# City Will Ask Highway Dept · For New Survey

In the regular monthly meeting of City officials Monday night of this week, the main topic of discussion was the age-old problem of congested traffic at the intersection of highways 15 and 281. This has been a troublesome problem for traffic for many years, and the council decided Monday night to ask the State for another survey. The State Department, when contacted, will conduct the survey in the very near future.

This is the intersection of Kenneth Avenue, Archer Street, Highway 15 to Borger and Perryton, and Highway 281 to Gruver.

Not only is the intersection always heavy with through-traffic but your vision is obstructed to the point that you must be half-way into the traffic lanes before you can see an on-coming car. Something needs to be done to correct the drving hazard at this point, and about the only answer would be a traffic light. If enough traffic is registered through the intersection by the Highway department, according to their set standard, perhaps this problem can be solved.
