## Tab Womble Killed Thurs. In Car Wreck

Funeral services for William Womble (Tab) Womble, 64, of Fritch, were conducted Sunday February 20 at 2:30 in the Pringle High School auditorium.

The Rev. Dorley Heron, pastor of the First Christian Church of Fritch officiated. Burial was in Leith cemetery at Pringle.

Womble a retired farmer, was killed late Thursday when his car went out of control near Truth or Consequences, N. M. and overturned three times. Investigating officers said Womble was traveling south and apparently passed a car, pulled back to his side of the road and lost control when he hit the gravel shoulder. He said the victim was thrown from the car and appeared to have been instantly killed.

Among the first motorists to arrive at the scene was his brother, Moody Womble of Morse who failed to recognize his brother's new car and drove on to Truth or Consequences. He was notified of the death as soon as he arrived at his destination.

Another brother, A. C. Womble of Morse, had checked out of a motel in Truth or Consequences and was en route home.

Tab Womble, who came to Hutchinson County in 1902 with his parents, had just retired from farming about 2 years ago and had built a lovely new home in Fritch. He was a director of the Fritch Bank. His wife was visiting a daughter in Colorado at the time of the accident.

Survivors include his wife Anna; the home, daughters: Mrs. Cele McNulty, Mrs. Millie Ruth Wagoner & Mrs. Dorothy Hood Amarillo, and Mrs. Marie Glover of Bakersfield, Calif. Four brothers: D. M. R. C. and A. C. Womble all of Morse and R. E. Womble of Stinnett; Sisters: Mrs. Betty Lackey of Spearman, Mrs. L. Board of Morse, Mrs. Ralph Forrester of Dalhart and Mrs. Ben Foster of Stinnett. 11 grand children and two great-grandchildren also survive.

## Young Gruver Man Killed In Car Accident Sat.

George Warren Davis, 29 of Gruver was killed about 1 a. m. Saturday, February 19 when his automobile failed to negotiate a curve as it traveled East on Farm to Market 289 about 18 miles west of Gruver.

Investigating officials said the Davis vehicle apparently struck a guard post. Davis was thrown from the vehicle and it rolled over him. He was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Marshall of Stratford.

Davis was born June 6, 1936 the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Davis of Gruver. He lived in Gruver all his life. In January of 1960 he married the former Miss Mary Farley from Oklahoma. They had three children. A veteran of the Korean war, he was a farmer, and a member of the Gruver Methodist Church.

Funeral services were conducted at 2 p. m. Monday in the Gruver Methodist church by the Rev. Norman Grigsby, pastor & Father James Guszinski of the Spearman Sacred Heart Catholic church. Burial was in the Gruver Cemetery.

Survivors include his wife: Mrs. Mary Davis; two daughters: Eva Louise, age 4, and Margaret Yvette, age 1, and a son, Mathew William age 2, all of the home. Two sisters Mrs. Vera May Hays of Spearman; 2 brothers: C. A. Davis, Jr., of Gruver and James P. Davis of Bushland, and his parents Mr. & Mrs. C. A. Davis of Gruver.

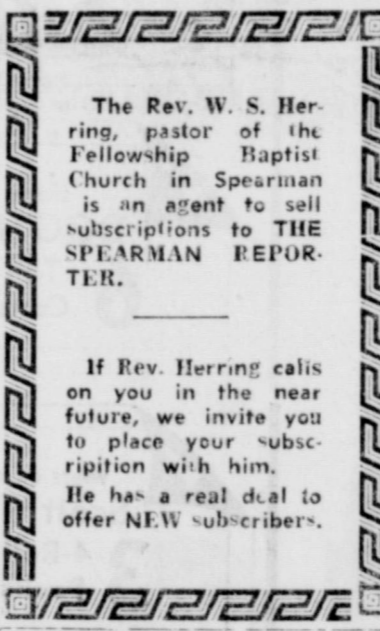
If enough traffic is registered through the intersection by the Highway department, according to their set standard, perhaps this problem can be solved.

**The Democratic Discourse  
 The Free Vote Is A Basic Right**

**GUEST EDITORIAL**  
 Voting is a basic right guaranteed by the Constitution of the United States. The payment of a poll tax as a precondition to voting is an unjustified restriction of that right. The poll tax is equivalent to a penalty imposed upon those who exercise their fundamental right at the poll.

A three-judge federal court has ruled Texas 64-year old poll tax voting requirement to be unconstitutional. The decision of the court prohibits the payment of the tax as a prerequisite to voting in any election in the State of Texas, whether it be general, special or primary, federal, state or local.

The U. S. Supreme Court ultimately must be the one to say whether the Austin court was right or wrong in its decision. The ruling of the Supreme Court on the constitutionality or unconstitutionality of the poll tax will affect Virginia, Arkansas and Mississippi, also. In the remaining states of the Union registration methods other than poll tax requirement protect the purity of the ballot.

Legislators both in the Texas House of Representatives and in the Texas Senate now are working to set up permanent voter registration procedures. Two schools of thought have solidified as to the methods of future registration. One school of thought proposes no change in methods other than in the removal of the \$1.75 (in some counties \$1.50) tax and, therefore, NO BETTERMENT.

The other school wishes to enact legislation making voter registration not only free but more

democratic and more continuing. Under a permanent registration system, such as the second group of legislators proposes, voters would renew their registration automatically by voting in one election each year. This system is the one that should be enacted.

A voter would register once, then could continue to be a qualified voter just by voting once every year. The bill for the so called "permanent" system provides for registration any time up to 30 days before the election. A Jan. 31 deadline discourages heavy voter registration because political interest is low at that time of the year.

Since our government cannot be OF all, though it may be FOR all, it is far better for our government to be OF as many as possible. A permanent voter registration system would facilitate the operation of the majority will.

**WHAT'S GOING TO HAPPEN?**  
 Attorney General Waggoner Carr today filed with Supreme Court Justice Hugo Black the State of Texas' application for a stay order from the judgment rendered by a three-judge Federal court which held the State's poll tax laws unconstitutional.

The decision of the special Austin court ruled that the State's constitutional and statutory provisions which require a person to pay the poll tax as a precondition to voting were unconstitutional effective immediately.

In asking Justice Black to delay the effect of the court's order, Carr pointed out that various special elections (local, school district, city and county bond elections, local option elections) have already been called for dates in February and March of this year.

"It is utterly impossible under any circumstances to compile new registration lists in time for these elections" Carr's application stated.

"On the first Tuesday in April, most of the cities and towns in the State will hold elections for the election of their officers" the application continued.

Referring to the present special session of the Texas Legislature, called by Governor Connally to pass a new voter registration bill, Carr said "Even with emergency legislation to become effective immediately (requiring a two-thirds vote of both houses) it would be difficult at best to complete the process of registration and preparation of registration lists in time for these elections, and at worst it might prove to be impossible. . . a truly chaotic condition will result should the decision of the District Court take effect immediately."

Carr's application also informed Black that the State intended to appeal the Austin court decision to the United States Supreme Court. He cited additional reasons why the stay should be granted.

(1) That the only voter registration system in the State of Texas for voting in state and local elections is based on receipts issued upon payment of the poll tax by persons liable therefore & on certificates of exemption iss-

ued to persons not subject to the poll tax. Until a new registration system could be put into operation, any elections held in the state would have to be conducted without proper voter registration lists, and the opportunities for illegal and fraudulent voting, such as multiple voting by the same voter, would be increased beyond compare.

(2) That the Supreme Court of the United States has never held that a requirement for payment of a poll tax for voting in state and local elections contravenes any provisions of the United States Constitution, and on four prior occasions the court has rejected contentions that this requirement violates the Constitution.

(3) That previous decisions of the Supreme Court of the United States have held that the privilege to vote in any state is not one of the basic rights granted by the Federal Constitution.

(4) That decisions which the Supreme Court will render in two Virginia cases pending before the Court might decide the Texas case.

The Attorney General requested that a hearing be granted on the application no later than February 21, 1966.
