Lynx Teams To Play Phillips This Week End



Spearman's Jynxing Lynx will meet the Phillips Blackhaws at Lynx Stadium this Friday night. The Blackhaws, who defeated the Dalhart Wolves at Dalhart last Friday night, will meet a determined Lynx team, fresh from an outstanding game against the Guymon Tigers.

Almost as important as the rivalry game, are the other three games between the 7th, 8th and Freshman teams. The 7th and 8th grades will play Phillips here Thursday afternoon, and the Freshman team goes to Phillips on Thursday.

All 55 of the Spearman Lynx players, mainly the undefeated 7th grades, will meet the Phillips Blackhaws this Thursday afternoon, for a Championship game. For the first time in history, the Spearman Tigers will be favored to win over a Phillips team, although little is known of the 7th grade record at Phillips.

Our own little Kittens, as they are known in Spearman, are one of the finest teams in the history of sports in Spearman, and possibly the greatest football team in the history of Spearman grade school.

For the past several weeks various organizations, interested individuals and Library Board members have been taking the pulse of the community on a proposed new Hansford County Library. Emmett Sanders, chairman of the Library Board, stated Monday that a business deal had been worked out with Ernie Pittman for the purchase of his Excel-Chevrolet Olds building on Main Street.

Pittman was approached by the Library Board early last week and he agreed to sell the two-story brick building for \$31,000.00, with terms, which will be worked out later.

This building is perfect for a Library: down-town site, plenty of space, a 35x60 foot room for art exhibits, large rooms for visual aid uses, book repair rooms, plenty of

Season First Snow Tuesday

The season's first wintery blast which invaded this area Thursday, Oct. 26, began to loosen its grip Wednesday as the sun came from behind clouds for the first time in several days.

Little moisture fell from clouds however, .08 was measured in gauges here on Oct. 30. Tuesday's rain mixed with snow left a total of .06 in the official weather gauge.

October's average temperature was in the high 70's. Four days in October were at least 90 degrees and above, 14 days listed 70 degree temperatures and there were 4 days when the high didn't reach the 70 mark. The hottest day last month was 96 on Oct. 1 and the coldest temperature of 29 was reached Oct. 27.

October's total measurement of rainfall was .47 on Oct. 6 and .08 on Oct. 30, bringing the year's moisture to 19.17 inches. The yearly average is 21.53 inches.

Begin Work On Christmas Lights!

Helpful Hints From Me To Thee . . .

Why not start cooking now for Thanksgiving and reduce traffic in the kitchen on the morning of the holiday. Fudge Pie can be made now and simply rewarmed on the day that you want it.

RECIPE: 1 9" pie shell unbaked, 1/2 cup brown sugar, 1/2 cup margarine, 1/4 cup granulated sugar, 2 eggs, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 cup corn syrup, 1/2 cup finely chopped walnuts, 1/2 cup vanilla, 1/4 walnut meats.

First prepare a 9" pie shell unbaked. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. In double boiler set over hot, not boiling water melt chocolate. Add brown sugar and butter to chocolate, beat until well blended, add granulated sugar, and beat again. Add eggs, one at a time, beat well after each addition. Now add salt, then milk and corn syrup combined. Beat until foamy. Replace in double boiler and cook 5 minutes stirring constantly. Remove from heat and stir in 1 cup walnuts and vanilla extract.

Bake 350 degrees for 55 minutes. Add 1/4 cup broken walnuts over top of pie and bake 5 minutes longer. Cool - Freeze then on the day, while the family feasts, unwrap frozen pie heat at 350 degrees 20 minutes. Serve warm with ice cream.

MACHINE WASHABLE BEDSPREADS DEPICT HOBBIES

Even a boy who gets up at dawn on Christmas morning to see what Santa has left, may want to snuggle right back into bed if his gifts include a bedspread that depicts his favorite hobby. For the miniature sports car collector there is a spread that is a sports car, complete with printed wheels, exhaust pipes, floor shift, and two bucket seats that drape over the bed pillows for a realistic effect. The railroad buff will admire a quilt printed with antique trains, and the city boy who longs for a pony may settle for a spread that pictures famous race horses of the past. These novelty spreads are colorful and are machine washable. Durable press and spot resistant finishes are other features that commend them to a boy's mother.

WASHABLE VELVETEEN IS FAVORITE FABRIC

Velveteen is the most popular fabric for toddlers dress-up occasions this season, and party treats are no hazard to this regal looking, yet sturdily-washably pile fabric.

It is best to wash pint-size velveteens by hand, and to keep deep colors separate from other clothes to avoid transferring excess color. Use warm soap or detergent suds and rinses, then allow the garment to drip dry without wringing. For touch-ups on velveteen, use a steam iron or a dry iron over a damp press cloth. Hold the iron just above - but never touching the fabric, as the steam alone will coax the pile to stand up.

CAREER GIRLS NEED A "BEAUTY DRAWER"

A pleasing and practical "send off" gift for the girl starting a new job is a set of make-up and cleanliness supplies--these to create and stock a "beauty drawer" for quick touch-ups that make for a well-groomed appearance the entire day.

Besides comb, brush, mirror, and duplicates of her cosmetics, include a number of clean washcloths and soap. Then make a "beauty bib" from a square of plastic, to tuck in the neckline of dress when sudsing off stale make-up before applying a fresh coat. For emergencies, provide extra hose, spare gloves, and a tiny sewing kit.

Telephone Co. Reduced Rates November 1st

General Telephone Company of the Southwest and Southwestern States customers will share in a \$120 million annual savings for telephone users in the nation.

The seventh long distance rate reduction in five and one-half years will go into effect November 1.

The new rates will apply to station-to-station interstate long distance calls (between states).

Under the new after-midnight economy rate schedule, customers will be able to call the furthest point in the U. S., excluding Hawaii and Alaska--for 75 cents, not including overtime charges and taxes.

Savings also will be realized by customers because the lower priced rate periods have been extended to include more hours. Station-to-station calls will have day rates Monday through Friday from 7:00 A. M. until 5:00 P. M. (Present rates cover a period from 4:30 A. M. until 6:00 P. M. daily.) However, calling periods will not be changed for intrastate messages (within the state).

New evening rates will be in effect from 5:00 to 7:00 P. M. Monday through Friday, and the night rate is scheduled to be Monday through Friday from 7:00 P. M. to 7:00 A. M., plus all day and night on Saturdays, Sundays, New Year's Day, July 4, Labor Day, Thanksgiving, and Christmas.

The new evening rate--from 5:00 P. M. to 7:00 P. M. Monday through Friday--permits calls from General Telephone's five-state operating area to the furthest points in the U. S., excluding Hawaii and Alaska--for \$1.25, for the initial three minutes.

The special late night economy rate has been added for customer-dialed station-to-station calls between midnight and 7:00 A. M., except for coin telephone calls, third-number billing calls, collect calls, and calls on which time and charges are reported. However, exchanges that do not have Direct Distance Dialing equipment also will enjoy the new late night rates on station-to-station calls.

If a call during this time period does not qualify for the special night economy rate because of previously mentioned conditions, it will be billed at the regular night rate. The special late night economy rate permits a call to the furthest point in the U. S., excluding Hawaii and Alaska--for 75 cents, not including overtime charges and taxes.

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



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

Changes Made In Pinocchio



Peoples Gas Co. Makes Delivery To Feed Yards

The first delivery of Natural gas was made Monday to the Texas Beef Producers Feed Yards, 5 miles South of Sunray by Peoples Natural Gas of Amarillo, according to Melvin Semrad, Supervisor of Market Development for Peoples.

The gas is being used at the new 15,000 head feedlot to provide thermostat regulated heat for drinking water, and for the preparation of custom mix cattle feed at the site.

The new feedlot, owned by Tom Marsh and Bill O'Brien of Amarillo, and Glen Deen, of Dumas, received its first shipments of cattle last week. The modern electronic feed mixing and grinding equipment is now in operation with the capability of preparing 40 tons of carefully mixed cattle feed per day.

The natural gas delivery is part of the rapid expansion of Peoples Natural Gas into the irrigation and general agricultural market of the High Plains of Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico.

Peoples is supplying gas to the Sunray area from one of Northern Natural Gas Company's large transmission lines which pass through the area. Northern Natural is the parent company of Peoples Natural Gas.

Enrollment Has Tripled At NW Nursing School

Enrollment has tripled at Northwest Texas Hospital School of Nursing, and as of September 1967 the School had a total of 127 students - 47 above normal capacity.

In a study of the 67 students who entered the school this September, the major reason for choosing nursing as a career was the desire to serve mankind. Major reasons given for choosing a diploma program were adequate clinical experience, length of the program, and the cost. The major reasons given for choosing Northwest were its recognition as an outstanding school, National League for Nursing accreditation, and location.

On a national level the demand for registered nurses has soared to an all-time high. There is a need for 125,000 more registered nurses now. Authorities set the goal for 1970 at 850,000 and 1 million by 1975. Presently 621,000 are actively employed; the bare facts show that the shortage may reach 344,000 in the next three years.

Demands for expert nursing care, spurred on in part by Medicare and Medicaid, are growing rapidly - yet a recent report issued by the American Nurses Association shows that close to 6,000 student vacancies exist in nursing schools throughout the United States. In 1965-66 a total of 35,125 students graduated from nursing programs throughout the United States. By 1973 this number must reach 72,000 graduates annually if the nursing needs of the nation are to be met.

Northwest Grads Scored Highest

Graduates of Northwest Texas Hospital School of Nursing, who took the State Board Examinations for licensure 1965-1966, ranked among the highest in the State of the thirty-three nursing schools in Texas, including seven degree, twenty-three diploma, and three associate degree programs.

Northwest graduates scored the highest in the State in three of the five subject areas. The top scores were made in "Nursing of Children," "Psychiatric Nursing," and "Medical Nursing." Graduates ranked second in the State in "Obstetrics" and seventh in "Surgical Nursing." This achievement of N.W.T. graduates has been consistent in the past seven years.

The School recently enrolled the largest class in its history when 65 students enrolled in September. The next class will enroll in January 1968. Northwest is the only program in Texas that enrolls two classes annually.


Dere Bob and John:
