Crime recommended higher pay and other benefits for the police officers as the foundation for a better law enforcement.

As a member of that Committ-

ee, I agree that many police are not paid a salary or provided any fringe benefits comparable with other occupations.

The foundation for a successful attack upon the problem of crime is better law enforcement and it follows that better law enforcement requires the best police officers.

The Presidents Commission on Law Enforcement and Administration of Justice reports that

in 1967 alone there will be 50, -000, vacancies in police dept. throughout the nation. The Co mmission also reports that the average starting salary for a patrolman in small cities is \$4,600. In large cities the average is \$5,300 and typical maximum pay is less that 1,000

more than the starting salary. Fringe benefits cusomary with most jobs today such as life insurance and survivors benefits are frequently not available to local law officers. And because police work is considered a hazardous occupation, in-surance premiums are high and difficult to meet with a low

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The policeman, like the soldier, frequently lays his life on the line carrying out his duties. Congress has provided generous fringe benefits to the military in recognition of the dangers of military life and local law enforcement officers should have similar recognition,

The Federal government can-not however, inject itself directly into the correction of this obvisously unjust situation confronting the local policemen. But the Congress can and often has stimulated local and state authorities by example. And

eral law enforcement officials in the United States but these officers rely daily on the support of more than 420,000 lo-



cal and state officers. For example, local police may accmpany postmasters to banks

with large sums of money. FBI, Secret Service, Postal Inspectors, Immigration officials and many others depend on the assistance of local police departments in carrying out their duties. And local officers take an oath to iphold the U.S. Constitution and all Federal laws. The responsibility should be reciprocal.

A well-written law of disability and survivorship compensation could stimulate state and local governments to develop state

laws for analogous local circum-Under existing law, Federal off-icers are provided for in a number

of compensatory procedures, in-cluding the Federal Employees Compensation Act which is administered by the Department of Labor for the benefit of disabled officers or their surviving wives and dependent children, I agree with the Republican Task; Force on Crime that we should

guarantee equal treatment to local police who risk their lives to assist Federal officers protected by this program in such activities as apprehension of bank robbers, kidnappers and AWOL military personnel. The cost to the Federal government would not be large but the dividends to better law enforcement would be signi-

ficant.
The plan would be a first step in improving the financial situation of the police officer and would establish a precedent. I believe this measure would be a real contribution to police morale and serve as an inducement to others to consider police work as a ca-

Our local law enforcement officers are working under severe handicaps now as the result of Su-preme Court decisions which have clouded the criminal law of the land with unnecessary confusion, doubt and uncertainty.




