

## Lt. Michael E. Crawford Awarded Medal For Heroism



Headquarters, 1st Cavalry Division (Airmobile) has announced the following award: Award of the Army Commendation Medal for heroism to Michael E. Crawford, 1st Lieutenant, Transportation Company, USA, Troop C, 1st Squadron, Cavalry.

Lt. Crawford was awarded the Army Commendation Medal with Device on the 14 of October 1966 in the Vietnam theatre of operations for heroism while participating in aerial flight.

First Lieut. Crawford distinguished himself by heroism in action on October 14, 1966, while serving as aircraft commander aboard a UH-1H helicopter during combat operations in the Republic of Vietnam, receiving word that a helicopter had been shot down nearby. Lieut. Crawford immediately loaded an entry squad aboard his aircraft and proceeded to the location of the downed helicopter.

The site, in a small clearing, was under intense enemy automatic weapons and small arms fire. With only two door gunners to provide suppressive covering fire, Lieut.

Crawford landed his aircraft in the clearing and debarked the infantry. This aggressive maneuver caught the enemy by surprise and resulted in three enemy soldiers killed and the sounding and ultimate capture of four prisoners with weapons, equipment and valuable intelligence information. Lieut. Crawford's courage and determination are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service, and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit, and the United States Army.

The 24 year old Lieutenant has a wife, Rita, and a son Shaun, age 3 years. Rita is a Senior this year at WTSU.

## Retires After 20 Years With School Cafeterias

Mrs. Bill (Willie) Wallis was honored at special ceremonies Monday night at the P-TA meeting, with a presentation of a 20-year pin for her services with the school Lunchroom.

Mrs. Wallis retired from the program in January of this year.

In the absence of Dr. B. E. Reeves, School Superintendent, James Pendergraft Jr. High Principal, presented the award.

Mrs. Wallis began work with the school lunch program in September 1944 when the program was operated under private management of Mrs. Paul Roach.

When the State and Federal school Lunch Program became effective, Mrs. Roach resigned and Mrs. Wallis and Mrs. Otha Bruce continued working about a year at which time Mrs. Wallis resigned to move to the country but returned to work after a lapse of 2 years (1949-50) & has worked continuously until January 13, 1967.

When Mrs. Wallis first began school lunch work, she and her helpers served about 100 students and adults with the work day beginning about 8 a.m. and ending some days after sundown. All for the same pay \$12 to \$15 per week. And sometimes there wasn't enough money to pay for the food and the salaries of the women.

She has seen the school build, and the number of students served increase to 900 per day.

Mrs. Wallis' primary responsibility with the school lunch program has been the baking, which included the baking of all breads, cakes, cookies and pies. During her last four or five years, she prepared these "noddies" for about 90 students and adults each day.

She was left a widow in 1958 upon the death of her husband. She has one daughter, Mrs. F. W. Thomas, who lives in Spearman with her family. Mr. and Mrs. Thomas have three children in the Spearman schools: Debbie, a sophomore; Steve and David, Junior High, and Lisa, age 4 years.

## Inspection Of Motor Vehicles Going Too Slow

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated an accident on rural highways in Hansford County during the month of January, according to Sergeant W. J. McLean, the Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in an estimated property damage of \$225 April 15 is the deadline to have your motor vehicle inspected. During the past five and one-half months 239,000 or 33 percent of the approximately 600,000 registered vehicles in this region have been inspected. This leaves 470,000 vehicles to be inspected between now and the April 15 deadline. If this number of uninspected vehicles were divided evenly among the 700 official inspection stations in this region, each would have approximately 672 vehicles to inspect in about 40 working days or about 17 vehicles per day. The inspection stations in heavily populated areas will have more than this average to inspect. In areas where there are only a few inspection stations you may have many miles to travel to get your vehicle inspected.

The Sergeant urges motorists to have their vehicles inspected without delay to avoid the inconvenience of waiting lines.

Remember, no extension of the safety inspection deadline, April 15, 1967.

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**Washington Report**

From Congressman  
**BOB PRICE 10TH DISTRICT, TEXAS**



I was very happy to introduce my third bill of the session on February 2. It was given the number House Resolution 4655 & is entitled the Human Investment Act.

During the campaign I suggested several ways in which the Federal Government could give some powers back to local governments and to individuals. One suggestion I made was a tax credit to industry for training workers. This is the Human Investment Act.

The thought behind this bill is that the most effective job trainer in the Nation has always been the free enterprise economy. Business and labor working together have consistently been able to develop sound training

programs, superior to inefficient government programs such as the Job Corps.

The Human Investment Act offers employers a 10 percent tax credit toward certain expenses of program designed to train prospective employees for jobs with the company or re-train current employees for more demanding jobs.

More than 120 other members of the House have introduced similar bills. With this great number of Representatives already supporting the idea I am hopeful we can pass the bill and get rid of the Job Corps as soon as possible.

Along these same lines, during the campaign I talked about giving property owners a credit on their income tax for local taxes

paid. The logic behind this being that these local governments could then raise their taxes by the amount of the credit in their community and perform the needed services without grants from Washington.

However, the majority of the members of Congress seem to have the opinion that only the Federal Government knows how to collect and distribute tax money. These same members also want to "equalize" by taking money collected in one community or state and giving it to other states and communities.

It appears that the best thing we can hope for this session is to start getting decision-making powers back to local government. A "tax-sharing" plan introduced by several Republicans in the House and Senate. This is possibly a step in the right direction to decentralize the handling of our tax money but is a long way from what needs to be done.

The "tax-sharing" proposal simply means the Federal Government would return a flat percentage of the taxes collected within each state to that state with no strings attached. I question the

wisdom of this plan when the Federal Government could simply reduce taxes by the amount they could afford to return to the states. Why bring the money to Washington, take out a handling charge, and then send it back to the states? The answer is simply. It goes back to those members who believe in the old socialist theory of redistribution of the wealth.

Under the present plans the 17 poorest states would receive supplementary grants. The 33 richest states would have to contribute to a "kitty" to give these 17 states something extra. I just don't consider this fair to the residents of the other 33 states.

However, I believe this tax-sharing program is an improvement over the Great Society programs which increase Federal controls and are designed to destroy any incentive one might have to accumulate any property or savings for the future of himself or his children.

**WORLD WAR II GI HOME LOAN PROGRAM TO END**

The Veterans Administration reports that its twenty-year-active World War II GI home loan program is still accounting for 12 percent of all loan applications. More than two million World War II veterans, according to the agency, still retain unused, unexpired eligibility to get a GI home loan or business loan guaranteed by the Government.

VA has warned these World War II veterans, however, that their eligibility will be ending soon. The whole World War II GI loan program terminates July 25, 1967. The VA says it is not enough that a veteran's first application be received in VA by the deadline date. The veterans' private lender must have applied to have the loan guaranteed or insured by VA by that date. VA has urged World War II veterans who plan to take advantage of their eligibility for mortgages guaranteed by the Government not to wait until the last minute. The July deadline does not apply to Korean Conflict veterans or to those eligible under the new GI program for Viet-Nam Era veterans.

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**Local Couple Tells Of Life In The Republic Of Panama**

Pictured above is Airman Second Class and Mrs. Bill Cator who are now residing in the Panama Canal Zone, at Howard Air Force Base. Bill recently received his second stripe and promotion and hasn't been in the service quite a year yet. He was sent to the Canal Zone last August and his wife, the former Dorothy Smith, joined him in December.

Their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Spec Cator of Gruver and Mr. and Mrs. Preston Smith of Spearman, receive many interesting letters from Bill and Dorothy. Some quotes from letters read as follows:

"The Canal Zone is just like the States but the Republic of Panama is something else. You wouldn't believe it. We are only a few feet out of the Canal Zone. Our back yard is in the Republic of Panama but beyond our back fence is the Canal Zone. The Air Force told us if any riots start out here for us to just climb over our back fence into the Canal Zone and we would be safe. We were warned to watch our step around New Years because that's when the riots usually start.

"Our home is located in Arraijan in the Republic of Panama. The road turning to our house from the main highway is the border line between the Canal Zone and the RofP, so we don't have to go through the check point everytime we come home. But we do have to leave our cars down there at night to keep the Panamanians from stripping them. Every night we park our car there and walk back home.

"People here don't know what a washing machine is. They all use scrub boards and a tub. My washer is a cement tub on my back balcony. I didn't know it was possible to get clothes clean in cold water washing by hand. But they come pretty clean. Our clothes line is pulley-type running from one building to another. Our house is made of cement blocks just plastered together and if you hit a wall too hard it shakes like a leaf in the wind. The partitions between the rooms like about two feet touching the ceiling (for ventilation). We have no glass in the windows, just screen. Every time I sweep the floor I sweep a gallon of cement off the floor.

"We have one television station here and the programs are the same as the States except they are about 6 months old. About all news is concerning Vietnam. The Army sends a lot of boys here to train for Vietnam because the weather here is the same as Vietnam. It helps the boys adjust to the climate.

"These people live about a century behind the States. The women carry big heavy buckets and baskets balanced on their heads. I don't know how they do it, but I have never seen anyone drop them. The little kids run around without clothes. Most people take their baths in community showers; there is one on every street. There are faucets along the streets where you get water, and some of the people just sit down under them and take their bath. Most of the people live in houses you wouldn't put chickens in! No one has a car. They walk, or ride the bus.

"Chickens, pigeons, lizards, monkeys and all sorts of creatures just run wild all over the place. There are avacadoes, bananas, oranges, sugar cane, orchids, and mangoes in our back yard. This place is mostly covered with jungles which are very beautiful, but it pays to keep a safe distance from them.

"When it starts raining here it doesn't fool around about it. If I have clothes on the line when it starts I just let them get wet because by the time I could get them off the line they would be soaked anyway.

"We buy our vegetables at little places by the road called

Chinese Markets. I buy peppers, onions, cabbage, cucumbers, banana's, oranges and tangerines. Bananas are a nickel a pound. We put the green bananas on the balcony to get ripe, and the monkeys ate them during the night.

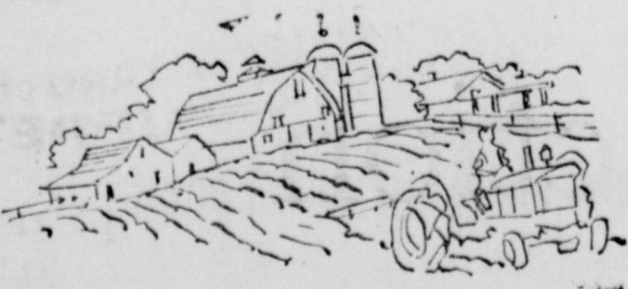
"We do all our shopping at the stores on the Base because Americans are not as welcome in Panama City and that's where all the large shopping centers and big stores are. But things in town are too high for Americans. They put 2 prices on everything... a price for the Panamanians and a price for the Americans. The American price is so much higher than the native price that you can't afford to buy. Our landlord buys things for us though."
