Received from connections were 6,148 cars, compared with 6,515 for the same week last year. Total cars moved were 30,577, compared with 30,799 for the same time last year. The Santa Fe handled a total of 32,583 cars during the preceding week this year.

# Hemphill County Gets Approval For Dam

One of the first of two counties to receive official approval for a dam under the terms of the Panhandle Water Conservation Authority was Hemphill county, according to a newspaper story printed in the Pampa Daily News. Hemphill county had received approval and \$87,000.00 appropriated for labor and material to construct the dam. The news story stated that Hemphill county officials, who had previously purchased land from Publisher of the

Amorillo News Globe, Gene Howe, and completed a bond issue of \$23,000.00 for land purchase, were dissatisfied that the approval of their project did not include purchase of the land. The article intimated that the project would be held up until the government could approve the purchase of the land. In a telephone conversation with Gene Howe Tuesday, Mr. Howe stated that the land purchased by Hemphill county was land that the News-Globe had

purchased, just as a matter of convenience in order to protect the option. The land is 1,800 acres adjoining the so called "Big Bull Ranch" owned by Mr. Howe. Gene is interested in giving the Panhandle country a place to fish and hunt, and prior to the approval of the government for the large dam, pledged \$15,000.00 for the News-Globe to construct a dam, independent of government aid. However, with the government aid available, the lake can be made much larger than had

been previously planned. As the matter now stands, according to Mr. Howe, the government will be asked to purchase the entire 1,800 acres as part of their water conservation program. Since it is understood that the government purchased some 2,000 acres in Randall county for the construction of the Umberger Dam, the other approved lake project, Plains citizens expect that the land now owned by Hemphill county will be purchased by the Federal Government.

## JOIN Red Cross Drive For Membership Underway

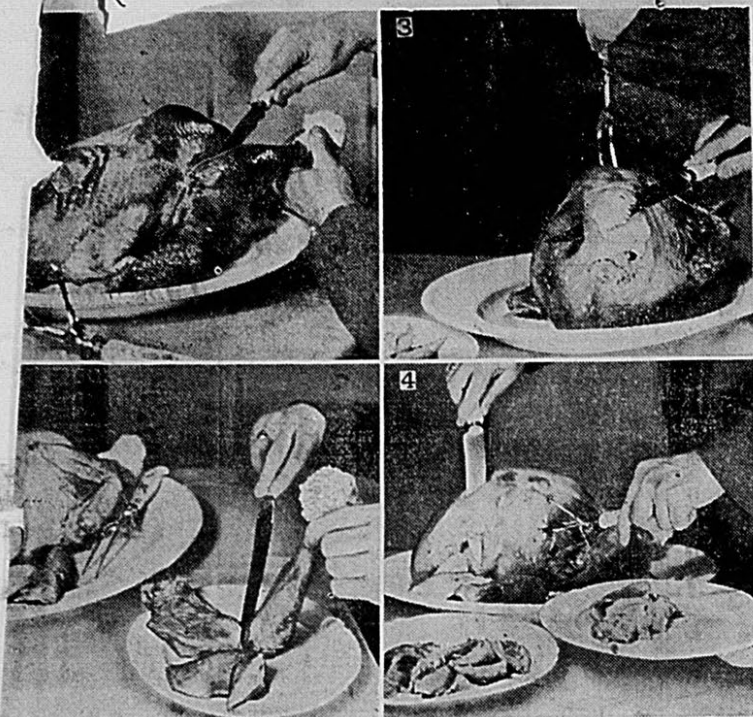

## Is Easy—When You Know How



RE, you can carve the Thanksgiving turkey—the most pleasurable thing in the world. Follow these easy rules and you're sure to be the envy of the guests who are usually seduced by the dire prospect of being whittled by the festive carver themselves. What's more, this simple method will save you time for a few nibbles at the white meat yourself before the first diner arrives. Now howling for more. Make sure the knife is sharp. Advance confidently upon the enemy, carving the side next to your left. Figure shows leg being removed by placing knife between thigh and body, sitting from left to right. Pressing outward with knife and bending

it back with left hand easily separates it from the body. It is rarely necessary to locate the socket and sever the thigh. With leg removed to a service plate, as shown in Fig. 2, the triangular piece of dark meat is cut first from the thigh; then ligaments between thigh and drumstick are cut, just over round bone to the thigh side. Small portions of dark meat are prepared from thigh and drumstick, or latter is left whole. The wing, after being removed, is left on the platter or served, as you prefer. Now for the breast. To avoid damaging the meat with fork holes, insert fork astride keel bone and beyond its point, one tine on each side along the bone. Slice meat down from the keel bone, as shown in Fig. 3, or, starting just above the joint where the wing was removed, slice upward to the keel bone paral-

lel to the breast bone. Note fork is held straight or almost straight up and down. Another position of the fork is shown in Fig. 4. It is inserted in the side through the ribs. Platter is turned at right angles to the carver. White meat is sliced downward away from the keel bone or upward, as described above. The meat service will be made complete by placing two slices of white meat over the dark meat (usually two pieces) and the dressing. By following this procedure an attractive service is assured and the meat is kept as hot as possible. If the carver is being assisted in such a manner it is best to carve white meat as needed for each individual service. Otherwise sufficient slices for all guests may be cut and placed on the platter along the edge in readiness to serve or on a separate plate.

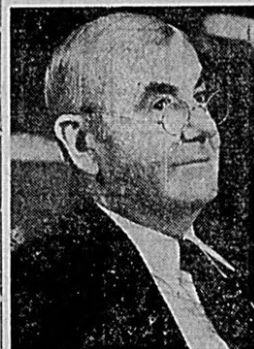

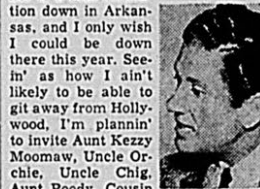

### Try This Stuffing

To each cup of broken stale bread add 1/2 tablespoon chopped fat from the bird. Be sure to have the market man send the fat with the bird. If there is insufficient fat use butter, not substitutes. Add also to each cup: 1 tablespoon chopped onion, 2 teaspoons chopped celery, 1 teaspoon chopped sweet pepper pulp and 1/2 teaspoon minced parsley. To each four cups of this mixture add herbs, sage, thyme and sweet marjoram—2 teaspoons of the first and 1 teaspoon of the other if powdered and a little more if you are so fortunate as to have dried herbs. Also add one teaspoon salt and 1/4 teaspoon pepper. This blend is recommended. Sew up filled cavity, bringing skin together. Stuff small cavity at neck and sew the stuffing in as described.

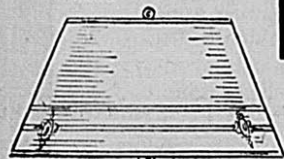

### Washington Was First to Proclaim Thanksgiving Day

### But Thank a Woman for Keeping It Alive.

**ARGUMENT** about the origin of Thanksgiving day in the United States has been going on, for many years. There are several answers, and which of them is correct depends entirely upon the point of view.

We think of Thanksgiving usually as an institution begun by the Pilgrims. Without a doubt it was the Pilgrims who were the first group of American people to cease work to observe a day of thanksgiving.

It was George Washington, as President, who proclaimed the first national Thanksgiving day.

It was Sarah Josepha Hale, editor of Godey's Lady's Book, who fought for many years to have the national holiday revived as a regular annual celebration.

It was President Abraham Lincoln who issued the first national Thanks-

giving proclamation since Jefferson, reviving a practice that has been observed each year ever since by whatever President who happened to be in office.

America's first official national Thanksgiving day occurred on November 29, 1789, or 168 years after Bradford's call upon the Pilgrims to give thanks. President Washington proclaimed it at the request of a joint committee of both houses of congress who beseeched him to

United States a Day of Thanksgiving . . . that we then may unite in rendering unto Him our humble thanks for His kind care and protection of this country previous to its becoming a nation . . . for the favorable interposition of His Providence in the course and conclusion of the late war; for the great degree of tranquillity, union and plenty which we have since enjoyed; for the peaceable and rational manner in which we have been enabled to establish constitutions of government . . . for the civil and religious liberty with which we are blessed . . . and also that we may then unite and beseech Him . . . to promote virtue, knowledge and the increase of science among us."

Several more Thanksgiving day proclamations were made in the following years; then under Jefferson they were forgotten. But those sentiments of Washington's original proclamation became a creed generations later to Sarah Josepha Hale, editor of the highly influential Godey's Lady's Book, the magazine with the quaint and colorful fashion prints which today decorate lamp shades and hang in picture frames in thousands of homes.

This cultured, energetic little woman devoted a large share of her time to her plan to make Thanksgiving day an annual national holiday. She wrote literally thousands of personal letters to governors urging that their states unite in observing a Thanksgiving day. She foresaw the coming of the Civil war, and she looked upon a national Thanksgiving day, uniformly celebrated by all of the states, as conducive toward peace.

But it was not until after the war had started that she succeeded in obtaining a Presidential proclamation from Abraham Lincoln.

A national proclamation has gone forth in each of the 74 years since that time. If we are happy about it, let us give thanks this Thanksgiving to the far-seeing editor of Godey's Lady's Book.

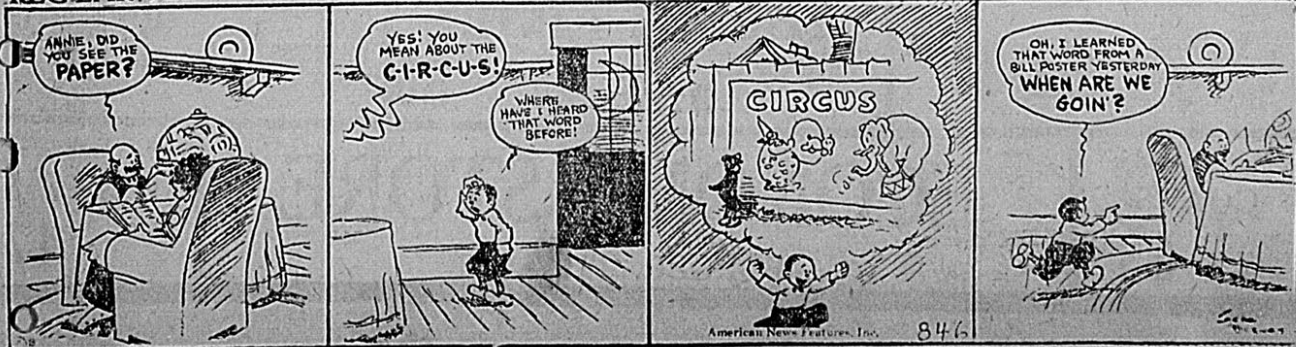

## 5-Minute Biographies



The Ballplayer Who Led A Million Souls Down The Sawdust Trail to Salvation

The most popular preacher in the history of the Christian pulpit was an ex-booze-fighter and the ex-ballplayer—Billy Sunday.

Eighty million people—two thirds of all the men, women and children in America—flocked to hear his rough-and-ready, rip snorting message of sin and salvation.

I saw Billy Sunday many times. He was a fury, a human dynamo in trousers. I saw him thump his chest, tear off his coat, collar and tie, leap up on a chair, stand with one foot on the pulpit, and then fling himself on the floor in imitation of a ball player sliding into home plate. Nobody ever went to sleep listening to Billy Sunday. His sermons were as entertaining as a circus. He preached so strenuously that he carried a physical trainer with him and never a day passed that he didn't get a pummeling and a rub-down.

Unlike most evangelists, Billy Sunday appealed mostly to men. He used to say: "I am a rube of the rubes. The odor of the barnyard is on me yet. I have greased my hair with goose grease and

blackened my boots with stove blacking. I have wiped by old proboscis with a gunny-sack towel. I have drunk coffee out of my saucer and I have eaten with my knife. I have said 'done it' when I should have said 'did it' and I expect to go to heaven just the same."

He was born in a log cabin in Iowa and reared in an orphan asylum. When he was fifteen, he got a job as janitor in a school. This job paid him \$25. a month and gave him a chance to get an education. All he had to do was to get up at two o'clock in the morning carry coal for fourteen stoves keep all fires going during the day, sweep and polish the floors, and then keep abreast of his studies.

His first real job was as assistant to an undertaker in Marshalltown, Iowa. It was while holding down that job that he began to make a name for himself as a ballplayer. He could run the bases so fast that Pop Anson, a leader of the Chicago White Sox, sent for him; and before Billy Sunday was 21 he was a star performer in the big league. "I could circle those bases in 14 seconds," he used to say, "and that's a record that's never been beaten."

Five years after he left the baker's shop that the revelation occurred which changed him from a hard drinking ballplayer into the most hypnotic preacher since the days of John Wesley.

Here is what happened to him—and now I am quoting Billy Sunday's own words.

"One day in 1887, I was walking down a street in Chicago in company with some famous ballplayers. We went into a saloon. It was Sunday afternoon and we got tanked up and then went and sat down on a corner. Across the street a company of men and women were playing on instruments—horns, flutes, and slide trombones and others were singing the hymns that I used to hear my mother sing back in the log cabin in Iowa, and I sobbed and sobbed. Then a young man stepped out and said 'We are going down to the Pacific Garden Mission. Won't you come down to the Mission with us? I am sure you will enjoy it. You will hear drunkards tell how they have been saved and girls tell how they have been saved from the red light districts.'

"I arose and said to the boys, 'I'm through, I am going to Jesus Christ. We've come to the parting of the ways, and I turned my back on them. Some of them laughed and some of them mocked me; but one of them gave me encouragement.' That is the way he describes his own conversion.

The skeptics and scoffers used to accuse Billy Sunday of exploiting religious hunger for the mere sake of money. Yet the truth is he gave up a salary of five hundred dollars a month as a ball player to work for the YMCA for 83 dollars a month—and it was sometimes six months before he collected even that!

Never before town called Babylon on the Hudson seen such a frenzy of religious excitement. His arrival was heralded months in advance. At least twenty thousand prayer meetings were held in preparation for his coming.

During his stay in New York Billy Sunday preached to a million and a quarter people, and nearly a hundred thousand sinners came forward and renounced their evil ways.

**FACSIMILE . . . . . Telegraphy**  
Facsimile telegraphy, which means telegraphing an exact copy of the original message, is being done by radio as well as by telegraph. Anything which can be reproduced in black and white can be transmitted in facsimile. The possible uses of this are immeasurable. It is used already to send exact copies of legal documents in a hurry, to forward "rush" advertising copy to newspapers, and I believe to rush fingerprints and pictures of criminals to police authorities, to help identify a suspect under arrest.

### NEWSPAPERS . . . . . All Day

As all of those things are perfected, people will get their news by radio or wire. There will be a receiving set in the house with a roll of paper in it. From the news office there will be sent simultaneously, to all subscribers, pages of the newspaper by a facsimile process. The printed pages will roll out of the receiving set, one by one. This will go on at intervals all day and keep the subscriber abreast of the news all the time.

### WOOD . . . . . Preservation

A few years ago a friend of mine found buried under the bed of a river in Yucatan, thousands of mahogany logs which had been cut by the early Spanish explorers, who tried to float them down to the sea for shipment to Cuba or Spain. A great flood had covered them with gravel and there they lay for more than 300 years. My friend dug them up and made a small fortune. The lumber was still as sound as when first cut.

Now they are 'mining' white cedar from the farmland near Mauriceatown, N. J. Buried for hundreds of years, tree trunks up to five feet thick and fifty feet long are being hauled out of the mud sometimes 30 feet deep. The wood is sound and smells like freshly-cut cedar.

These logs have been preserved because they have been continuously submerged. Wood decays when it is alternately wet and dry. Next to a dry barn the best place to store wood apparently is at the bottom of a pond.

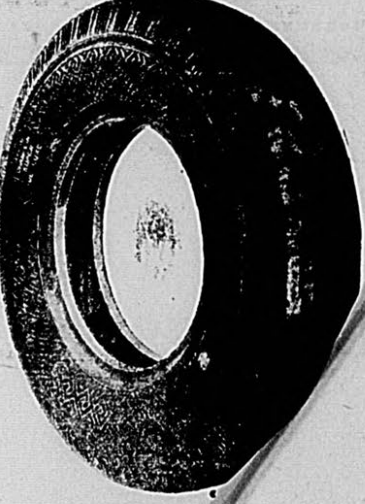
