## Wheat Harvesting Gets Underway

Hansford County's wheat crop which has been hanging in the balance the past four months should begin to be harvested within the next few days. Grain moisture estimate harvest should be in full swing by the 15th.

The crop which has suffered both from late freezes and no moisture will be out of the fields

in record time provided that no additional rains fall to slow the ripening process and delay combines.

The first wheat received in Spearman was dumped Monday at Equity Elevators by Carter Crawford. This was dry land wheat. Although no average was available, the grain tested 60 lbs. and had 3 moisture content of 14.56. Crawford was cutting again Tuesday.

Marvin Jones delivered the first barley to be cut in the area on Saturday. The grain tested 11 percent moisture and had a 44 lb. test weight.

E. and B. Grain Company reported test loads of wheat coming into their elevators on Monday. The samples showed 14 moisture with a test weight of 59 lbs. This was dry land wheat, which would begin to be harvested Tuesday of this week.

There is only a smattering of dry land wheat to be harvested. For a major part of the growing season, the wheat was forced to exist on sub-moisture supplies with very little rain in the past five months. In fact these months are the driest for this century and only a little over 2 inches of moisture has been officially recorded since the first of the year.

Farmers feel fortunate that the late freezes did no more damage than they appear to have done, with only isolated instances of heavy damage. The determination of wheat yield will simply have to await the combining.

Irrigated wheat is the one bright spot in the picture, considering the county as a whole. Prospects for the crop which has been receiving regular water is considered good. A farm labor bulletin issued by the Amarillo wheat harvest control office, gave an indication, that yields from irrigated acreage is expected to range from 35-55 bushels. They estimate dry land yields at 8 to 15 bushels per acre.

### J. B. Patterson Rites Pending

J. B. Patterson, 85 year old area resident since 1924, passed away Tuesday afternoon at his farm home south of Spearman.

Mr. Patterson, a well known farmer-stockman came to this area in April of 1924. He was born April 24, 1881 in Wise County. He was a member of the First Methodist Church of Spearman.

His survivors include sons Otis, Meffin and Sam, all of Spearman, and J. B. Jr., of Billings, Mo., a daughter, Mrs. Raymond Sparks of Spearman; a brother Orel of Benjamin, Tex.; a sister, Mrs. Ruth Kenner of Crowell; 13 grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be Thursday (today) at 4 p.m. in the First Methodist church of Spearman. The pastor Rev. Wesley Daniel will officiate, assisted by Rev. Luther Berry. Interment will be at Holt.

Texas Democrats selected conservative Crawford Martin as their choice in the race for attorney general in the only statewide runoff election.

Hansford county voters chose Martin, with 173 ballots cast in his favor, Spears received 22 votes from Hansfordites.

Crawford Martin will face Republican Robert Stewart of Richardson in the November election.

Mr. Fred Dawson is the Driver Education teacher for the summer.

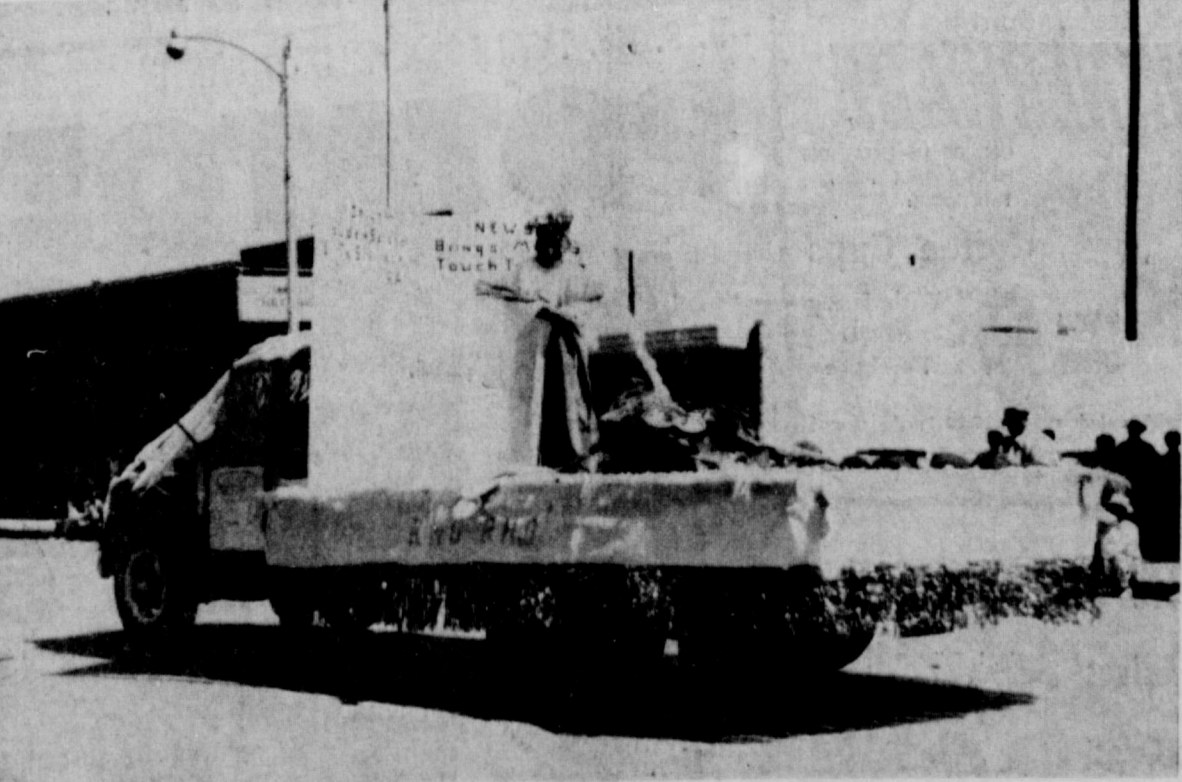

### Hail Storm Reaps Havoc

Late Sunday, evening storm clouds refused to release any moisture to speak of, but dumped plenty of huge hail stones as big as your fist! The storm path started South west of Spearman about 16 miles out near the Bob Hays place, cutting a swath from 2 to 5 miles wide on south east as far as the Marvin Jones farm. This took in the farms of Peyton Gibber, West boys, Guy Fuller, Warren Jeffries, L. M. Womble, Gillispie, K. White, Hester, Campbell, Brock, the entire Holt Community, and many others.

A few places on the north edge of the storm path received a measurable amount of moisture; James Sparks received 20. In most places no moisture fell, not even enough to make tire tracks on dirt roads.

Hail insurance adjusters reported many wheat fields were totaled. Damages ranged from 20 percent to total on everything in the path of the hail storm.

One field of dry land wheat belonging to Mrs. Jenkins in the Holt community was a total loss. Combines were to begin cutting Monday morning, but the hail reaped it for them.

The Holt community received much damage to houses, roof tops, cars and vulnerable equipment.

At the Gas plant near the Holt community, 37 windows were shattered. The hail stones were so large and came down with such force, all the glasses were broken out of pole light meters.

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### June Begins With Rain!

With the rainfall on Tuesday, (the last day of May), which totaled .10 early that morning, it helped keep the month of May from being almost totally dry when added to the .05 recorded on May 14. But the rainfall recorded for May shows it to be the driest in many a year.

The 86 year average moisture for the first five months of the year totals just over 7 inches. This year there has been a total of 2.25 inches recorded which gives an indication of how dry it has been. On June 1, weather recorder Mrs. H. P. Cates measured .10 and on June 2 another .61, bringing the total to 2.25 for 1966.

Last week's rains were spotted, but beneficial to parched pastures and on row crop land even though the wheat is past the stage when rain will do much for it.

May set another sort of record too, with late cold weather and late freezes.
