran a spur from Shattuck, Okla. across the country to terminate at a new townsite to be located several miles east of Old Hansford.

The citizens of the town decided to leave the old for the new, and participated in the lot sale going on at the proposed townsite. Each time they drove out to the new project they were reminded of Mr. Weist and his E. O. & W. railroad by the pine stakes driven along the old right of way he engineered.

The name of Spearman was chosen in honor of a Santa Fe official in Chicago; and J. B. Tower local sign painter, was chosen to make the new signs to be placed at each entrance to the city. The sign was an Indian warrior in breech cloth and with a feather in his hair. He held a spear in his hand. The bold letters beneath him read: Welcome to Spearman!

The First Spearman School. The Old three story wooden structure used as public school system at Hansford had seen better days. The window panes were broken, the belfrey, with its tolling bell, that once gave out peals of welcome to reluctant feet, was about to fall apart. Only two rooms were in use when the movers came to tow the building to its new home.

School started about a month late, Oct 1920, to accommodate the face-lifting and innovations made to take care of the influx of new students.

For the first time in several years, the four rooms on the first floor were utilized. The second, reached by a new stairway, held a study hall, office, and two recitation rooms, and, wonder of wonders a new laboratory our new superintendent's pride and joy! The third floor was utilized, still, by the IOOF. The old wooden rickety stairway on the outside of the building, that the pupils ran up and down (to peer into the large windows), was torn away as a safety hazard.

"Something had truly been added" to the Spearman School System. By the end of the first season, progress was made that brought notice from the surrounding area and soon students from adjoining counties were entering to take advantage of new accreditation acquired by the eager work of W. A. Clark, Jr., Superintendent.

The Spearman High School student body started off the new term with a Halloween party at the High School Building. The rooms were decorated with black cats, witches, and goblins made from gold and black paper. Games were played, but fortune telling was the most popular amusement of the evening.

In February the Seniors and Sophomores decorated the school rooms with their class colors of purple, gold and white, and entered the Juniors and Freshmen.

In March, the Methodist minister's home was the scene of a delightful party. Victrola music was enjoyed and wedding tours on the moonlit lawn were the chief amusements. Mrs. Z. B. Pirtle, the hostess, served dainty refreshments to a happy group of young people.

Howard Neilson gained a nickname for the rest of his life at this party. He arrived early, the first of all the boys, to find only girls present. Astonished, he stammered out, "What is this, a chicken party?" He was always called "Chick" after that.

Miss Hart invited the High School to her ranch home on the Palo Duro, to a weiner roast. It rained and the road was muddy, but all reached their destination. A huge bon fire was built on the creek bank, and hours of happy games were played, and many roasted franks and marshmallows were devoured.

Slumber Parties
Mr. and Mrs. I. F. Dacus owned and operated, the Palo Duro Hotel at Old Hansford, and moved it Spearman. They were the parents of Leo and Henry (Mutt) and the "Dacus Girls", Lena, Della, and Winnie. Their home was always open to the young people. More fun was had in their home than anywhere else, it seemed.

Often Mr. and Mrs. Dacus permitted the girls to have slumber parties on the hotel's third floor. Rows of cots lined the wall and the girls romped like tambours, if they chose; or told ghost stories, or danced to the strains of the victrola, or just plain had fun!

Sometimes amusing incidents occurred, perhaps otherwise too, but one in particular lingers in memory.

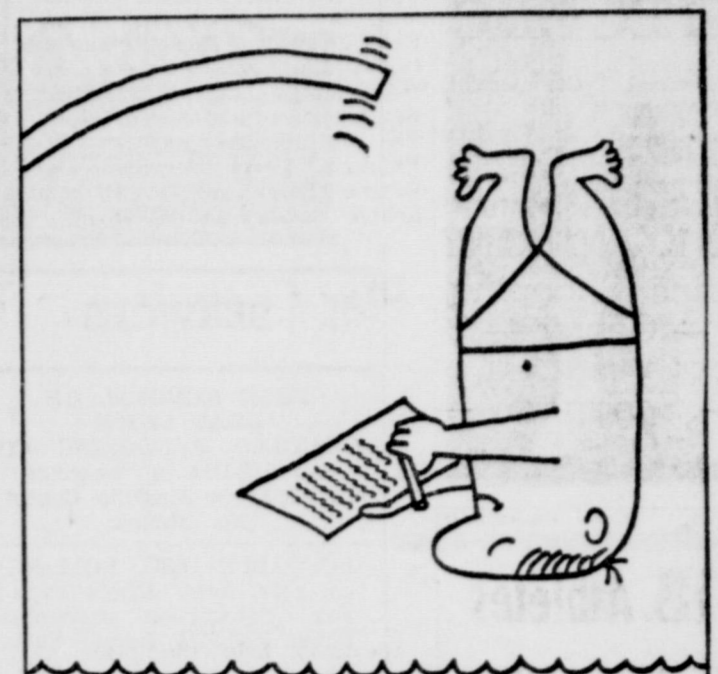
The girls were retiring, laughing noisy and boisterous. Suddenly the room was still as a tomb. Grace and Burnice were saying their prayers silently beside their bed. About the time they got to the "Amen", Mattie Ruth Berner raised up in bed and shouted "Who's dead?" No one answered, and she couldn't see the girls on the opposite side of the bed. 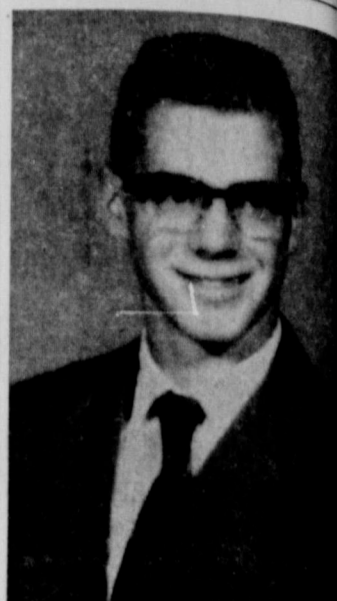
MANTOVANI IN PERSON
