



#### Farm Bureau **Members Total** Over 100,000

Final 1966 membership tabulation showed the Texas Farm Bureau increased its membership by 5,722 over last year, according to Wayne Little organization director. Oct. 31 is the end of the TFB's membership

Total 1966 membership in the TFB is 100.926 -- first time ever for the 33-year-old farm organization to The Texas Farm Bureau, fifteen times larger than the next biggest farm organization in the state, has shown an increase in members each year for the past 14 years.

'Considering the continuing decline in number of farmers and ranchers, our gain this year is evidence that most farmers and ranchers in Texas endorse the Farm Bureau's activities in legislation, marketing and personal economic services," Little said

There are 203 organized counties in the Texas Farm Bureau. organization is supported by voluntary dues-paying members. Dues vary by county, but average about \$10-\$12 per year.

The 100,000th member signed up in the IFB this year was a 47year-old dairyman, Oswald Norman of Wills Point, Texas. He was enrolled the last week in October by T. L. Roberts, president of the Van Zandt County Farm Bureau.



First cotton to be delivered to he gin for processing was from the Calaway and Redwine field ear Perryton on Nov. 7th. rs from Hansford, Moore and

Ochiltree counties. Hansford County had 1147 acres of cotton allotment for this year, but many farmers diverted their acreage so only 664 acres were actually planted to cotton.

The crop is producing a very poor yield this year due to the early frost and most farmers are getting just over one bale per acre. One farmer made 16 bales on 11 acres. The cotton harvest is expected
