

School Enrollment Shows Loss From 1965

Final tabulations indicate Spearman school enrollment is off eight pupils over the last year's total of 1109. Official enrollment in high school is 370 pupils (up 32). Junior High has 359 (off 34). Elementary has 372 pupils (off 6). Junior High graduated 109 pupils from the 8th grade last May so this shifting of students into high school explains the drop in the grades and the increase in High School.

No break-down was available as yet for High school grades. Junior High Principal James Pennington shows 82 Fifth graders, 106 Sixth graders, 74 Seventh graders and 97 Eighth graders. Elementary Principal Allen Alford has five first grades with 89 pupils; five second grades with 87 pupils; four third grades with 104 pupils and four fourth grades with 82 pupils.

Last year Spearman schools enrolled 1109 students. This year the second day of school showed 1101 students on the rolls.

Board Reviews Student Draft Classifications

No mass draft of satisfactorily performing college students is in prospect for these registered with Selective Service Board No. 99, headquartered in Perryton, despite some recent classification changes by the board.

More than 150 students had their draft classification changed in a meeting this month from 2-S (student deferment) to 1-A (available for military service).

The local board secretary Mrs. Don Shockley, pointed out, however, that many of those whose classifications were changed would soon be switched back to the stu-

dent deferred category.

Changed were those who had no information in their files that they rank high enough in their classes to be deferred, or who had no score on the Selective Service College Qualification Test.

Some of those changes had had the required information in their files, but they failed to have a satisfactory test scores or class standing for continued 2S classification, and will continue in 1-A.

The registrant has a responsibility to get his college to provide the necessary information on class ranking, to qualify for the deferment.

Law on college students provides that they must be in the upper one-half of their class, based on first year work; in the upper two-thirds, based on the second year, and the upper three-fourths, based on subsequent years work.

As an alternate, the college student can be deferred if he has a score of 70 or above on the qualification test.

The board headquartered here, serving Ochiltree, Hemphill, Lipscomb and Hansford counties had some 275 students in the deferred class prior to the reclassification.

This board will be sending ten persons for induction on Sept. 22. Seven to fill the September call for the local board and three who have been deferred for various reasons from other calls.

Going for induction on that date will be Kenneth G. Hargrove, Lester E. McCants, Robert W. Allison, Adolph Bressler, Douglas C. McGarraugh, Michael W. Morris, Sandy G. Fiel, Rodney L. Hale, Arnold D. Wood and Billy B. Morris.

The October draft call has already been received, with 14 due to be sent by the board here. Notices on these are due to be sent out by the first of September.

Ten are due to go for physicals on September 22, with the physical call not yet received for the October 4 date.

Mrs. Shockley pointed out to

college students who may have lost their deferment status, that they are eligible for a special 1-SC classification.

The law provides that a registrant satisfactorily pursuing a full-time course on instruction at a degree granting college when he receives his notice to report for induction may have the induction cancelled until the end of the academic year.

This special deferment is available only one time to each student.

Should a student be placed in that classification, he then will have an opportunity to bring his grades up to the required level and then could once more be eligible for the 1-S classification of a regularly deferred student.

It also spurred the building of western railroads. The nine to ten million cattle moved through this trail represents the greatest movement of animals, under the control of man, in all history.

Besides the work being done on the proposed 50th anniversary of the Spearman marker and the Hansford Cemetery marker, two buildings deserving of a historical medallion are being considered.

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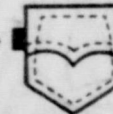

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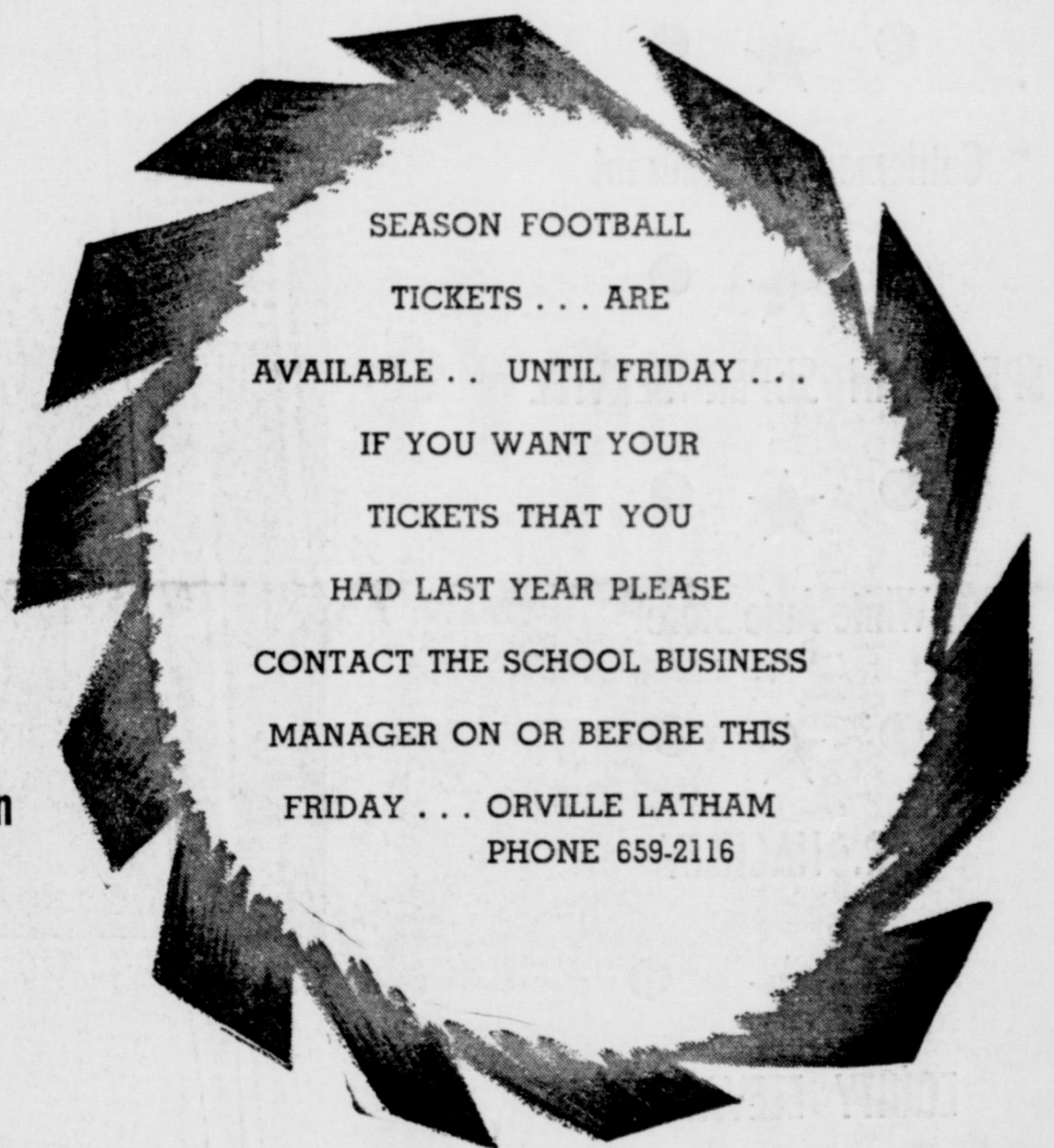

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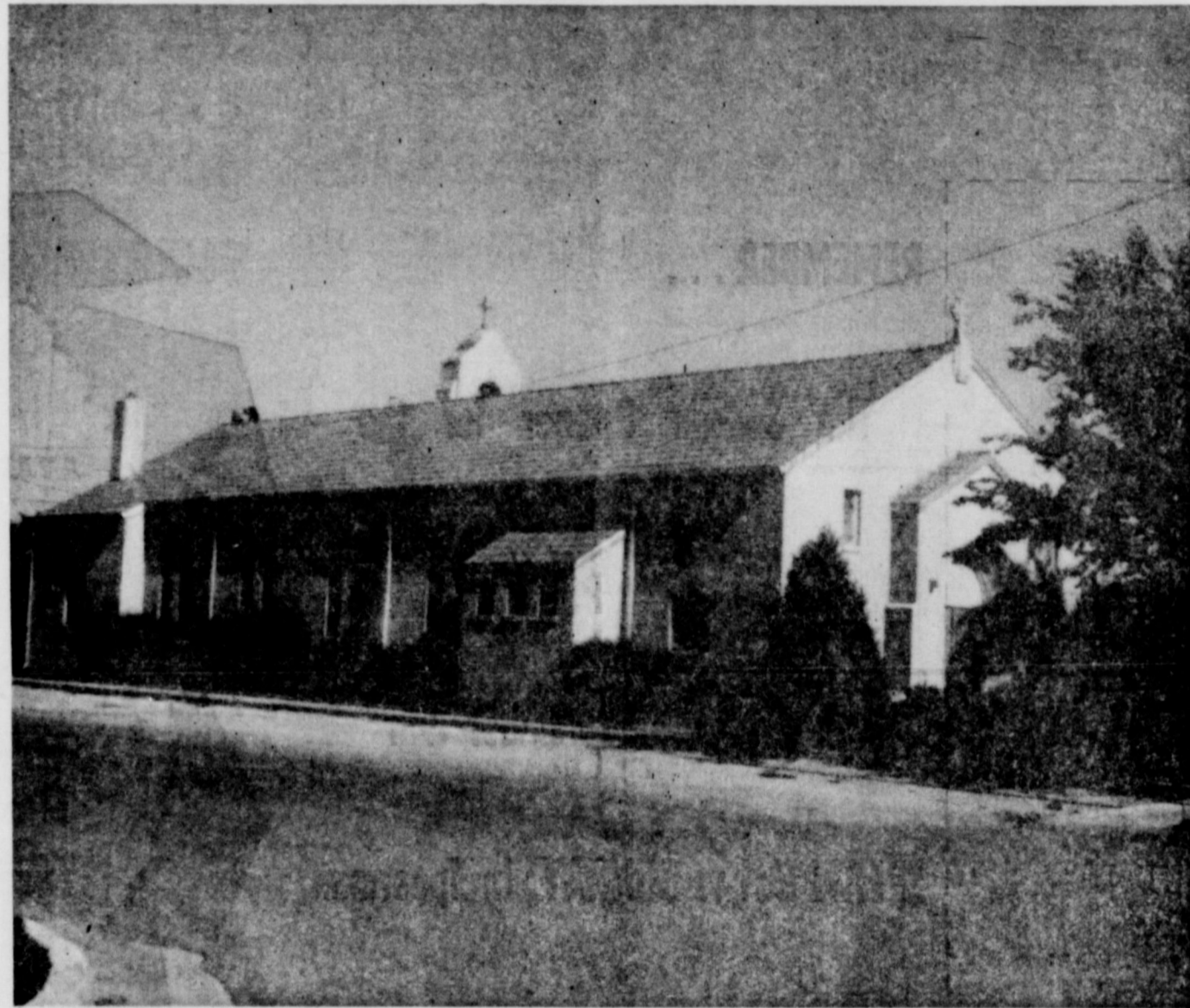

Spearman Teachers Told That Knowledge Doubles Each 15 Yrs.

The sum total of human knowledge is doubling every 15 years. The teacher has to step lively just to keep up, and this is what motivates teachers in their drive for heightened skills and greater understanding.

These facts were presented to Spearman school teachers during pre-school sessions held last week for the entire faculty.

Yesterday's Curriculum in math, science, social studies, languages is old hat for today--and impossible for tomorrow, speakers continued.

Mrs. Gudridge, who is assistant director of information for the National Education Association states that the typical middle-class

teacher is not fitted without special training, to cope with the youngsters of an up-the-down-staircase environment. Now Federal legislation is making this kind of training possible. The reason teachers try so hard to fight off academic obsolescence is the nature of the child who sits in their classrooms. If he is a middle class child he has been exposed to books, television, magazines, films, and other learning experiences almost from the time his eyes began

to focus. He knows more than any child entering school ever knew in previous times. Teachers must jump to keep up with these five and six year olds, not to mention their savvy older brothers and sisters.

A major reason behind the overwhelming drive for more education is that teachers themselves are a young breed nowadays. Of the women teachers new in service, 39 percent are under 36 years of age, and a whopping 61 percent of the

men in service are under age 36. A substantial percent of the Nation's current teaching corps has 30 years of service ahead of it, and it is obvious teachers are bent on making these 30 years a lifelong search for wisdom.

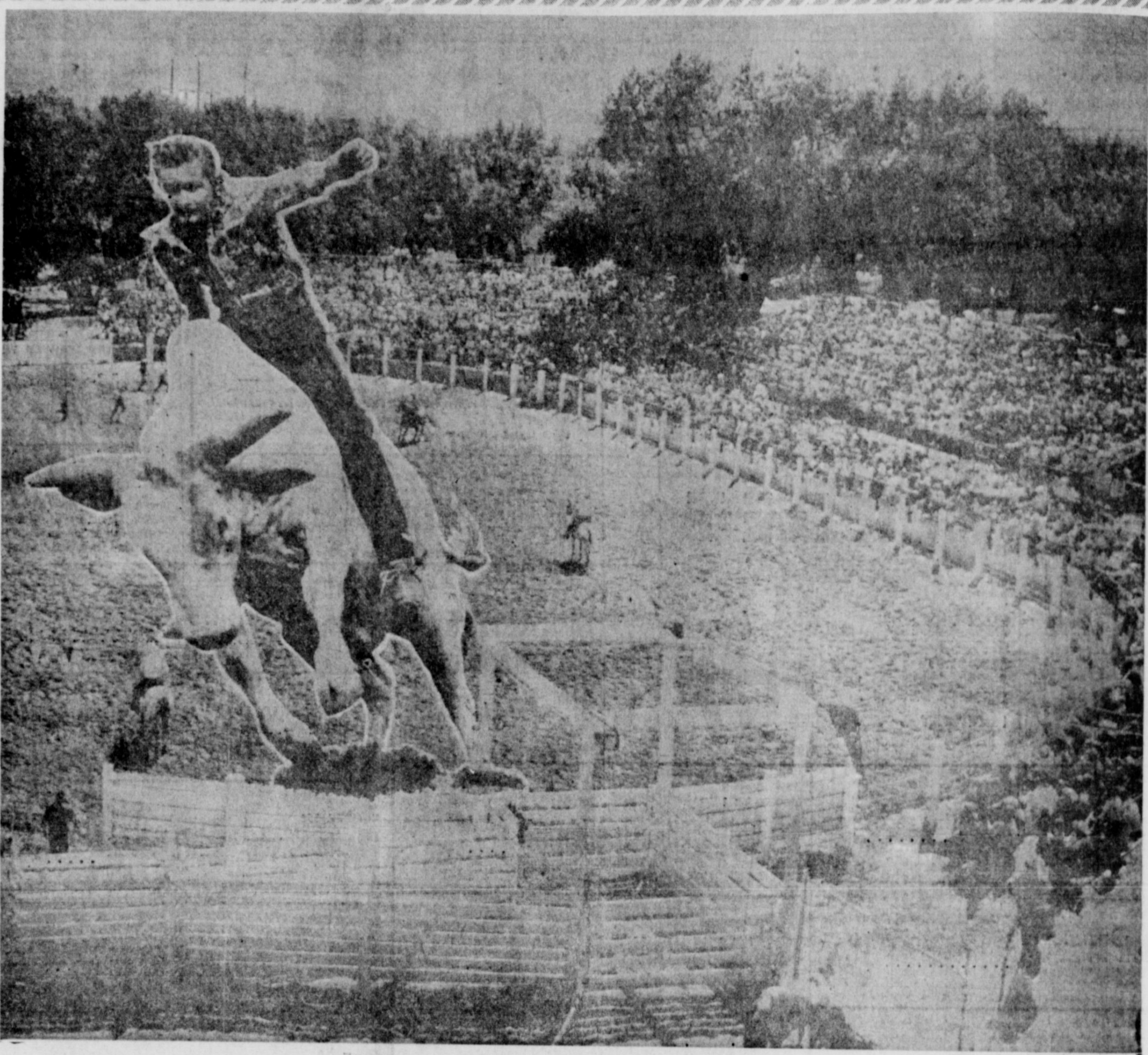
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
