

Wheat Crop Beginning To Suffer: More Moisture Needed To Insure Crop!

Although the Amarillo weather bureau recorded the dryest first three months since the "dirtythirties", it is not so for Hansford County. We are not that dry

However in going over weather charts for as far back at 1943, we note that when the first three months start out dry, the year usually wound up mighty wet! In a few instances this was not so, but the average figured this

Local weather observer. Mrs. H. P. Cates shows an official 1.20 moisture for January, February and March of this year. In 1963 the first quarter measured only .61 and the year ended with 13-71 inches total. In 1962 the first quarter measured .80. This is the year when three months records are not recorded so the year totaled with 7 inches only.

1961 January recorded .6 with February only .44 but in March we came up with a whopping 3.32 inches. The year ended with 22.11 inches.

In 1955 the first quarter of the year measured only .27 with a total of 15.87 for the year. 1950 shows .60 for the first 3 months with a yearly total of 36.38. In 1943 we received .38 the first 3 months with 33.27 for the year. The first quarter of 1964 mea-







GUEST EDITORIAL

The electoral college is in direct conflict with the "one man one vote" principle. The voter is far removed from the process of nominating a President. In only a third of the states are the delegates to the electoral college chosen directly by the voters. In the remaining states the deleare chosen at party conventions or by

committeees. Starting in the elections of Presidents and Vice Presidents have beer. fought on national party lines. In fact, the presidential electors meet only in their respective states and send their pre-ordained decision in writing to Washington.

There has been one lonely voice raised in a call for the abolishment of the electoral college. Sen. Margaret Chase Smith (R., Maine) has proposed the direct popular election of the President. If the principle of "one man one vote" is to be valid, the electoral method should be overturned. The late Robert A. Taft voiced a call for a direct popular vote. More than 15 years ago Sen Taft said, "The theory that we ought to go to a system of a national majority and a direct popular vote is perfectly sound.'

No office is less sought or more obscure than that of the office of presidential elector. Most often it is rewarded to an eminent figure as a cheap honour. Its only importance, a negative one, is that the "winner take all" system increases the chances of a reversal of a popular vote


The number of electors provided each state is equal to the number of the Representatives & Senators to which the state is entitled. Therefore, each state is entitled to at least three electors. The resulting over-representation of the rural areas is not justifiable, but is not perhaps too serious. What is serious is the syschosen by the voters of the state in one general election and the winers take all the seats. As D. W. Brogan points out: "It could happen that a President might be


