ARTS AND CRAFTS GUILD

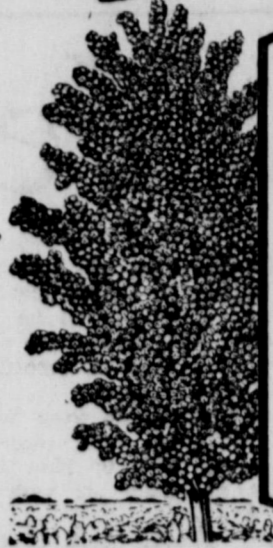
Mrs. J. E. Wombie was hostess to the Arts and Crafts Guild in her home Friday May 20.
