VETERANS LOANS TO END JULY 25

Less than five months remain or thousands of veterans of World War II to use their privilege for a GI loan to purchase a home farm or for business purposes This warning came from William J. Driver, head of the Veterans Administration.

Present laws provide that the absolute cutoff date for World War II veterans will be on July 1967. This deadline is result of Congressional action which has delayed the final date eligibility several times.

The cutoff will not affect veter ans of the Korean Conflict or veterans who have served since January 31, 1955, Driver pointed out as these veterans are cover ed by different legislation.

Almost seven million loans have been guaranteed by the Veterans Administration to veterans since the beginning of the program following World War II. One out of
