
THE FIRST STATE BANK SHOWS ITS RECORD OF PROGRESS SINCE 1917

The Guaranty State Bank of Hansford, Texas began business on July 10, 1917. The Board of Directors were W. S. McNabb, B. V. Andrews, L. G. Blackmer, L. R. McCornas, and Walter C. Sikes. W. S. McNabb was the bank's first president, B. V. Andrews its first vice-president and Walter C. Sikes its cashier. The Guaranty State Bank had purchased the assets of the Hansford County Bank an Unincorporated Bank which had been organized earlier in 1917. The total assets at its time of organization were \$47,698,30, its deposits totaled \$15,326,63 with loans of \$18,782,89.

Mr. McNabb resigned as president in March 1918, and Mr. L. G. Blackmer was elected president. H. E. James was cashier from October, 1919, until October, 1925. In November, 1919, 1. E. Cameron of Guymon, Oklahoma, purchased the bank and owned it until January 1, 1930, when the bank was purchased by J. R. Collard, P. B. Higgs, Walter Wilmeth, and H. B. Hart.

Defing the early history of the bank, it had pretty tough going. It went through the first world war, low farm and livestock prices, continued droughts, and crop failures and then the depression so the growth of the bank was small until the 1940's. During the second world war, the bank experienced good crops at good prices and began to make a substantial growth which has continued through the years. The name of the bank was changed in November, 1926, to The Fidelity Bank of Commerce and operated under this name until January 1930, when its name was changed to the First State Bank, which is the present tile of the bank. Walter Wilmeth and P. B. Higgs were presidents of the bank during 1930. Early in 1931, J. R. Collard was elected president and continued as the bank's president until his death in 1952. C. A. Gibner came to the bank as vice-president in September 1930. He had been cashler of the First National Bank of Spearman before comling to the First State Bank. During the ownership of the bank by H. B. Hart, P.B. Higgs, J. R. Collard and C. A. Gibner, the bank showed a wonderful growth. After the death of Mr. Collard, C. A. Gibner was elected president and is president at this time.



IN 1927 this picture of the First State Bank shows Cashiers Fred J. Hoskins and Miss Vera Campbell. The Bank was located where the P. A. Lyon Abstract office is now. In 1927 deposits in the bank totaled \$117, 995.13.



LATER IN 1937 the Bank moved across the street into the building now housing the ASC Office. This was it's home until 1960. The above picture was made shortly after the move. During 1947 deposits were \$5,838,538.17. Ten years later, the close of business December 31, 1957 deposits totaled \$4,964,907.79.



IN 1936 the Bank was still located in the same building, but had been remodeled some. Note the window curtains, instead of shades, floor covering and new marble counters. In 1937 the bank statement showed \$443.915.15 on deposit.





The terrible looking cloud came roaring into Spearman about 8 p.m. out of the Nor-theast. The black, turbulant cloud from this freek direction, was rolling and boiling close to the ground. Watchmen unable to tell just what the cloud contained, turned in the tornado alert. Although the man on duty at the City Hall didn't know how to trip the switch for the torna-do whistle, he did punch the fire alarm long enough for Spearman citizens to take notice. The down-town area vacated in a moment of time and city traffic hasn't been heavier in the town's history. Those having no storm shelters took to the highway to out-run the approaching

Sheriff's officers reported nothing but minor damages from the heavy rain and winds Carrol Thompson at the Airport said he had been in 80 nile-an-hour winds several times and he certainly would say that wind velocity was at least this Monday night.



2.36. Other than the big 9.87 in 1965, we look clear back to 1950 for the reading which beats last months 4.08. In June 1950 we recorded 6.33.


