It has been the home of Excel-Chevrolet Olds Motor Company for the past several years. The Library Board made arrangements with Pittman to buy the building for \$31, 000, with terms. Money for the Library will be raised through public subscriptions made payable to Hansford County Library building fund.



Enrollment has tripled at Nor. as Hospital School of Nursing, thwest Texas Hospital School of Nursing, and as of Septemb-er 1967 the School had a total er 1967 the School had a total 1966, ranked among the high-of 127 students - 47 above nor- est in the State of the thirty-

tember, the major reason for choosing nursing as a career was the desire to serve mankind. Major reasons given for choosing a diploma program were adequate clinical experience, length of the program, and the cost. The major reasons given for choosing Northwest were its recognition as an outstanding school, National League for Nursing accredita tion, and location.

On a national level the demand for registered nurses has soared to an all-time high. There is a need for 125, 000 more registered nurses now! Authorities set the goal for 19-70 at 850,000 and I million by 1975. Presently 621,000 are actively employed; the bare facts show that the shortage may reach 344,000 in the next three years.

Demands for expert nursing care, spurred on in part by Medicare and Medicaid, are growing rapidly - yet a recent report issued by the American Nurses Association shows that close to 6,000 student vacan-

In 1965-66 a total of 35, 125 students graduated from nursing Programs throughout the United States. By 1973 this nu-mber must reach 72,000 graneeds of the nation are to be met.





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
