Old Fort Site Visited Sat.

The Hansford County Historical committee met June 9 for a short business meeting and a visit to the old Rifle Pits 15 miles north of Spearman.

Following the business session, members visited the Rifle Pits. Some of the old dug-out markings are still visible as well as the Dodge-City-Tacosia trail nearby. Some of the members found old square nails which had been used in the construction of the Fort. Square nails have not been made for the past 100 years at least.

There is an old Cemetery near the Fort. Three marked graves date back to just a few years after the turn of the century. The cemetery is quite large and must contain many unmarked graves.

As soon as the committee receives the information about the Rifle Pits from the archives in Washington, a historical marker will be erected at the site. This was a station for Federal Soldiers who protected trail drivers from Indian attacks.

County Residents Asked To Help Solve Mystery Of Names



Letter Praises Dr. D. E. Hackley

Residents of Hansford County were asked this week to help solve the mystery of the origins of several geographical names found on county maps.

The information is needed for a dictionary of Texas place names, including Hansford and the other 253 counties, to be published soon by the East Texas State University press.

Before Dr. Fred Tarpley, professor of English at the university, submits his final manuscript, he is appealing to county residents for assistance in contributing information about several names with unexplained origins.

With the following exceptions, the reasons for the choice of approximately 200 names found on detailed maps of the county have already been determined:

Fairwell Draw, Frisco Creek, Hackberry Creek, Hannas Bay, Hansford North O. F., Horse Creek, Kimball, McKibben, New Hope, North Palo Duro Creek, Oiso, Panhandle O. F., Phillips Camp, South Palo Duro Creek, and Wilbanks A. F.

Dr. Tarpley, who started his research on Texas geographical names five years ago, has exhausted material available to him in history books, newspaper files, student research, and interviews with county leaders.

He is hoping that the story behind the naming of the communities, creeks, and other geographical sites listed above can be explained before his book goes to press.

Information will be welcomed by Dr. Fred Tarpley, Department of English, East Texas State University, Commerce Texas 75428.

Sgt. Richards, a career soldier, has been in service 16 years. He has had special language training and is an advisor to the South Vietnamese fighting forces. He has been in Vietnam since last September. He hopes for a chance to return home for a two-week rest sometime in July before returning to the war zone.

Charles would tie her up for days and the minute he released her she made a bee-line to the Reporter Office, much to Charles' chagrin... but Billy's pleasure. 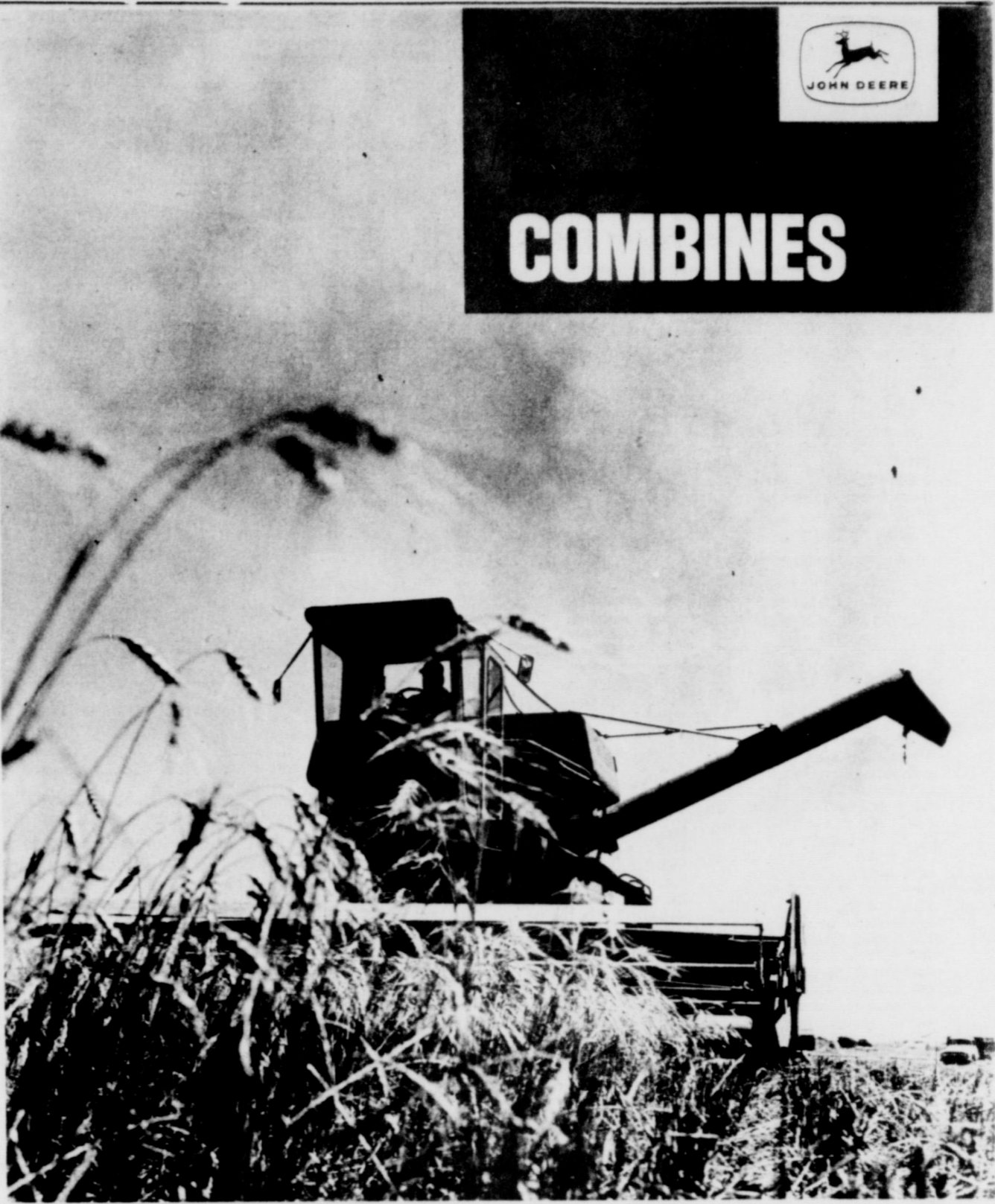

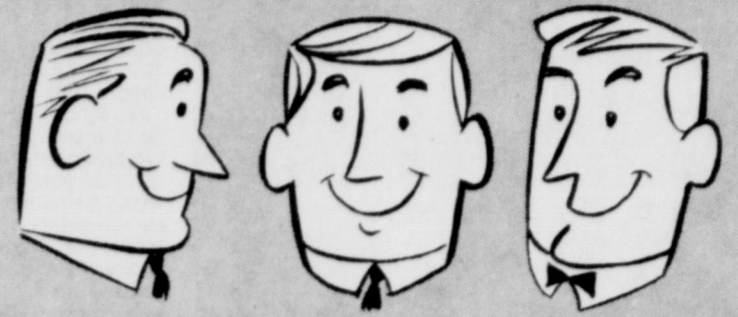

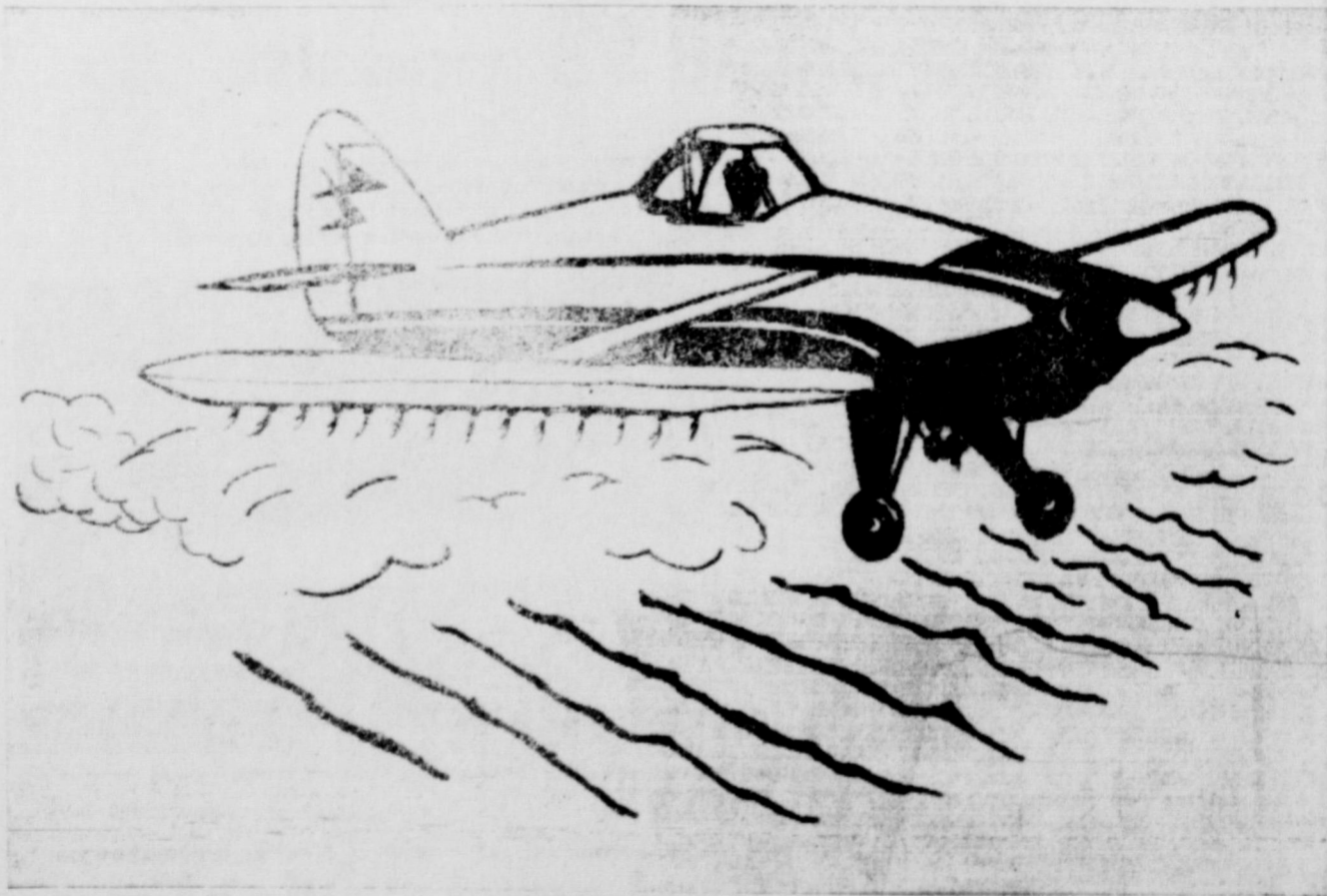
