Mr. Everett E. Vanderburg of Hansford County, Texas has been appointed to the three man Hansford-Hutchinson County Farmers Home Administration Committee it has been announced today by Mr. Robert J. Holloway, County Supervisor. The appointment

is for a three year term beg-inning July 1, 1967. Mr. Vanderburg succeeds Mr. Ray Phelps and will join the other two members of the committee who are Roy Thomas of Gruver, Texas and Fred Co oper of Gruver, Texas. The three member committee serves in an advisory capacity to the County Supervisor and makes determinations as to el igibility for loan advances for the Agency. They are also frequently called upon by the County Supervisor to render assistance in the servicing of loans and the development of


other community services. The Farmers Home Administration does not compete with private lenders in the field of agricultural credit; however, they supplement such sources of credit and make loans on a long-range basis for the development farms and ranches as well as improvement of community facilities, and provide housing for the rural residents. One of the most important Programs is the family-type loan to young farmers in ever-increasing numbers throughout the State. Recent authorizations have been given the Agency by Congress to make loans for recreation facilities for rural residents as well as financing multiple housing for senior citizes and labor housing associations. Another of the more extensive loan

programs includes that of making loans for small towns and communities for the establishment or improvement of water systems. Four counties are serviced by

Year's Rainfall Stands Near Normal Thru July

Rainfall in the Spearman area, boosted greatly by good rains in June and July, is now standing at 15.18 inches as of Tuesday August 1st. Monday night's rain (measured and recorded on August 1 official weather chart) measured 1.26 at the weather guage in the H. P. Cates yard. Although we citizens will call this part of July rainfall, it will be recorded for Aug-ust since the guage is read the next morning if moisture falls after 4 p.m. Until the rains started in June, the total for the first 5 months of the year was only 2.58.

June rainfall totaled 4.08 and July 5.96 (counting Monday rainfall.) Rains came in time to plant

milo, but then more rain came to wash out the seed and required replanting. Some farmers have planted more than one milo crop! However there are thousands of acres of milo in the gr-



In Hansford county, an average yield is established at 25.1 bushels per acre, so the \$1.36 per bushel is paid on 35 per cent of this.

This means that the average producer on a section of wheat land with full allotment would get about \$5,000 in certificate payments, Vanderburg said.

There is a feed grain diveron payment program which will affect local farmers but these payments will not be made until after August 28.


Gilley was hired as C of C manager here July 5. While in Houston he visited with two former Spearman citizens: Jerry Frye and Carl

Are you having trouble car-ing for your Durable Press or Wash and Wear garments? Dating back to the introduction of the truly synthetic fiber, nylon, women dis-covered often by the trial and error method, that new practices in care was required New with durable press joining wash-and wear in the easy care field, the consumer might well review the care techiques that will give her the ultimate in performance. "Dacron" Polyester is the le-

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ading synthetic fiber on the market. Most synthtics require the same care. Here are some suggestions for laundering synthetics.

First, pretreat the stains; deep soil lines on the collar and cuffs of shirts will be more easily removed by thoroughly ru-bbing areas with full-strength heavy-duty liquid detergent. or a paste of detergent and water. Treat stains as soon as possible and allow time for

de tergent to loosen the soil. Stubborn, greasy wax or oil base stains may yield only if treated with a degreaser or dry cleaner solvent before treating with a concentrated detergent.

When laundering wash and wear or durable press items, this insures a cleaner wash and avoids setting wash wrinkles.

Generally, hot water removes soil more efficiently than cool or cold water.

Good wrinkle-free perform. ance can be achieved with line drying of wash and wear garments; however, for ultimate in easy care neatness, it is recommended that automatic home washing be followed by tumble drying. With good laundry care, ga-

rments and home furnishings of dacron polyester will remain bright and clean. However, when improper washing practices are used, poor re-sults will follow. This may

appear as an over-all yellow ing or graving of white goods or dulling colors. Some of the factors causing yellowing or graying are: in-sufficient amount of soap or detergent; hard water; washing at too low a temperature without a special cold-water detergent; chlorine bleach-


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



COUNTY AGENT'S REPORT by Robert Adamson

NEW CROP DISEASE SUSPECT ED ON HIGH PLAINS

A disease new to the West Texas area is suspected in some corn and grain sorghum fields. The invader is belived to be maize dwarf mosaic vi-rus (MDMV), says Dr. Robert W. Berry, Extension plant pa-thologist at Texas A&M Univ-ersity's South Plains Research and Extension Center.

Fields heavily infected with the suspected virus have been found in the Hereford area, Deaf Smith County, as well as in parts of Parmer, Castro, Dallam, Moore, Donley, Ha-le, Crosby and Floyd Countles.

Infected plants show a mottled mosaic pattern of light and dark green on the new leaves as they emerge from the whorl, explains Berry. In grain sorghum, infected plants will turn bright red or reddish-brown in cool weather. In corn, however, the mottling is primarily brown. Grain does not develop nor-

mally in crops infected by MDMV. On corn only a few grains may form on the cob while grain sorghum heads may be practically sterile. This particular virus was first uncovered in South Central Texas last year in sweet corn

and losses ranged from 10 to 50 per cent. MDMV overwinters in the rhizomes of Johnson grass and is transmitted by aphids. As the tender shoots of this grass emerge in the spring, the ap-hids begin feeding, acquire the virus and move to suscep-

tible crops where they trans-mit the disease. There appear to be some varietal differences but all varieties examined in the area are seemingly susceptible to the suspected virus.

At this time there are no control practices which will be of benefit to susceptible crops, Many specimens of infected plants have been submitted to Dr. Robert W. Toler, viriol-ogist with the Department of Plant Sciences at Texas A&M

for positive identification of the disease, FEDERAL CROP INSURANCE Hansford County wheat farmers who are eligible for Feder-

al Crop Insurance Corpora tion's program, have been gi-ven a limited amount of time to make application for 1968 and succeeding crop years. The federally operated pro-gram's field representatives were pulled out of a number of counties earlier in the year when the drouth risk became extreme in order to protect farmers already participating in the program.

In an announcement from Ben A. Jordan, state director of the FCIC, there was also good news for the irrigated wheat farmers in Carson, Dallam, Hansford, Moore, and Sherman Counties and for dryland wheat farmers in Fannin County. These farmers have recently been made eligible for the crop insurance for the

coming year. In addition, Jordan said that more land in Grayson and Collin Counties has been classified for wheat insurance for 1968 following a survey of the two counties.

Farmers interested in details about the program should co-ntact their nearest FCIC field office or the state office in the USDA Building, College Station, Texas 77840.

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




