R. L. McClellan Badly Injured In Collision

R. L. McClellan, popular young business man of Spearman remains in intensive care unit at Lubbock Hospital this week suffering from injuries he received in a car crash Saturday evening.

L. and his family were in Lubbock to attend a board of directors meeting for the Texas Hardware and Implement Association. The president of this association is manager of the R. L. McClellan and Sons Impl. Company of Spearman.

The accident occurred at 39th and Knoxville street in Lubbock intersection, which has no yield signs was entered by the McClellan vehicle according to investigating officers. The 19 year old Lubbock girl was driving the car which rammed McClellan's vehicle on the driver's side. The impact knocked McClellan some 90 yards when he hit another vehicle parked in a private yard at a residence. McClellan's small daughter Jean, who was riding with him, was thrown into the floor and injured. Observers stated that R. L. had his seat belt fastened the accident would probably have been fatal to him. The side of the car was completely demolished.

Both drivers were rushed to Lubbock hospital where R. L. was immediately taken to surgery. Doctors broken him for 8 crucial and broken ribs, ruptured spleen & other internal injuries. The driver of the other car was treated for facial lacerations and abrasions.

Attending physicians give "satisfactory" reports on his progress. They may release him from ICU sometime Wednesday or Thursday, barring complications.

PHILLIPS It was obvious early in the game that we were not mentally ready for Phillips. Our pass defense was pitiful. Our 2 safety men played very poorly as the films show they were not paying any attention to their keys. They seldom rotated to their zone and when they did it was in slow motion and without motivation. The two quick ones hurt us bad as it made things an uphill fight all the way after that. It is my opinion that we have been concentrating so much on developing an offensive punch that we let our defensive secondary get "stale" on us. Needless to say there will be a lot of work on pass defense this week.

Must Register For 1967 Vote

The poll tax requirement for voting was held invalid in February of this year by a three judge federal court. It based its ruling on the due process clause of the Federal Constitution. The court said this requirement was equivalent to a charge or penalty imposed on the exercise of a fundamental right, & it indicated that any charge for registration would be illegal. The United States Supreme Court affirmed the decision.

Immediately following the three judge decision the State Legislature was called into special session and it adopted a new registration act. The major change in the law was that registration with the County Clerk should be without charge.

Under the law passed in February voters will register annually, as they have previously done, during the period of October 1 through January 31. A temporary registration was allowed in March 1966, but this was a one-time provision only.

You do not have to pay a poll tax now, but you must register. The time to do this is now. To be eligible to vote in 1967 elections, you must go by the County Tax Office and register. Deadline date is January 31.

Everyone from the age of 21 years through 60 must register in order to vote. If you are over 60, you are exempt.

Although no State or National elections of importance are on the agenda now, there will be constitutional amendments, local bond elections school board, city aldermen etc. coming up in 1967, so it is of utmost importance that you register before January 31.

Get Smart About Fire Prevention

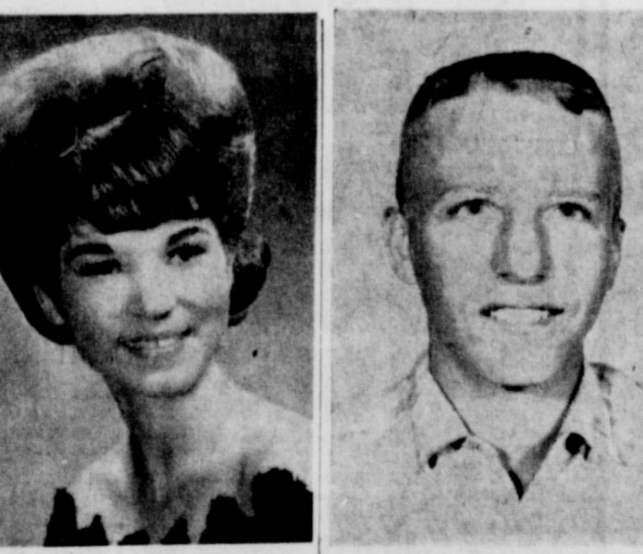

With a parent, they check at home for faulty electric cords, overloaded electric outlets, paint-soaked rags in the cellar and they pledge never to play with matches.

Thriving Greenhouse Business Called For Large Expansion

One of Spearman's most thriving industries has had to expand. This is Wilcox Flowers and Greenhouse. Mr. and Mrs. Donald Wilcox have had their greenhouse in the back yard at their home at 911 S. Heneys for the past several years, and had expanded as much as they could there. This week they moved into new quarters out on the Gruver highway where they will have an additional 100 x 25 feet of growing space for hot house plants. Mrs. Wilcox employs 3 women to help her in the bedding and potting of seedlings. Of course the spring season is the busiest time of the year, but at the present she has some 2,000 Foinsetta plants in process to be delivered to florists during the Christmas season. The past spring she delivered 6,000 pony plants, 20,000 petunia plants and over 7,000 assorted flower plants. She estimates that customers purchased around 40,000 pepper and tomato plants. Mrs. Wilcox services florists and super markets on a weekly schedule throughout this part of Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, New Mexico, Colorado and Nebraska. She stocks her station bus once a week for these deliveries, and sometimes twice. The greenhouse at her home is 100 x 25, and along with the new one just completed, with double the space for the usual bedding plants and foliage, flowers and vegetables. At present she is in the process of starting tomato plants for a Morse customer who plans to grow them the year-round. Mrs. Wilcox invites the public to come by their new business and pay them a visit.

Jerry Mitts, Jimmy Beeson, Roy McBride and Eddie Gale Martin left Spearman Monday afternoon for induction into the Armed Services. The Spearman boys reported to Amarillo and were inducted Tuesday. It was thought they would probably report to Fort Bliss, El Paso Texas for their eight weeks of boot training.

Record County Tax Roll Is Now In Mail

Hansford County Commissioners have approved a record tax roll according to Tax Assessor-Collator, J. B. Cooke. The total bill, including the state tax, will be \$531,729.99. Major parts of the issue are the county property tax of \$316,742.67 based on a valuation of \$31,674,267, and the state bill of \$145,987.32 assessed on a value of \$30,231,885. Other items are a \$90,696.52 special road tax with an additional \$16,466.16 in Precinct 2. Also included is a \$15,735.70 bill for the North Plains Water District. The state rate has been increased this year from 42 cents per \$100 valuation to 47 cents with the extra portion going to the fund for state colleges and universities. The county rate remains \$1.35 which makes the total \$1.82. The rate in Precinct 2 is 20 cents higher to pay for the special road bond sinking fund. Cooke said that his office had the statements in the mail October 1st.

Brave Soldier Commemorated

In commemoration of a brave soldier, Brig. Gen. Charles T. Horner presented awards to the widow, Mrs. Fay Darnell Croley in ceremonies held recently at Grand Junction, Colorado. "For Gallantry in action..." Behind the simple phrase lay a story of desperate courage which cost the life of Platoon Sgt. James Robert Croley, 33, the brother of Mrs. John Brown of Spearman. Brig. Gen. Charles Horner presented his widow the medal for gallantry in action, the Purple Heart and a statuette of an infantryman modeled after a lifesize statue at Fort Benning, Ga. The statuette and a plaque were awarded for a different reason. They designed Croley as the outstanding non-commissioned officer in the 1st Battalion 25th Infantry, for the fourth quarter of fiscal year 1966, & the non-commissioned officer of the year for 1965-66. Croley had been chosen for these awards only a few days before his death. The Silver Star citation told of a patrol led by Croley which surprised several Viet Cong in a small trench network near the village of Phu Loi. The VC scrambled for weapons, but Croley, acting on an instantaneous decision, fired first Elements of his platoon supported him with flanking fire. Charging thru dense undergrowth under fire, Croley seized the object & routed the enemy. In the trench he found the body of one VC and bloody tracks of others who had fled. But Croley died next day of his wounds. (July 19, 1966) "As a result of his quick thinking and courageous leadership, the Viet Cong emplacement was singlehandedly overtaken and destroyed. His unquestioned valor in close combat against superior hostile forces is in keeping with the finest tradition of the military service and reflects great credit on himself and the 25th Division and the U. S. Army," the citation reads. Sitting among the small group of relatives who were spectators, was Croley's mother, Mrs. J. E. Evans, and his younger brother Gene Croley, of Amarillo. Croley was a dedicated career soldier, said his mother. At Amarillo High school he was a letterman on the Golden State football team, but the attraction of the Marine Corps was greater. He quit school at not-quite 17 to join. For the widow and her four children the medals and the statuette will become the symbols of a treasured memory.

45 Called For Army Physicals

Selective Service Board 99 has been instructed to send 45 men for physical examinations on October 23. This is the highest number to be sent for physicals in some time. More than 45 will be sent, 47 in fact, two being sent back to be re-examined. These boys are considered "single" which includes those married after the deadline set several months ago by the defense department. State draft boards will be called upon to furnish 2,329 Texas men for the armed forces in November. This compares with the 2,845 October quota which was the highest since April of 1953.
