

\$126.50 RADIO IS PRIZE IN SUBSCRIPTION CAMPAIGN

Work On Lakes Due To Begin Within Month

Confidence that work on one or more of five major lakes for the Panhandle would begin within a month was expressed by J. C. Foster, head of the land utilization division of the Farm Security Administration, yesterday at a meeting of the Panhandle Water Conservation Authority in Amarillo.

Foster said that 100 projects are now before a planning committee in Washington and that its report should be issued soon. He said his division had been given additional engineers to expedite the work.

Carl Hinton, secretary of the authority, told of efforts in securing an option on land of the Tierra Blanca creek and that he had to secure an option at a fee of \$500. There was a spirited argument as to whether the money should be paid out of the authority fund or by Randall county. There was no criticism of the action but it was believed Randall county should pay the bill. The group adopted a resolution asking Congressman Jones and his committee that the range program with reference to lake and dam construction be liberalized so as to fit the needs of small ranchers and farmers, and that through the basic soil conservation law this program be permitted to participate in efforts for the public good along this line. The range program was lauded.

The association went on record that counties through the Panhandle association would assume the responsibility of getting options on proposed lake sites and submitting them with the application. The group also resolved to continue its efforts on the program and asked for the fourth quarter financial contribution from members.

The association also voted to invite every community of the approximately 110 counties in the five-state drought region to participate in the plans for the organization and in its program in the future.

The association discussed the advisability of enlarging its scope of activities by aiding in the seeking of new industries for the entire Panhandle area. The group which numbered about 100 men were guests of the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce at the luncheon at noon honoring Col. Ernest O. Thompson.

The all day program will include a morning patriotic program at the high school auditorium featuring an Armistice day address by Rev. Harold B. Duryee, pastor of the First Christian church of Liberal. Other numbers on the program will include instrumental music, band music, welcome address, response to welcome address, greetings from Hansford county ex-service men and observance of the "zero hour". At the noon hour all ex-service men of Hansford county are to be guests of the Perryton Legion post at a pot luck dinner to be served at the Post Hut in Perryton. Following the dinner the annual football game at 2:30 p. m. In the evening the Perryton Legion post will feature the annual Armistice Day dance with the Abel Snider orchestra furnishing the music.

Seven Senators Kill Soil Conservation Bill

Soil conservation—one of the keystones of Roosevelt's New Deal last week figured briefly in the legislative picture as the special session wore on to its end.

The Legislature last May passed a soil conservation act which provided tax remissions of \$1,500,000 to counties to carry on the program. At the instance of Sec. of Agriculture Wallace, Alfred vetoed the measure because the Federal government would not approve it.

During the summer farmers held meetings over the state and drafted a compromise soil conservation bill which was acceptable to all factions.

Last week end farm legislation leaders in both houses of the Texas Legislature assured Alfred that all groups had gotten together, so he submitted the subject of soil conservation for legislative action. The bill was expected to sail through without opposition.

In the Senate Eph Davis of Brownwood author of the bill, sponsored the new bill. Last Monday Davis argued and fought for his bill but 7 senators killed it. He passed the bill to engrossment by a 16-11 vote but when he tried to finally pass the bill, the vote was 21-7 four votes short of the necessary 4-5 vote.

The 7 against: Harold Beck of Texarkana, T. J. Holbrook of Galveston, Weaver Moore of Houston, Frank Rawlings of Ft. Worth, John Redditt of Lufkin, Morris Roberts of Pettus, and Albert Stone of Brenham. They declared that the bill required more study and should be passed on until public hearings had been on it.

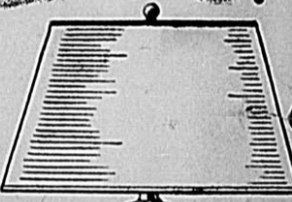
