Searching For Large Pumpkin And Sunflower

The sunflower competition which is a regional event, offers a \$10 first prize, with a \$5 award for the second largest entry.

Going-Away Fellowship

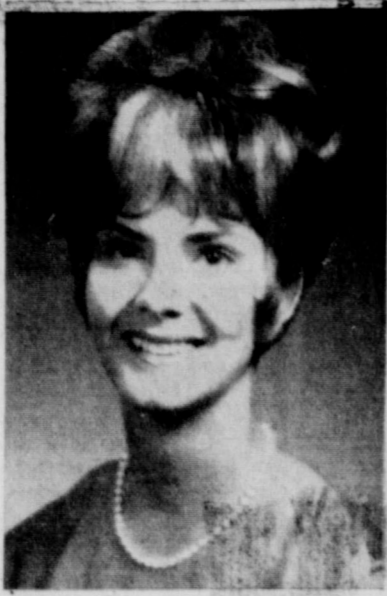

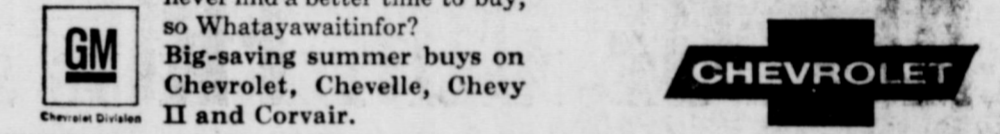
